... For The Lamp of Liberty

We have been hearing so much about the marvels of science, that by now the triumphs of technology go in one ear and out the other. If anybody wants to split an atom, say we, yawning, let him go ahead.

But it does bring us up with a start when we realize that we'd have to be not merely rich, but filthy rich to drive a car if the oil industry had sat on its hands and was still satisfied to turn out two or three gallons of gas from a barrel of crude oil (as it used to), instead of 18 to 20 (as it does now).

And the same goes for developing scientific methods for finding new oil fields, and learning how to drill a hole miles deep. In 1921, with consumption a small fraction of what it is now, we were wringing our hands because our lamp was burning low. We were pretty nearly out of petroleum. We were actively looking for substitutes. Now our reserves are the biggest we have ever known.

Next October, the industry is going to celebrate these accomplishments. "Conservation" will be the theme of Oil Progress Week. But before the oil boys start sounding off, we'd like to put in our two cents worth:

"Conservation" means, says our big book, "the act of preserving, guarding or protecting". What oil men have preserved for us could be no less than our way of life—our very freedom. We shall remove our hat when the oil industry parades its achievements.

BIG BERTHA, 1953

The first atomic cannon will fire the first live atomic shell at Frenchman's Flat May 23rd. But the matter of getting the cannon out there was quite an achievement in itself. In fact, two of the 80 ton monsters were dismantled, loaded in four freight cars each, and given special routing over railroads having wide track clearances and good big tunnels.

We hope, if the military is setting any store by this weapon, that they have designed some junior models for travel abroad.

MIXING OIL AND WATER

It begins to look as though our coastal states will finally be given title to the lands beneath the sea up to their "historical boundaries" . . . after years, in fact as much as a century, of development of these "lands" by the oil-producing states.

In spite of the fact that similar bills were passed by Congress a year ago and six years ago, and both vetoed by President Truman, the resistance in the Senate to the third round by twenty-five Democrats, nine Republicans and Wayne Morse reached a new high, and included three-and-a-half weeks of that travesty on government known as a filibuster, and the further spectacle of Democrats leading a fight against what is primarily a states-rights issue.

The battle proved one thing beyond question—that a man can stand up and talk for more than twenty-two hours without falling on his face. Senator Morse said he wasn't even tired. But everybody else was.

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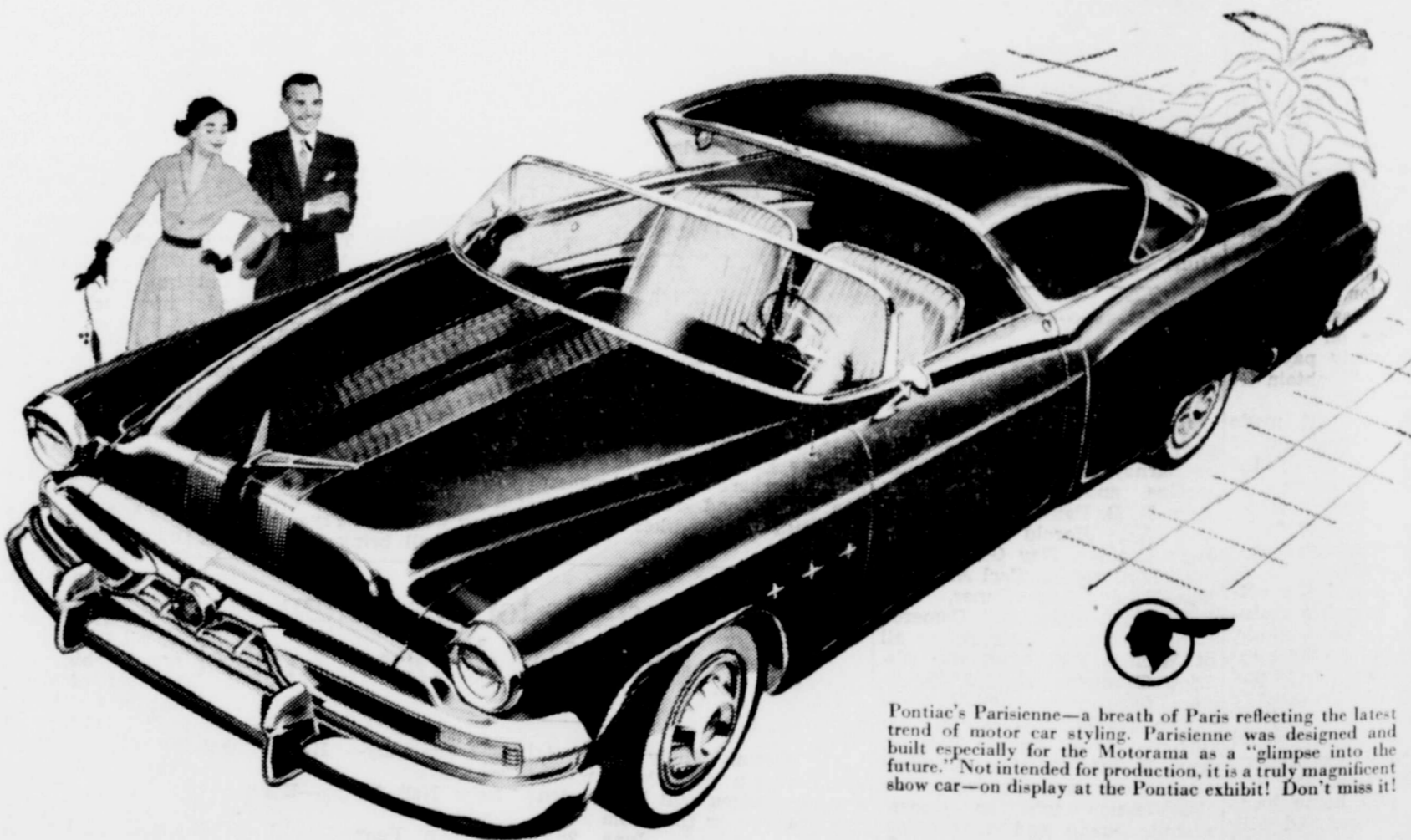

