GRASS ROOTS OPINION

ONTARIO-UPLAND, Calif., Daily Report: "Every taxpayer in the United States has a vested interest in an overhaul of the Federal government. For twenty years the New Deal has encouraged lavish spending at a Federal level thus indirectly furthering its Socialistic revolution. If government is ever again to be brought back to size, many money-spending bureaus and agencies must be abolished entirely while others must be consolidated."

END OF AN ERA

The action of the Senate Finance Committee in refusing, by a vote of 11 to 4, to approve raising the federal debt limit, in spite of urgent requests by the President and other top Administration officials, indicates the present temper of national thinking.

Without going into the pros and cons involved in this specific question, it is obvious that the American people want and demand vigorous economy in government, and Congress, naturally, has begun to reflect that attitude. The era when the taxpayers would accept unbridled spending with hardly a complaint has come to an end.

THE PRICE OF FARM MACHINERY

To say that machinery is a "must" is present-day farming is to say the obvious. Efficient equipment is the key to greater production, better production and land use, and production at minimum expense.

Morever, the cost of that machinery, measured in terms of the market value of basic farm products, is less than it was before the last world war.

That fact is brought out by Dr. Earl L. Butz of Pur-

due University. During the first six months of this year, he says, the farmer could buy a typical two-plow tractor for the money received from the sale of 51 hogs, while before World War II it would have taken 64 hogs. And the equipment was cheaper also in terms of milk, corn and wheat, even though these commodities were down in price at the time the comparison was made.

Dr. Butz stresses another highly important fact. In the first six months of 1953 wage rates for farm labor were 423 per cent of the 1935-39 level. Prices received by farmers were at 246 per cent of that level—and the price of new farm machinery at 203 per cent. As he says, "These data again serve to illustrate that it is good economy to substitute machinery for expensive labor."

The machine started an agricultural revolution a little more than a century ago. That revolution continues.

George Malenkov, heir to the wings and halo of Stalin, told the 1,300 members of Russia's Supreme Soviet in a two hour marathon speech the other day that he was going to let the people have a little more to eat and whittle down maybe on tanks and guns so they could have some pots and pans and stuff in the five and ten ruble stores.

But when he told them the Americans weren't the only ones who had the hydrogen bomb, inferring that the Russians had it too, they really whooped and hollered. Since then, of course, on this side of the water the debate has been hot and heavy as to whether this is so. Secretary of State Dulles has expressed doubts, on the grounds that no H-bomb blasts had been detected. But it's no fault of

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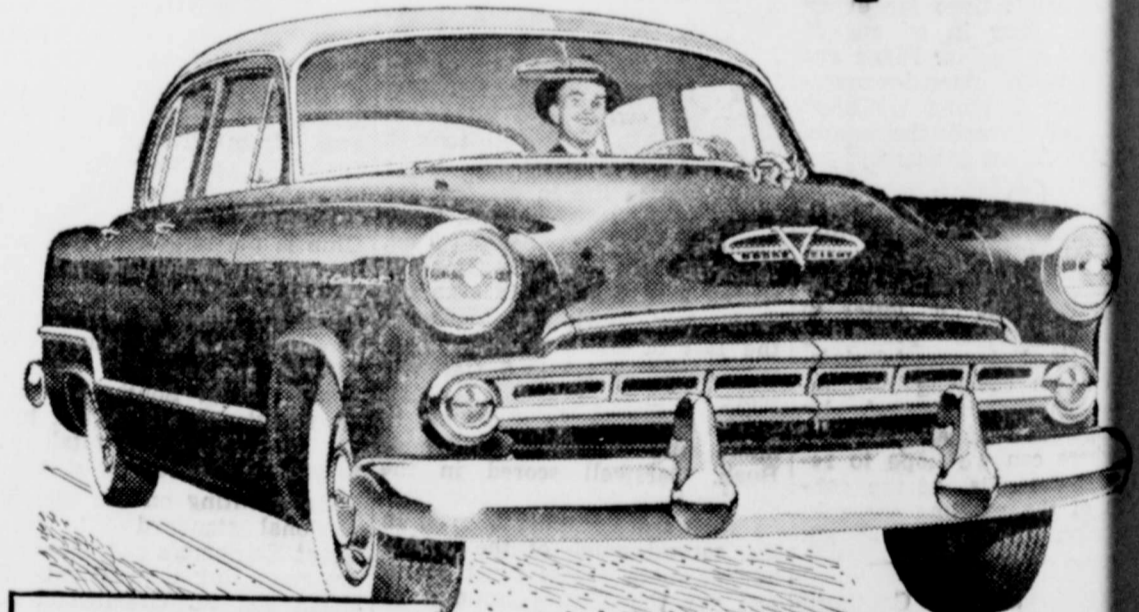

