Even "Little" White House Is Better Than None

President Truman will return to the Key West "Little White House" next week for three weeks of vacation while the renovators of the Big White House up in Washington finish their job, including an octagonal sun-room of blue-green glass and equipped with tropical bamboo furniture.

His three weeks rest, according to report, is to prepare him for the extensive speaking tours he will make in behalf of the Democratic party, to begin with his address at the \$100 a plate Jefferson-Jackson Day dinner in Washington.

The report did not name the candidate for whom the President will campaign, but we will hazard a guess that his initials are HST. Considering the enthusiasm with which he recently conducted a group of newspaper men through the White House, explaining the improvements and changes, particularly those for which he proudly claimed personal credit, Mr. Truman did not give the impression of a man about to accept a six months lease.

HOW'S THAT AGAIN?

The new Price Stabilizer, former Governor Arnall of Georgia, declared on his first day in the new job that it would be his policy to "firm up the dollar, discourage inflation and stabilize prices in relation to wages." You may gather from this that Uncle Sam's new boy is not only ambitious but optimistic. If he had reversed point number three to read "stabilize wages in relation to what prices ought to be," he might have a chance of accomplishing one and two.

Stabilizer Arnall also said an extension of the controls law was one of his immediate problems, while down in Tallahassee, Florida, at almost the same hour, Secretary of Commerce Charles Sawyer said that it was his plan to relax controls as rapidly as possible, and that increasing productive capacity should result before long in the elimination of controls on building materials. As of now, he said, all building projects, in the U. S., which have been started and held up to conserve scarce materials, may now be completed.

Highway Dept. Official Map Is Ready for Public

The shortest distance between two points is established by an old axiom, but from the standpoint of motorists, the shortest distance between two points can only be established by the Official Highway Travel Map.

Mr. D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer, announced today that the Department's new 1952 Official Highway Travel Map is now available free to the general public. The Official Highway Map is revised and published annually. It is used by all state agencies as the basis for computing official car mileage. The new map is 28"x36" and is chock full of travel guidance and information on Texas. The material is illustrated and in color for easy comprehension and appearance. Several important changes have been made in this year's map which include a topographical relief drawing along with the addition of symbols which show the locations of the 854 roadside parks and turnouts. Special emphasis has been placed on indicating various recreational, scenic, and historical spots. All U. S. and State highways are shown. The more important Farm & Ranch to Market roads which serve the cross country motorist are also shown. The travel information reflected on the map is designed to supply motorists with guidance needed for safety, comfort, and pleasure while traveling Texas highways.

The back side of the map is jam-packed with factual and pictorial Texas history. The story of Texas is unfolded with the map. Many famous milestones and landmarks are described and portrayed pictorially. There are 26 pictures in full color of the more popular historical points of interest in the State with a full caption explaining each scene. A panorama is used to introduce some of the more popular historical characters in a "passing parade" of Texas history.

Included also for the first time is a map of Mexico, incorporated with the small U. S. map, showing the principal highways and cities, however, it is primarily for geographical purposes.

This new map can be obtained by mailing the map card distributed by the Tax Assessor Collector's office with the sale of license plates, or by writing directly to the Texas Highway Department, Austin 14, Texas. Copies are also available in any Highway District Office or the Highway Travel Information Bureau.

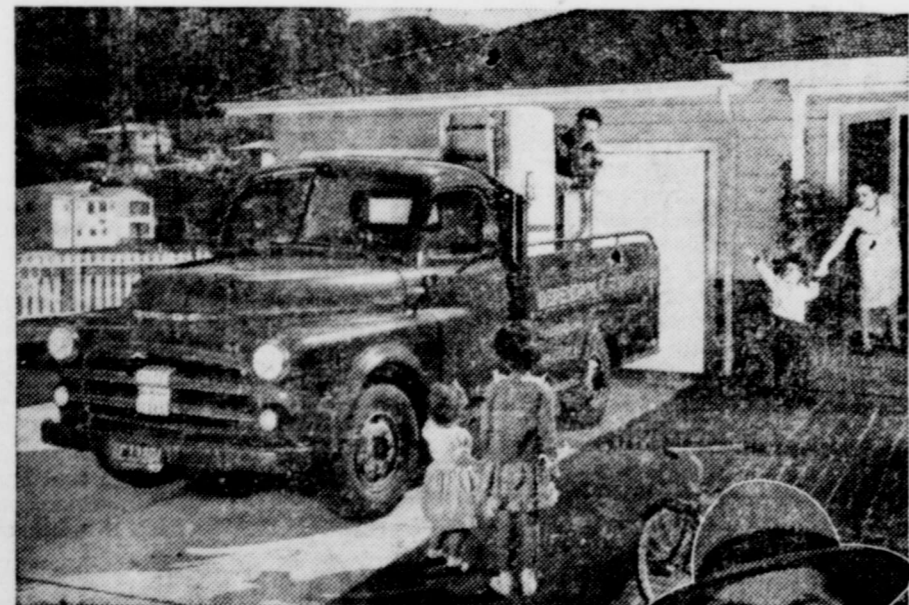

Worm Of Scalp Increasing

Worm of the scalp appears to be increasing in some parts of Texas, and action is being taken to contain it. In medical circles as "capitis," ringworm of the scalp is said to be prevalent in the Grande Valley, Houston, Antonio, and Dallas. Reports to the State Department of Health say skin specialists in these areas are seeing increasing numbers of infected children. A preliminary study conducted by the state health agency on 891 children in two Rio Grande Valley schools shows 5.5

