ONE TO KEEP

Along about now, if we check up on what happened to all our pious New Year's resolutions, we appreciate the wisdom of John Lair of Renfro Valley, Ky. In his first "Renfro Valley Sunday Gatherin'" of 1953, he warned against too many pledges. "A few promises kept," he said, "are better than a whole lot of them broken."

But, if all your glittering resolutions have gone the way of the Christmas Tree ornaments, it's still not too late to try concentrating on just one. Mr. Lair thinks what is most needed by most of us is "to pay a little more attention to our church and church work." He says this is especially true in rural America where so many churches have been abandoned or allowed to get down-at-the-heel. In the city, when this happens, the property is sold, the church torn down, and there's nothing left to revive. But in the country, the weather beaten spire still points steadfastly to heaven—a daily reproach to those who might restore its usefulness and replenish their own souls.

"Chances are you know of more than one old church house falling to decay," says the man from Renfro Valley, "that housed lively congregations of folks that really enjoyed getting together there as often as they could. Maybe you grew up in just such a church body. Do you ever stop to ask yourself what your kids are missing in not following the same path?"

"There are more attractions—and distractions—for boys and girls now-a-days and if the community church has lost out in the competition, you older folks had better see to it that it gets back into the field. You know what the old country church did for you when you were growing up. Try to give your youngsters the same chance in the same old country church."

And it should be especially noted that it is not only the abandoned church that needs revitalizing. Plenty of them that are still functioning are in desperate need of fresh enthusiasm and new activities. It used to be fun to go to church. It can be again!

And if you need a special occasion to spark this one big resolution, what could be more appropriate than Brotherhood Week, the week established to signalize "justice, amity, understanding and co-operation among Protestants, Catholics and Jews"? It starts on George Washington's Birthday, which is Sunday this year, the first Sunday in Lent. So there's still time, if you round up some helping hands, to clean out that neglected old church, perhaps even patch the roof. A Brotherhood resolution is as good as a New Year's resolution—any day!

LOOSE TALK?

In a secret briefing of the House armed services committee, Defense Secretary Robert A. Lovett described the world situation as "tense", questioned the effectiveness of all-out force in Korea, discussed the possibility of greater economic pressure on the Chinese Reds and the danger of antagonizing our allies.

Representative Dewey Short (Rep.) of Missouri, chairman of the committee, who reported on the closed meeting, also quoted Mr. Lovett as saying that large defense expenditures would have to be continued for the foreseeable future, that to cut such spending below 55 billions in a year would be a "grave risk".

As he appeared before the committee, the Secretary made public a letter written to the President November 18th in which he recommended a general overhauling of the Defense Department and urged prompt attention to the security problem. Under existing laws, he said, it is impossible to protect the nation's secrets against "traitors, spies and blabber-mouths".

All-in-all, Mr. Lovett's remarks seem curiously at variance with President Truman's press conference statement of the previous week that prospects of world peace were improved over a year ago . . . and Secretary of State Acheson's testimony before the Chief sub-committee that faithless Americans in the UN were no peril to our security. The Defense Secretary, however, did not name any "blabber-mouths".

A Truman Speech to Remember

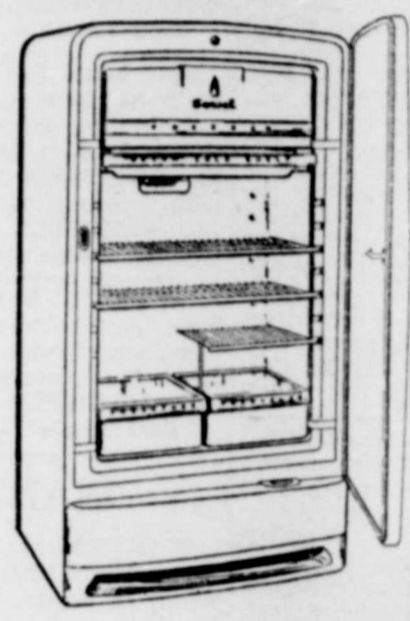

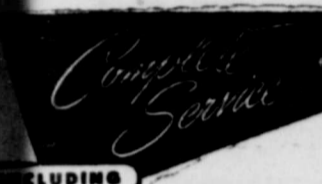

I had a good long talk with old Bill the other afternoon. You will remember old Bill, the old timer who at one time called good old Burk his home, only to do like a lot of other good people, wander off, and he's been sorry of it ever since. Well, old Bill was fairly happy over the inauguration, recent rains, coming of spring, etc, but then old Bill was kinda down in the dumps over other things also. "Louis," he says to me, "I been notice in the papers where there are some farmers who have been putting their cotton in the loan (while I never have done that; 'cause if I had any cotton I would sell it the minute it was picked. Would have to in order to beat the check to the bank for having it picked), but I like this loan system 'cause I been investigatin' its merits and I have a suggestion to make. As I understand it, if a cotton farmer thinks the price of cotton is going up, he can put his cotton in the government loan and get the loan price right then in cash, and if the price goes up he can later sell and make an additional profit which he is entitled to, and even if it doesn't up, even if it goes down below the price he still gets to keep the loan and doesn't have to pay the difference."

