T-O Fair Offers Varied Interests

From Automotive to Agriculture: from Television to Trailers that is the picture of the Industrial Exhibits Department of the 1953 Texas-Oklahoma Fair in Iowa Park this Fall, according to Department Chairman, R. E. Lewis of Wichita Falls.

Lewis said exhibitors who showed in the 1952 Fair have been offered their space again for the annual Fair, but that many new firms have requested space.

"We were filled to the brim last year," he declared today, "but we'll make room somehow for these new fellows."

He pointed out that contract forms have been mailed to everyone who purchased exhibit space last year, and already many of them have reserved space for the 1953 Fair.

In the Industrial Building itself, Lewis said, television sets, with motorboats in the exhibits area—and items ranging from farm implements to automobiles share the big buildings space.

Behind the Industrial Building and accessible through the building or through the Main North Gate, the large outdoor exhibit area will again be in use, the chairman said. Industrial equipment, oil field trucks, trailer houses and farm implements made up this exhibit last year, he said. The Industrial Exhibits area is paved and provides excellent exhibit space.

Interest each year has been high in the exhibits offered by firms in the area, Lewis declared, with practically every Fair visitor seeing the show at least once. Last year attendance at the Fair surpassed 170,000.

A new feature of the Industrial Exhibit has been the addition of daily entertainment programs from a stage behind the Industrial Building, the chairman remarked. The programs feature talent arranged for by Wichita Falls merchants, and drew many visitors for the regular programs. The show will again be used in the Silver Anniversary Fair, Lewis said.

"Whatever you want to see," he said, "from motorboats to electric organs, from combines to tractor trucks, we'll have it in the Industrial Exhibits Department."

Parents Should Set Safety Examples For Children

"Children traffic habits, more often than not, are the result of the example their parents have set."

Col. E. B. Tilley of Houston, President of the Texas Safety Association, and Services advisor for the Gulf Oil corporation, made that statement today in appealing to motorists to cooperate with the Texas Safety Association in their September traffic program for child safety.

"Good traffic habits and attitudes of parents will do a lot to keep children safe in traffic," he said. Also important is the extent to which parents try to teach children safe traffic practices.

Parents can best cooperate with the program of the Texas Safety Association and the National Safety Council by following five simple rules, according to Col. Tilley.

He listed the five rules as follows:

1. As pedestrians, always set a good example to children. This includes crossing streets only at intersections, waiting for the signal, and looking both ways before crossing.
2. Learn what the schools are teaching and, in cooperation with schools and traffic officials, help children to develop safe traffic habits and attitudes.
3. See that children play only in approved play areas, never in the street or near moving traffic.
4. Teach children safe use of outdoor toys such as roller skates, tricycles, bicycles, scooters and wagons.
5. Instill in children the attitude that safety rules must be given the same respect and obediences as other rules of conduct learned at home and in school.

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

MANSFIELD, OHIO, News-Journal: "Politics is too dirty a game for an honest man to have anything to do with." This remark—expresses one of the most dangerous viewpoints in the United States. If politics, the art of government, is left to the dishonest, our government will be eaten by rotteness, and be replaced by some regime which does not represent the people such as communism."

OSKALOOSA, IOWA, Daily Herald: "The Western railroads cooperating with the government's drought relief put into effect on July 1 a 50 percent reduction in freight rates on livestock feed to the stricken southwestern states."
ADA, OKLA., Times-Democrat: "Probably the most flagrant sample of destructive and unnecessary socialism has been in the field of government electric power plants. In every case, the service would have been provided by heavily-taxed, publicly-regulated utility companies."

CORVALLIS, ORE., Gazette-Times: "A dairy industry group has evolved what they call the 'housewife's butter plan' which they believe will—reduce Federal participation in butter purchases and move butter onto the nation's family tables by lowering prices. While this idea certainly isn't panacea it would be an improvement on the present one."

SHAME ON US

We have been hearing alarming stories about Alaska. It seems that the chain of Aleutian Islands that stretches westward from the mainland for nearly 2,000 miles, and is all but a bridge to Siberia—is not a military asset, as we once thought, but a liability. The air-strips that we considered so important in World War II are all but abandoned. Today, we are told, the only military value of Alaska would be for basing atomic bombers, and there are few bases in the peninsula large enough for this purpose.

You might think from all this that we might as well give it back to Russia, or maybe ask them to return the original price of \$7,200,000. But one aspect seems to be slightly overlooked. Alaskans happen to be Americans. They happen to be pioneering Americans. They, and their forbears had the courage to penetrate this vast wilderness to pit their strength and determination against the colossal forces of terrain and climate, to hack out farms, to build villages and town and cities, and to rear in our own tender times a race of young Americans as rugged and hardy and self-reliant as ever our forefathers were.

No one knows the wealth of Alaska, merely because its natural resources, which have already proved fabulous have scarcely been tapped. But that is somewhat beside the point, for the greatest asset of any land is its people. And if this prodigious territory, which has been American since 1867, possessed no more natural treasure than any of the states you wish to mention, the Alaskans' right to statehood would be no less.

We should be ashamed that there is even yet no star in our flag for this proud peninsula. And we should be more ashamed if we let another session of Congress ignore the matter, even though some of the Pentagon brass hats who regarded it as a special gift of Providence to their purposes just a few years ago, may now have changed their minds.

IT TAKES MEN

Every now and then someone with nothing better to do heaves a shuddering sigh about the supposed evils of the Machine Age. Dark fears are voiced that mechanization and assembly-line techniques may be eroding away such sturdy old virtues as self reliance and pride of craftsmanship.

We refer these timid souls to the recent remarks of Harlow H. Curtice, president of General Motors, at the annual Scholarship Award Banquet of the Fisher Body Craftsman's Guild in Detroit. The dinner was in honor of those youngsters who spent long hours fashioning model automobiles for the contest sponsored by GM's Fisher Body Division.

The Machine Age, Mr Curtice noted, has not abolished the "great need for men who have an abiding belief in their own ability to do something better than it has been done before—and the plan fortitude to finish what's been started."

"Machines can't design themselves," he reminded the youngsters. "New products cannot design themselves. Businesses cannot run themselves. It takes men to make things happen—in industry—in science—in government."

Whatever fears some aging head-shakers may express we believe most of our young people agree with Mr. Curtice's common-sense observations.
