City Manager Resignation Accepted By City Council

City Manager Leon Carver Resigns Position

The resignation of Leon Carver as City Manager has been accepted by the City Commissioners, to be effective January 31st. Carver, who has been City Manager for the past year and one-half, goes to Clinton, Oklahoma, where he has accepted a job on reactivation of the Base at Clinton. Mr. Carver was in charge of water and utility installations at this Base during the war, and will not be going into new work. Under Mr. Carver's administration here, many improvements have been made. The electric distribution system has been completely revamped to give better service, and much has been done to relieve the water shortage experienced here the last two years. At present the foundation is being poured for a new 250,000 gallon water storage tank, and a new engine and generator is being set at the City Light Plant.

Burk Invitational Tournament Set For January 22-24

M., the loser of the Burkburnett vs. Electra meets the loser of Byers vs. Seymour game. This will be followed at 8:30 by a game between the winners of these two games.

Saturday, January 24, the championship and consolation games begin. Games are to be played at 1:00 P. M. and 2:30 P. M. Saturday night at 7:00 P. M. the two winners in the consolation bracket will play, to be followed by the championship game which starts at 8:30 P. M.

Foundation For New Water Tower Is Huge Project

Pouring the concrete foundation for the new 250,000 gallon water storage tank required lots of excavation, dirt moving and plenty of concrete to refill the holes. The tank will be erected beside the city jail, near the present storage tank. Pete Bate, local contractor has the responsibility of preparing the foundation. He and a crew of workmen have been laboring on the project some time. They were pouring concrete before the snow came and had to shut down until the weather warmed up. Work has been going on all this week.

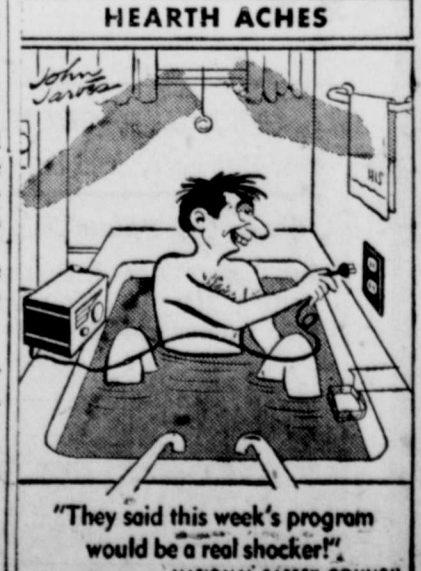
These figures are approximate, not given out by Pete: Six holes were dug for the six supporting legs of the tank. They were 10 feet square and six feet deep. Those holes had to be filled with reinforced concrete. Then on top of these hunks of concrete a dome-like cap of concrete six by six feet and tapering to two by two feet will have two-inch bolts to anchor each leg. A hole was dug in the center between the legs for the stand pipe and valves. This hole was 11 feet square and seven one-half feet deep. It also was heavily reinforced concrete. In all, it will take four, five, or six hundred sacks of cement to do the job. Steel for the tank will be put up as soon as the concrete has gone through its seasoning period. The new tank will dwarf the tiny 60,000 gallon tank now in use.

Mrs. J. S. Mills, 74, died early Tuesday morning in a Wichita Falls Hospital. She had been ill for several months. She was the wife of J. S. Mills, former manager of the Cicero Smith Lumber Company here for many years.

UNCIVIL RIGHTS

The Senate of the United States is a perennial, whose continuity remains unbroken through the years. Thus ruled its members by a vote of 70 to 21. Specifically, the vote was on the motion of Democratic Senator Clinton P. Anderson, of New Mexico and eighteen "liberals" of both parties, that the existing rules be declared dead. A favorable vote would, of course, have required the writing of new rules, the proponents hoping to change the closure rule so that debate (filibuster to you) might be shut off by a majority of the members present, rather than requiring, as at present, the votes of 64 of the 96 senators. And the purpose back of this, of course, was to pave the way for passage of civil rights bills without the staggering and problematical task of wearing down the Southern and allied defenders of states rights beyond the state of physical collapse.

Thus, if you thought at first, that the Senate might be leading the way in putting the Congress on a twelve-months-a-year basis—they weren't. Rather, we are told, the solons are laying plans—before they've gotten under day—to adjourn in July.

