Burkburnett Adds Water Tank to Meet Growing Needs

Residents of Burkburnett may be proud of the new land-water tower that has risen in their city. A new water tower stand 137 feet above its base is under completion. In size and height, it dwarfs the old tower standing nearby, which has served the city since 1914. The new supply system of Burkburnett will compare favorably with that of any city of the same size.

The new tower, made possible by a bond issue voted in 1952, has a capacity of 250,000 gallons, approximately five times that of the old one. It has a 10-inch supply line, and outside water level, and many other features of advanced design. The cost of the tower when completed will be 42,000. Cost of the base and the material used in it was about \$4,000. Some of the steel used in construction. The Dorby Corporation of Kansas City, Mo., is the builder.

It is contemplated that the tower will supply all of the water needs, with possibly some exceptions in the outer portions of the city limits, for some time. It is to be painted a silver color and will probably carry a slogan advertising the City of Burkburnett.

Started in February, construction work on the tower was started in February. Completion is expected by the end of the month. Work of laying pipe and connections to the city water system is progressing satisfactorily. All should be in readiness for use near future.

In contrast to this latest improvement in Burkburnett's water system, early residents will remember the first public water supply in the city, which consisted of a windmill and watering trough purchased by public subscription in 1911. It was located at the center of town at the intersection of Main Street and Second Street.

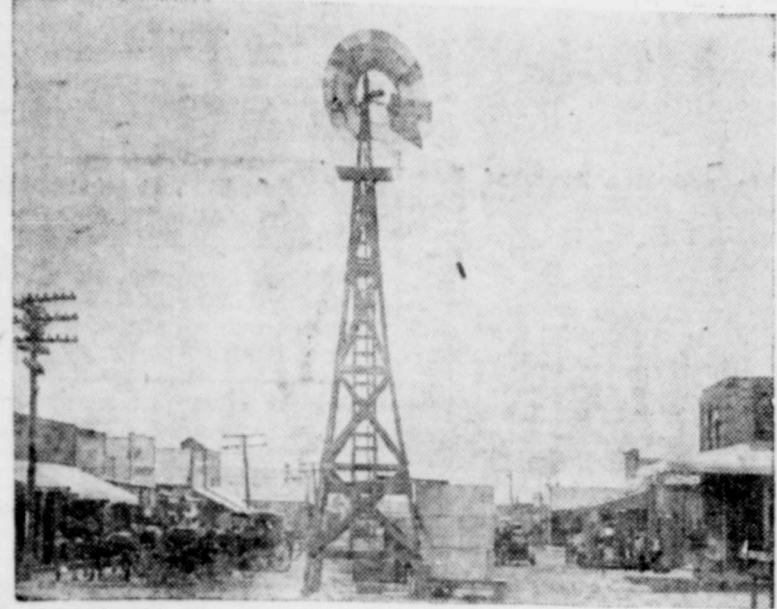
The equipment served until 1914 when a bond issue of \$8,000 was voted to buy and install a tower and mains to supply the business district and to provide fire protection.

With the discovery of oil in the area and the rapid growth of Burkburnett, from a small town of 500 population to a sprawling community of more than 2,000 people, the water supply distribution system became inadequate. The well pump located where the water tower now stands became a health menace because of pollution by oil, gas and dirt. On one occasion a violent explosion occurred in the area due to gas collecting and ignited by an electric spark from the pumping motor.

The new source of water was located north of town on the Riley farm. The water was pumped by gravity flow into a large basin and pumped to the tower. This source also fell prey to pollution by waste oil and water from oil wells along Red River.

The third, and present, source of water supply is from wells and a pumping plant about three miles east of the city. A network of wells, six of which are owned by the Perkins farm, the Perkins Scout Reservation supply 800,000 gallons per day. More wells are being added in the near future.

The new pumping plant, under the supervision of Jobie Dunn, who has been with the water department since 1921, is equipped with four electric pumping units.



695,000 Gallons Available
Storage tanks at the main pumping plant will care for 390,000 gallons of water and this, combined with the 250,000 gallons in the new tower and the 55,000 gallons in the old tower provide a supply which should care for any emergency.

The average rate of water consumption in the city is 400,000 gallons daily. Last summer 600,000 gallons were pumped daily, and had facilities been available 800,000 gallons could have been handled.

Engineers are confident the new facilities will prove adequate for all seasonal demands.

THE CATTLEMEN RIDE ALONG

One of the best commentaries on the current beef situation appeared in the April issue of a magazine published by the Iowa Farm Bureau. It began with a discussion of the causes of the sharp drops in beef prices, saying, "What happened? We think we know that it was a combination of growing numbers of beef cattle, combined with consumer resistance in the markets based on price. We feel sure that given a price she can handle, the housewife will always buy beef as her first choice. We have, in fact, seen just that happen, as retailers doubled the beef they moved to the dinnertable in the week or two immediately following the price break. That increased consumption is the first and most important factor in strengthening the market on beef in future months."

