L. V. Abernathy Announces For Judgeship Race



L. V. ABERNATHY, former county attorney, Thursday, issued his formal announcement as a candidate for the office of Judge of the 39th District Court.

Abernathy, who is 52 years old, is a native of Texas, and has resided in Wichita County since 1917. He served as assistant county attorney from 1928-30. In 1930 he was elected county attorney and served two terms. In 1937 and 1938 he was assistant district attorney.

He is a veteran of both world wars. In the first war he enlisted in the air service, which is now the U. S. Air Force. He was appointed a flying cadet and completed his training as a pilot at March Field, California. In the second war he was in the Corps of Military Police, and was assigned most of the time in the prisoner of war branch. Immediately before his discharge, he was in charge of the Prisoner of War Camp at Camp Wolters, Texas.

Abernathy is married and has three children. He has practiced law for more than 25 years in Wichita Falls.

In making his formal announcement, he states:

"Since I first became a lawyer, it has been my ambition to some day become a judge. I feel that now is my opportunity and my time to realize that ambition. Judge Walter Nelson, who is now judge of the 89th District Court, is retiring at the end of this term and the field is open to elect a new judge.

"I seek his office knowing full well its duties, obligations and responsibilities. It is one of the most important offices in our system of government for upon the fair and impartial interpretation of the law depend all of the rights of the people. In my former service as a public official of this county, I always did my best to co-operate with other officials to promote the common welfare of our county. If elected, I assure you it will be my plan to seek the co-operation of and co-operate with all of our officials to promote the common good.

"During this campaign, it is my desire to meet personally most of the voters in this county. I realize it is impossible to see everyone. As to my integrity and ability to make you a good judge, I refer you to the members of my profession as well as my many friends throughout the county who have known me for the past 30 years.

"I feel that my experience as a soldier, as a father, as a prosecuting attorney and long experience as a practicing attorney provide me with the knowledge and qualifications to be of service as a judge to the people of Wichita County.

"If elected, I will do my best at all times to be fair and impartial and maintain the dignity of this office."

For the second part of the program, C. A. Morgan was introduced, who told of the building of the new rodeo arena and grandstands South of LaSalle Refinery. Mr. Morgan started at the beginning and told of the first move, which was purchase of 15 acres of land from Hugh Preston. Next came the moving of dirt to level the site up. In all, some 30,000 yards of dirt had to be moved. Dillard Vaughn is contractor for the project, taking one-half payment in cash, and one-half in script. For the grandstand seats which are supported by steel, the following quantities of pipe were used: 6,000 feet of six inch pipe, 6,000 feet of 4 inch, 2,000 feet of 3 inch and 18,000 feet of two inch. The grandstand seats are fifteen rows high, running the full length of the arena which is large enough for a foot ball field with space to spare. Seating capacity with present seats is more than 6,000 people. If the need ever arises, more seats can be added to increase the capacity to any desired figure.

Mr. Morgan said plans include the building of a softball diamond in the arena, and he stressed that when completed, the rodeo grounds and facilities would belong to Burkburnett, and its citizens would be welcome to use it for whatever they wished. A hard ball diamond is being constructed on the rodeo acreage, and lights will be put up for night playing.

American Legion To Send Boy To Boy's State

Frye-Vaughn Post No. 264, The American Legion, will send a boy to Boy's State for the week of June 8-14, providing a proper candidate can be found.

Eligibility is restricted to white students who are Juniors in Senior High school during the 1951-52 school year, and who have not previously attended Boy's State.

Boy's State is a plan for training in the functional aspects of citizenship. It is a program of education sponsored by The American Legion, Department of Texas. This program, originated in Illinois in 1934, is now in operation in 45 states and is rapidly becoming one of the most highly regarded of citizenship training programs.

The objective of the Boy's State is to "educate our youth in the duties, privileges, rights, and responsibilities of American citizenship." It is a plan for training in the functional aspects of government.

In Boy's State, citizens organize their own city, county, and state governments. They choose their own officials in accordance with regular election procedures. They learn the duties of the various city, county, and state officers. They introduce and argue their own bills in a Legislature. Justice is administered by their own law enforcement agencies and own courts.

The entire program is non-partisan. Problems will be considered without reference to any existing political party and will be free from propaganda. The sole purpose is to enable the boy to grasp the meaning of some of the responsibilities which he will be called upon to assume when he becomes an adult.

In Boy's State, the young citizen has the opportunity to learn for himself that his government is just what he makes it. Here each boy "LEARNS TO DO BY DOING."

How Will You Have Your Problems?

On America's largest cattle ranch, the famous King Ranch down in Southern Texas, a crew of ranch hands are working from daylight till dark with special butane burners to get the spines off of prickly-pear cactus to help keep drought-starved cattle alive . . . while huge areas of the country face perhaps the worst flood threat in 70 years.

Max W. Rate, Jr., Assistant Director of the Red Cross Disaster Service, reports unprecedented mountain snow-packs, and states that what happens will depend entirely upon the weather. With warm days and freezing nights, the run-off will be gradual, but warm weather around the clock will bring heavy floods to central California, New England, the Missouri River basin, the Rio Grande River region and Utah.

Thus, if it weren't for being pegged as an isolationist, we could mention that we still have a few chores to look after at home.