NEW ERA

In his final message to Congress on the state of the nation, President Truman placed his greatest emphasis on the threat of Communism to world peace and human freedom, and the present ability of man, through his atomic developments, to obliterate his civilization.

And the President addressed himself to Josef Stalin as well as to the Congress, warning the Generalissimo against his professed belief in Lenin's prophecy of "war between your world and ours."

"But," wrote Mr. Truman, "Lenin was a pre-atomic man . . . War has changed its shape and its dimension. It can not be a 'stage' in the development of anything save ruin for your regime and your homeland."

Whenever the Communist rulers recognize this, he said, "they will find us eager to reach understandings that will protect the world from the danger it faces today."

The cold war, the President indicated, is likely to be of long duration, since the Communists "seem to think and plan in terms of generations." He predicted "a long hard test of strength and stamina . . . our strategy against their strategy . . . our nerve against their nerve." The ultimate outcome, he felt, would be a cracking of the Red autocracy, or adjustment of the Communist world so that it can live with its neighbors.

The President concluded his long message with an appeal for unity, by pledging his support to "our new President", and asking the same of his hearers. It was not the message of Politician Truman, whom we have known so long. It was perhaps our introduction to a new national figure—Historian Truman.

WE'RE NOT WORRIED

We do not know whether Salesman Churchill, in his vacation retreat on the island of Jamaica, is writing his "call report" for the Home Office . . . or whether he's waiting till after the follow-up on President Eisenhower at the White House, which is scheduled for spring.

During the Prime Minister's three-day visit at the home of his old friend Bernard Baruch, in New York, he and Ike had three meetings, the last for 95 minutes after excusing themselves from a party their host was giving. At its close, a hatless and coatless "Winnie" escorted General Ike out into the raw winter night before saying goodbye.

Had he made a sale? And, if so, what is the bill-of-goods?

Whether or not Mr. Churchill sought to persuade the President-elect that Western Europe, and not Korea "is the real center of gravity", and that "it would be a very great pity" for our forces to "wander all over this vast China"—as he told newsmen—we shall probably never know. Nor do we expect bulletins on their discussions (if any) of mutual defense measures, including sharing atomic secrets; on stimulating the flow of British goods into America, or having a talk with Stalin.

We do not think the Prime Minister's attitude on Korea, at least, will be too impressive to the General, who seems to feel that when you have a shooting war on your hands the thing to do is get on with it—and who is not likely to forget that recognition of Red China hangs about the neck of Mr. Churchill's government like an albatross.

But we can expect that such talks between "men of good will" and able leaders, each passionately devoted to the welfare of his own country, will be of mutual advantage and productive of new strength for the free world.

