### Questions, Ans. Rent Stabilization

Q. What rents are now controlled in the Wichita Falls Defense-Rental Area?  
A. Every type of rental housing accommodation in the Wichita Falls Defense-Rental Area is subject to rent control including hotels, new construction, trailer courts and spaces, motels, etc. (Note: There are a few exceptions such as tenant-farmer housing and housing rented to service employees such as caretakers.)  
Q. What territory is covered by the Wichita Falls Defense-Rental Area?  
A. All of Wichita County.  
Q. Who administers rent stabilization in the Wichita Falls Defense-Rental Area?  
A. The Office of Rent Stabilization with the advice and assistance of the local Rent Advisory Board composed of local citizens who represent the landlord, tenant and the public interest.  
Q. How are Rent Advisory Board members appointed?  
A. Rent Advisory Board members are appointed by the Director of Rent Stabilization acting for the President. The Governor of the State of Texas makes the nominations for appointment. Members of the Rent Advisory Board serve without pay as a local board of directors for rent control. This includes the review of unusual or hardship cases.  
Registration  
Q. What rental accommodations must be registered with the local rent officer?  
A. All residential accommodations for rent should be registered with the area rent office. Registration forms are available at that office.  
Q. Who registers the property?  
A. The landlord or owner is required to file the registration statements.  
Q. How much time do I have to register my rental property?  
A. The deadline for filing registrations is February 29, 1952, but the earlier you file the better.  
Q. What about hotels, rooming houses, boarding houses, motel courts, etc? Must they also be registered?  
A. Yes. All accommodations must be registered which are rented for living or dwelling space.  
Q. Does this include rooms rented in a private home?  
A. Yes.  
Q. Where can I obtain registration forms?  
A. Registration forms may be picked up and filed at the Area Rent office. Registration should be made by February 29, 1952.  
Q. Do all rental housing accommodations use the same forms for registration?  
A. No. There are separate registration forms for residential housing units, hotels, and housing accommodations covered by the Rooming House Regulations. (More Next Week)

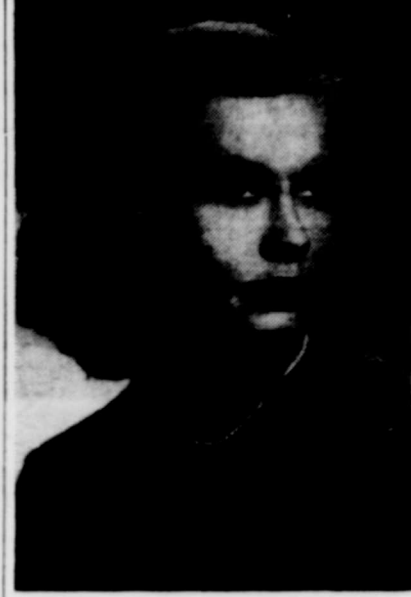

## Are We Being Pushed Around?

New insolence plus an attitude of complete indifference on the part of the enemy we are supposed to have beaten, may mean Moscow has instructed the Chinese Communist and North Korean leaders to walk out of the Panmunjom circus tent in order to force the Korean truce issue into the Security Council of the UN.

Russia's Andrei Vishinski, who originally proposed this shift of scene says he wants to get the conferees out of the rut "in which they have been floundering for six months."

But perhaps even more urgent is the question of where does it leave us, and what do we do if and when our enemy concludes the truce talks? A decision on this point may be in the making at top-level talks at General Ridgway's headquarters in Tokio as this is written.

There was a time when it would simply mean going back into the fight and finishing what we started. But under our "containment" policy that does not appear to be possible. Besides it's technically the UN's war, not ours, even though we are furnishing practically all of the fighters and what they need to fight with. And finally, we are just plain scared . . . of Russia.

## "Dirt Traps" Are Wife Savers

Time was when a doormat was just a doormat, even the super-deluxe model with "Welcome" on it. But modern doormats, and inside mats too, are such a help with the housework that housewives, especially on the farms, think they should have "Hallelujah" on them instead.

In fact, rubber matting is so popular in the country that even the horses use it! A stable owner near Lima, Ohio, uses it as a lining for horseshoes. He has found the way, he says, to solve the problem that worried the famous cockney who has been so widely quoted: "It ain't the 'eat as 'urts the 'orses' 'oofo, it's the 'ammer, 'ammer, on the 'ard 'ighway."

