The highlight of the Boom Town Celebration, so far as all the kiddies in this area are concerned, is the Kiddies' Parade, held the last day of the Celebration each year. This year H. D. Smith and all his workers have gone all out to make this year's event the granddaddy of all others. The parade will form on Avenue B, between 3rd and 4th Streets, proceed East on 3rd Street to Avenue D, then South on Avenue D. The start of the parade is set for 2:00 P. M., Friday, June 5th. After the parade, the children are in for some special treats, a free show at the Palace Theatre, with free popcorn, etc., and free tickets to the Rodeo Friday night at Morgan Stadium. Prizes are offered for 1st, 2nd and 3rd place winners in all divisions.

GRASSROOTS OPINION

NATIONAL CITY, CALIF. News: "The issue is state's rights — Decentralization of government would mean its return to the grass roots where people can watch it and see it and know it."

VEST, MINN., Vision: "The TVA area is practically all in the state of Tennessee. So a comparison of Tennessee with the other Southeast States is indicated. The figures — show that Tennessee's remarkable development has been matched in most of those states, and exceeded in others. In other words, Tennessee has just about average. It is not easy to see much justification in the claim that TVA has done what private industry could not do."

ALBANY, OREGON, Democrat-Herald: "As the law now stands, a citizen has a legal right to belong to any party he chooses, including the communist party, which as of now is not outlawed. He has not, however, the right or privilege to use the classroom and the college as a place to promote ideas of a group devoted to the overthrow of the government by force."

BOSTON, MASS., Jewish Advocate: "Mankind is in ferment. The sanctity of the individual is threatened and God on high denied by an atheistic philosophy and power which would enslave the human personality and crush man's religious spirit — The greater the show of belief in God, the more ominous the portent for His revilers."

Government Should Not Support The People

"The lesson should be constantly enforced that, though the people support the government, the government should not support the people."

Does that sound like something that was said yesterday? Actually, it was said by President Grover Cleveland 76 years ago, in the course of vetoing a long-forgotten bill.

The principle which President Cleveland laid down was important then. It is a thousand times more important now. In the intervening years millions of us, knowingly or otherwise, have been infected with the virus of government paternalism. We have become accustomed to being supported, wholly or partly, by government. And that trend, unless checked and reversed, can end only in dictatorship, tyranny and the destruction of all that is courageous and adventurous in the human spirit.

TAXING THEIR PATIENCE

In New York, the other day, a judge ruled the city government was all wet in firing an employe because he had been a member of the Communist Party, and ordered him reinstated.

It was the judgment of the Court that as a washroom attendant, such a man was no threat to the nation's security. No doubt hizzoner was right enough on this point, but we think he overlooked another that is just as important.

It should be apparent by now, even to a judge, that the people have made it clear they do not wish to provide out of their tax money, the comforts of life to Commies, ex-Commies or fellow-travelers.

TRADE NOT AID

The State Department has "confirmed and elaborated on" the testimony revealed by Senator McCarthy's subcommittee charging that two British-owned ships carried Red Chinese troops during the Korean War. A letter to the subcommittee, signed by Assistant Secretary of State Thurston B. Morton, identified the vessels as the *Miramar* and the *Perico*, both of which were under Panamanian registry at the time of the alleged offense.

The letter, revealed by Senator Karl Mundt, acting chairman, stated that information in the Department indicated that the *Perico* was registered under the Panamanian flag by Wallem & Co. on December 10, 1949, and that "There is no indication that the vessel changed hands until it was sold for scrap in Hongkong, in 1952. "Available information" showed that the *Miramar* was bought by Wheelock, Marden and Co. Ltd. from Wallem in early 1950, and "subsequent to June 1952 came in the hands of the Chinese Communists."

A general denial by Sir Roger Makins, British ambassador, was forthcoming almost immediately. In a lunch-say no ship under the British flag and subject to British law, has done any such thing.

At the time of the alleged services to the enemy, he said, "these two ships appear to have been under the control of the Chinese Communists."

But whether the facts can ever be established or not, we can not get too excited over hauling a couple of shiploads of troops — when we think of Britain's mounting trade in "non-strategic" goods that supports the enemy economy — with the approval of our State Department.