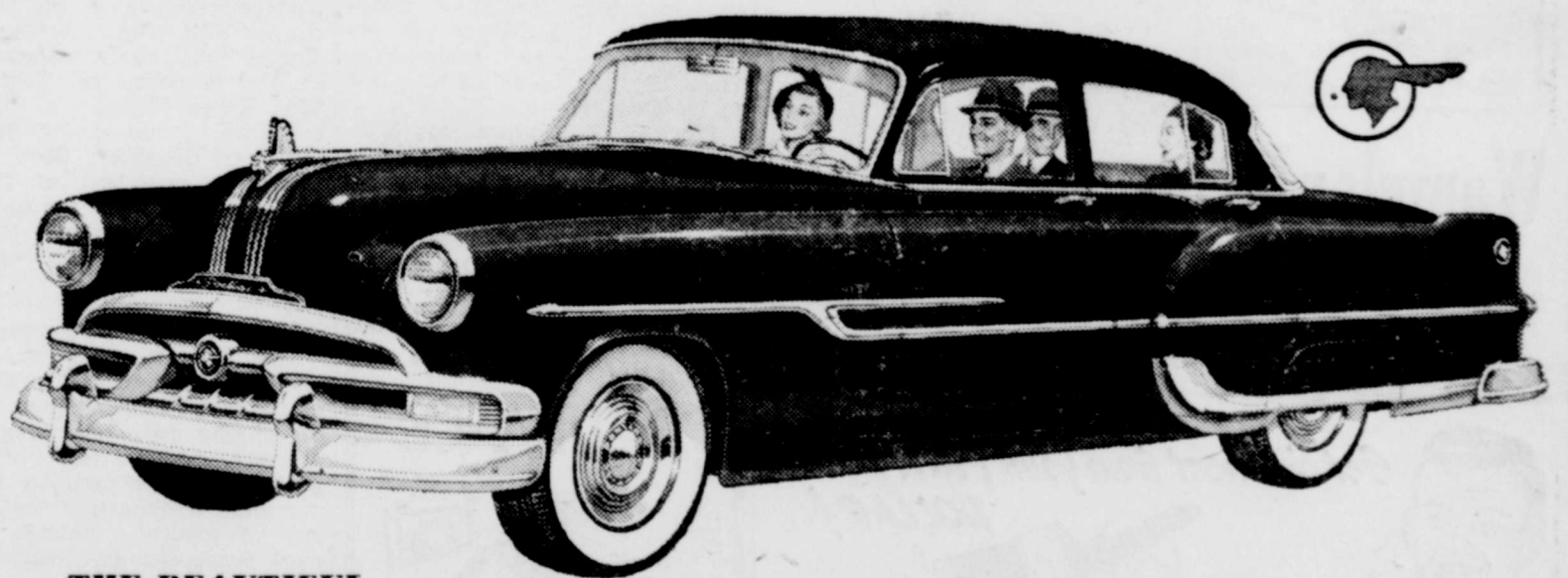

History of the Church

The Rev. C. A. Warden is present pastor of the church, one of the few remaining rural churches—the Friberg and the Cooper—in the area but after a storm had severely damaged the two churches they were rebuilt into one and the congregations combined at the Friberg location.

Records show about 45 different pastors had served the two churches. Many residents of this area when the church was established are still located here, including the Rev. J. H. Snarr who served as pastor from 1921 to 1924, and again from 1936 to 1939. He is still living in the community and is an active member of the church. His wife, the former Miss Katie Lovell, was a member of the group which organized the Friberg church in 1896. She was a child at the time, and became a member of the first Sunday School. In that year Sunday School and church were organized by Levi Carey with the first services conducted in a hay barn, the congregation sitting on bales of hay as their pews. Later

church services were moved to the new one-room schoolhouse. At his death in 1901 Carey left in his will a sum of \$500.00 to be used toward the building of a church at Friberg, on condition the community match the fund. John Friberg, G. E. Friberg and O. M. Johnson were appointed trustees. A meeting was called May 12, 1902 for raising the additional money, a subscription list was started and \$750.00 was raised. On May 7, 1902 a deed to seven acres of land was acquired from Charles Andrew. On the following July 28th, the

foundation was laid and August 2 marked the setting of the cornerstone. It was on Dec. 28, 1902 that the new church was dedicated, with Rev. D. R. Evers of Dallas making the dedicatory address. The first pastor of the new church was Rev. F. T. Farrington. A new parsonage was built the same year at a cost of \$500.00.

It was on Sept. 2, 1938 that the church was destroyed by fire and again services were conducted in the schoolhouse. The Rev. J. H. Snarr was pastor at that time.

The enterprising congregation immediately began planning to rebuild the church and by January 16, 1939 actual construction was begun, with all work donated by the community.

The pews, with cooperation of the district Supt., the Rev. Robert Thompson, were donated by the Methodist Church of Elk City, Oklahoma. Mr. and Mrs. N. D. Singletary and family gave the piano.

It was Sept. 3, 1939 that the new church was dedicated, free of debt. Dr. Thompson made the dedication and Dr. Eugene M. Antrim, pastor of Grace Methodist Church of Wichita Falls, delivered the principal address. Mrs. Troy Hurdt was the pianist for the occasion, the same Mrs. Hurdt whom now serves in that post, as she has since 1920. She was then Miss Thelma Lovell. Now that the church has acquired a Hammond organ, she presides at its keyboard also.