per cent positive infections in one group, and 5.7 per cent in the other. Positively infected girls outnumbered the boys four to one, although there were more boy students, the study showed. Ringworm is contagious. Children are most often afflicted, although adults, while less disposed to infection, often have more severe and longer lasting attacks. Ringworm is marked by round, scaly areas on the scalp, and patchy baldness or short, broken-off hairs. It is caused by a fungus—a vegetable-like growth caused by spores. Sources of infection, health officials and skin specialists say, are the scalp lesions of infected persons, articles of clothing containing the spores, or the infected hairs or scales

shed by an infected person. State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox, is cooperating with the skin specialists society of the Texas Medical Association, and the State Board of Barbers and Cosmetologists, is rewriting the rules and regulations governing the sterilization of beauty and barber shop instruments after each use. They hope to get legislation enacted to provide penalties for non-compliance. There is no immunization against ringworm. Recommended control measures are cleanliness of the hair and scalp, and provision for separate isolated classrooms for suspicious cases. Positively infected children should be excluded from school until the condition is cleared up, Dr. Cox believes.

Streit plans to sod coastal bermuda grass along this drainage ditch. He believes this will furnish more forage than the native grasses. Madrid clover has proved a very profitable crop for Mr. Streit. One nine acre field of Madrid Clover cut 419 bales of hay the first year and 1300 lbs. of clean seed were harvested the second year. Another legume which George has found to be a good cash crop as well as a soil builder is alfalfa. He plans to use alfalfa in his crop rotation plan in the future. Mr. Streit has found that terracing alone has increased his wheat yields from nine bushels in 1946 to an overall average of 20 bushels at the present time. George plans to increase his yields still further by using legumes as soil improving crops. In 1946, Geo. was running four cows on his farm. Since reclaiming his pasture land and by grazing his legumes and other cropland, he has been able to increase his herd to 25 head.

Soil Conservation News

George Streit, eight miles northeast of Electra, Texas has greatly increased his farm profits by following a conservation program. Mr. Streit became one of the first cooperators with the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District after its organization in 1946. Since that date he has been practicing conservation over his entire farm by following sound land use. George's first conservation practice was to terrace all of his rolling cropland. George did the shaping with his farm tractor and then sodded the ramp with bermuda grass. In 1948 George cut a drainage ditch through his bottomland to carry off excess surface water. By doing this he reclaimed 30 acres of water logged land. This area furnishes year round grazing for his cattle now. Before draining this area he could use this pasture only during the driest months. 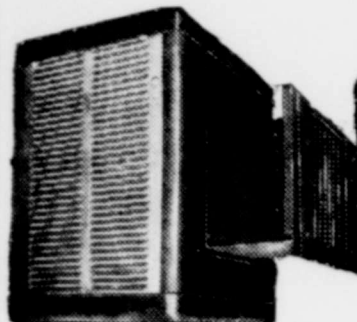

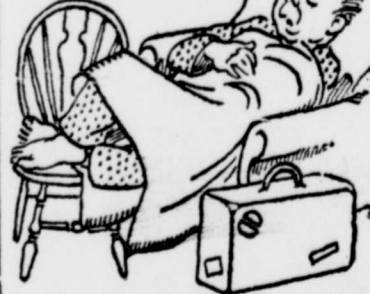

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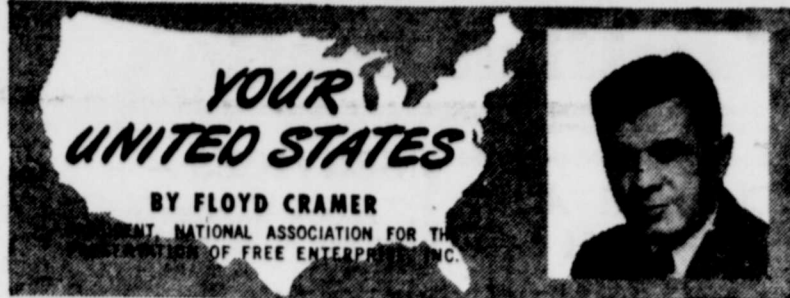

er jobs than we now possess!

Should we ever stop wanting,
we will stop hoping, too.
I suppose the citizens of the
Soviet Union already have a
kind of freedom FROM want.
Government gives them just as
much as it thinks they need.
What the Russian doesn't have
is any freedom TO want. What
good would it do him to want
a car? He knows he can never
buy one.

In truth, our freedom to want
to buy something tomorrow
makes it worth while to live
and work today.

We live our lives in that
kind of wanting. And in satis-
fying those wants we realize
our achievements, and we at-
tain the sense of security that
comes from accomplishment.
Without freedom to want, we
would all slide back to the log-
cabin and the wood fire.

Men produce everything from
automobiles to paper clips be-
cause other men want these
things. The more that is want-
ed, the more that is produced;
the more produced, and the more
employment, and the less poverty.

So let's not talk meekly about
freedom from want. Let's cher-
ish the freedom to want, and
the freedom to gratify our
wants.

We are a country with an in-
comparable past and a tremen-
dous future.
We are a people of hope and
faith.

It is free enterprise that
makes it possible for us to live
the lives we do.

Let's not betray our glorious
past and let's not throw away
our splendid future, by falling
into a totalitarian trap baited
with mere bread and cheese.
