country, accounting for over 50 per cent of the world's Sat. Lodge hrs. 11-L oil. Since then h er annual production has multiplied by 3, that of the United States by nearly 30. In 1951 she produced only 61/2 per cent of the world's oil supply though her original petroleum deposits were probably of about the same size of those of the United States.

In Mexico, Argentina, Boliva and now Iran, the story is much the same and the reason for failure is simple. The very nature of oil exploration precludes regimentation. Every oil field in this country, with few exceptions, was discovered as a direct result of competitive exploration. Some individual's conviction that oil could be found and his willingness to drill an exploratory well where others had given up, resulted in the discovery of such fields as Cuyama Valley and Signal Hill. The Williston Basin was just so much real estate until one company, contrary to the best judgment of many others, went in and drilled a well that turned out to be a producer.

This spirited competitive search for new deposits is the secret of the American oil industry's success. No monopoly, whether public or private, with its single and final judgment can hope to match it, and a government monopoly is the host handicapped of all. In the United States where nearly 10,000 geologists and geophysicists aid in the search for new oil or gas, only one wildcat well out of nine is a producer. What bureaucrat could afford to risk his official neck on odds like that!

#### Green Beans Popular When Home Canned and Garnished

"Finish your green beans . . . or no dessert!" Does that sound familia

Green beans can be good, good enough to tempt the appetite of a finicky child, or, for that matter, a husband who leans too much toward a meat, potato and pie diet. Especially if the green beans you serve have been canned in your own kitchen and then prepared for serving with an extra garnish!

#### Process Under Pressure

Choose crisp, meaty stringless beans. The beans in the pods are tiny at this stage. Wash the pods clean, then drain. If you're washing the vegetable in a pan, two or three changes of water should be used. Lift the beans out of the pan each time into a bowl or onto a clean surface

and then pour out the water. Snip off stem ends and cut or break beans into even pieces. Cover with boiling water and boil from 3 to 5 minutes. Pack the hot beans into hot jars. Add one teaspoon salt to each quart if desired and cover with boiling water. Put Dome lig on jar and screw band tight. Process pints 20 minutes and quarts 25 minutes at 10 pounds pressure. If you are canning beans which are near the shell-out stage, add 20 minutes to processing time.

#### Ways of Serving

When you serve the beans, serve them plain one time and "dressed up" another. One way to "dress them up" is to open the jar, heat the beans for 15 minutes, drain, season with salt, pepper and butter, and

garnish with sliced raw onion rings. Sweet-Sour Sauce, Tomato Sauce, Cheese Sauce, a touch of pork or bacon fat and bits of crisp bacon or salt pork are other ways of making green beans tasty. Serve green beans in salads, soups, stews and casseroles, too.

Try these variations and you'll find yourself actually running short on home-canned green beans! So put up plenty of them this summer. Remember—you save by canning your own!
