Plans for the Third Annual Observance of Public Schools Week got under way here this week with the organization of a local citizens committee to work with the school authorities in the promotion of the event. The week this year will be from March 1st through 7th.

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## 1953 Chevrolets On Display Here Friday, Jan. 9th

Expanded to include a third series of cars, and boasting more significant advances than ever incorporated in a model in the low price field, the widely discussed new Chevrolets make first public appearance at dealer showrooms tomorrow, (Friday, January 9th).

For the 1953 market bodies have been completely redesigned. All cars have increased power, with special emphasis on a new power train that includes a new engine and improved automatic transmission. In performance, in economy, in driving and riding qualities, exterior and interior appointments, the latest Chevrolet models contribute importantly to automotive progress.

Features of the new cars range throughout the bodies and chassis. Of major interest:

1. The entirely new series, to be known as the Bel Air and credited with being the most luxurious models in Chevrolet history. To be produced as two and four door sedans, a convertible and sport coupe, the Bel Airs are included in the choice of 16 Fisher body types. Other passenger car series are designed as the "Two-Ten" and "One-Fifty".

2. A new 115 horsepower "Blue Flame" engine and a refined Powerglide automatic transmission re-engineered for greater operating economy and faster pickup. The so-called "standard" engine also moves up to 108 horsepower, a gain of 17.4 per cent over 1952.

3. Two Chevrolet "firsts" in the low price automotive bracket are registered in optional equipment available on all cars. Power steering, which reduces manual effort yet maintains traditional steering safety, makes its debut. The second innovation is the Autronic Eye, an electronic mechanism that automatically lowers headlamp beams for passing.

4. Roomier and stronger bodies with greatly expanded visibility. All have curved, one-piece windshields from which the center divider has been eliminated. Other body construction highspots include front swingout door hinges to provide easier entrance; fold-away front seat backs in two-doors; and wrap-around rear windows.

5. Operating advances cover the automatic choke on all cars, softer, smoother brake action, easier steering, even more reliable starting in damp weather, static-free ignition, softer front and rear springs for improved ride, and higher capacity generator.

6. Unusual developments in the station wagon field. Three station wagons, one known as the Townsman (eight passenger in the "Two-Ten" series) and two as the Handyman (six-passenger in the "Two-Ten" and "One-Fifty" series). The latter contain three-passenger rear seats that can be folded into the floor.

7. An array of convenience items including key-turn starting, crank-type front door ventipane controls and almost one-fourth more luggage space. Trunk lid openings have been enlarged and deepened. The sill is now at virtually trunk floor level as an aid to luggage loading.

8. A lavish choice of colors marked by brilliant new greens and blues are offered in 13 solids and 10 two-tone combinations. Two-tone interiors harmonize with the selection of exterior colors in many of the cars.

The principal difference in the improved Powerglide is the inclusion of a new automatic operation that will add appreciably to economy and acceleration. With the new version, the car starts in the former low range, then moves automatically into the cruising range. To take advantage of the low range for passing in traffic, the driver merely depresses the accelerator pedal. The return to the cruising range is subsequently automatic. The torque converter itself is bigger and more efficient.

## What Do You See In Your Crystal Ball?

We don't know whether there is such a thing as a "jaundiced ear" or not. But if there is, we have two of them—from listening to the annual crop of New's Year's predictors. For, even though we humans fortunately possess a safety-valve that allows much of what we hear to go in one lateral orifice and emerge from the other, a certain amount may churn about in the think-tank for some time.

For instance, it seems generally agreed among our sooth-sayers that the cold war will stay in the ice-box during 1953; that the Korean struggle may break out of the present clinch, but there will be no knock-out and no decision that wages, prices and employment will remain high; that IF there is a depression, it won't strike much before it's time for these same characters to start telling us what we should be Thankful for—and finally, that farmers may not be as well-off as city-people!

That last one would REALLY be a switch! Not being a member of the Oracles' Union, we can't read the signs and portents in the heavens. But, as a matter of reason, and not tea-leaf reading, we believe the farmer will continue, by long-odds, to be the best-fed American; by virtue of his daily routine to be the most rested at cock-crow; to worry least about the landlord; and because of his superlative ability to do for himself, to remain the happiest American.

