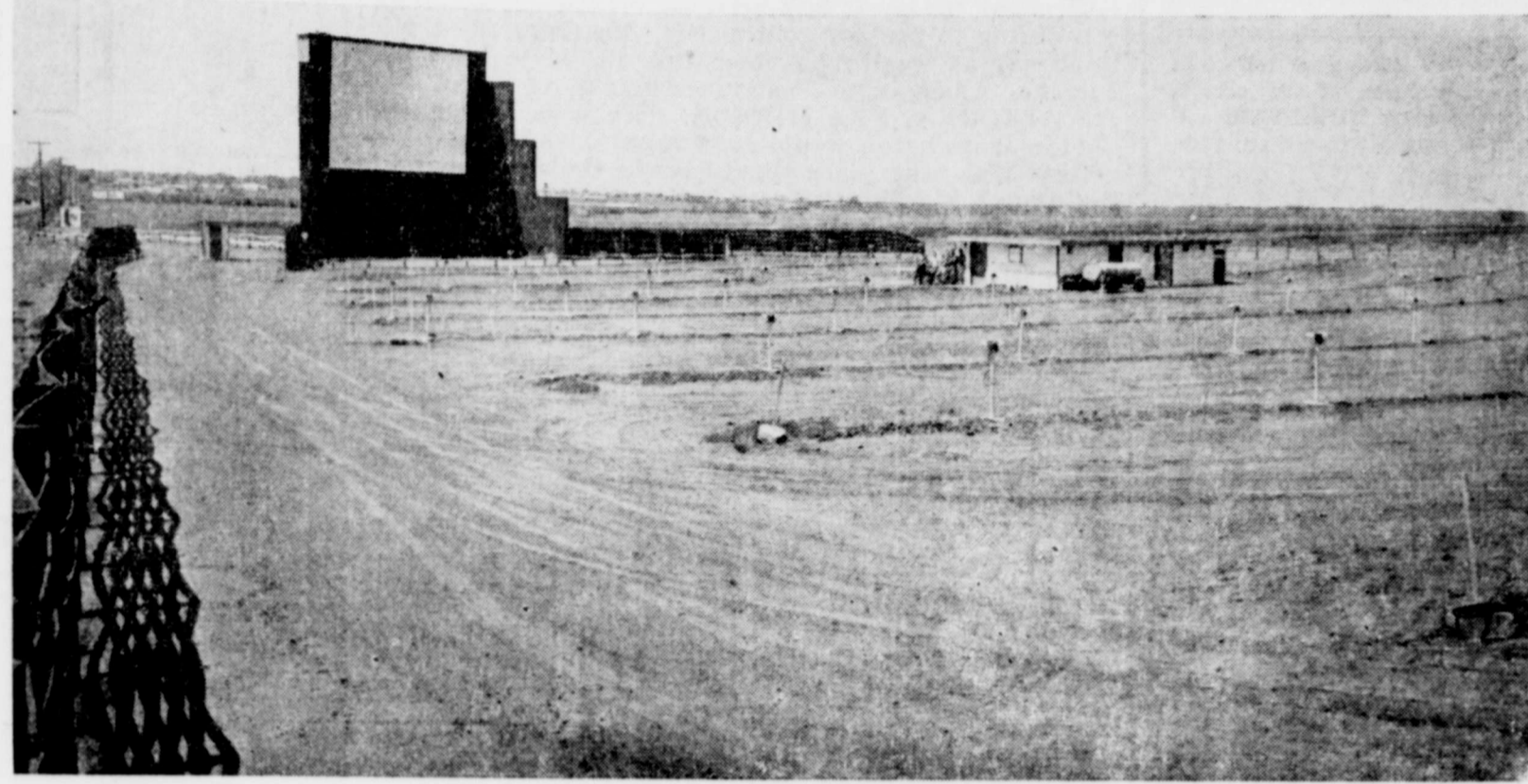

COME AND GET IT

General Eisenhower's deputy reports on the tremendous military machine of Russia, its broadening industrial base and increasing production of atomic weapons, aircraft and submarines. In Korea the enemy build-up continues while truce talks go on and on. Europe's need of raw materials and finished products for both armament and economic reconstruction is a major Administration theme song. And Defense Production Administrator Manly Fleischmann announces that civilian production can have 15 percent more steel, 19 percent more copper, 37 percent more aluminum in the third quarter of this year!

Automobile production is to be stepped up to \$1,150,000 cars for July, August and September, and the removal of all restrictions on consumer goods is being considered.

It is explained that this is made possible by the "stretch-out" in war production. But we are just suspicious enough of the Washington palace-guard to think that either the government stockpiles are so big they're actually scaring the care-takers . . . or, there may be an important election this fall.

ONE DAY'S MEAT

Today you and your fellow citizens will eat 60,000,000 pounds of meat. You'll do the same thing tomorrow and the next day and all the days of the year. That's enough meat to fill 15,000 two ton trucks, and every 24 hours it disappears across America's dining tables.

