\$40,000 Sale At Livestock Barn Last Saturday

The Market was steady to a little higher on some classes of cattle. Cows and heifers were some higher than the previous week. Top cows sold around 24 1/2c, heifers brought as high as 28c. The stocker trade was slow and if anything 1-2 to 1c lower. Fat calves were about steady.

Slim Owen, cattleman and oilman from West of town sold a nice load of calves that topped 33c. These calves weighed around 425 and were about the best offering I saw. Slim usually sells the best and usually brings his cattle here.

J. D. Taylor of Randlett, Oklahoma, brought in a load of heavy (855 lbs.) short fed dry lot steers that sold for an average of 27.70. These cattle were only fair quality and he was more than pleased with the price.

Italian Sewing Machine "Thinks Like Human Being"

In New England where I was brought up, girls were taught to sew by hand and by machine. We cut and basted our grammar school graduation dresses in the sewing class, took them home and stitched them up on the Singer. It may seem quite quaint but I still find a sewing machine indispensable, and until recently mine was operated laboriously by foot pedal. Now something new has been added to my life: An exciting imported Italian electric sewing machine called the Necchi. To learn to run the Necchi I had to take as many lessons as I did when learning to drive an automobile. And in many ways my Italian stitch machine seems more amazing than my car. In fact, I have had to absorb a brand new word in order to understand the wonders of the Necchi. The word is "cybernetics."

Cybernetics means control over a machine so that it thinks like a human being. That's what the Necchi does. It performs 21 sewing operations formerly done by hand, and actually is the first radical improvement over any sewing machine since the Civil War. It stitches backwards and forwards, from side to side and up and down, zig-zags, embroiders, monograms, darns, blind stitches, hems and—sews in two hole and four hole buttons! To me this seems a modern miracle.

The inventors of this almost human sewing machine were makers of church bells in Italy in 1492 when Columbus sailed the ocean blue. In 1900 they decided there was more demand for sewing machines than church bells and this decision has proved profitable. The Necchi was ready for the USA in 1940 when war interfered. So it made its debut in '48 and now 1500 cities from coast to coast carry this wonder machine plus repair parts (though it rarely gets out of order.) Apart from the simplicity of making clothes and draperies fast and good on this new machine, it is deeply satisfying from a cybernetic angle. In this machine age cybernetics proves that man need not fear the machine, but can control it and make it do what it has never done before. This is what the Necchi has taught me.

To Stop Killing . . . Start Planning

"Obsolete roads are killers," says Vice-President James J. Newman of the B. F. Goodrich Company. "Over the Christmas holidays, alone, they played a grim part in hundreds of tragedies all over America that took the lives of 535 men, women and children . . . over four times the number lost in the horror of the West Frankfort, Ill., mine blast."

"There will always be disasters. The unforeseen can never be controlled. But to calmly face, each week end and each holiday, a predictable number of highway killings is not necessary. It's inhuman, it's indecent, and basically, it's unintelligent," says Mr. Newman, who would replace the short-sighted one or two-year appropriation policies common to most communities by a fully coordinated ten year master program of highway improvement and expansion.

"There are many groups in America," he said, "who are both concerned with and informed on the human and economic menace of our outmoded, unsafe, inadequate roads. All of them should be integrated into the plan through membership in a top level committee, to be formed with the aid of Congress, and to include highway engineers, economists, automotive industry leaders and Government experts, technicians and executives."

Such a committee, the rubber company official emphasizes, should be appointed "immediately", and should go to work "right now" in planning for the next decade the highway safety, capacity and integration essential to national welfare in peace and in war.

In urging haste, Mr. Newman points out that unless we get going now, we'll still have the same roads in 1960. Roads that are intolerable today with 48,000,000 motor vehicles . . . that will be still more murderous then with 65,000,000.

Acquired Tastes Last Longer

"One of the few basic differences between babies and grownups," says Alfred Politz, famed marketing analyst, "is that babies have only innate tastes, while grownups achieve 'learned tastes'." Which Mr. Politz explains, is one of the reasons manufacturers do not try to sell caviar or scotch or brassiers to babies.

It is Mr. Politz's job to find out for manufacturers and advertisers how people think and behave and what their preferences are. In this way he can help the manufacturer make exactly what you want, and help the advertiser tell you exactly what you want to know about it. The result is more effective manufacturing and advertising, which to you means a better product at lower cost.

Mr. Politz finds that the tastes acquired through experimenting have more staying power than the innate, or the tastes people were born with. And that is a lucky thing, so long as man keeps on having ideas and manufacturers think up new things for the public to acquire a taste for.

There's A Salesman At The Door

Even though the indestructible Winston Churchill, again England's back-to-the-wall champion, has flatly told his countrymen not to expect America to solve their economic problems, or that "anyone else is going to keep the British lion as a pet," his attack on Washington, beginning should be impressive.

Accompanying the Prime Minister will be his Foreign Secretary and alter ego, Anthony Eden, the First Sea Lord, the Chief of the Imperial General Staff, three other Chiefs of Staff, two Cabinet members, Chief Staff Officer to the Ministry of Defense, the Chief of the Foreign Office division in charge of the N. A. T. O. and the Council of Europe and members of the ensemble which will include economic advisers, financial advisors and secretaries . . . and no doubt the secretaries of secretaries.

His purpose, he says, is "a good understanding." But it looks to us more like a bill of goods.

THAT'S TELLING THEM

The past week has produced another ringing statement to go down in the American history books with Admiral Farragut's "Damn the torpedoes, full speed ahead," Oliver Hazard Perry's "We have met the enemy, and they are ours," Commodore Lawrence's "We have just begun the fight," Teddy Roosevelt's "Pericardium alive, or Raisuli dead!"

They are the words of Dean Acheson, following the payment of \$120,000 in ransom by the U. S. Government to recover the four U. S. Air Force flyers seized by Hungary. He stated that the "fines" (ransom to you) were not paid "willingly", and that this government states clearly "in order that there may be no misunderstanding of our attitude in the future, that our patience is not inexhaustible."

Ringing words? Well, not clinging, exactly; but they sort of tinkle.





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

SPORTS AFIELD

By Ted Kesting

Generalized comparison of one type of boat construction with another is hard to make. But let's talk about canvas-covered boats today.

In a general comparison of the durability of canvas-covered craft with other constructions, account must be taken of the fact the average canvas-covered boat is lighter. To be fair to them, a comparison should be made with other craft of equal weight.

And boating expert Willard Crandall points out that there are even variations in canvas-covered constructions. There seems no question that some of these are enough different so they should not be judged under the usual rules for canvas-covered boats as to use, upkeep, and so on.

When you are considering a canvas-covered boat, one of the first things you should ask is how it will stand up in rough use, and in snag-filled water. Canvas can be ripped if you hit something sharp enough fast enough.

By snag-infested waters I mean those with a welter of submerged bushes, logs and even trees in waters above a dam, or in a swamp. Occasional stumps or brush along a shore are not considered a snag area.

How about repairs on canvas boats. There will be upkeep work, sooner or later, on a canvas-covered boat. But, and here's a point of importance which is too commonly overlooked, canvas-covered boats can always be well repaired, and usually simply.

Amateurs sometimes cover old wood boats that are flat or V-bottom, or of some heavy construction that is quite unsuited for canvas. No factory that I know of would use canvas in this way. But the fact amateurs will try such stunts in efforts to hold together an old leaky boat does not add to the reputation canvas-covered boats have with the layman. It's too bad, because they are good boats.