As for the predictors, we predict, that come Michaelmas, there won't be a finger-nail left to chew among the lot of them.

## TIME TO LOCK UP

In its annual report for 1952 the House Un-American Activities Committee has recommended war powers for the Federal Government in dealing with suspected espionage, including the admission of evidence secured by wire-tapping, and a new law making it a crime to transport secret government documents without authorization. The committee also asked the death penalty for espionage in peacetime as well as war-time.

In spite of the protestations of President Truman and Generalissimo Stalin, few Americans consider that we are today at peace. And, in view of the horses already stolen from our stable, and the reasonable assumption that we still have some more in the stalls, we believe the report is very much in order.

## HOLY JOE

"Good Old Joe," Stalin says, in answer to questions submitted by The New York Times, that war between the US and the USSR "can not be considered inevitable", and that he still believes "our countries can continue to live in peace."

Asked about a possible meeting with President Eisenhower, the Generalissimo replied: "I regard this suggestion favorably." As for his interest in diplomatic efforts to end the Korean War, he said: "I agree to cooperate because the USSR is interested in ending the war in Korea."

But wait a minute! There was another question tucked in between. Asked "Wherein lie the sources of present world contention", he gave us the \$64 answer:

"Everywhere and in everything wherever the aggressive actions of the policy of the 'cold war' against the Soviet Union find their expression."

It's the same old cast-iron olive branch—not even regilded for the occasion. He will accept surrender—and we must stop interfering with his plans for us.



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## DITHER DEPARTMENT

The Inaugural Committee in Washington is having space troubles . . . not interstellar, but right on the ground in the Nation's Capital. One of them is to seat from 100,000 to half a million people in grandstands for 40,000—which would seem to be a problem for television rather than carpentry, or even reducing.

Another is how to build more than forty parade floats on only 40,000 square feet of floor space. 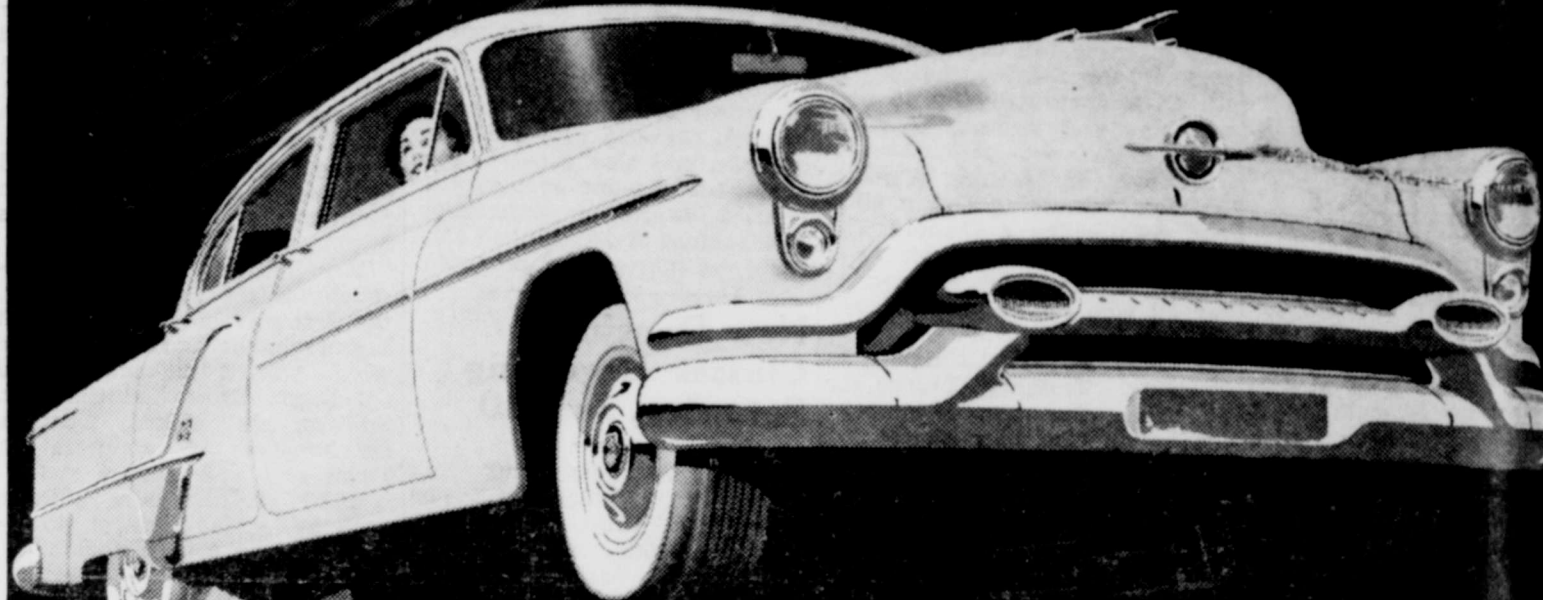

