House Bill No. 3 Weeks to Add to Burk School Taxes

In 1952-53 Burk Burnett local schools assigned to education were assessed \$22,242.28. Under House Bill No. 3 now up for consideration, Burk Burnett local schools would be assessed \$27,184.51. Charles H. Tennyson, executive secretary of the Texas State Teachers' Association, said today that plan for easing the critical classroom shortage will seriously handicapped if local school districts are required to pay a bigger share of the minimum foundation program. "Local schools already are paying more than 40 per cent of the cost of public education in Texas," Tennyson said, "although those who want to reorganize the school financing pattern cite only the figures showing that local schools pay about 30 per cent of the minimum foundation program cost. They fail to cite the cost of current operations and repayment of bonded indebtedness."

The big difference in percentages lies in the fact that the minimum foundation program does not represent total school costs. Local school districts must pay many additional expenses themselves, including the cost of new buildings and facilities. Figures compiled by the Texas Education Agency show that the total cost of public education in Texas during the 1951-52 school year was \$318,963,078. Tennyson said. Local school districts paid \$132,832,708 of that amount, or 41.6 per cent. The state paid \$186,918,657, or 58.4 per cent. The federal government contributed 1.7 per cent, or \$5,211,713, mostly for the school lunch program.

"Approximately 33,000 children in our elementary schools do not attend classes for less than half day because of the classroom shortage," Tennyson said. "Our local school districts are getting as much money as is available into new buildings. Many plans for new school construction may have to be scrapped if local contributions to the minimum foundation fund are increased."

The limit on local contributions to that fund now stands at \$3,000,000. "Many other states grant financial aid to local schools for construction purposes," Tennyson said, "but in Texas the need for buildings and facilities must be met by the local communities themselves."

Many of the other states pay school construction costs," Tennyson said. "In recent years, Virginia set aside \$100,000,000 for that purpose. The Washington appropriated \$100,000,000. North Carolina \$100,000,000 and Delaware appropriated \$13,000,000. California recently made available, in two separate moves, \$55,000,000 and \$60,000,000 to help local school districts meet building costs, in addition to \$250,000,000 earmarked for a long range building program. Massachusetts pays to 65 per cent of the construction costs for school buildings."

The local school districts in Texas have made no plea for larger grants, Tennyson pointed out. On their own initiative, they are doing their best to alleviate the critical classroom shortage which forces 33,000 students in elementary schools to attend classes for less than a half day.

Tennyson said there is no danger of state control of education when the local schools themselves are paying 40 per cent of the education bill. "It should be noted," he said, "that the Gilmer-Aikin bills place local control to the greatest extent and not a single bill has been introduced in the legislature that would alter or take away local control. Nor would we support any measure that would tend to centralize the control of education."

Burkburnett Rips Quannah to Tie for District 2A-4

Burkburnett High School vaulted into a first place tie with Quannah for the District 2A-4 leadership here Tuesday night as the Bulldogs rallied in the second half to sidetrack the Indians, 51 to 43.

Both teams now boast 4-1 conference records going into Friday night's regular season finale, which finds Quannah at Seymour and Burk Burnett at Electra.

Burk's battling Bulldogs held the Indians to only four points in the third quarter to take command, 35-29, after trailing 25-23 at halftime.

The sterling defensive efforts by Burk in the third quarter turned the tide for Coach Jim Whitaker's Bulldogs, who then outscored Quannah 16-14 in the last period.

Donald Gee, Stanley Owen and Richard Ragsdale paced the Burk Burnett attack with 15, 12 and 11 points, respectively.

Bobby Williams, the district's top scorer, netted 24 points for Quannah to raise his district total to 134. Billy Sellers was runner-up in the Quannah point-making column with seven, while Charlie Richardson scored six.

Quannah won the B game by a score of 38 to 23.

War On The Water Front

"They've been fiddling around with it a long time and not getting anywhere", said Senator Charles W. Tobey, (Rep.) of New Hampshire, in speaking of racketeering on the New York docks, which he termed a "national scandal" and a "national disgrace".

The Senate Interstate Commerce Committee (of which he has since become chairman) has jurisdiction, since New York is a two-state port, he said, and he would like to see it conduct an inquiry . . . and on television, too. "Yes," he said, "I'll go for television. I like it. It is only a little more elaborate reporting and I think the people have a right to see their government working."

And the Senator will also have the help of all the AFL maritime unions in the New York area, if he wants it. The Greater New York Harbor Port Council, a new organization, has been formed by 200 members of AFL unions representing longshoremen, sailors, licensed deck and engine-room officers, and radio operators who have declared war on waterfront crime, violence and union rule-breakers.

With all due respect to the Senator from New Hampshire, we submit that this Port Council will prove as mighty a force in this reform as the miracle of television. Unions are growing up, and coming to understand their real power and how to use it, when they organize to defend the society of which they are a part, as well as to control erring members.

AN ERA BEGINS

Within the span of a few historic moments, shortly after noon on January 20, 1953, Dwight David Eisenhower became President of the United States, the avowed disciple of a new national unity, and the man to whom the free half of a viciously divided world looks for leadership in its struggle for survival and ultimate peace.

After reviewing a five-hour parade, sticking by his post till the last marcher had passed, long after darkness had settled over Washington; after his first, quick meal in the White House (served on a tray); after attending the two Inaugural balls; President Eisenhower was at his desk at 8:00 next morning to begin his first full day at the biggest job in the world.

Despite the weeks of earnest, effective planning and organizing at his New York headquarters and the Washington meetings with President Truman and his outgoing department heads, the official family was still incomplete and there were breakers ahead. But there could be no dismay in the heart of the man who had prayed the day before for "the power to discern clearly right from wrong, and allow all our words and actions to be governed thereby, and by the laws of this land." There could be no room for misgivings in the mind of a leader who had humbly and devoutly asked: "May cooperation be permitted and be the mutual aim of those who, under the concepts of our Constitution, hold to different faiths; so that all may work for the good of our beloved country and Try glory. Amen."