The magazine then dealt with the possibility of supporting beef through a government-purchase program. It described some of the tremendous difficulties that would be an inevitable part of such a program — and of the heavy waste of beef that might very well result. Then it made this significant observation: "We feel that supporting beef prices through government isn't the answer. And we're tickled to know that cattlemen in general don't want supports—the feeling we sense most often as we visit with cattlemen is this: 'We rode it up, we rode it down. Now if we can get enough credit, we'll ride along until it stabilizes at a fair level, in a fair ratio with feed costs.'"

The cattle people, in other words, believe in the free market and the free economy. They don't want to be coddled by the government or bossed by the government. More power to them.

FARMING IS A PROFESSION

A late March issue of Pennsylvania Farmer carried a brief but significant article by Wellington D. Smith of the Pennsylvania Young Farmers Association. His theme was the almost incredible progress we have witnessed since the turn of the century. As he put it, "Fiftytwo years ago the telephone and electricity were in the infant stage. No one believed in the horseless carriage or the gasoline engine. Old Dobbin and the wagon wheel were here to stay. The breech loader was then our secret weapon."

"Today I am surrounded with the necessary but apparently luxurious automobile, steamliner, super-sonic jet aircraft, atomic submarine, radio, television, deep freeze, electric kitchen, combine, hay baler, field chopper and diesel tractor. Even old Daisy (the family cow) is equipped with a jet pump—During the years following World War II there have been fabulous investments made in agricultural enterprises. Such investments have served to cause a tremendous increase in agricultural production."

The result of this, Mr. Smith believes, is that farming is becoming a true and integral part of our vast industrial system. And here he made the telling observation that farming "— is no longer a proposition for the man with the hoe. It is a profession for the man with a knowledge of the science of the soils, the language of a cow, and the heart of a tractor."

Science and machines have gone a long way to transform the face of the land. And they are transforming the lives of the men and women who live on the land.

HOW TO MOVE SURPLUSES

U. S. News and World Report recently published a lengthy interview with Secretary of Agriculture Benson. In the course of a discussion of the extremely difficult problems of surpluses and price supports he said: "There was a time, before we got into all these support programs when, if you had a surplus, you would go to the National Association of Grocers or the National Association of Food Chains and you'd get them to put on a special campaign to move the surplus, through advertising and through featuring certain products in surplus."

We accomplished a great deal that way, and I think we need to return to such teamwork and get the great distribution agencies to cooperate in selling a surplus of any particular item, rather than running to the government every time there is a little difficulty."

There is a 100 per cent sound way to help solve the surplus problem. And, in addition, it is an excellent example of what a tremendous force mass-distribution is — in the case of food and all other generally-used commodities as well. It is, indeed, a full partner of our universally admired system of mass-production—for the ability of our farms and factories to produce goods in incredible quantity would serve no useful purpose unless there were an equally efficient distribution machine to move these goods into the hands and homes of our 150,000,000-plus consumers.

FREEING THE INDIVIDUAL

The Court held, in effect, that any state has the legal authority to pass such a law.

