Low Rent Housing Project Slated To Start In Burkburnett In 45 Days

The Housing Authority of Burkburnett has accepted the low bid of Mills and Thweatt Rig Mishap Kills of \$336,995.00 for the construction of 52 low rent housing units and a maintenance and management building. The project will be located on eight acres of land two blocks east of the Grade school building. 3:50 P. M., Monday on the Riley Construction will start within 45 days after receipt of final approval from the Federal Public Housing Authority.

The project will consist of 26 duplex houses, each of brick veneer construction. These will be 12 one-bedroom units, 24 two-bedroom units, 10 threebedroom and two four-bedroom units. Two duplex units will be built for the Negroes.

The new project in Burkburnett is to benefit low income groups. Tenants are restricted to those with incomes below a statutory level established by FPHA. All utility bills will be paid. Each unit will have wall heaters, thermostatically conelectric refrigerators, kitchen ranges, hot and cold water, venetian blinds and asphalt tile floors.

The Burkburnett Housing Authority is composed of Truman Garland, chairman; Paul Browning, vice-chairman; George Byerly, secretary, and Commissioners Virgil Brookshear, Clark Gresham and John Brookman.

The map and plat of a 34 lot residential addition to the city of Burkburnett was filed with Wichita County Clerk Monday. The new area will be known as Chambers Addition, and is owned by W. W. Chambers.
