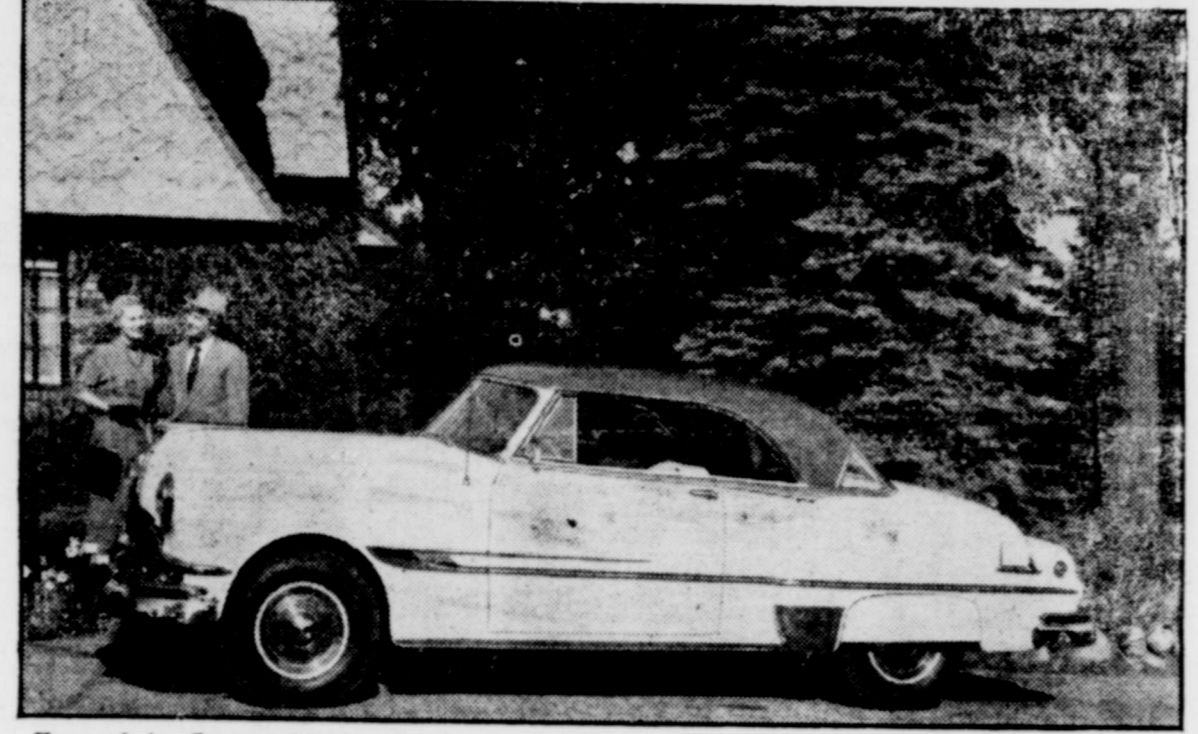

Bloodmobile Is Coming to Wichita Falls Jan. 2nd-3rd

A bloodmobile from the Red Cross Defense Center at Fort Worth will be in Wichita Falls January 2nd and 3rd to take at least 300 pints of blood to be donated by Wichitans. The blood will be for use in Korea and for the national defense effort.

Attentive Group Hears Mrs. R. A. Lincoln Review

Directors of the Wichita County Chapter of the American Red Cross approved the project at a meeting held Tuesday morning in the directors' room at the City National Bank.

Red Cross officials will seek to register 400 potential donors for the two day project. The bloodmobile unit can take 150 pints each day but the additional donors will be sought to allow for possible rejections.

The Mobile will be at the Boys Club. On the first day the hours will be from 1 to 7 P. M. and on the second day from 9 to 11 A. M. and from 12 noon to 4 P. M. Requirements are that donors must not have eaten later than 4 hours before coming to give blood and anyone ever having jaundice can not be used.

Anyone in Burkburnett interested in giving blood, should contact A. H. Lohofener, Burkburnett, Red Cross Chairman, and tell him what time and which day it will be convenient to go, and you will be notified a week ahead of your appointment date.

Modern In In Every Detail

The owners have wanted to build Burkburnett a beautiful new drive-in theatre for a long time and that was their intention when the site was leased some time ago, but the government shut-down came on materials made it impossible to start construction until materials were again made available. But now that the go ahead sign has been given on most of the material, it shouldn't be long until Burkburnett can enjoy one of the very best in places of entertainment.

