THE LAND MUST PRODUCE MORE

The population of the United States is increasing by 7,000 persons a day. By 1975, government experts forecast we will have to be capable of feedinf five people for every four who sat down at the table in 1950.

There are two ways this can be accomplished. One is to proportionately increase our croplands. The other is to make better use of the land we now have.

So far as the first of these solutions in concerned, it football game last Tuesday nite is estimated that, if our present standard of living is to be maintained through 1975, the huge total of 100,000,000 fertile acres will have to be brought into production. So far as anyone can see now, this is an impossible goal. At present we are bringing in only 2,000,000 acres a year, Fair will be given to students and more than half of this is being offset by the expan- Tuesday, Sept. 29. sion of communities and industrial areas.

Therefore the population problem can be met only by producing more food, feed and fiber from an acreage which will be moderately increased.

That, luckily for America's future, can be done thru the application of proven scientific production practices along with better land conservation and utilization. And here agriculture has a mighty ally in farm machinery. The machine is the key to making the land yield-and, at the same time, preserving and improving that land for future generations.

AVAILABLE

Federal Judge Harold R. Medina, who displayed not merely the wisdom of Solomon, but the patience of Job and the courage of Daniel in the gruelling task of presiding over the nine-month jury trial in 1949 of the 11 top Communists who were convicted of conspiracy to overthrow the Government by force and voilence, has now completed another prodigious task.

After two years and ten months of trial, piling up a five million word record of 108,646 pages, and costing from six to ten million dollars, Judge Medina dismissed an anti-trust suit against 17 investment banking firms, in which they were charged with conspiring to dominate the securities field, and the management of over fourteen bil-

lion dollars. Now that Judge Medina is ready for another assignment, we recall there is another big job open, that of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. It's just about his size.

BUMPS AS WELL AS REWARDS

"Preservation of the U.S. Free enterprise system depends upon our intelligent acceptance of a few bumps along with the tremendous rewards," says the Ontorio, Calif., Report.

That's worth memorizing. It means that no one can expect to always get more and more in return for less and less work. It means that booms aren't necessarily a permanent state of affairs, and that it's only wise to expect occasional setbacks. And, of great importance right now, it means that if we are to have efficient and economical government, which is the only kind of government that can assure the perpetuation of free enterprise and the other freedoms, all of us must willingly accept cuts in unnecessary tax spending that affect our pocketbook, no less than the pocketbook of the othe fellow.

THE TURNING OF A KEY

Secretary of the Interior Makay recently said some wise words concerning the conservation of our oil resourc-

He observed: "For the past 20 years, we have read many times that the United States would run out of oil wilthin 10 years, or 20 years, or 25 years. Usually these statements were made by an economist, usually a government economist, or in some cases by a government official who should have known better.

"Needless to say, the United States has not run out of petroleum and unless I misjudge the capabilities of the petroleum industry, it will not exhaust this extremely valuable resource in our time. And incidentally, we hope to end rumors about complete depletion of our pertroleum

"True conservation is not a negative thing, not a hoarding of the riches man has found in the past and wishes merely to possess. Conservation is a positive thing, a method of making the fullest use of every resource that

has been bestowed on man. "Conservation connotes the turning of a key. But it is not turning a lock on what has already been found; it is the turning of the key to open new posibilities for use-

fulness "Oil conservation is accomplished best by using wisely what we have, giving due thought to the future and tak-

ing every precaution against waste." That is exactly the kind of conservation the oil industry is giving this country.

One for the Books!

The drouth - breaking rains which fell on Texas recently not only brought welcome respite to farmers and ranchers but also saved the state from a clanking federal relief program that was about to come apart at the

Criticism of the program was gathering momentum even before the project was nullified by range soaking showers. Dissatisfaction cropped up concerning mismanagement, inadequate distribution of relief feed and the snail like peace which marked every phase of drouth relief. But the real scandal hardly had time to mature and it would have blown the lid off the gov- skirts of the present administraernment program if the drouth tion, had continued.

Texas ranchers desperately needed hay at a reasonabl price for their stricken cattle. This was the principal demand made

Amarillo conference of governors in July which was attended by the leaders of the federal farm program. Yet the subsequent "aid" offered by the Secretary of Agriculture included not one bale of drouth relief hay. Instead, the program that was

launched proved to a flagrant example of political chicanery. Where we needed hay we were offered government surpluses of feed concentrates. These were the same surplus-

es which were used as a political issue during the election last year. Having been condemned as products of an expensive and wasteful farm program, they were being unloaded under the guise of livestock relief. Yet, it was mererly an effort to get rid of a political hot-potato which was still besmirching the

value without hay roughage. The B. H. Alexander, Jr. Secretary should have given Real Estate - Home Construction Texas that hay. But the critical

by ranchers themselves at the situation was used to unload unwanted surpluses.

In other words, Texas was used as a dunping ground for a fetid political issue.

Efforts of Texas' own agencies to fill this void due credit. The Civil defense and Disaster Relief committee worked hard to secure the needed hay. If the various projects launched on a state wide basis had had time to slip into high gear, then they would have offset this federal blunder.

Legumes can hold the line on of acreage controls on some cash crops, the need for increasing profits on each acre planted is emphasized, says B. T. Haws, County Agent. He adds production costs can be cut by using improved machinery and labor saving equipment but emphasizes that higher acre yields are of major importance.

Legumes used in combination with other good farming practices, can boost yields and put extra dollars in the farmer's pocket. To get the most from legumes, however, only the best adapted varieties should be planted, the seed properly innoculated and fertilizer applied in accordance with the soil needs. A soil analysis should be used as the basis for determining fertilizer needs.

Legumes when properly innoculated can help reduce nitrogen fertilizer requirements of the crops which follow the legumes.

Research workers of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in a 11-year study have found that the top growth of Hairy vetch contains an average of 102 pounds of nitrogen an acre. Legumes are the only farm income. With the return plants which have the ability to take nitrogen from the air and store it in the plant but must be innoculated with the proper nitrogen-fixing bacteria before they can do so.

He recommends the use of commercial innoculants which are readily available. Be sure and check the label on the container, to make certain the right innoculant is being used.

Legumes, like other crops, require proper fertilization for maximum growth. Phosphorus is needed in almost all areas of the county. On soils low in organic matter, a small amount of commercial nitrogen applied at planting time will help get the legumes off to a good start. The effects from plowing un

der a heavy growth of legumes usually lasts for more than one year. The legumes add organic matter to the soil and thus improves the soil structures. This allows deeper root penetration and increases the water holding capacity of the soil. 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


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


