A TRIBUTE TO THE QUIET MAN

Because Americans like to glorify their headlines and enjoy the actions and antics of men who paint themselves into our national picture with raw color and bold strokes, too frequently the quiet men of accomplishment go unsung, unhonored and unnamed.

On our industrial scene, the giants of both labor and management who have locked horns in bitter sensational strikes and over controversial issues of labor legislation and regulation have hogged the headlines over a period of years. As a result their names are household words regardless of whether they have contributed anything to the nation's welfare and well-being.

But quieter men of management have also been at work — men who have made vital contributions to the science of industrial relations and hence to the welfare of all of us. These are then men who seldom made headlines because they had mastered the art of working with labor without strikes, violence, bitterness and public hardship.

H. Thomas Hallowell, Jr., president of the Standard Pressed Steel Company provides a case in point. Early next month he is to receive an award which we think should be one of the most covered in the United States. It is the annual Industrial Relations Achievement Award of the National Metal Trades Association. For the past four years it has been awarded to the man who, in the Association's opinion, has contributed most to sound, peaceful industrial relations. Mr. Hallowell is to be congratulated as the winner.

But what is more important, the National Metal Trades Association is to be congratulated for recognizing and creating an award for "the quiet men" of accomplishment in industry. Noise, as any engineer will agree, is a symptom of inefficiency.

US COMES BEFORE UN

Reduced to its simplest terms, the present hassle in the Senate over the "treaty amendments" presented by John W. Bricker (Rep) of Ohio, and Senator Arthur V. Watkins (Rep.) of Utah, is a question of whether we should safeguard our constitutional government or trust to the omnipotent wisdom of Administration heads and the benevolence of the United Nations organization.

The Bricker Amendment, which is backed by 63 other senators, would require that both the Senate and the House must approve a treaty before it can have the effect of law, while at present, only a two-thirds vote of the senate is required. And in view of the Teheran, Yalta and Potsdam "agreements" — which never received even the senate's blessing, and didn't get "repudiated" — and the fact that the UN has a whole bagful of new treaties it is readying up, this would seem an excellent time to protect ourselves against the alarming threat of government by busy bodies.

A year ago, John Foster Dulles, as a private citizen, warned against treaty law, which he told a meeting of the American Bar Association at Louisville "can over-ride the Constitution — can take powers from the states and give them to the Federal Government or to some international body — can cut across the right given to the people by the constitutional Bill of Right."

Today Secretary of State Dulles appears to fear Congressional action more than he does treaties, and has told the Senate Judicial subcommittee that the Administration will not sign the UN covenant on human right, or the UN convention on political right for women. Attorney General Herbert Brownell, Jr., has complained to the subcommittee that to curb the President's treaty-making powers would disturb the balance of power set up by the constitution. Mutual Security Director Harold E. Stassen fears we wouldn't be able under the Bricker amendment, to make agreements on foreign bases. Assistant Defense Secretary Frank C. Nash thinks it would have hampered our Panmunjom armistice negotiations.

All this is rather sickly reminiscent of past administrations, the heads of which knew better than we what was good for us. So Mr. Dulles won't sign any treaties unless they're just what he thinks we need. How nice. We will still take the Constitution.

WATCH WORDS

Whether it disturbs the aplomb of enemy spies or not it is good to hear from the Pentagon that "—for reasons of economy and security, public demonstrations of important new weapons and equipment are not in the public interest at this time."

For, much as we agree with Bernard Baruch, who recently told a Senate committee: "All this talk about Government secrecy is a lot of hokum. Foreign agents know more about our military matters than our own people. They went to the heart and center of the atomic bomb before I knew one was being made." — we still think a

little clamping down in the Defense Department may be good for morale, inside as well as out.
And it's nice to see those words "economy and security" bracketed. Economy helps anybody's security.