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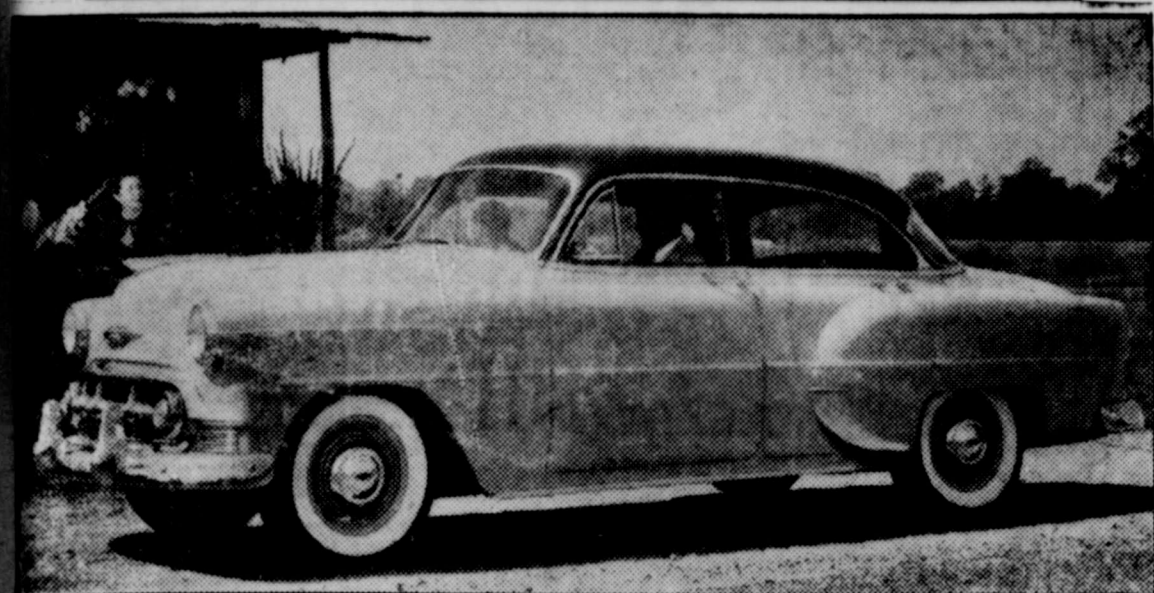

### Soil Erosion by Wind Entering Critical Period

The Soil Conservation Service

reported today that the lands subject to blowing in western Texas and Oklahoma have entered the new wind erosion season in the most perilous condition since the end of the blow years of the 1930's.

Regional Director Louis P. Merrill of SCS disclosed that reports from area headquarters

in the wind erosion sections of the two states show 6,279,500 acres are not sufficiently protected by growing plant cover or crop residues to prevent destructive blowing in strong winter and spring winds. This total is nearly 2,000,000 acres more than were in this category at this time during the last twelve years.

The dry weather following wheat plantings and the large acreages in cotton, failure of sorghum crops, and overuse of sorghum stubble and range lands, account for the big increase in unprotected acreages, Merrill explained.

