## NOTICE

The City Commission of Burkburnett, Texas, sitting in regular session Monday, July 20, 1953, enacted Section Two of Ordinance No. 317.

SECTION 2. The City Council shall have the authority, and does by these presents, have the authority, in order to conserve the shrubs and trees of the citizens of Burkburnett, to zone the City of Burkburnett, and through Procolamation, to allow the people of Burkburnett in those zones to use water for specified purposes set out in the Procla

The zones and the days that each zone may use water for the purpose of watering shrubs and trees are as follows:

ZONE 1. To water on Monday between the hours of 6:00 A. M. to 9:00 P. M. All of the town West of the railroad tracks.

ZONE 2. To water on Tuesdays between the hours of6:00 A. M. and 9:00 P. M. The area East of the railroad track and North of Third Street.

ZONE 3. To water on Wednesdays between the hours of 6:00 A. A. and 9:00 P. M. The area East of the railroad track and laying between Third Street and Glendale Street, considering Hayworth Street as an extension of Glendale Street.

ZONE 4. To water on Thursdays between the hours of 6:00 A. M. and 9:00 P. M. The area East of the railroad track laying between Glendale Street and Tidal Street.

ZONE 5. To water on Fridays between the hours of 6:00 A. M. and 9:00 P. M. The area East of the railroad laying between Tidal Street and Sheppard Road.

ZONE 6. To water on Saturdays between the hours of 6:00 A. M. and 9:00 P. M. The area East of the railroad track and South of Sheppard Road.

This is an experiment to see if we now have enough water to allow limited watering. If it is found that there is not sufficient water, then Section Two of Ordinance No. 317 will be revoked and the new watering ordinance will be enforced again.

Air conditioners must still have circulating pumps. Car washing will be allowed.

The City Commission has asked me to express their appreciation for the co-operation given in the past and again to ask for your continued co-operation in using as little water as possible under the above plan.



#### SOLVING OIL'S MYSTERIES

We have a vastly larger number of oil products at our disposal today than we had 30 years or so ago, and they are far better in quality. A paramount reason for this progress can be expressed in one word: Research.

Petroleum research was not given a great dea! of atdied Saturday while enroute to tention in this country until shortly after World War I prior to that time practically all the important laboratory work was done in Europe. Now the situation is entirely different. In both basic research, which is primarily done in university laboratories, and in applied research, which is primarily a task for industrial laboratories, the American oil industry sets the pace for the world.

Research is suported in various ways. The American Petroleum Institute, for instance, has financed 51 different fundamental research projects at about 30 institutions As of several years ago, some 300 oil companies when providing about 1800 fellowships, scholarships or grants for research, and the number is much larger today. All maner matters are being

is present in crude oil to problems connected with nuclear physics.

Dr. Robert E. Wilson, one of the country's leading oilmen, has pointed out that when the great research program started "petroleum had the dubious distinction of being one of the country's most important but least understood raw materials. Its chemical composition was prac tically unknown—except that it was a complicated mix-ture of hydrocarbons." #### **NEVER LOST ITS GRIP**

That horse Ben Franklin wrote about that lost his shoe "for want of a nail", and having lost the shoe, was lost himself—seems now to be lost for good. But not the missing nail. That's back again - that old-fashioned, square-shanked cut nail!

Two hundred years ago, no one knew how good it was. For one thing, there weren't any other kind-and for another, there weren't any scientific testing laboratories. Even a hundred years ago, when Wheeling first began making cut nail by hand-fed machine, instead of entirely by hand, in their now hisoric LaBelle Works, they still didn't know how good they were.

But now, today, when few people outside of the carpentry profession know what a cut nail is, or ever used one., its sterling worth can be accurately measured. Professionals have continued to use this square-shanked nail ever since it replaced the wooden peg, ,especially on hardwood floors and for nailing furring strips or other wooden members to concrete or cinder-blocks. And when the growing ranks of do-it-yourself enthusiasts discover that modern laboratory tests show the cut nail has 72 percent more grip in wood than the wire nail, and averages four time in building blocks; that they cut their way into wood without splitting it, rather than spreading the fibres to get through; that they are hard-tempered so they won't bend, today's backyard and basement craftsmen and home hobbyists are going to be as fussy as grandpa.

People used to look in the mouth of that horse we were talking about to see how old he was. Now-a-days they judge a craftsman by looking in his mouth too-to see what kind of nail he uses.

#### OLD TRICK

Next time you hear someone damning the real or alleged shortcomings of American business, and demanding more government interference with the free enterprise system as the cure, it would be well to remember a recent statement by Secretary of Commerce Weeks.

This top-level official observed that, for more than 20 years, private enterprise has been "burdened by government, punished by government and then blamed by government for not performing as many miracles as it could have, had it been free.'

It's an old trick of certain politicians to throw money wrenches into the wheels of progress and then blame everyone but themselves for the results.
