Soil Conservation and efficient land use have the prime concern not only of progressive dirt farmers, but of far sighted agricultural and industrial leaders. Yet, for several de-cades our crop acreage has remained virtually stationary at about 370,000,000 acres. The importance of this lost land may be judged by the fact that the entire wheat crop of 1950 was harvested from 61,000,000 acres.

It would appear from these figures that the country should now be suffering from near famine. The reason it is not is that production per acre as a result of improved pland use and modern machinery, has increased sufficiently to keep pace with our rising population. Oil Under The Water

The Wall Street Journal recently carried this interesting item in its news columns: "Oil companies could, if unhampered by legal squables and materials shortages, drill enough weels in the underwater lands of the continental shelf to produce 200,000 barrels of crude oil daily after five years. This report was submitted to the Interior Department by the National Petroleum Council, an advisory group composed of industry representatives. In addition, the report said, the companies could produce more than 600,000 cubic feet of natural gas daily and would probably discover 'an important number of major oil and gas fields."

The materials shortages will eventually end. But the legal squabbles and the political bickering which stand in the way of progress are birds of another feather. Powerful groups in this country, motivated by socialistic impulses, practically make a business of attacking the oil industry with all kinds of unsubstantiated charges-and are doing everything conceivable to block needed development of untouched oil resources.

The oil people are ready and able to start work on the underwater lands. And no one need worry for fear that these resources would be wateful exploited. Oil's record in the field of true conservation is outstanding and tradditional safeguards can be incorporated into law. It's high time the go-ahead was given.
