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COUNCILMEN MAKE POLICIES

It has been brought to our attention that some of the citizens of Burkburnett are not properly informed as to the functions of our City Government and it is the purpose of this article to tell how your City is operated:

Your City is operated under the Council-Manager form of government governed by a Home Rule Charter adopted by the people. This charter provides for a Council of 5 men elected at large from the City and from this body a Mayor is appointed. The Council does not have a salary but are paid for meetings attended. The Mayor presides over the meetings of the Council but has no special powers.

The Council passes such legislation as may be necessary and has complete control over finances. The Council makes all important contracts and authorizes borrowing, subject to state and local laws. It grants franchises and controls the administration of the City through the City Manager. All rates and charges for service are set by the Council as well as fines and costs in the Corporation Court.

It will be seen that the Council is the important member of the Council-Manager team. As the elected body it interprets the desires of the people as they relate to City affairs. It determines all policies, gives orders to the Manager accordingly, and requires him to carry them out. The Manager is held responsible for the efficient and economical administration of all City departments.

The Tortoise and Hare Fable Again

Biggest news from England since the overturn of the Labor Government, bigger perhaps, is word from London that the British have heated a house! It is one of the buildings at the big atomic research station at Harwell. The fact that it happens to be heated by atomic energy, instead of wood or coal or peat, might indicate that our long-suffering cousins were simply waiting for the ultimate method. But we still get a big kick out of throwing another log on the fire.

MORE SUNSHINE

Following his extended visit with the president, Defense Mobilizer Charles E. Wilson told a press conference at Key West that defense production is, after all, up to schedule. He was referring, he pointed out, to the schedules of his own bureau, and not those of the Defense Department, which he characterized as "just hopes." He said that defense production is now three times that of a year ago, and that he "would guess" that military production is increasing "at the rate of a billion dollars a month".

A week ago, Chairman Harold R. Boyer, of the Aircraft Production Board of Mr. Wilson's Defense Production Administration, reported that military aircraft production was far behind anticipated goals, having about doubled in the past 12 months, instead of increasing fivefold as President Truman had predicted.

Thus, it's nice to know that everything is alright. A visit to Key West can certainly work wonders.

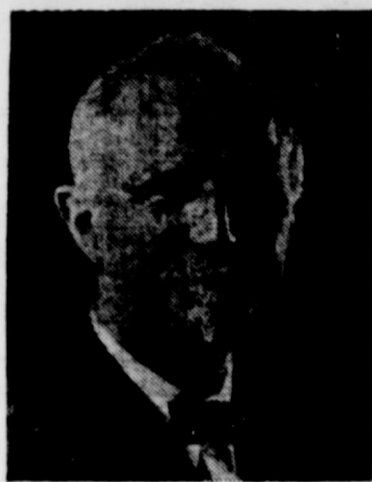
A LOT OF BULL

Half a dozen miles south of the National Capital, a prize Black Angus bull cropped the greensward dividing the teeming lanes of a super-highway last Saturday afternoon just before sundown.

Twelve hours later, having exhausted the police department of Alexandria, Va., the Virginia State Police of Englewood Barracks, charged and capsized a trailer-truck, wrecked a passenger car and injured two occupants and demoralized traffic, the bull was dead, the damage was just under \$5,000 (plus medical expenses) and the highway department was clearing the road for the Monday morning rush.

The bull had killed himself in his charge on the truck. In all Washington, and environs, there were none to cope with him. Congress is in adjournment.

Background of Roger W. Babson



Roger W. Babson

American business has no more inspiring personality than Roger W. Babson, internationally known business commentator and investment adviser. An outstanding feature of his philosophy has been his lifelong insistence on the importance of religion in business.

Born in 1875, reared in an old fashioned atmosphere of hard work and hustle on a farm in Gloucester, Mr. Babson went to the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Upon graduating in 1898, he turned instinctively to financial and business activities.

His exertions, however, undermined his health; he contracted tuberculosis and he was sent West "as good as dead"! It was while he was convalescing from this dread malady that he worked out some of the possibilities and problems of business forecasting. His weekly releases are used by over 450 newspapers and his financial reports by 20,000 corporations and estates. His research work is carried on by a large staff of workers.

Mr. Babson founded Babson Institute for Men; and, in cooperation with Mrs. Babson, developed Webber College for Women—both nationally known educationally institutions. Here young men and women may concentrate on the fundamentals of business administration. Later, he founded Utopia College, located in Eureka, Kansas, the center of the United States. Recently, he has been active in the establishment of another medium of service to the public, the Gravity Research Foundation, located at New Boston, New Hampshire.

Mr. Babson has probably done more than any other man to create among his millions of newspaper readers an interest in simple business problems, and to instill a broader vision in businessmen, enabling them to meet the ups-and-downs of the business cycle.