A recent test of the modern link-type doormat, made by the American Mat Corporation, Toledo, Ohio, who makes eleven different kinds of floor mats, disclosed that these mats, properly placed, remove 80 per cent of the dirt that would otherwise be tracked into the house. They found out, too, that while housewives dread the mud and slush of winter, these mats are an even bigger help in dry weather. Wet dirt, or mud, makes lumps, and generally stays in one place, while dry dirt that is tracked in is carried by air currents to all parts of the house. With link mats, the spaces between links act as dirt traps, whether the dirt is wet or dry.

As Eddie Guest so truly said: "It takes a heap o' livin' to make a house a home," but it shouldn't take such a heap o' labor for the woman who runs it.

## Is There a Carlsen for the Ship of State?

The excitement, on both sides of the Atlantic Ocean, over the brave skipper of the little American freighter Flying Enterprise, is the most fortunate occurrence thus far in the year 1952. The incident has brought to public notice the fact that there remains one man at

least in this recedent world to whom duty is sacred. And the fact that this display of principle in the face of the utmost peril has so captured millions of hearts, indicates the present day human hunger for something to admire.

To Captain Henrik Curt Carlsen, his conduct has been only what a ship Captain's should be. He has merely fulfilled the responsibility he assumed with command of the vessel. For this was no case of mere heroics, of dramatizing the seafaring tradition of "going down with the ship." Captain Carlsen's whole intention was to save the ship, and as long, certainly as there was any chance of it, there could be no thought of abandonment. He was aware of risking his life, of course. But the thing he has demonstrated so needfully, is that risk and duty are separate considerations.

We can even hope, perhaps, that the example of Captain Carlsen will remain in the minds of Americans until next Election Day, and help many of them to vote for a return to self-reliant Americanism . . . even though a relative might be cut off the Federal payroll . . . even though a union leader might disapprove . . . and even though a house-cleaning in Washington might reduce or even eliminate a lot of handouts and subsidies.