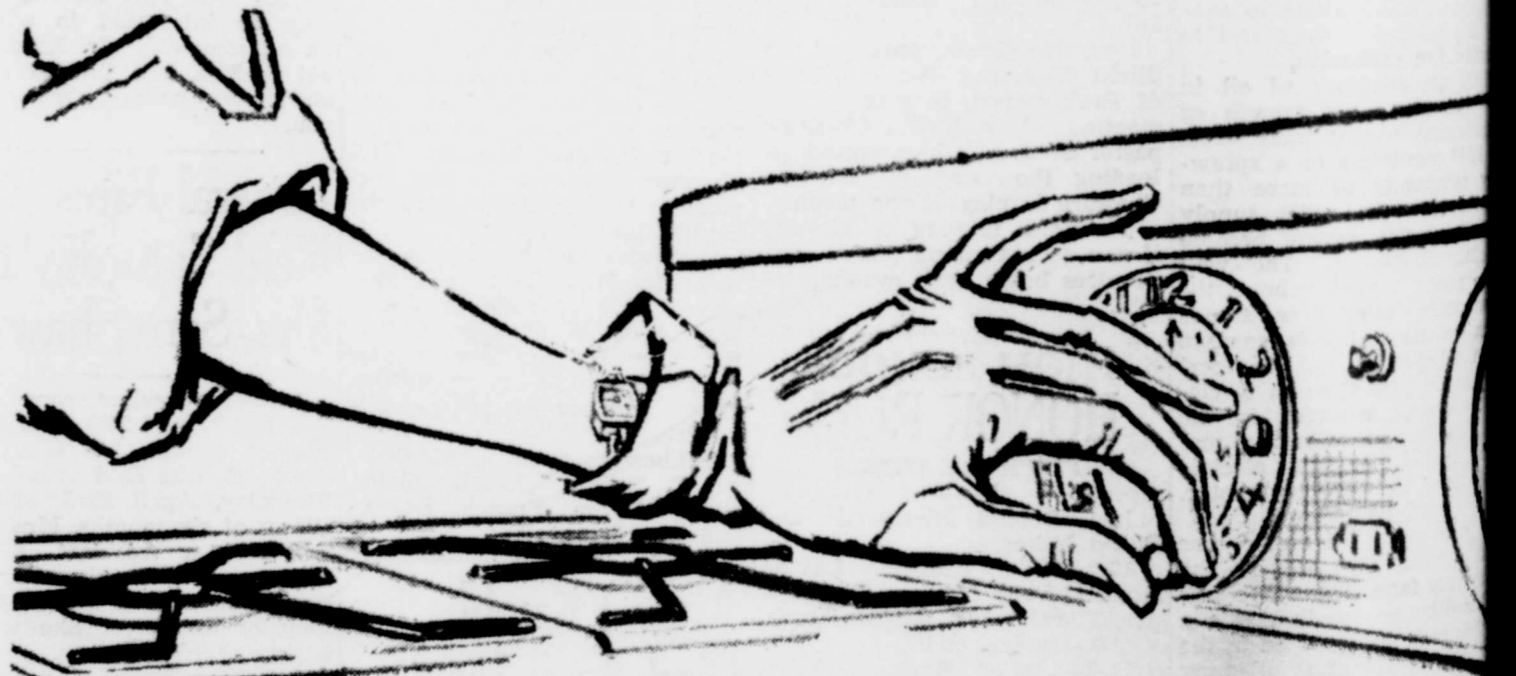

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Farm Safety Measures

Farming is a dangerous job. The risks are physical as well as financial. In the last year of record, about 15,000 U. S. Farm residents were killed in agricultural accidents. Another 1,300,000 were injured.

Each farm is a separate sphere of management and operation which involves a wide variety of activities and working conditions. The heavy toll of accidents caused by these different farm tasks wipes out some 17 million man days of labor every year.

Texas farmers may face one of the major accident creating situations this year — labor shortages. When hired help is scarce, the farmer takes on more of the work load. He toils longer hours and becomes tired long before the job is done. As a result, he is tempted to take risky short cuts or postpone needed repairs on machinery and buildings. This sets the stage for crippling accidents.

Farm machinery is the big killer. Careless handling of equipment causes many mishaps but even a careful operator may be hurt if he is running broken or worn machines. A good maintenance program for machinery could do much to keep down farm tragedies.

Another common cause of injuries is farm animals. Some accidents with animals are unavoidable. Still, many result from impatience on the farmers part or an underestimation of the animal's dangerous traits. An ill-tempered bull not properly confined can easily kill or maim the farmer, worker, or member of the family.

Fires are a greater hazard on the farm than in the city. They cause 3,500 of the 15,000 farm deaths each year—not counting the millions lost in valuable food, domestic animals, existing buildings and equipment. These fires occur at the rate of 300 per day and most can be traced to defective heating units, flammable roofing materials, overloaded electrical wires and lack of protection from lightning.

But the farmer and city dweller share equal risks right in the home. Four thousand farm residents die each year from accidents inside the house. Thus home safety is a prime starting point in eliminating accidents which rob families of their livelihood.

Now that another season is underway, a little more caution and advance planning may help assure you of being around when the time comes to reap the harvest from seeds you're planting today.