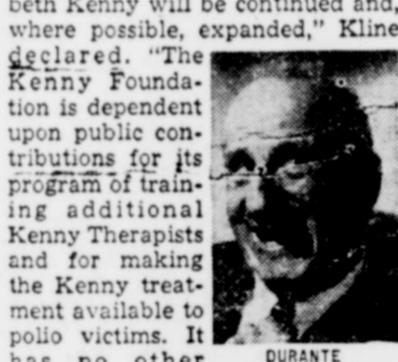

Questions and Answers

Q—The son of a friend of mine was killed in an automobile accident on his way to report to his draft board. Would he be covered by the free automatic indemnity paid to survivors of Korean servicemen?

A—Indemnity coverage of selectees is limited to those who died as a result of disabilities incurred while enroute from the draft board to the induction station, or who die within 120 days after the incurrance of such disabilities. The coverage does not extend to travel to the draft board.

Q—I'm planning to sell the

house I bought with a GI loan. What can I do to make sure I won't be liable, in case the person who buys the house fails to make his payments?

A—Generally, you should see to it that the GI loan is repaid in full at the time of the sale. In that way, you will be released from all personal liability. Consult your lender or your VA office for full details.

Q—I am receiving a VA disability pension. I have just sold my house, but at a price less than what I paid for it. Must I figure the proceeds as income for pension purposes?

A—No. So long as the house was sold at less than the purchase price, no part of the proceeds of the sale need be considered as income.

Q—I'm drawing compensation for a service-connected disability I received in Korea. I was on active duty for two years. Am I automatically entitled to vocational rehabilitation training at Government expense?

A—Not necessarily. One requirement of the law is that you must need the training to overcome the handicap of your disability.

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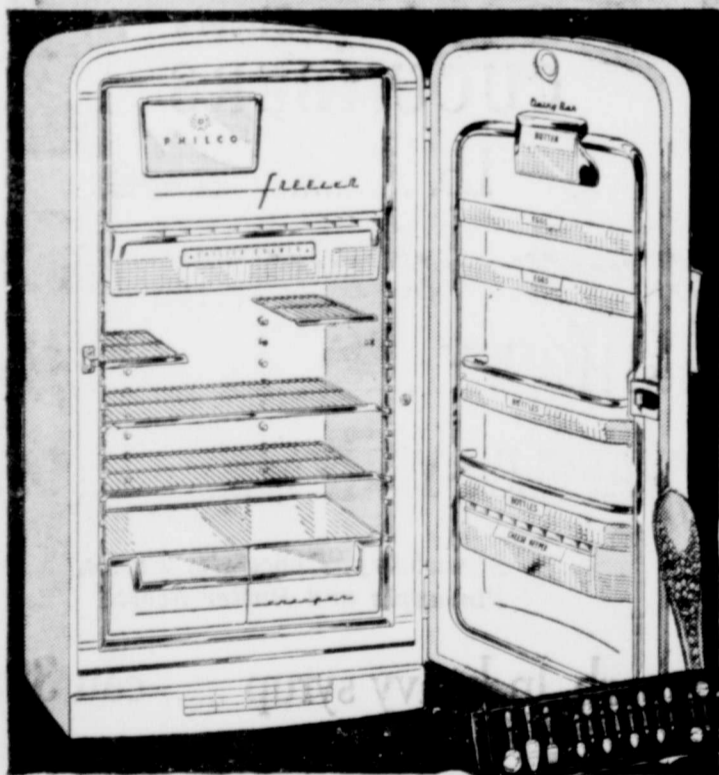

Your Senator Reports



by LYNDON B. JOHNSON
(Senator Lyndon B. Johnson, writing from Washington, gives a weekly report on happenings in the National Capital as they affect Texas and Texans).

Texas' almost miraculous industrial progress during the last decade has attracted nationwide attention. Many new manufacturing establishments, big and little, have sprung up over the State. An enormous overall addition has been made to the productive capacity of the United States.

We want to continue our industrial growth. Development of large and dependable water supplies is essential to maintenance of the rate of Texas industrial growth. Water is the lifeblood of modern industry.

These needed supplies will have to come from water resources not used at present. That is a primary conclusion of an

appraisal of the Texas water problem made by the Bureau of Reclamation.

Must Develop Water Resources

The Bureau reports that Texas has a potential water supply more than sufficient to take care of all foreseeable industrial and domestic needs. Our present use of water represents only about 15 percent of the water available, year after year, from Texas streams.

The water problem facing our State is two-fold. First, we must take steps to conserve as much as possible of the 85 per cent of the total supply that now runs off into the Gulf of Mexico and is lost to us. Second, we must devise and put into effect a distribution system that will get adequate supplies of water to the places where they are most needed.