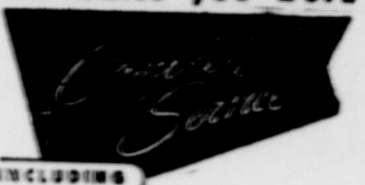

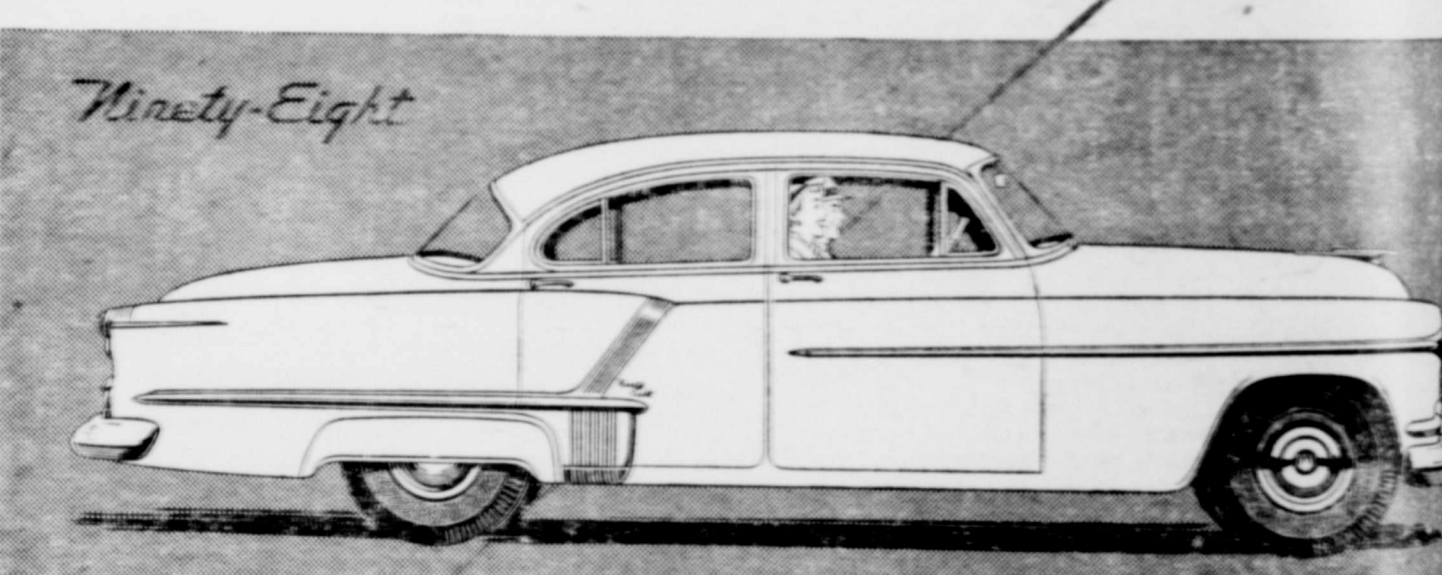

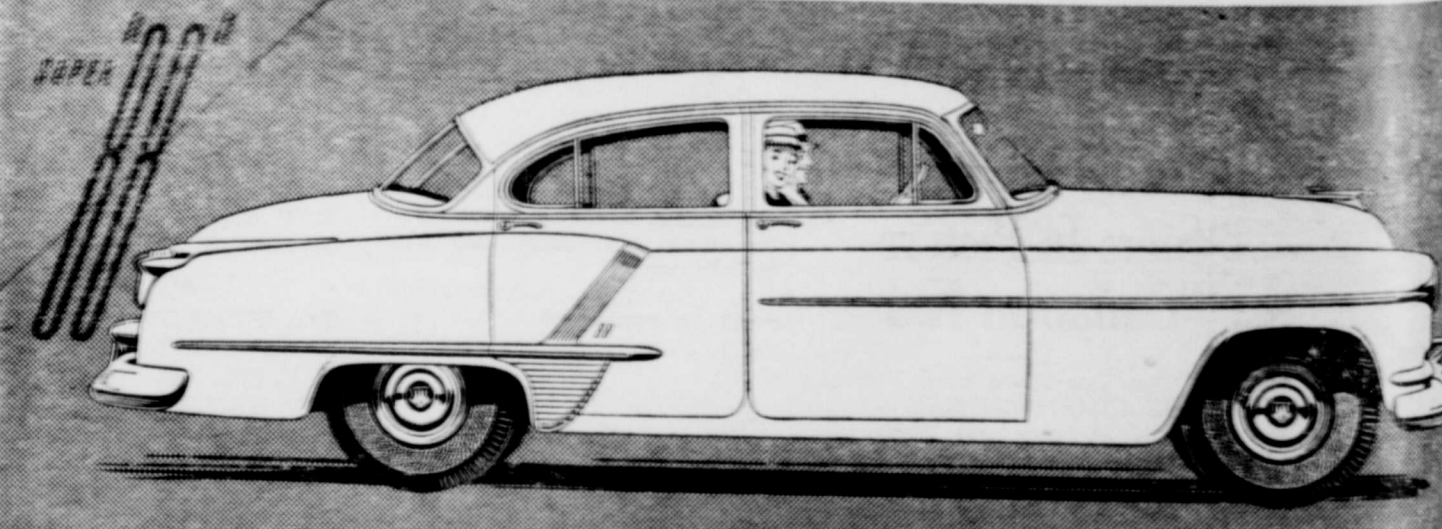

"Have I received credit for all my wages on my Social Security account?" That is a question heard frequently according to Erton F. Tate, manager of the Wichita Falls Social Security office.

You can usually be certain that your account is correct if you observe these rules: 1. Carry your social security card with you when you are looking for a job or changing jobs. 2. Show it to your employer so that he can enter your name and number on his records exactly as they appear on your card.

If your job is covered by social security, your employer is required to report your wages and your name and number every three months. When he does not have your correct name or number on these reports, the Social Security Administration must contact him for the correct information.

If you do not have your card, apply for a duplicate number by getting an application blank from the Wichita Falls social security office or your post office. The same application blank will get you a new card if you have never had a social security card before.

"Make sure you are getting credit for all your wages," Tate says, "by making sure your employer has your correct name and account number."

