



Until living standards can be improved, millions of Asian children, like the youngster pictured, must work. Meanwhile, the International Labor Organization (ILO), a U.N. specialized agency, seeks to eliminate harmful practices through international action. At present, young people are sometimes sold for their services or given over to contractors on a long-term indenture. Asian countries will soon meet under ILO auspices to discuss measures to abolish such procedures and improve employment conditions for young workers.

"Nothing that the US alone can do will ever be enough to make Europe safe," declared Secretary of State John Foster Dulles in his radio report to the nation on his whirlwind ten day survey of European capitals. The fate of the North Atlantic Treaty Organized, he said, awaits ratification of the six nation European Defense Community treaty, which includes Germany, and which is now three months overdue.

This treaty, activating a six nation "European Army' he said, would give NATO a "stout and dependable heart", and while he believes there is "a will to proceed", he warns that unless there is action soon. "progress will be difficult."

We must be sympathetic, says Mr. Dulles, to Europe's difficulties and fears and historic hatreds and must be "sober and restrained in national conduct." We must display, he said, "clear vision, righteous determination and

firm performance." He and Mr. Stassen, our Secretary of State reported, visited Rome, Paris, Bonn, Brussels, The Hague and Luxembourg. He did not mention London-although we seem to recall he was over there, arriving with scant fanfare at the very hour that Foreign Secretary Eden reported to the House of Commons his alarm over Ike's deneutralizing Formosa and it's "unfortunate political repercus-

If such legislation is passed by the Congress, and I hope it will be, then of course it will be necessary for such legislation to be ratified by at least two-thirds

of the States. This week the House acted on the first appropriation bill to come before this session which was the second supplemental appropriation bill. The bill as finally passed by the House was about 60 per cent less than the budget request. This was an encouraging sign that there possibly will be some real economy during this session of Congress. It seems to me that one of our greatest responsibilities is to work for a balanced budget can stabilize our economy and bring about a reduction in income and other federal taxes.

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