Good growing weather to permit wheat and other winter crops could reduce the unprotected acreage greatly, the regional SCS director said.

The Panhandle section of Texas was added to the trouble areas of the Southern High Plains of Texas as a threatened area, Merrill reported. Area Conservationist Myles A. Kelly at Perryton, reporting for the uppermost 10 counties of the Panhandle section, and George W. Taylor at Amarillo, whose area includes 11 counties, said in their reports that winter wheat seedings are in poor con-

dition and offer little or no protection for the soil. Taylor said only 20 per cent of the wheat planted in his area has sprouted. Sorghum stubble in the Amarillo area at present is furnishing protection but much of it is being over grazed, Taylor reported. Cotton lands in that area are in poor condition.

SCS Area Conservationist Homer A. Taff at Lubbock reported 1,680,000 acres in his 12-county area without sufficient blow protection. Most of this is cotton land which was mechanically stripped and sorghum land on which the crop was cut for bundle feed.

In the 13 county area reported by Area Conservationist W. S. Goodlett of Big Spring 1,394,000 acres are unprotected and in condition to blow. Mechanically harvested cotton acreages, with large areas of bare cultivated and range lands, account mainly for the condition, Goodlett said.

In the northwest section of Oklahoma, A. T. Elder at Woodward said 500,000 acres of wheat lands, on which the new crop has made poor growth, are in condition to blow. Farmers using crop residue management practices, however, have adequate protection.

Merrill said that in the few dust and sand storms which already have occurred in the blow areas only 83,500 acres

have suffered moderate to severe damage. Of this total, 29,500 acres are in the Big Spring area.

"Many farmers in the areas of Oklahoma and Texas threatened by wind erosion are awake to the danger and are doing their best to get ready," Merrill said. "They already are busy with emergency tillage operations on the exposed lands."

"However, our goal in this fight against wind erosion is the kind of farming being done by soil conservation district co-operators R. J. Purcell of near Brownfield; Steve Brockman at Dimmitt; O. M. McGuity of near Spur, and J. J. Loftis of near Frederick, Oklahoma. These men are keeping their land protected and making it more productive at the same time. There will be no blowing on their farms this

season and on thousands of other farms whose owners are using soil conservation district methods."

### Texas Farm Bureau District Meeting for Jan. 15th

Legislative strategy and organization plans for the Texas Farm Bureau in 1953 will be discussed at a special District Conference of state and local Bureau leaders, January 15th, at the Y. W. C. A. in Wichita Falls, Texas, according to D. Barbour, state director from this district.

The meeting is one of a series of legislative and organization conferences being held this month in 12 of the 13 Farm Bureau districts in the state. The sessions will begin at 10 A. M. with a report on the last state board meeting by the district director.

Legislative, organization and publicity conferences start at 11 A. M. and continue until noon. Vice-president C. H. DeVaney of Coahoma will preside at the legislative meet, State Field Representative Leon M. Lane will preside at the organization conference and Information Director Bill Hoover will meet with local newspaper reporters and county Farm Bureau publicity directors.

O. R. Long, southern field representative of the American Farm Bureau Federation, is scheduled to speak at a noon luncheon for the group.

Conferences will resume at 1 and continue until 2 P. M. At that time, DeVaney will preside at the assembly on "The Challenge To Texas Farm Bureau." Following his address, Lane will speak on the "Now Is The Time." A discussion period is scheduled after the speeches.

He discussed in the conference will be issues expected to come before the 53rd session of the Texas Legislature which opens January 13 in Austin. These include legislation affecting rural roads, non-highway gas rebates, water and seed laws and many more issues vital to persons engaged in agriculture. The Texas Farm Bureau Federation was considered the most influential lobby at the last legislative session.

"The maxim 'in unity there is strength' is all too true," DeVaney stated. "The people in the rural areas of the state who depend upon the soil, either directly or indirectly, for a living must band together to protect their common interests in an expanding economy. Even now, the farmer must buy from, sell to, and rely on services of economic groups that are strongly organized. This is an age of organization. The farmer must organize, too, if he is to survive."