INTRODUCTION

The report of activities of your Chamber of Commerce for the year ending December 31, 1951. These accomplishments have been made possible through the splendid co-operation of our Officers and Board of Directors and our entire membership, our City and County Officials, all Civic organizations, our local Newspaper and Citizens as a whole.

GENERAL ACTIVITIES

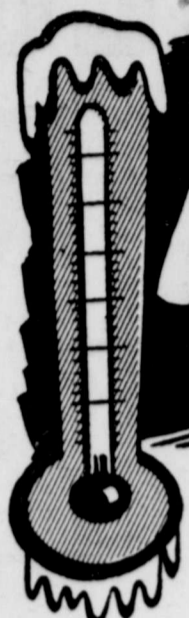

HOME FOLKS SPECULATE ON PRICE DANIEL



The presence of Price Daniel, Attorney General of Texas, and his family in their home town of Liberty during the holidays increased speculation that the historic old city might furnish Texas another Governor or Senator in 1952. LIBERTY CITIZENS THINK THEY HAVE ANSWER TO '52 POLITICS

LIBERTY, TEXAS, Dec. 30 (Special)—Historic Liberty, third oldest city in Texas, literally buzzed during the holidays with the talk of furnishing Texas a new senator or governor in 1952. The town's native son, Attorney General Price Daniel, and his family were at home. As the State's chief lawyer walked the streets where as a boy he had sold newspapers, his homefolks speculated more than ever about the part their town would play in politics of the New Year.

The last Liberty lawyer to serve as governor or United States Senator was Sam Houston. He served in both offices. Price Daniel's law office in Liberty was on the exact spot where Sam Houston had his office. What is more, Daniel married Houston's great-granddaughter, Jean Houston Baldwin. While living in Austin temporarily, they and their four children spend Christmas and vacations here.

Liberty has had a long claim on the fighting attorney general and his family. His ancestors settled here in 1824 and helped Mexican officials build the town in 1831. His great-grandfather, Hugh B. Johnston, was the first alcalde and engaged in the early conflicts of the Texas revolution. This accounts for some of Price Daniel's interest in Texas history and his uncompromising fight to keep the federal government from taking the Texas tidelands away from the State's public school fund.

All these bits of history are recounted as Liberty folks predict that the mantle of Sam Houston will fall on the capable shoulders of Price Daniel in 1952. They admit after several days of visiting with him that they do not know which of the two offices Daniel will seek, but they will give odds that it will be the senate.

Neighbors Comment  
A Liberty merchant put it this way: "Price Daniel has been fighting against the Truman tidelands steal and other federal encroachments for several years. He never gives up. He has some unfinished business in Washington, some scores to settle with those who robbed this State, and you can bet that we will

win the tidelands in Congress if Price Daniel gets a seat in the United States Senate."

A county official and former law partner also believes Daniel has his eye on Washington and is waiting only for a decision by Governor Shivers that he will run for re-election instead of the Senate. This man said:

"Price is a natural-born fighter, smart in the books, a forceful speaker, and honest as the day is long. His heart is in the fight to save the tidelands for Texas schools, and he will jump at the chance to run for the Senate because he believes the fight can be won there."

The homefolks would be proud to see Daniel run for either governor or senator, and judging from the way they talk and the way they voted in his last contested race, they will support him strong for either job. His home county gave him a vote of 4944 to 778 for his opponent in 1946, the largest majority received by any state official in his own county. In the last two elections Daniel has been unopposed for Attorney General.

When asked for a preference, Liberty people almost invariably speak of the Senate. The reason is clear. They are fed up on the scandals of the Truman administration, mad about the tidelands grab, tired of government waste and extravagance, and displeased with the foreign policy in China and Korea.

They believe Price Daniel has the nerve to oppose these things and to "fight for Texas and for honesty in government" as one man put it. They point to his fight against organized crime in Texas and predict that he would be as good as Kefauver or Fulbright in investigating corruption and demanding a housecleaning in the federal government.

Above all, they point out that Daniel has no obligations to the Truman administration which would interfere with or slow up his work. They recall that Daniel came out boldly, last October, against the renomination of President Truman and said Texas should lead the way in finding a Democratic nominee who would respect and uphold the Texas Annexation Agreement.