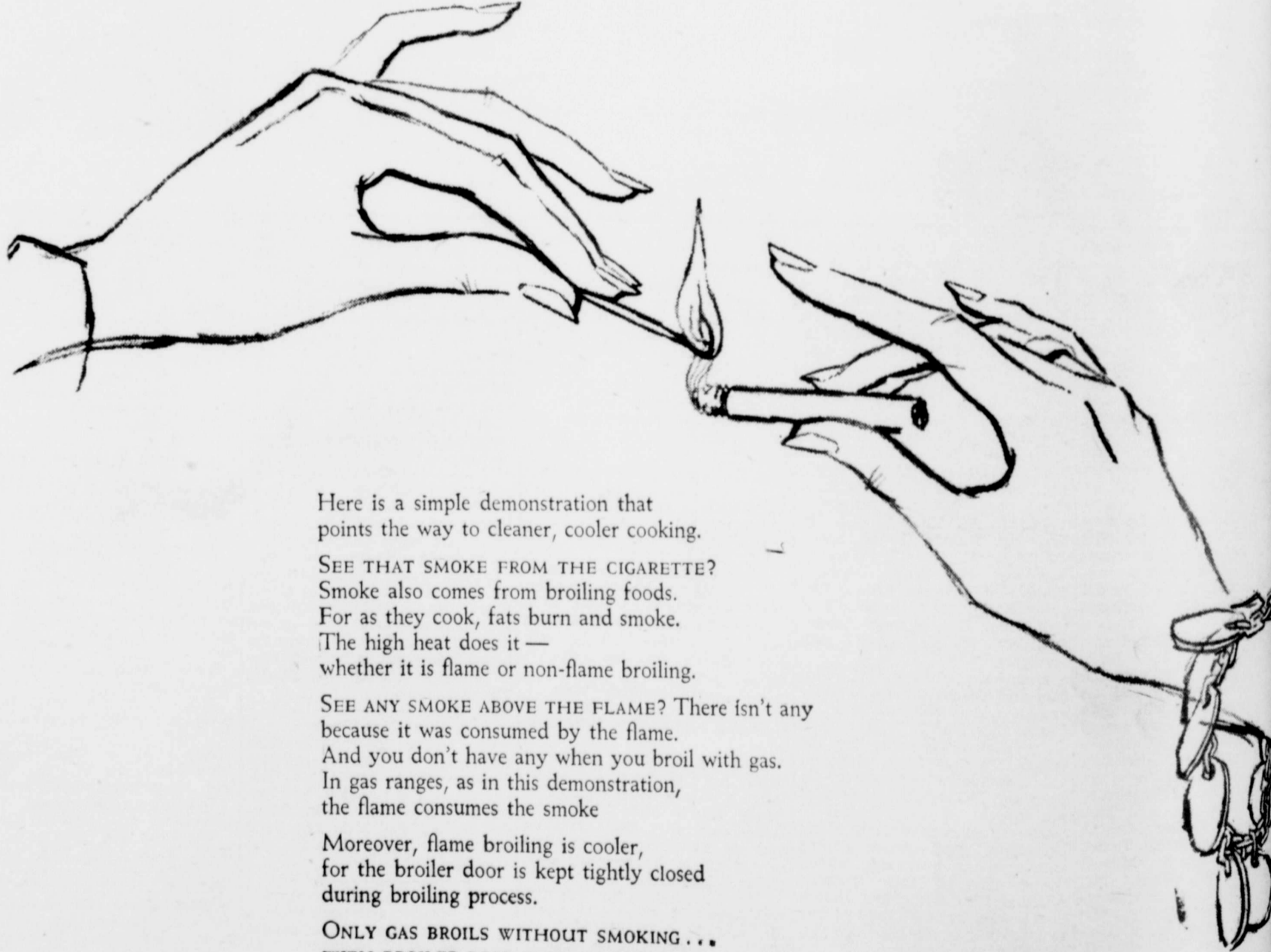

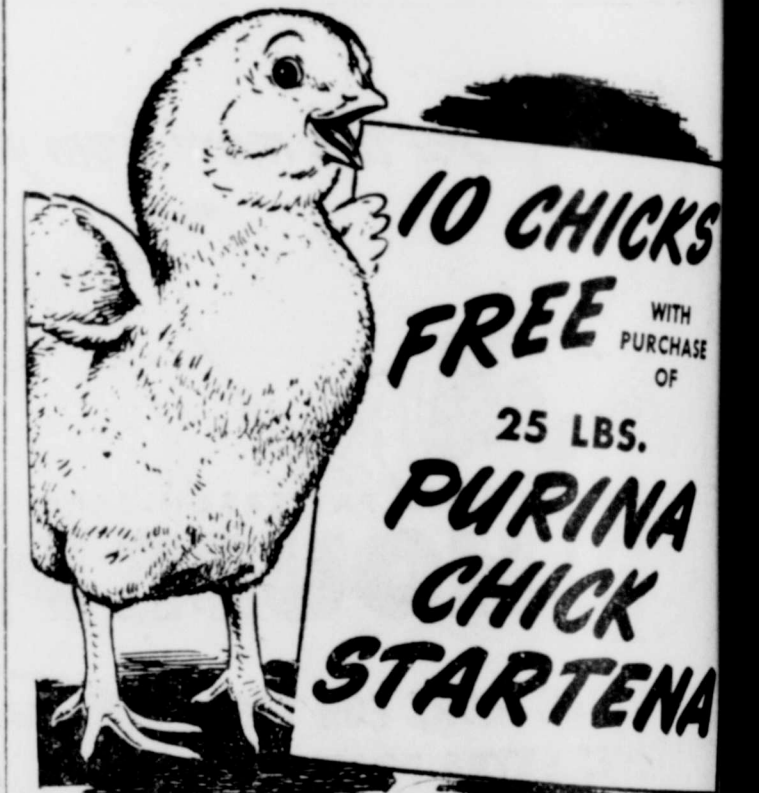

(Senator Lyndon B. Johnson, writing from Washington, gives a weekly report on happenings in the National Capital as they affect Texas and Texans).