Must Meet Challenge

Admittedly, this challenge is no puny one. It is one that must be met. Only by meeting it can we take advantage of the unparalleled economic opportunity before us.

Every phase of our anticipated industrial development will require increased supplies of water. The Bureau of Reclamation predicts, for example, that eventually industries and municipalities in the Gulf Coast area will require an annual water supply

four times as large as the present usage.

The Bureau report suggests new and revised programs aimed primarily at transforming Texas' potential water resources into available water supplies. It estimates economic gains that would come to Texas as a result of carrying out these programs. It discusses the character of the Federal interest in the Texas water problem. It outlines policies which respect both State and national interests.

Solution Vital To Texas

The solution of our water problem is vitally important to Texas, of course. But not to Texas alone. The entire Nation has a great stake in solving this problem. The Nation needs the additional manufactured goods

and farm products that would come with greater utilization of Texas water resources.

I hope that Texas and the Federal Government will work together to solve the problem—with the rights of Texas over its own waters protected to the fullest degree.

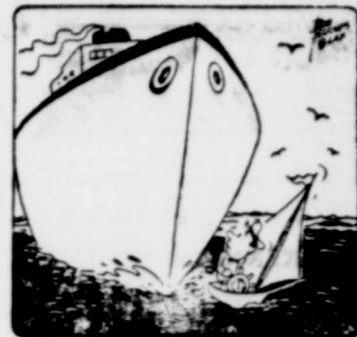

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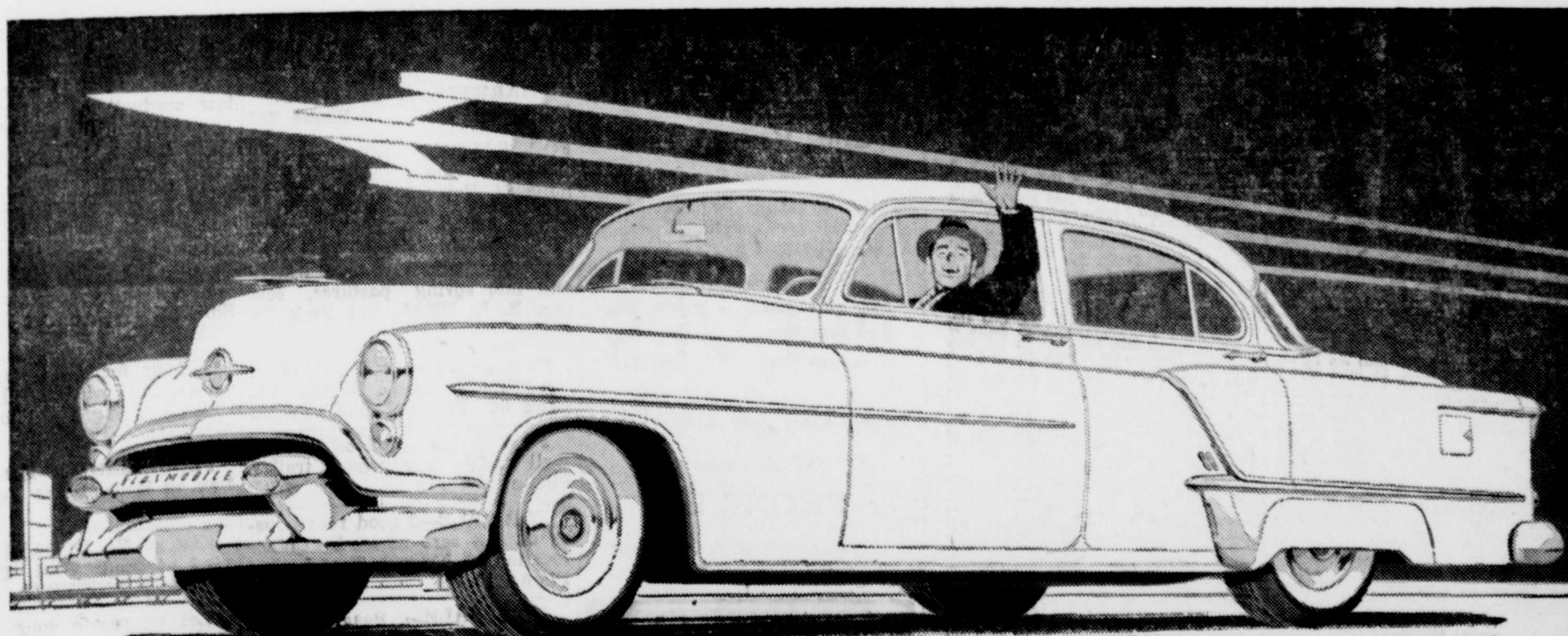