Expect January Decision  
It won't be long now. Sometime in January Price Daniel will announce one way or the other, for senator or governor. Liberty folks are for him win, lose or draw but they'll quickly tell you that on his record Price is not a "loser" or "drawer" but always a winner.

This is backed up by a set of solid facts which go back to his boyhood when he delivered the Beaumont Enterprise and Houston Post in the mornings and ran a laundry route in the afternoons.

It continued when he went to Fort Worth to attend high school where he won every debate championship, edited a weekly magazine for Fort Worth high schools, and was a cub reporter for the Star-Telegram.

At Baylor University he majored in journalism before taking law. He edited the campus daily "The Lariat" and the yearbook "The Round-Up" and served as a reporter for the Waco-News Tribune. He holds A.B., LL.B. and LL.D. degrees from Baylor.

Returning to Liberty, Daniel hung out his shingle as a lawyer and became co-publisher of the Liberty Vindicator and the Anahuac Progress. He served two years as president of the local Chamber of Commerce, was president and teacher of a men's bible club and Master of the Masonic Lodge.

During his eleven year-lawyer-publisher, he served six years in the House of Representatives and was elected speaker of the house as another tribute to his leadership.

The armed services saw Daniel's leadership in two branches, the Army and the Marine Corps. Waiving his legislative exemption, he entered the army as a private and emerged as a captain. He saw service with the Marine Corps in Japan on special assignment from the Army.

As attorney general, Daniel has gained nationwide attention for his tidelands defense and his fight against organized crime. On the latter, he was complimented in the final report of the Kefauver committee.

At 41, with a long list of achievements behind him, he is still just "Price" to young and old alike in Liberty. They are ready to help him make another step up, and if they have their wish, it will be in the direction of Washington, D. C., and the United States Senate.

### YOUR UNITED STATES

By FLOYD CRAMER

President of the National Association for the Preservation of Free Enterprise, Inc.

We ought to be the best informed people in the world. No where else is there such a flood of information as we receive from our newspapers, magazines, radio and television. But the fact is, all of us are falling down on the job of keeping abreast of events.

Every time some one asks me whether I have heard of some interesting and important matter, and I have to confess that it's still "news to me", I feel that I have failed to do my full duty as an American.

The people who live on the wrong side of the Iron Curtain don't have any such problem. They don't have any trouble keeping up with the news, for the simple reason that they never hear any. They hear only what the men in power want them to hear. And if they are caught reading something smuggled into the country, or if they are caught listening to a foreign radio broadcast, they are likely to go to jail for it.

But in our country, and in other democratic lands, we live by a different philosophy. Our idea—and thank God for it!—is that if the people are given light, they will find the way. We believe that if the people know the truth, they will make sound decisions; and that every man who stays in public office must have the continued approval of the people.

This is a wonderful idea, and our free schools and free press have built up an electorate whose general fund of information is greater than any people ever possessed in the past.

However, if our government is to keep on functioning wisely, the people of our country have to keep on being well informed. And these days that's a problem. I am afraid I see a tendency here and there for people to quit making time for their necessary reading on public affairs.

Under our democratic system, our people don't have to submit to guidance from the top. We can make our own choices. And the choices have to be wise ones if our country is to continue to thrive; and our choices can't be wise if we don't know the facts. I must admit that the sports page and the comics and the fantastic lives of some of Hollywood's residents are pretty fascinating diversions after the day's work. But dull as the national and international news may seem, we must remember that our way of life depends to a great degree on how well informed we are.

Americans who refuse to study the issues of the day and who refuse to make the effort to keep informed may well be the first ones to gripe about higher taxes, corruption and inefficiency in government. They forget that it is their duty to keep informed, to detect tendencies they don't like, and to tell their elected representatives what they want done about them.

Knowledge of current events will give us all confidence. And with confidence backed by knowledge we can resist all enemies, at home and abroad. With confidence, we can build up our defenses, reasonably and soundly. We can work to keep America strong, productive and economically sound. We can flush out the dishonest and the incompetent who put their own money interests ahead of the national welfare.

We can fulfill our right to vote, by never letting an election pass without our presence at the polls. We can spend a definite period every day reading and digesting the facts which mean so much to ourselves and the future of our children.

