A SOLDIER IS A CITIZEN

Nearly half of America's 3,500,000 service men and women "will be denied either the right or reasonable means of voting" in the presidential election under existing state laws and regulations, according to National Commander Donald L. Wilson of The American Legion. In a personal letter to the Legion department commander of each of the 48 states, calling attention to this "traversery on democratic principles," and asking for an analysis and report of local conditions, he said:

"The American Legion is particularly alarmed because this group is comprised of Americans who have already suffered curtailment of many of their personal liberties, and who are called upon to risk life itself in defense of the nation's freedom . . . I earnestly hope that you will take the lead in initiating a demand for such action—either administrative or legislative—as may be effected . . . in your state."

We feel reasonably sure that no legislator in any state wishes to deprive any soldier, sailor or marine, male or female, of the duty and privilege of voting. Where regulations make such absentee voting difficult or impossible, they are surely the result of inertia or our lack of experience as a militaristic state. We heartily endorse Commander Wilson's stand and add our voice to the plea for GI ballots in that "Get Out the Vote" drive that the Legion and most of the rest of us are pushing.

It's Not the Fumes . . . It's the Fungi

To overcome this condition, a compound has been developed which when added to the paint by the manufacturer or painter will protect the finish from mildew attack.

Mildew of paints is only one of the losses due to fungi. Billions of dollars of materials are destroyed annually by mildew. The government has shown its awareness of the problem by specifying that treatment of many textiles purchased for the military forces includes a fungicide which will protect the fabric.

Various research and industrial laboratories have been developing fungicides for paint, wood, textiles and other materials. Application of the compounds is simple and inexpensive. Yet it has been predicted that widespread use of these chemicals could well eliminate losses of material due to mildew destruction.

SAVE YOUR CHEERS

A warning from the administration this week, following President Truman's announcement that he will not be a candidate for re-election, that this did not mean a Korean Truce is imminent, seems highly superfluous.

The Reds now want a "higher level" truce team to work on the problem of accepting Russia as a "neutral" armistice inspector. The UN Command is protesting that the enemy has placed prisoner-of-war camps close to military target and main supply routes, and have failed to properly identify the camps, thus endangering the lives of the prisoners. In reply, the Reds have charged Allied flyers with "wanton bombing", and said the camps could not be moved. Thus, the stalling continues.

Lieut. Col. Albert N. Butler, who undertook to explain the UN position on the prison camps to Chinese Col. Wang Chien, remarked that "very little thought" was given to the security of prisoners. No doubt this was the diplomatic approach, but it is fairly obvious that the Reds have used, are using and will continue to use UN prisoners to shield them from attack or to minimize its intensity.

The White House announcement that a Korean Truce is not necessarily at hand is the understatement of the year . . . the year since General MacArthur was relieved of his old-hat idea of winning the Korean War.