ANOTHER RECORD FOR OIL

This year, the American people will burn a record-breaking 46,500,000,000 gallons of gasoline. Since 1946, the increase in demand alone has amounted to 40 million gallons a day—which is more than the total daily consumption of gas as recently as 1929.

On top of that, we will use over 60,000,000,000 gallons of other oil products by the time 1951 becomes history. Total consumption comes to about two gallons per day per man, woman and child. By comparison, the average for the rest of the world is approximately half a pint a day per person.

Those facts are clues to the high state of American living standards. In the home, in industry, on the farm, on the highway, oil has been a revolutionary factor. It does—efficiently, quickly, cheaply—a thousand and one tasks that used to be performed with the muscles of man or beast. And it is the source of a multitude of valuable products—from cosmetics to "soapless soap"—which, in many instances, bear no superficial resemblance to oil at all.

One of oil's most spectacular achievements has been in filling the huge military requirements and taking care of the ever-growing civilian demand at the same time. Within a year after the outbreak of the Korean war military use of oil actually doubled. It is still increasing. But the industry is sure it can handle whatever comes, and its past record certainly justifies that confidence. Oil is used to doing the near-miraculous.

Tree Our Greatest Chemical Plant

Conservationists, lumbermen and forestry enthusiasts in general are having a busy time of it honoring 83 year old Dr. Carl A. Schenck, who, though his home is in Lindenfels, Germany, is widely considered the "father of American reforestation". Highlight of his current American tour, under the auspices of the American Forestry Association, will be the dedication of a Redwood grove near Orrick, California.

In the meantime, Dr. Schenck has been similarly honored by the Vermont Forest and Farmlands Foundation, and has toured the east on what he calls an inspection of the "greatest chemical factories in the world." For, he explains, trees manufacture from water and soil materials, 1575 different products.

Dr. Schenck first came to America in 1895 at the request of the late George W. Vanderbilt, to become forester of the Biltmore Estates, near Asheville, N. C. In 1898 he founded the Biltmore Forest School, the first in America, on the Vanderbilt estate, and remained in this country promoting reforestation until 1918. During his early years at Asheville, Dr. Schenck planted 1,000 acres of white pine seedlings, and recently had the thrilling experience of seeing "his" forest again, now half a century old.

What America needs is not only more trees, but more Dr. Schencks to encourage them.

What Will We Whittle On Now?

A squirt of plastic into a mold, the whoosh of a big steam press, and there it is . . . a new dining room table, or a case for a grand piano, or a bedstead, or maybe a whole set of chairs. Furniture that won't warp, or split, with no varnish to check or paint to peel or veneer to loosen. But this new plastic furniture, soon to be in production in somewhat smaller items, will never bring joy to the antique hunter. No "patina" of age, not even any wormholes . . . nor marks of craftsmanship, either.

A new plastic molding press about the size of a locomotive, now about ready for production work in the Decatur, Ill., plant of General Electric, will be the first to turn out completely molded furniture. This 135 ton press, probably a smallish hint of others to come, can turn out end tables and kitchen cabinets, weighing up to 13 pounds. No doubt this is progress, but we wonder what the home craftsman and the Mr. Fixit will do with their long winter week ends?



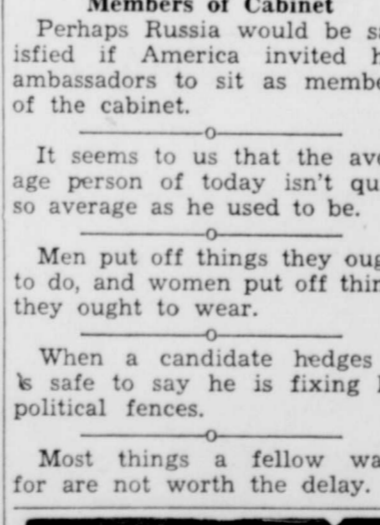

Every fall the lunch box problem returns to plague us. When you think how the children eat when they're home, it just doesn't seem possible to cram one-third of their day's nourishment into so little space! The trick is, of course, to include extra energy-builders—by enriching foods they like and want anyway, by adding foods that are concentrated nourishment in themselves. Chocolate in the milk not only tempts Junior's appetite, it also increases the nutritive value of the milk. World's Record Prices



A world's record price for heifer calves in auction was recently set in Moberge, S. D. when 400 head of Shorthorns were purchased at an average of \$44.00 per hundredweight. The American Shorthorn Breeders' association says that wide demand for Shorthorn range-bred calves and yearlings such as pictured above far exceeds present numbers, and points to another record set on the Omaha market in September when \$40.00 per hundred was paid for a load of Wyoming yearling heifers, another all-time high price for their kind. Most of the heifers will return to range country to produce more calves.