We have a duty to ourselves and to our country. We must preserve democracy and our system of free enterprise. But to do that, we need to know the facts. And to get the facts, we need to spend some time on our newspaper. What the people know, influences their thinking. What they don't know, enables frauds and knaves to flourish. Ignorance is NOT bliss. Ignorance can lead to destruction.

### Sheep Men to Battle Scabies

The Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas has asked the Governor of Texas to issue a proclamation relative to sheep scabies. The Commission submitted an order which was signed by the Governor January 7th, 1952.

Part of the order follows: Whereas, it has been determined by investigation and inspections made by regularly employed representatives of the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas that sheep scabies, Psoroptes Communis Ovis, a serious, contagious and infectious disease of sheep, exists in the State of Texas, and

Whereas, sheep infected with or exposed to scabies, are being assembled at community sales rings, public auction sales and stockyards for sale, trade and barter as a result of which the disease is being disseminated to the farms and ranches of this State with serious consequences

to the economy of the sheep industry, and

Whereas, it is imperative that control measures be instituted to protect the sheep industry of Texas from the ravages of this disease,

Therefore, for the purpose of preventing the spread of this disease, the Livestock Commission of Texas, by virtue of the authority vested in it by law, hereby declares that all community sales rings, public auction sales and public stockyards in the State of Texas are classed as infected with, or exposed to, sheep scabies, and are hereby quarantined

Now, therefore, the Livestock Commission of Texas has adopted the following regulations governing the removal of sheep from said quarantined community sales rings, public auction sales and public stockyards

No sheep shall be moved in-trastate therefrom (except for immediate slaughter purposes) without first having been dipped one time in a wettable Benzene Hexachloride solution containing a gamma isomer concentration of not less than 0.06 per cent, under the supervision of a representative of this Commission or of the United States Bureau of Animal Industry and accompanied by written permit or certificate, issued by a representative of the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas or of the United States Bureau of Animal Industry.

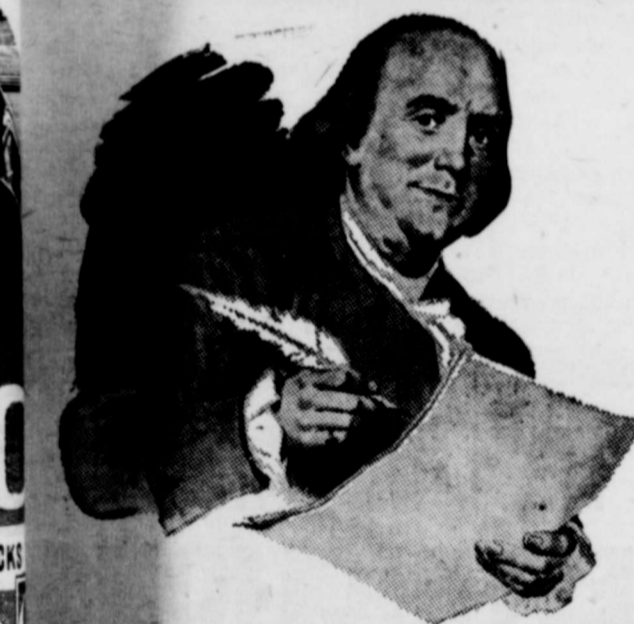

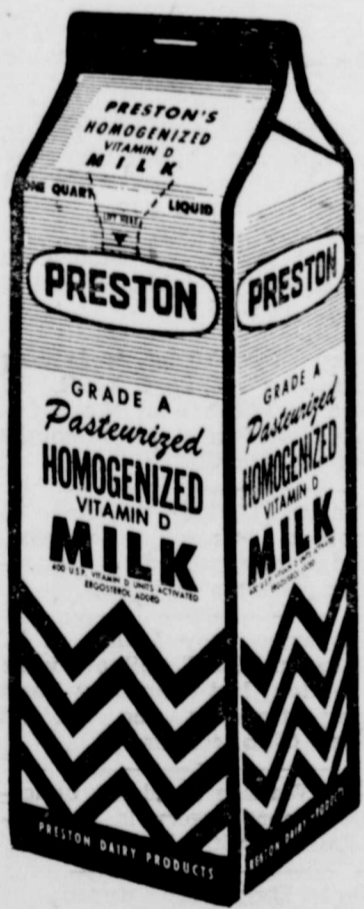

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### Soil Conservation News

In spite of the past dry year, soil conservation work has progressed as brought out in the annual report of the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District for the Eastern portion which comprises Wichita County. The district supervisors for the local district in this portion are: Arthur Ramming, Chairman, northeast of Wichita Falls; Tom Pace, Iowa Park; and Jack Walser, Electra.