Peace Or A Sword

Are we on the road to peace — real peace? That is the major question before all of us.

The Russians have indicated a willingness to settle some of the questions that have kept the Korean War alive. Possibly there will be a Korean truce by the time this appears in print. Of course, we are ready for a

truce on honorable terms. Every American wants to end the Korean fighting at the earliest possible moment. We cannot, however, permit the prospects for a Korean truce to lull us into a false sense of security that will cause us to weaken our defenses.

We must be vigilant — ready to discuss and accept proposals that will lead to real peace, but refusing to let down our guard.

Our Government Is Strong

Our system of government has weathered all the storms of its history. It is a system resting upon three pillars — a legislative branch that is a deliberative body and not a grand jury; a judiciary that determines the guilt or innocence of those accused of breaking the law; an executive who conducts the business of the United States and its relations with other countries.

Let one wage guerilla warfare against the others, and our freedoms are weakened. Let one surrender its rights and authority to another, and our freedoms are gone.

Whether we be Democrats or Republicans, it will certainly serve none of us as Americans to use the tactics of the jungle against our fellow Americans. Still less will it serve us to use those tactics to tear down the great foundations of our gov-

ernment.

We cannot tear down the foundations without pulling down the house itself. If we pull down the house, we will all be buried in the ruins.

Can We Cut the Budget?

The budget can and should be cut. We must not forget that 87 cents of every Federal dollar go to pay for past wars, foreign aid, defense, veterans' aid, and interest on the national debt. Even in the field of defense, there is much waste that should be eliminated. But is hard to make any astronomical cuts out of that 87 cents.

Any saving will be welcomed by the hard-pressed taxpayers. But we are headed for a let-down if we look for "Bib-Savings" — savings that will balance the budget — this year.

Canadian River Dam

Secretary of the Interior McKay learned about the Panhandle's Canadian River Dam project last week.

The educational job was done by Joe Jenkins, former mayor of Amarillo and now President of the Chamber of Commerce, and T. E. Johnson, editor of the Amarillo Globe-Times. They were favorably impressed by Secretary McKay's interest. Rex Baxter, Manager of the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce, also was in Washington, had earlier visited the Secretary with Mr. Johnson. Mr. Jenkins attended a Civil Defense conference while here.

Wear Sunglasses When Driving

Viewing with concern the staggering prospect of 66 million vacationists in 32 million automobiles traveling night and day during the coming months over crowded, unfamiliar highways, Paul R. Kulp, general manager of the Texas Division of the American Automobile Association today sounded a word of warning on an item dear to every vacationing motorist — Sunglasses.

"Wear them when driving by day," the AAA official advises, "but take 'em off when you're driving at night."

Studies reported by AAA safety experts show that exposure to too much bright sunlight by day results in a serious vision loss at night. By wearing sunglasses with a 12 per cent transmission during the day, but not at night, the after-dark loss of vision will be prevented.

But, the AAA contends, claim of some manufacturers that tinted glasses will improve seeing at night are "contrary to all evidence concerning effective vision."

Sharks Opposing Junior Bar Bill, Editorial Says

Most of the companies which are extorting high interest are opposing the anti-loan shark legislation advocated by the Junior Bar of Texas, declares the Dallas News, editorially. The opposition of the users "is in itself a recommendation that these measures should be adopted," the editorial states, adding:

"The reason usury flourishes is that the needy small borrower seldom has built up credit. The man who lends to him is taking a chance. Nothing can be gained by drying up the source of his credit in need. But a lot can be gained by trying to keep fairness to both borrower and

lender in mind. This was the basis of the now veteran Sage Foundation small loan plan around which the Junior Texas Bar has built its small loan proposals.

"Users are evading the 10 per cent interest limit by various devices which enable them to collect extortionately in the guise of brokerage, insurance, etc. The new proposal is to put a top limit on the amount that can be charged to any items on any loan."

The Junior Bar of Texas is supporting a constitutional amendment (HJR) and House Bill 604 in order that Texas may have small loan legislation similar to that which has proved successful in more than 30 states.