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

YOUR FARM BUREAU-

BY MARYE ECKELKAMP

The Secretary of Agriculture asked the American Farm Bureau Federation, the National Grange, and the National Cooperatives to write the Program for 1955. For the time in twenty years the members are going to have the opportunity of writing their program.

and to make our resolutions reflect the honest opinions of these men, be they Farm Bureau members or not. One of the big issues in the new farm program will be foreign trade. The so-called protectionists in Congress are rallying their forces from both parties in an attempt to destroy the present trade agreement act, or at least weaken it by amendments that will make it virtually useless. These same protectionists want Congress to start building up the tariff

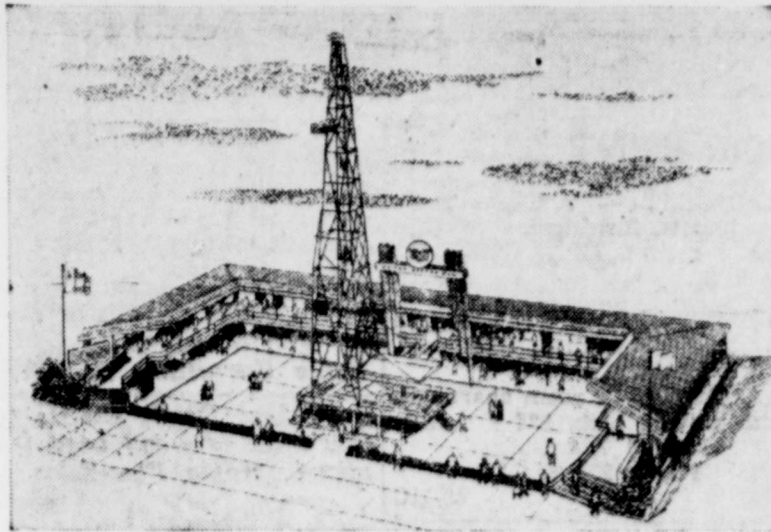
walls this session; walls that are to high now. There should be a big question mark in the minds of the home folks as to just whom these forces are actually seeking to protect. Certainly not the farmer. He has milk, wheat and butter running out of his ears. So the farmer is discussing acreage allotments and marketing quotas in 1954. The farmers are not producing supplies greater than the demand. Not when children still cry for milk and bread to nourish their starved bodies. I wonder then, could it be the selfish interest of this nation they seek to protect. Interests that are scared to trade on the free world market without tariff subsidies.