Cover crop and legume plantings continue to increase. Since the local soil conservation district has been organized a total of 22,881 acres of soil improving legumes have been planted. Sound land use calls for deep

rooted legumes to improve the physical condition of the soil and provide a cover against the damaging effects of "rain drop splash."

The construction of terraces has increased this year with a total of 39 miles being built to date. Channel type terraces have been used the past year to large extent and have been highly satisfactory. All of these practices are worked in together in a coordinated plan to keep with the capability of the land and treat it according to its needs.

Range improvement and grass seeding have been the major practices that have been hindered by the dry weather. However, the better grasses and good condition ranges still have fared better through the dry weather than the poor grasses. Stock ponds have been built to provide for better grazing distribution.

A practice not to be forgotten is underground drainage where a total of 27 miles of open drains have been built which benefit a total of 4,329 acres. Many of these acres have become completely non-productive until drained.

Conservation irrigation systems have been applied on a total of 5,217 acres in the irrigated valley. Grasses and legumes are highly important phases of these systems.

One hundred and sixty-eight additional farmers and ranchers

have started working with the district this year which comprises a total of 109,450 acres cooperating with the district. The Soil Conservation Service at Iowa Park renders the technical assistance to farmers in the planning, application and maintenance of soil conservation practices.

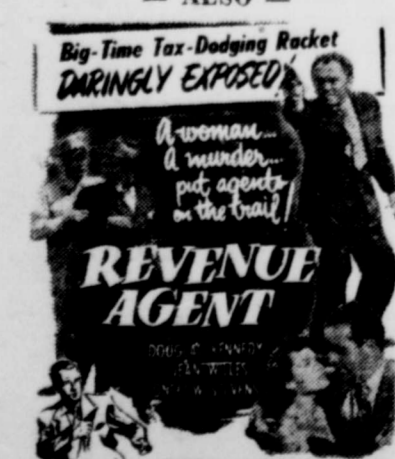

Australian Cowboy At High School Tues., Feb. 5th

From England's Windsor Castle to our South and Southwest is a long way, but Johnny Regan, world-famous cowboy, made it. His act consists of trick roping and stunts in which he uses the famous "Texas Wagon Wheel," an origination of the late Will Rogers. He says, "Will taught me the stunt while we were together in London." During the stunt Regan twirls a huge lasso sideways and jumps back and forth through the loop.

When Regan was a youth his father, a member of the King's Royal Horse Guard at Windsor Castle, sent him to live with an uncle, who was a cattle rancher, in Queensland, Australia. At the age of 14, the famous rope and whip artist began learning how to be a cowboy. He specialized in whips and horsemanship and even participated in bronc riding events. As would be expected he made contacts with rodeo contestants and eventually toured Africa, New Zealand and South America as a bronc rider in rodeos.

In 1929, twelve years after his departure for Australia, he returned to England to visit his parents. While there he made acquaintance with a number of college students, who were touring Europe with the famous Hardin - Simmons University Cowboy band from Abilene, Texas. One of the members of the band suddenly was stricken by an illness and was forced to return to America. The ill student was a trick rope and whip artist in one of the acts featured by the band. So Regan, who had learned to be a showman through his experience with cowboys in Australia, was persuaded to serve as a substitute for the remainder of the tour.

When the tour was concluded Regan was talked into returning to Texas with the students. For eight years Johnny made his home in and near Abilene. He often stayed on a ranch which belonged to one of the directors of the University. When asked if he attended the university the cowboy replied: "My education was cattle. I learned everything I could about them on the ranches near Abilene." When at Abilene he continued to tour as a special attraction with the cowboy band. But the rodeo fever bit Johnny and he returned to the road with many of