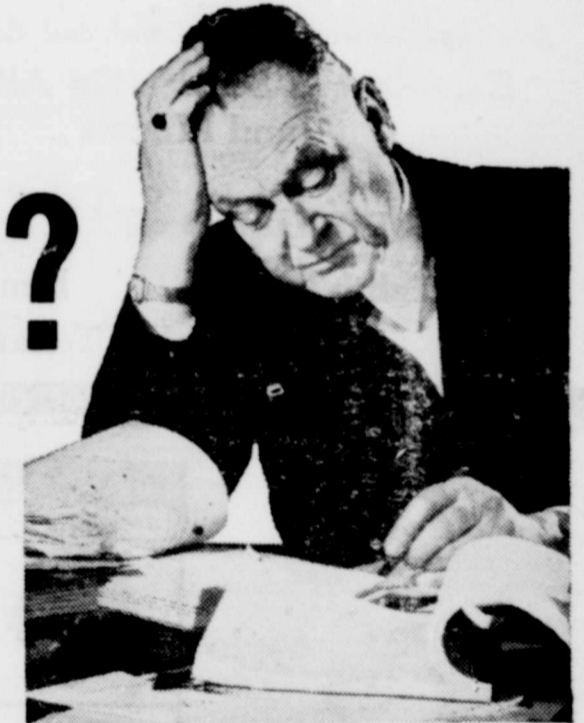

Questions and Answers

Q—My daughter and I are receiving VA compensation payments because of the death of my husband, a World War I veteran. My daughter is past 18 years of age, but she is attending a school approved by VA. Will the compensation payments go on during her summer vacation? She intends to continue school in the fall?

A—Yes, the payments may continue throughout the summer, so long as your daughter resumes her studies after the vacation period has ended.

Q—My wife and I are both World War II veterans. Is it possible for us to combine our GI loan benefits to buy a house?

A—yes, However, the total amount VA will guarantee is 60 percent of the loan. Also, the maximum guaranty may not exceed \$15,000 — which represents the combined maximum guarantees you and your wife would be entitled to, individually.

Q—I am a paralyzed veteran eligible for a \$10,000 VA grant for construction of a "wheel-chair home." Do I have to buy plans and specifications for the house?

A—No. These may be furnished without cost to veterans eligible for the VA grant, but they must meet the approval of VA.

Q—I am a disabled World War II veteran, training under Public Law 16. I suffered an injury in training that has aggravated the disability for which I draw VA compensation. Is it possible to have my compensation rate increased, because of it?

A—Yes, but VA, of course, would have to adjudicate your new claim for increased compensation.

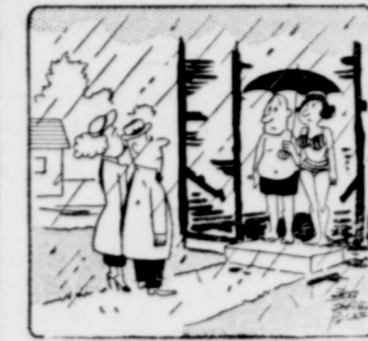

Your Senator Reports



by LYNDON B JOHNSON
(Senator Lyndon B. Johnson, writing from Washington, gives a weekly report on happenings in the National Capital as they affect Texas and Texans).

Peace Program—

A program for real peace was presented to the world by President Eisenhower in his recent address before American newspaper editors. The President spoke as the leader of the nation—not as the leader of a political party. He looked for ways of getting out of our difficulties—not for point-less arguments about how we got into them. He stressed the basic principles that unite Americans—not the partisan differences that divide them.

As your Senator—an American—I support that kind of program. I am ready at any time to do whatever I can to help the President carry it out.

Flood Control—

Texas flood control projects are threatened with drastic stretch-outs. Heavy cuts in appropriations are suggested in the revised budget for flood control and rivers and harbors, presented to Congress last week.

Suggested appropriation for the Dallas floodway is slashed from \$2,900,000 to \$750,000, that for the Ft. Worth floodway from \$1,550,000 to \$1,000,000. These projects are designed to prevent flooding of the Trinity River, Dallas area by the Trinity River. The cuts, if put into effect, will simply delay completion of the overall project. That delay could be disastrous. Who knows when the Trinity will flood again?

The revised budget cuts out altogether \$975,000 for Galveston seawall. It would reduce the appropriation for the Garza-Little Elm Reservoir from \$4,935,000 to \$3,635,000. It proposes an appropriation of \$7,265,000 for the Texarkana Reservoir, compared with \$8,656,000 in the original budget.

Postmaster Exams—

Postmaster vacancies in 80 Texas towns and cities have been announced. There may be more to come. All eligible registers were terminated when Civil Service Commission, at the request of the new Postmaster General "raised standards" for postmasters.

I wrote the Postmaster General to ask (1) if postmaster- ships are to be denied because of political affiliations to persons who have passed Civil Service examinations recently but whose appointments have yet to be confirmed, and (2) if postal appointments are to be removed from Civil Service.

The Deputy Postmaster General replied that "No one is being denied opportunity to compete for a postmastership because of political affiliations." He said standards had been raised because "The position of Postmaster is much more important than has been generally recognized." It is interesting that the Republicans didn't recognize the importance of postmasters until they started making the appointments. He also wrote: "There is no intention of removing from office any postmasters appointed during the previous administration if they are now performing and continue to perform satisfactory service."

Texas State Society—