These perplexing questions must be answered. To wait until 1955 or 1965 is pure folly. Now is the time to begin seeking the best answers. Take time off soon and seriously think about the answers you would give these problems. After doing this, why don't you sit down and write me what your decision would be, and why. We all have ideas about the farm world we dream about; the right answers to these posing questions will be the right steps toward this dream. Your answers may be the step in the right direction.

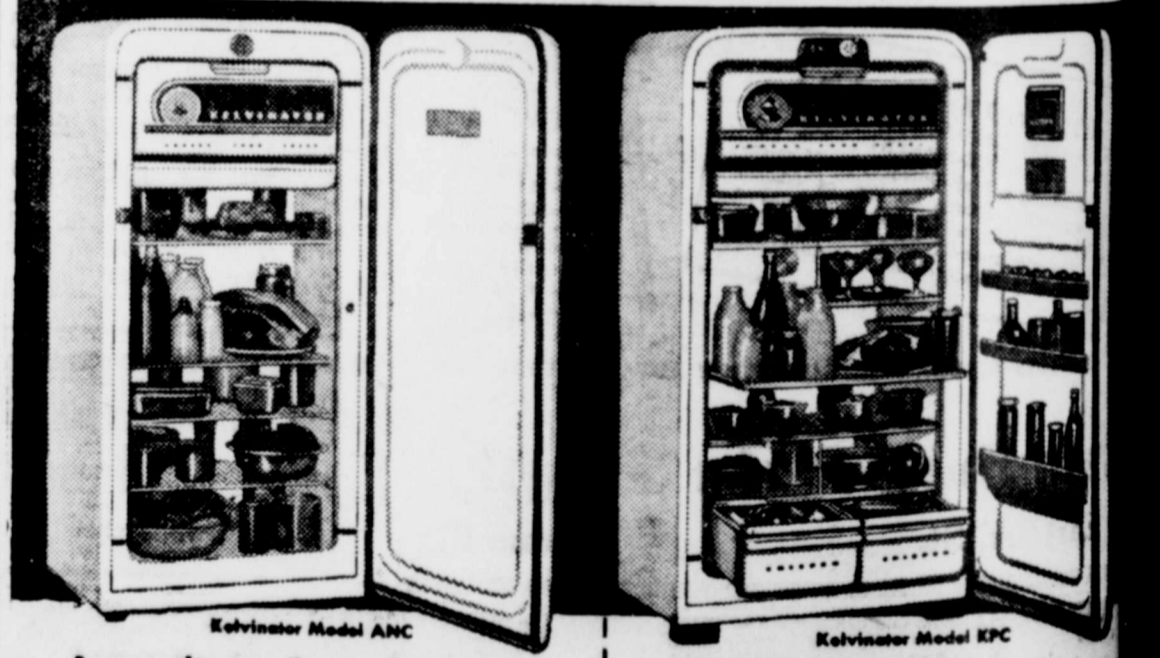

Questions and Answers

Q—If I take on the job training under the Korean GI Bill, will my monthly GI allowance be for the same amount throughout my training course?
 A—No. Under the law, your allowance will be reduced at four-month intervals, as your training progresses.

Q—Both my wife and I are World War II Veterans. I used my GI loan entitlement to buy a house. Now we want to sell, and buy a larger house. Could my wife use her entitlement for a GI loan for the second house?
 A—Yes. Both you and your wife are individually entitled to GI loans. The fact that you've used your loan entitlement would not prevent your wife from using hers.

Q—I have just been awarded a disability compensation rating by the VA, but I think I should be entitled to a higher rating. I plan to appeal. Is there any time limit on filing my appeal?
 A—Yes. You must appeal to VA's Board of Veterans Appeals within one year from the date VA mailed you the notice of your original rating.

Q—I have a permanent plan of National Service Life Insurance policy. It is possible to exchange it for a term insurance policy for the same amount?
 A—No. Permanent plan policies may not be exchanged for term policies under VA regulations.

Veterans Administration has reported the number of post-Korea veterans, and their dependents or beneficiaries who are receiving certain Federal benefits under laws enacted by Congress.

Nearly 44,000 post-Korea veterans are drawing compensation for disabilities incurred or aggravated by service since June 27, 1950.

In addition to the 43,953 veterans on the compensation rolls as of February 28, 1953, VA had awarded compensation to 33,310 widows, children or dependent parents on behalf of 17,551 veterans whose deaths were due to service since June 27, 1950.

VA is also making 10,502 monthly payments to beneficiaries of veterans whose death was due to service since June 27, 1950. These payments are being made under the Servicemen's Indemnity Act of 1951.