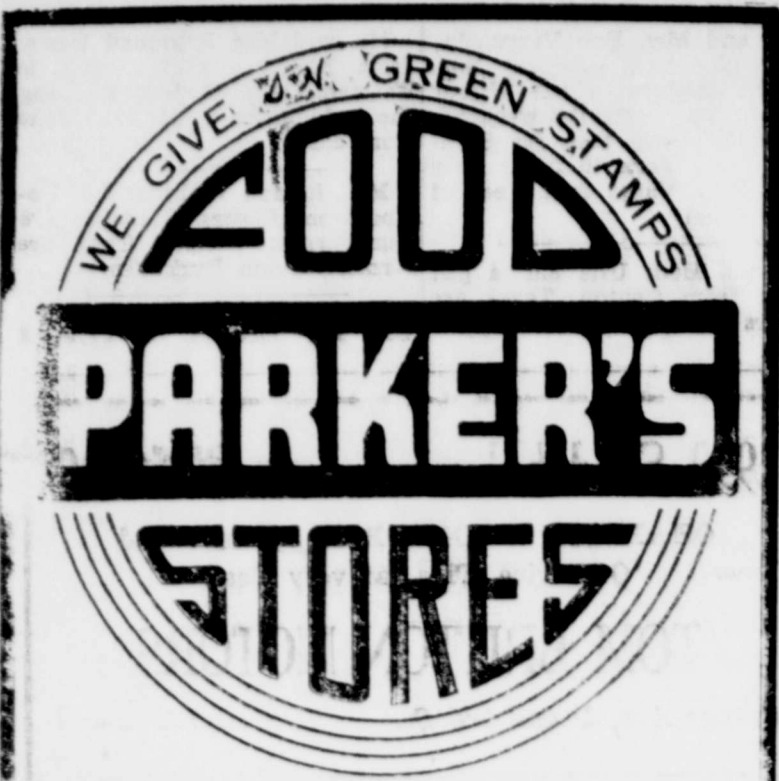

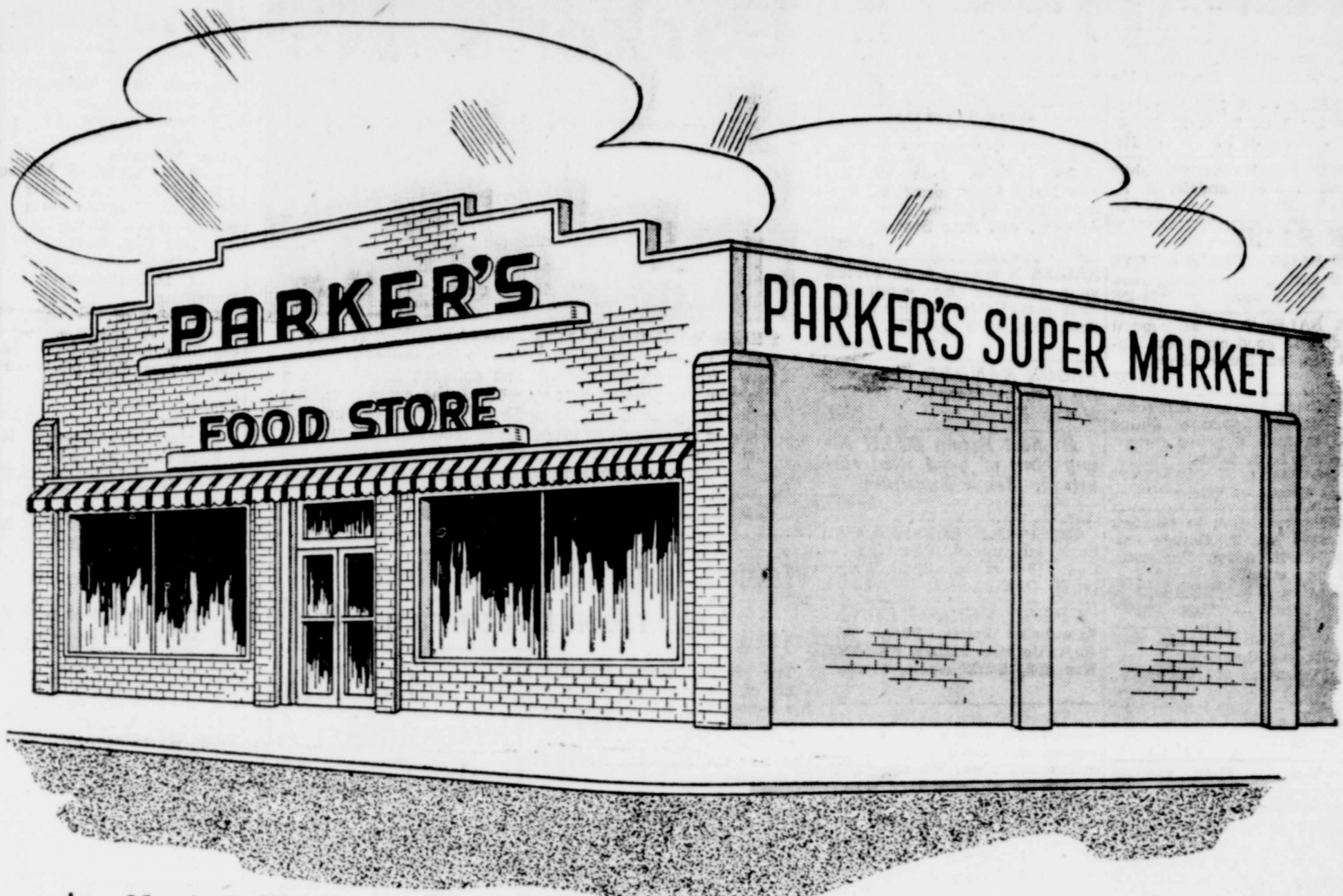

Are you still checking over the wheat crop? By yourselves; even folks can't believe it. Tests are showing yields as 40 bushels to the acre. Very little is showing in the Melvin Pace at Center has an over-all average of 20.2 bushels. I go 30.

Elvy Sargent at the SCS office here in Iowa Park and put it to him. It seems that wheat actually requires very little moisture and our growing season comes during a period of least evaporation. Although it is hard to believe, we have had 10.2 inches of rainfall since December 1, 1952. Most of them have been slow rains that soaked into the ground with very little run-off. This looks like one of the shortest wheat crops in history as far as height is concerned. This too has been a blessing. The short stems have required less moisture and more of it has been absorbed into heavy heads. This proves one thing: you don't have to grow tall wheat to make a crop. Stubble mulching has helped this year's crop too. This is most effective during dry years.