You don't have to know anything about the meat industry to realize how big a job it has on its hands. Most of our meat is produced west of the Mississippi, while most of it is eaten east of that river. The meat industry has to see to it that the meat is moved in an orderly fashion from the far-flung centers of production to all the centers of consumption. It has to get it where we want it and when we want it—and in every one of its many forms.

The meat industry, all the way from the livestock grower through the packing house to the butcher shop, is a basic, essential enterprise. That it is highly efficient goes without saying—meat is a perishable commodity and waste can't be tolerated. And it serves us far more cheaply than most of us realize. As an example, the packing concerns commonly earn, as profit, only a fraction of a cent a pound on the meat they handle. That is one of the good results of competition—there are more than 4,000 packers in the country, all looking for business. The meat industry's job is getting bigger all the time. Our population is increasing at the rate of about 2,500,000 a year. This is due to two developments—first there has been a bumper crop of babies in each of the

past 10 years; second, more people are living longer. And practically everyone is a meat eater.

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

NARROWSBURG, N. Y., NEWS-TIMES: "In the present situation small business not only faces the necessity of readjusting to different conditions, but is unable to do so because of the arbitrary and often futile rules and orders issued by the government. The small business man's own judgment is of no avail because the operation of his business has been taken out of his hands by a paternalistic government . . ."

TITUSVILLE, FLA., STAR-ADVOCATE: "Behind the notion that inflation and prosperity go hand-in-hand is the superstition that money is wealth. There was a time, of course, when money was wealth, because things that had value in themselves—gold, silver, cattle, wheat—were used as money. And for more than a century paper money could be exchanged, on demand, for precious metal. Today it is a criminal offense for an American citizen to possess gold money. But this ancient faith in money as wealth has been transferred to our paper currency which is not, today, redeemable in gold."

ALTOONA, PA., MIRROR: "We wonder what Mr. George Washington would have to say about some of the actions that take place these days in the city that bears his name? Washington was dedicated to the service of the country he helped to establish and to the welfare of his fellow Americans. He was not concerned with entrenching himself in office."

BISHOPVILLE, S. C., MESSENGER: "On the Brink of Socialism" is an editorial feature which appeared in last week's issue of Collier's Magazine. In the large picture at the top of the page is shown a view of Niagara Falls. Just at the brink of the falls and pulling on the oars of a small rowboat with all his might is a man who evidently represents the general public or 'Private Enterprise'."

News From Social Security Office

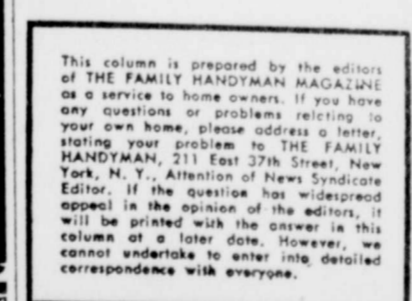
Vacation time will soon be here, but too many of us, vacation time means time to go to work. So if you plan to get a job this summer, chances are you'll need a social security number, according to Erton F. Tate, manager of the Wichita Falls social security office.

If your summer job is covered by social security (and it probably will be), your boss will hold social security taxes out of your pay check every payday—1 1-2 cents out of every dollar. Every three months he has to report your wages to the Government. He is required to show both your name and your social security number on his report. Most employers rightly require that the employee have his card when he reports to work. And if you do not have a number, you won't get credit for your wages. Furthermore—if the boss reports your number incorrectly, that's as bad as if he hadn't reported it at all. Tate advises you to "play it safe"—show your employer your social security card the first day, and let him copy the name and number exactly as they appear on the card.

If you already have a card then you're all set for the summer job. But if you've never had one, or if you had one and lost it, get an application (Form SS-5) from the Burkburnett Post Office, fill it out, and mail it to the Social Security Administration, 425 Federal Building, Wichita Falls, Texas.

A representative of the Wichita Falls office will be in Burkburnett at the City Hall on Thursday, April 24, 1952 at 9:30 A. M. You are requested to contact him if you have any questions in connection with social security.

County Included In 123 New TV Stations for State

Wichita County can look forward to its own television on four stations which may be built under a plan of the Federal Communications Commission, in Wichita Falls.

The FCC plan, which has just been adopted calls for 123 new stations in Texas. Most of them will operate in the Ultra-High Frequency range, which is an untapped section of the radio spectrum. Use of this UHF band and expansion of the present Very High Frequency service should eventually permit nearly 2,000 new television stations in every section of the nation. The 108 television stations now operating in the United States are in the VHF range.

The adoption of the UHF plan in conjunction with the expansion of VHF means the beginning of a truly nationwide television service with visual entertainment and education brought to remote areas miles from the nearest cities," stated Dr. C. B. Joffe, vice president and technical director of the Radio Corporation of America, which pioneered the development of UHF television. "We are ready to build the transmitting and receiving equipment to bring about this national television service."