Mr. Babson's annual Business and Financial Outlook for 1952 will appear in the Burk Star on Thursday, December 27th.

Sixteenth Annual Golden Gloves Contests Started

Fort Worth, Dec. 12—The sixteenth annual Texas Golden Gloves program will get under way this week. The first flurry of action took place at Denton Dec. 6-7-8, where a district tournament was held.

There'll be 19 regional centers this year where contestants from district tournaments, like Denton's, will qualify for the five night state tournament in Fort Worth Feb. 13, 14, 15, 16 and 18th.

For those who win State championships, there will be an all-expense paid trip to Chicago for the annual Golden Gloves Tournament of Champions.

Regional tournaments are planned for Abilene, Amarillo, Austin, Beaumont, Brownwood, Bryan, Corpus Christi, Dallas, El Paso, Fort Worth, Houston, McAllen, Odessa, San Angelo, San Antonio, Tyler, Waco and Wichita Falls.

All Golden Gloves tournaments, as in the past, are sponsored only by newspapers and established civic organizations on a non-profit basis, with surplus funds going to recognized charities and development of amateur sports.

The program is sanctioned by the AAU, and all contestants must be registered with that organization.

In Texas the Golden Gloves program is sponsored and directed by the Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

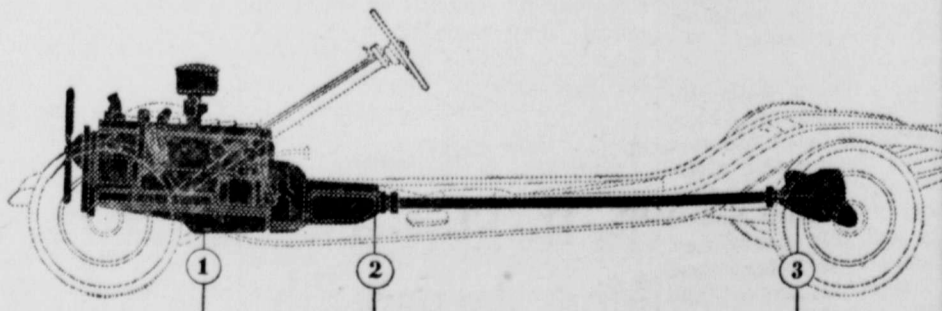

CONSERVATION NEWS

IOWA PARK:

Glen H. Bear, one mile north of Bacon Switch, has completed three and one-half miles of channel type terraces. Mr. Bear has also completed a new farm pond on this same farm. On another farm in the Cashion community, Mr. Bear has completed a terrace outlet channel or farm waterway. This waterway is to be seeded to perennial rye grass. After a good vegetative cover is established he plans to construct a complete terrace system on this farm.

Dr. W. H. Ogden of Electra has reworked four miles of old terraces and constructed one mile of new terraces on his farm six miles northeast of Iowa Park.

Albert Wolf and Mrs. Anna Keisker, two miles north of Pumpkin Center, have constructed a joint waterway on their farms. This waterway was constructed to carry off the runoff water from their terraces in keeping with sound land use in treating land according to its capabilities and needs. The water

way has been seeded to perennial rye grass and will be overseeded in the spring with native bluestem mixture grasses.

Mr. Wolf plans to use his waterway for a hay meadow, thus receiving benefit in two ways. The vegetation will stop erosion and he can also utilize the hay for feed. He already has one waterway used in this manner which he says pays off more in dollars than any like acreage on his farm.

Soil Conservation Service technicians are rendering assistance to these district cooperators in the lay-out of these waterways. The design of the waterway is based on the soil type, slope, erosion, drainage area, type of farming used and the type vegetative cover.

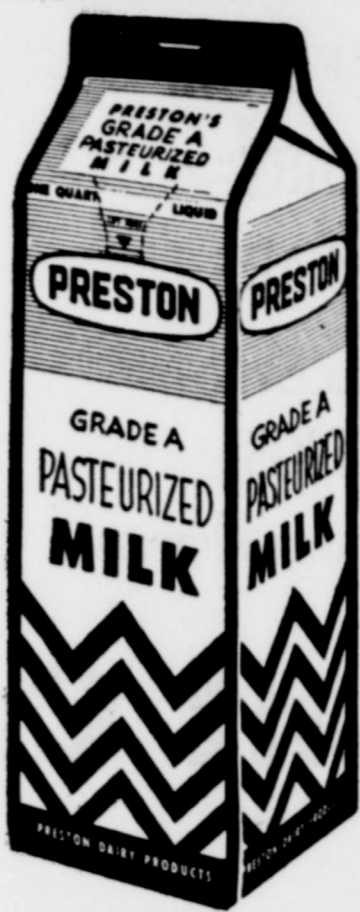

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Correct Social Security Number Is Very Necessary

"I will bring my social security card tomorrow." "I have lost my social security card, but I know my number." "I have my number copied down on this piece of paper."