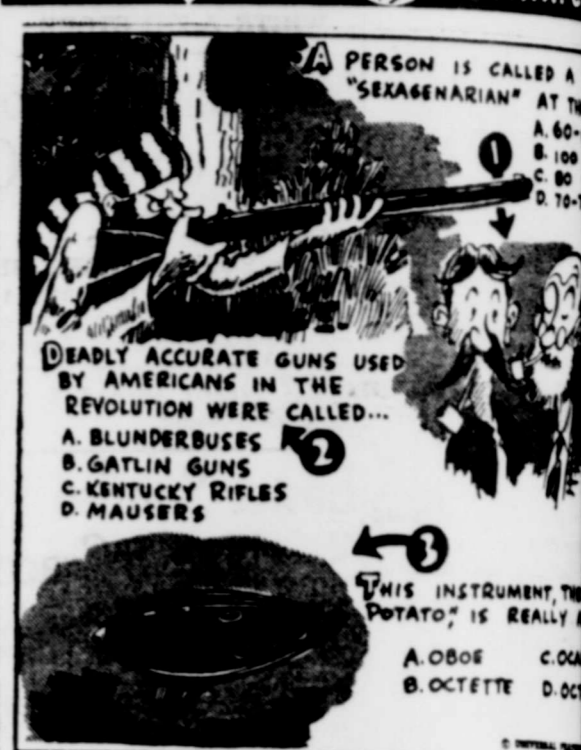

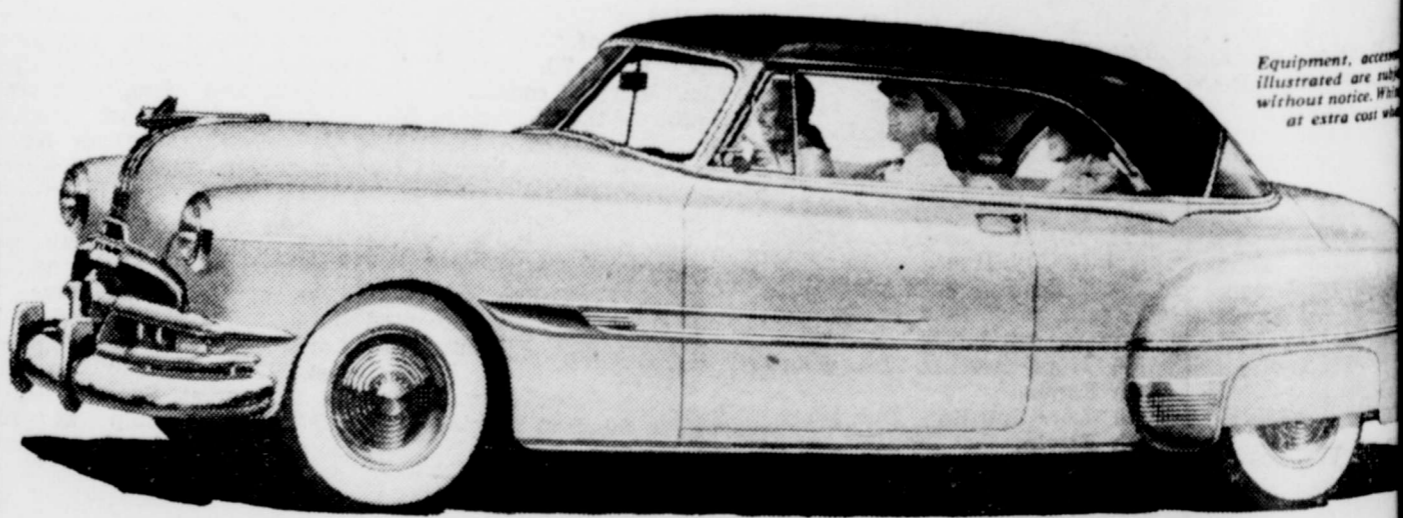

The 27th annual production of the Easter Sunrise Service will be produced in the Wichita Mountains of Oklahoma on April 13th, Easter Sunday. The service begins at midnight and continues until dawn.

At the present time, extensive preparations are being made for the Easter pageant. Women are busy making costumes for new scenes; Electricians are working on the grounds, moving the flood lights from an area which will provide a roadway for the fifty mounted horsemen in the King Arthur scene, riding full speed in search of the Holy Grail; Stage props and backdrops are being erected; the galleons on which Haman is to be hanged, in the "Queen Esther and Mordecai" scene, is being built; the loud speaker staff is getting ready to install equipment; the Oklahoma Highway patrol is making preparations to receive the largest crowd in pageant history; The Red Cross has organized first aid assistance, ham radio to broadcast messages to any part of the world, by anyone in the audience desiring its service which is free; the Lawton Fire Department will bring out equipment to the Holy City for protection against fire; and the refreshment stand on audience hill is preparing to serve 30,000 gallons of milk, sandwiches, potato chips, ice cream and other items of food to the 200,000 people who migrate to Zion's Holy Hill in the greatest religious pilgrimage in America.

A cast of 3,000 people constitute a unique fellowship and a rare event in religious participation. This year the performers are coming from ten states, and several officers from far away will perform as priests in "The Eleven Great Faiths." One of these Koreans will play the role of Balthazar and bring his gift of gold to the infant Jesus in the manger.

The Wichita Mountains Easter service operates as a non-sectarian organization. People of every faith, race, color and creed, attend it and participate in it.

This combined effort is provided free of charge to the public. The offering during the production and the gifts which people send to the Easter pageant office, help to pay the cost of the production.