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

TOMBSTONE, ARIZONA, EPITAPH: "Breadwinners of Tombstone who filed returns for the biggest Federal tax grab in history, probably don't know the half of it. The most extravagant Federal bureaucracy in history is costing you money in far more ways than are shown on income tax forms. Here are the open and hidden Federal levies on average families of this community: About \$331 comes out of an income of \$1500, \$952 out of \$3500 income and \$5087 out of \$12,500 income."

JEROME, IDAHO, NORTH SIDE NEWS: "Proponents of the Hell's Canyon dam project should examine and explain fully the reason why congress must continue to appropriate funds for the Tennessee Valley Authority while it is continually cited as a Utopian accomplishment for the benefit of the people. Last week, Congress slashed \$14,757,000 in committee from the budget appropriation for TVA and then another \$14,000,000 on the floor of the House where the huge experiment in government ownership and operation was tagged under the appropriate name of 'socialistic.'"

ANAHEIM, CALIF., BULLETIN: ". . . The House Appropriations Committee slashed an average of 10 per cent from the seven billion dollars requested for a dozen Federal agencies for the next fiscal year. For some departments the cuts ran as high as 33 per cent. More of this sort of thing might well 'obviate the need for deficit spending or more taxes,' as one law maker expressed it."

OSKALOOSA, IOWA, DAILY HERALD: "Somewhere there is a point at which earnings can be knocked down by taxation to the point where they are inadequate to pay the taxes. Which is to ask, what happens to the milker when the cow goes dry?"

Money Won't Buy Good Men

Top-dogs in the Defense Department appear to be infected with the Fair Deal credo that you can buy anything, having told a Senate Armed Services subcommittee that cutting the extra pay allowance for hazardous duty would threaten national security.

But Chairman Paul H. Douglas, (Dem.) of Illinois disagrees. "I don't think you get very good men for money," he said. ". . . morale which is purchased is pretty sad."

Hazard pay for flyers, amounting from \$50 to \$210 per month, according to rank, he believes, creates "an artificial elite, a super-elite and a super-super elite." The system, he says, is unfair to the infantrymen, who "deserve extra pay" if any one does. But, he would substitute increased insurance benefits and disability pay.

The whole discussion brings ugly reminders of Goering's late Luftwaffe, and we should be grateful to Senator Douglas for daring to question the brass hats' conviction that bravery is bought like beefsteak . . . and the best costs more.

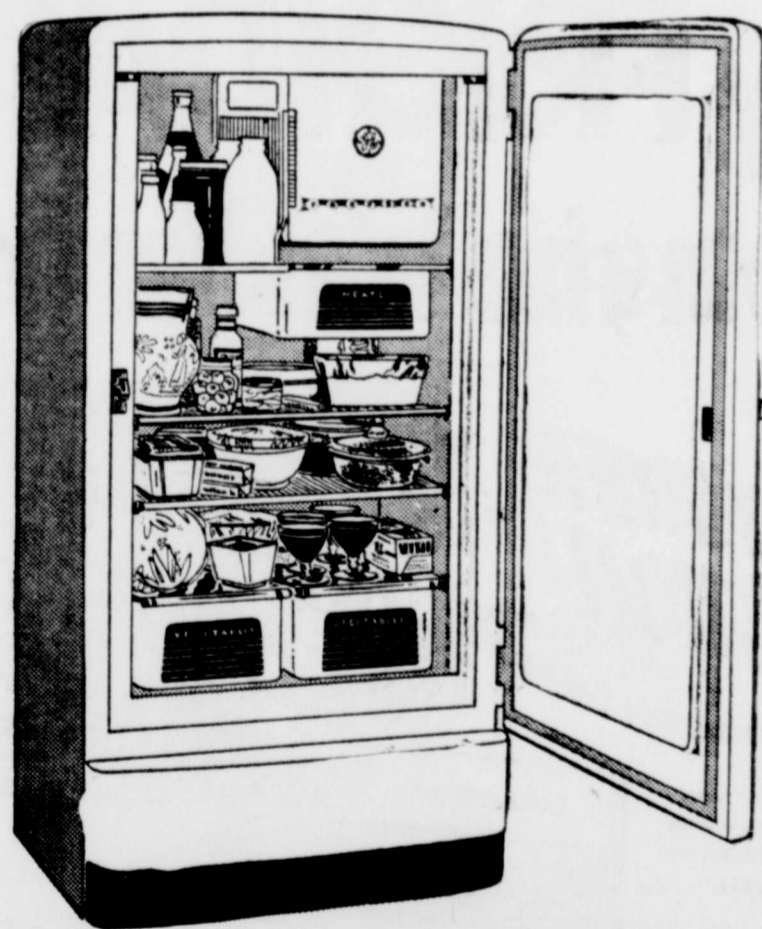

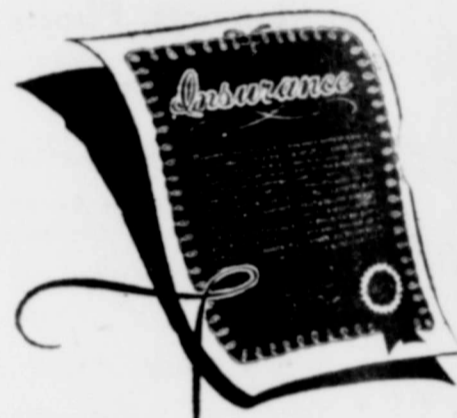

Vehicle Inspection Urged by Chief G. W. Busby

Through Dress Revues, members develop grace, poise, good posture and habits of good grooming by modeling garments of their own creation.