History of the Cooper churchland was donated by the late J. D. Cooper to build the school. Church services were held in the schoolhouse in 1910 and in 1911 more land was given by Mr. Cooper to build the church. Mrs. J. L. Huffines, Cooper daughter, was one of the charter members. Mrs. Huffines taught one of the first Sunday School classes with an enrollment of 31 in her class. Mrs. Huffines still lives in the Cooper community. Mr. O. J. Cooper and Mr. Lee Cooper also reside in the same community. They are also sons of the late J. D. Cooper.

Mrs. W. L. Cooper was Sunday School secretary at Cooper and also served as secretary for

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the church. Mrs. Doyle is still a very active member of community affairs. She is Spiritual Life chairman for the Friberg-Cooper U. S. C. S. at the present time.

In 1947 an educational annex was added to the church, and at that time the Rev. C. D. Copeland was pastor. The material used for the construction of the annex was material salvaged from the Cooper church. More than 75 per cent of the labor was donated for the building, and it was free of debt at the time of completion.

The church is located on the highest point in Wichita County, its steeple significantly marked by a neon cross erected in 1945 in memory of Ted Jenne, a minister who had grown up in the church, and who was killed in an accident in 1941.

On June 22, 1952 members dedicated a new organ and spinet piano. Also during the year a prayer bench and rug were added to the chapel rail and during the past two years the parsonage has been completely modernized and refurbished.

The women of the church have made a name for themselves during the last 25 years with their famous chicken and noodle suppers, served usually on the third Thursday night of each month. This is the only profitable project necessary for meeting the budget of the W. S. C. S. Last year the organization sent to its district treasurer a report accounting for \$2,233.27, including the pledges of the 31 members.

The church has an active M. Y. F. which has produced three full time Christian Service Workers. Cherry Lynn Kolter is in college preparatory to become an occupational therapist. Her brother, Bill Kolter, is planning to enter the ministry. Mervin Turner also is a recruit for full time service.

Mrs. J. W. Loveall is the only charter member of the Friberg church still living in the community but many descendants of the founders are still here. Mrs. Ethel Bryan, a Friberg daughter, is an active member and her daughter, Mrs. V. C. Lamb, is president of the W. S. C. S. which is presenting a stained glass window to the church for the home coming event.

Program for Homecoming

Mrs. Troy Hurdt at the organ and Mrs. Eldon Manis at the piano, the congregation joined in singing two selections. Rev. Warden read letters of best wishes to the church by former members and pastors that could not be present. Letters were read from former pastors Rev. Draper of Inwood, Iowa, Rev. Landcaster of Grimes, Okla., Rev. Farrington of Grace Mont,

Okla., Rev. Roy Haven of Vernon. And from former member Mrs. Edna Musgrave.

Organ selections "The Church in the Wildwood", "What a Friend We Have In Jesus", and "I Love to Tell the Story" were presented by Miss Frances Jenne in memory of her father, Ted Jenne, a Methodist minister claimed in death by an accident in 1941. Rev. Grimes of Vernon, Texas, brought the afternoon sermon. He was pastor of Cooper some 40 years ago. After the closing song, "Blessed Be The Tie That Binds," Mrs. C. D. Copeland of Dallas dismissed with prayer. Refreshments of coffee and cake were served to the group present. The cake was a big anniversary cake decorated with yellow roses and a big 50 to represent the 50th anniversary.

The program for the morning service was conducted by Rev. C. A. Warden, introducing the visitors and urging all them to stay for the basket lunch to be served at the noon hour. Rev. C. D. Copeland of Dallas brought the message after a special song by Mrs. Ralph Huggins.

Approximately 150 people attended the Homecoming.

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Legislature Urged To Improve Teachers Salaries

The 53rd Texas Legislature was urged today to improve teacher salaries in order to attract 11,000 additional teachers that will be needed in Texas Public Schools the next eight years.

Inadequate salaries is the main reason schools cannot find teachers for the classrooms being built for increasing enrollments, said Charles H. Tennyson, secretary-treasurer of the Texas State Teachers Association.

Tennyson said Texans should be shocked by the fact that the state may have fewer teachers in 1960 than in 1952 even though the scholastic population is expected to increase 325,000 over its present level by 1959-60.

More than 4,000 teachers left the profession last year, while population growth created the need for an extra 1,000 teachers. This meant a total of 5,000 new teachers was needed. Only 4,000 college graduates were certified to teach in Texas in 1952, and approximately half of those were lured away from the profession, primarily by higher salaries offered by industry, Tennyson reported.