This is a system designed to stabilize the price of cotton, to keep cotton growers from dumpin' all their cotton on the market at one time and approve it. But old Bill says "I'd like to

see the system expanded. . . Take me for instance," he says, "I've got a few head of cattle on hand out here, and as everybody but the meat market knows the price of cattle's been droppin' steadily. In fact, in the last eight months it has dropped over thirty per cent. All right now" Bill said "I paid pretty good prices for my cattle, bought 'em when they were high, and while they haven't got too much to eat, hay is higher than I can get Mr. Brookshear to let me have the money to buy feed, and they still have to eat. What I want to know is, why I can't put these cattle in a government loan? Why can't I turn these cattle over to who ever handles government cotton, and let them hold them and feed them for me until the prices go back up in places besides the meat markets. I tell you it would take a burden off me without sellin' 'em or without buying any more feed. Course" says Bill, "if I sell 'em now I got to take a loss, and if I keep on feedin' 'em I gotta take a bigger loss, but if I could put 'em in a government loan things would sure purk up for me. Now if you think this plan has any merit, I would appreciate it if you

Additional money for roads, Governor Shivers believes, should come from another penny-a-gallon tax on gasoline.

He recommended salary increases for state workers and teachers, and the construction of a \$6,725,000 tubercular hospital plant and buildings at the Texas School for the Deaf.

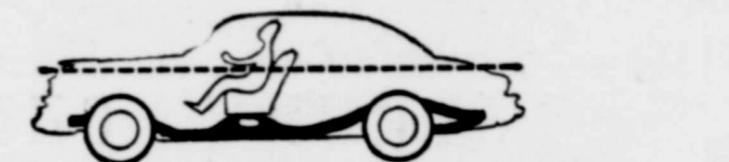

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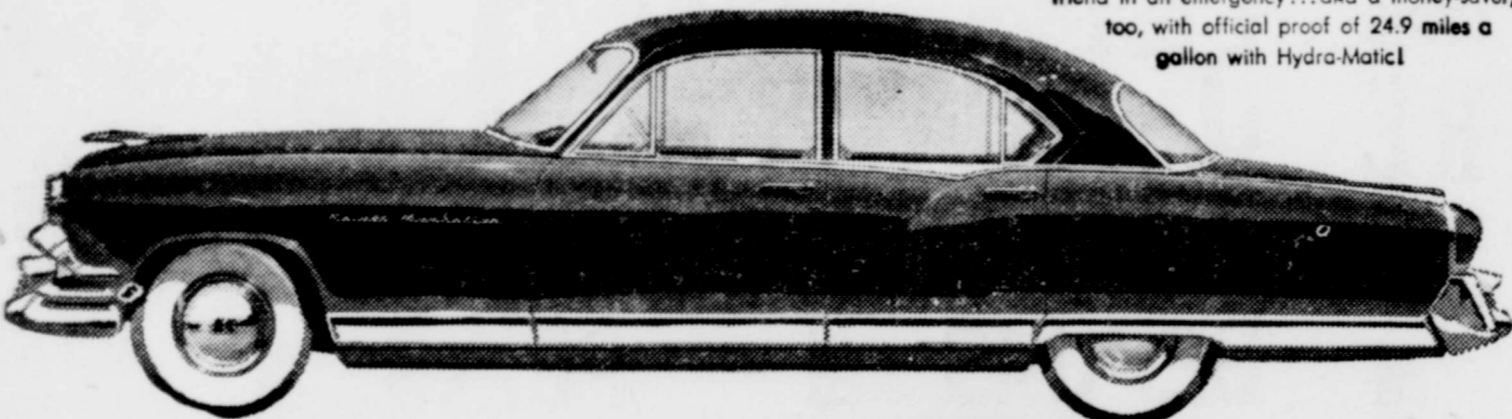

Why, then, should the farmer hesitate in organizing? He too wants a higher standard of living, bigger profit, better working conditions, and higher production.

All the farmers have ever asked was a chance to earn a day's pay for a day's work. If it takes organization to bring the economical standards of agriculture to equal labor and industry, then the farmers have enough horse sense to organize.

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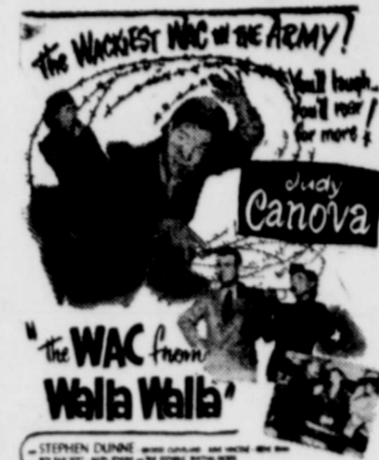
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