The simple scientific fact that silver can be made sensitive to light enables us to make wonderful snapshots, like the one above, of people and situations we want to remember.

How Is a Picture Made?

ALTHOUGH I usually steer away from the technical aspects of photography in these columns, I do think that anyone really interested in picture taking should know a little about the fundamentals.
 We know that with a camera we can make pictures of almost anything we can see. And it all depends on one simple scientific fact. Silver can be made sensitive to light.
 Mostly we think of silver as a bright shiny metal, but the black area in your film negative is silver too. It's black because it consists of finely-divided rough particles. When you buy a roll of film, the silver is in still a different form. At that point it exists as whitish silver salts that has been treated with sensitizing dyes, heated, mixed with gelatin, and coated on a transparent film base.
 Everyone knows that you mustn't let light get to the film when you load your camera—but not everyone knows exactly why. It is because the only time light should reach your film is when you press the button that opens the shutter to take a picture. Light passes through the open shutter and the image of your picture is formed on the light-sensitive silver-salt emulsion of the film.
 In due time, your photofinisher will immerse the film in a developing solution and the light-struck silver salts will turn into particles of black metallic silver. A fixing bath will dissolve the particles of silver salts on the areas of the film that were not exposed to light. And there will be your negative, complete in every detail.
 But this negative is in reverse—it is black where it should be white and vice versa. So then the photofinisher, as a final step, will take a piece of sensitized paper—coated with silver salts just about like the film—and expose it to light through the negative. And, after development, there will be your finished print—a record of what you saw through the viewfinder of your camera which led you to push the button that opens the shutter that lets light through to the light-sensitive silver of the film.
 And that, in capsule form, is the answer to the question—"How Is a Picture Made?"

Pontiac features is the Dual-Range Hydra-Matic Drive. The owner of the new 1952 model is provided with two completely optional driving ranges, each having individual characteristics which make it suitable for two different classes of driving conditions.

One of these systems provides the usual first, second, third and fourth gear speed range permitting smooth, economical performance for country and boulevard driving. The second is a new first, second and third gear range particularly adapted for driving in congested traffic or mountainous territory.

When driving in the 1-2-3 traffic or mountain range, the car will normally remain in third gear and cannot shift into fourth except at very high speeds. According to the engineers, this gives greater flexibility in normal city traffic, provides engine braking in mountains or on steep hills, and because of the greater reduction in the gear box allows for a lower ratio rear axle. This permits the car to accelerate more quickly and at the same time assists in braking, a safety factor and a marked contribution to longer brake life.

In the 1-4 range, most forward driving or cruising is done in the fourth gear speed which brings the new 3.08 to 1 rear axle into full economy service. The new axle ratio is a 15 per cent lower reduction than the previous 3.64 to 1 which results in corresponding deduction in engine revolutions per mile of travel. The result is quieter operation, improved fuel economy on the highway and driving more nearly approaches the effect of "coasting."

Selection of either of the drive ranges is made, without reference to the speed of the car, by moving the Hydra-Matic Selector Lever into the desired driving position.

SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

IOWA PARK: Range grasses in the Wichita Falls area will go through the winter and emerge next spring in the shortest condition that they have been in the past several years. This condition is attributed to the prolonged summer drought, and the limited supplemental pasture usually provided during summer months that give pastures a rest. Several cooperators of the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District who seeded range grasses last spring lost their grass due to the excessive summer drought. Some of the farmers successful in securing a fair stand were Bob Miller, southwest of Wichita Falls, with 30 acres of bluestem and Jerry B. Crain, northeast of Iowa Park. Cooperators securing a fair to good stand of King Ranch Bluestem are Mrs. Gail V. Mitchell, Roy D. Thompson, Everett McCullough, Ray Hirschi, and Hawkins and Hawkins. Farmers and ranchers desiring to make grass plantings this fall and next spring should purchase their seed now. The local Soil Conservation District has equipment for use in seeding grasses. Soil Conservation Service technicians will render assistance in planting procedures, kinds of grasses, rates of planting, seed sources, etc.