He questioned whether the average 1951-52 teacher salary of \$2,860 was adequate to hold men and women in the important profession of educating Texas boys and girls. Income tax and retirement deductions cut that average to \$2,279 in take-home pay, and this had a purchasing power of \$1,150 dollars in terms of the 1935-39 dollar, Tennyson observed.

"Who will teach Texas children in 1960 if the teaching profession is able to attract only 2,000 qualified college graduates each year and continues to lose 5,000 teachers annually?" Tennyson asked.

This, he said, is a major question to which the legislature should give serious consideration.

Mrs. O'Neil was actively engaged in farming and cattle business until about eight or nine years ago. Her first husband died at Bellevue. 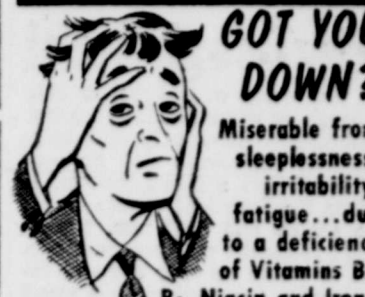

Lone Star Gas Makes Record Gas Delivery

Lone Star Gas Company delivered its first billion cubic feet of gas in a 24-hour period, as of 7 o'clock Saturday morning, to more than 620,000 customers in 387 cities and towns in Texas and Oklahoma, according to reports from the firm's Dallas headquarters.

The record breaking consumption resulted from Friday's siege of cold weather combined with growth of the company's operating territory, the report stated. It followed on the heels of another record set this winter which witnessed a period of 54-straight days when temperatures averaged below 65 degrees and required constant heat.

The stretch of heating weather started in mid-November and continued through December and into January over most of the Lone Star system.

The total send-out through Saturday morning was 1,060,400,000 (billion) cubic feet of gas.

gas. On Wednesday, the day before the cold wave struck, total consumption was about one-half of Friday's peak. The previous high for a 24-hour period, was 936,700,000 (million) cubic feet recorded at 7 A. M. on January 30, 1951.

During early stages of the cold siege the company ordered minimum curtailment in gas consumption by a few large industrial plants. This was done to protect the gas supply for homes and was in line with regular contractual agreements.

The company's ability and delivery capacity to meet these record requirements, officials said, is represented by a continuing construction and enlargement program which, since 1945 has called for more than \$100 million in new capital and hundreds of new employees.