Farm Bureau Resolutions

If all organized "pressure groups were as wise and reasonable as the American Farm Bureau Federation, the United States would have much more balanced and effective economic legislation and policies.

Many pressure groups have followed the policy of "get ours" regardless of what happens to the general economy. But a study of resolutions adopted at the Farm Bureau convention in Seattle this month shows that this large farm group has developed a program in which all segments of the economy are given a balanced place.

The Farm Bureau fights for many things of particular advantage to farmers; but it does not, for example, demand economy in government except where agriculture is concerned. One resolution states that "No segment of our economy, including agriculture, (should) be spared participation in efforts to achieve a balanced (federal) budget."

The AFB supports a continuation of price support program that will protect the farmer against radical fluctuations in prices. But the resolutions add: "It is not, however, the responsibility of the government to guarantee profitable prices to any economic group." And the resolutions state: "In order to encourage high production per man in agriculture, the emphasis in farm programs should continue to be on adequate prices in the market place rather than on income subsidies."

The AFB, in our estimation,

does not demand anything from the government that is not both advantageous to agriculture and the national economy as a whole. For many years, as an example, some farmers have been paid federal subsidies for conservation practices which any good farmer would use. The Farm Bureau states that "Payment for practices which have become a normal and accepted part of farming operations of the area in which a farm is located should be discontinued."

These are some of the ways in which the "American" part of the Farm Bureau Federation's program is emphasized. It is a sound plan for agriculture but it is also a rounded economic program for the nation as a whole.

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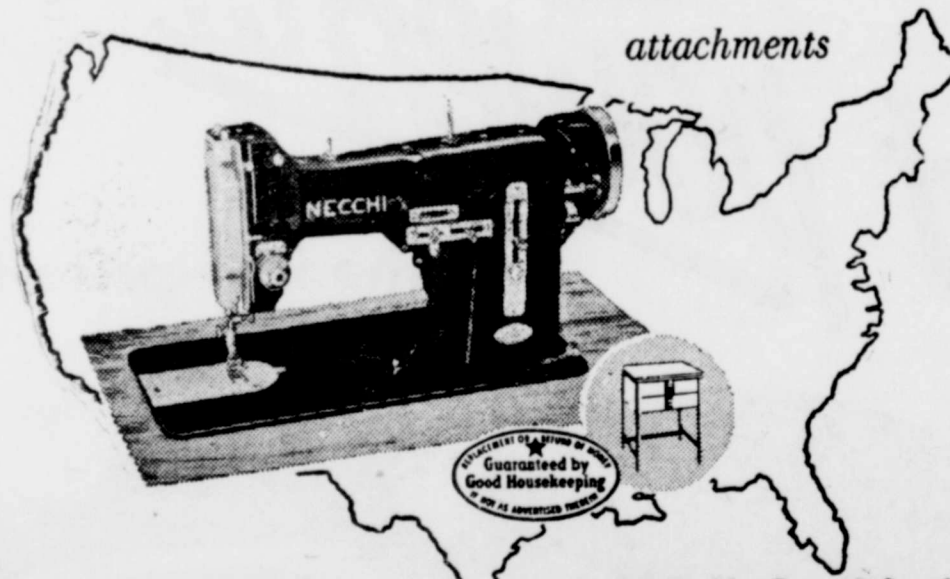

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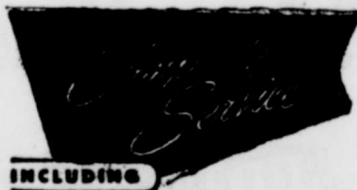
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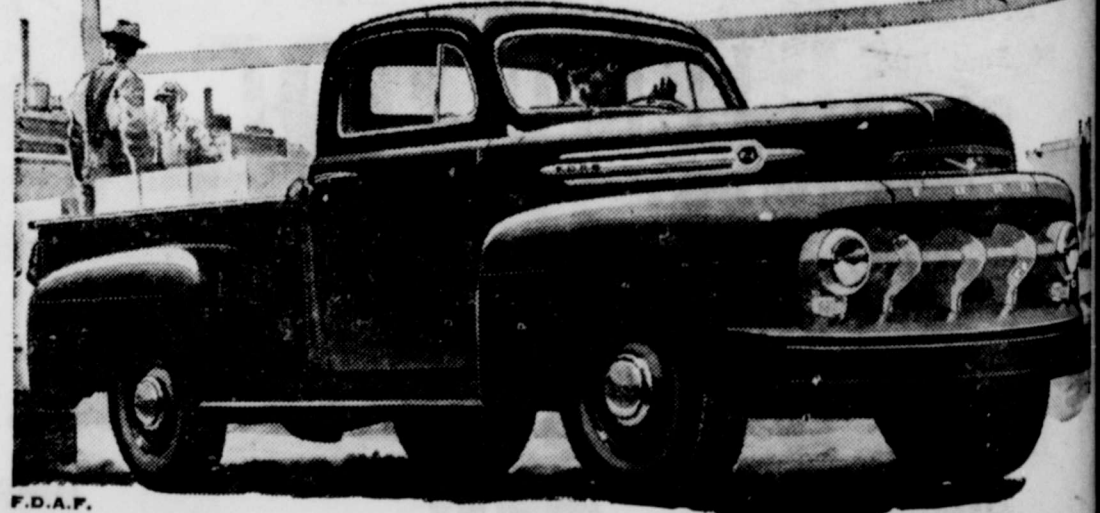