These high tariff and embargo walls have already wrought a great deal of damage to American prestige abroad. They have made us appear two-faced to our foreign friends. They must think Americans are incredibly stupid. Imagine giving away billions of our hard earned dollars to them so that they can in turn buy back American commodities with it. Giving away money to nations begging to trade. Incredibly stupid? It's outrageous. To save their self respect, many of our friends, England, France and Germany among them, trade with their sworn enemy, Russia of its satellites. They are forced to trade wherever they can because they can

not compete with Uncle Sam's high embargo and tariff rates. Rates that have benefitted so few to have hurt so many. Tariffs are hurting our national security by forcing our friends to help the one nation that would destroy us. These walls are cutting the farmers markets in half. When markets are lost, be they foreign or domestic the entire national economic structure becomes weakened. Lost markets mean the cuts in production. A cut in production means less work, less money, less prosperity, not just for the farmer, but for the nation.

To these so called protectionists, I would say that all your high tariffs can do is destroy American friendship abroad. We can give you our money, but sorry we can't trade our milk cotton, rice or tractors for your tin, iron, ore copper or pitch works. So you take our money and go do your trading with your friendly neighbors, Russia. Don't you know that Stalin and Malenkov have had the chuckle over this fantastic situation? The American people, that means the farmer, grocer, the used-car dealer, everyone must wake up to these tariff-subsidies and I deliberately call them

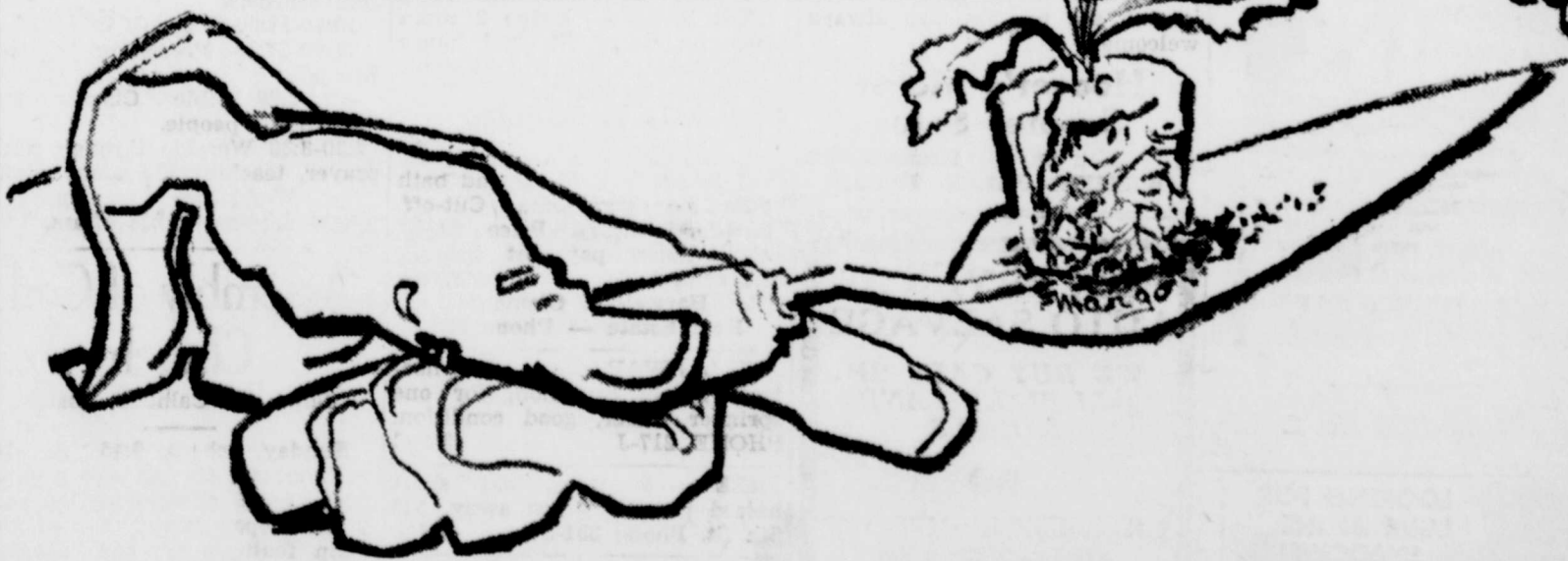