What ever the reasons for this blessing, the biggest reason has been good old Mother Nature Herself. Just when we all had just about given up hope, she gently opened the heavens and

sent water to our thirsting crops.

Now the farmers are relaxing their vigil somewhat as the thousands of bushels of yellow gold fills up the graineries, the Secretary of Agriculture must face the problem of acreage allotments and marketing quotas. Final decision on whether wheat marketing quotas will be imposed for the 1954 crop must be made not later than July 1. The decision on wheat acreage allotments must be made by July 15.

If quotas are proclaimed on wheat, a national referendum among all wheat growers must be held by July 25. Two thirds of all wheat farmers voting must approve proclaimed quotas before they can be put into effect. If they fail to approve by this two-thirds vote, they will subject only to acreage allotments, but price support levels will be dropped to 50 percent of a parity. This would make the price support price on wheat approximately \$1.52 a bushel in 1954. The choice is yours.

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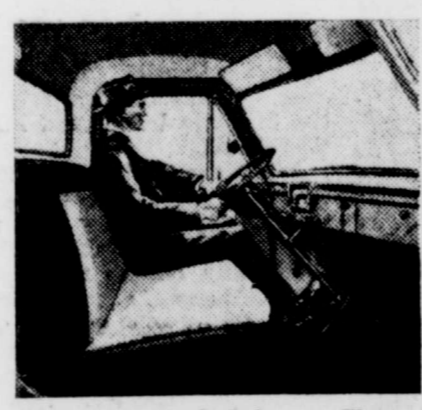