Reliance on such statements by employers causes more trouble than anything else connected with the keeping of correct social security records for their employees, according to Erton F. Tate, manager of the Wichita Falls social security office.

Wages reported by employers on their quarterly social security tax returns are posted to the employee's individual wage record by machines. If the name

and the social security number do not agree, then it becomes necessary to re-contact the employer for the correct account number before the worker's wages can be posted to his credit. This extra work adds materially to the cost of keeping the records for the employer who makes an incorrect or incomplete tax return.

Employers could save time and money not only for themselves but also for the Government by reporting each worker's name and social security account number EXACTLY as they appear on the worker's social security card. Workers are urged to show their employers their social security cards when they go to work and not guess at their account numbers.

If an employee changes the

spelling of his name or a woman worker marries, the social security office will issue another card bearing the same number but the new name. These changes can be made by contacting your Wichita Falls social security office, 412 Post Office Building and filing an application for the change.

A representative of the Wichita Falls social security office will be in BURKBURNETT at the City Hall on Thursday, December 20, 1951, at 9:30 A. M. He will be glad to discuss any question you may have.

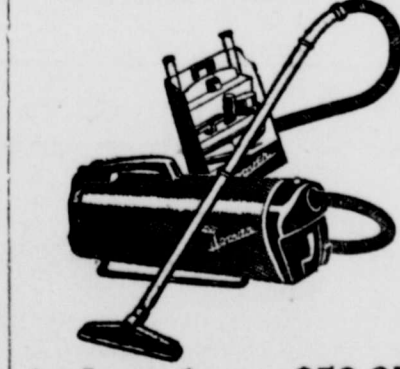

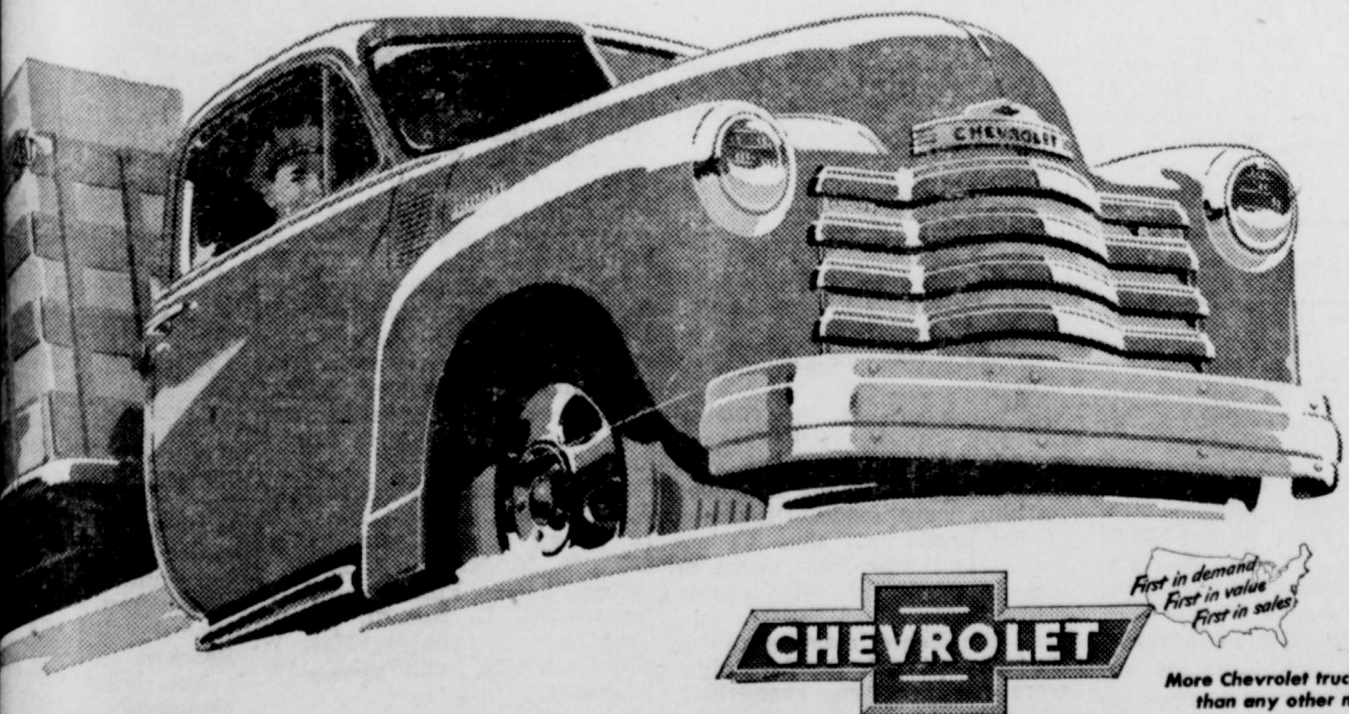