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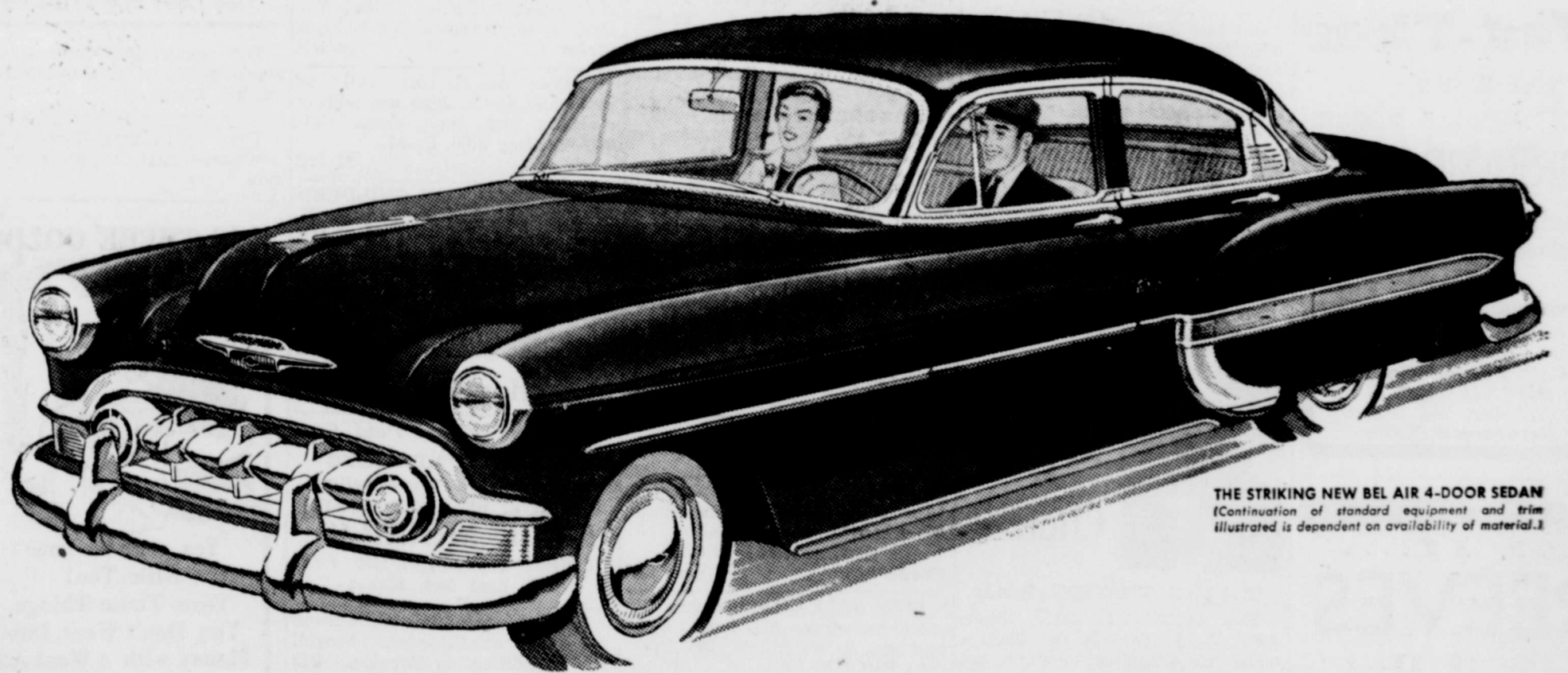

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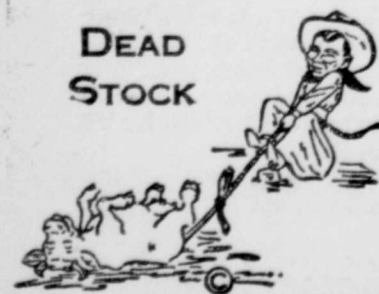

Your Farm Bureau

Many people believe that the American Farm Bureau is controlled by a handful of men that formulate the policies and tell its members what their stand is going to be on the national level in regards to parity supports, soil conservation, etc.

This could not be farther from the truth. Then men that carry official titles in the AFBF were elected by the membership and are subject to them in all matters concerning the members.

All members of the Wichita County Farm Bureau are also members of the AFBF, as well as the state organization. You elect your county officers; and you elect the voting delegates to the state convention. You vote on the resolutions that are presented to the voting delegates for approval. Resolutions are the basis for the 1953 legislative and organizational plans.

All resolutions that are approved at the state convention are submitted for national approval by the delegates from the states and territories. Through approved resolutions, your Farm Bureau becomes the "voice of agriculture."

Neither can Allan Kline, Walter Hammond, Dutch Eckelkamp, Mont Bowles nor J. L. Caffee say that the Farm Bureau is for or against any issue unless it is so stated in the resolutions.

Let's take a look at one of the

resolutions passed by your county organization November 3, 1952, at the county meeting. It states:

"The Wichita County Farm Bureau urges support by all Farm Bureau units and members, of the proposed Farm Credit Legislation House Bill 8336 and 8337 and companionate Senate Bill 3388."

These bills propose to take the Farm Credit Administration from under the jurisdiction of the Department of Agriculture and make it an independent agency with the authority to report direct to Congress.

A twelve member board would be set up, consisting of one member from each Farm Credit District. This board would have the authority to hire and fire the executive officers.

This resolution was read and passed at the state convention last November. In December, it was approved at the national meeting. We, as members of Farm Bureau, stand behind our resolutions. They stand for the intelligent thinking of the farmers, by farmers, and for farmers.

The Farm Bureau is a machine, a tool, which a farmer can use to do his work outside the fence row. It is an organization of, for and by farm families, united for the purpose of analyzing their problems and formulating programs to effect for farmers economic equality, educational opportunity and social advancement, and thereby promote the national security.
