The near sighted may bewail that - the airplane shrinks the map and exposes distant havens to quick attack and its wake of destruction, Commerce Secretary Sinclair Weeks told members and more than 500 guests of the National Association at a dinner in Washington the other night. "Such lack of vision has appeared before in history he said." The advent of sail, steam and gasoline also roused regrets among those with limited points of view and

No doubt Mr. Weeks could have gone further in pressing his belief that the airplane is a greater instrument of peace than of war. Perhaps he restrained himself because of the President's recent crack-down on free wheeling comments on atomic developments. But in any case the night after the dinner celebrating the fiftieth anniversary of powered flight, Radio Commentator Morgan Beatty revealed that space-travel via guided missile is practically

The government, says Mr. Beatty, is contracting with Pan American World Airlines to conduct tests expected to prove the pilot-less device is practical for point-to-point transportation. The proving operations, with the rocketlike projectiles under electronic control will be conducted on the Airline's Caribbean bases, and in cooperation with the Radio Corporation of America.

Thus a week-end should soon be ample for that trip to the moon. But it doesn't help a bit in getting from home to work, and we still have the problem of finding a place to park.

It is now official that a government job is not a right,

but a privilege.

By executive order, President Eisenhower has cut off the subversive Federal Worker's retreat behind the Fifth Amendment. Any employee of Uncle Sam who refuses to testify before a Congressional committee on the well-worn ground that it may tend to incriminate him, may be sum-

marily fired. It is important to note that, as a citizen, he may still so testify if he wishes to use his Constitutional privilege. But the Constitution was never intended to offer anybody job protection.

As a matter of fact, it seems pretty silly to think that a Presidential directive was required to stiffen the backbone of a bureau chief sufficiently to fire a worker who refused to say whether or not he was a member of a

conspiracy to destroy our country by force and violence. But we must still wait to see whether even this authority is sufficient to get more of the blattae crientalii (that's latin for cock-roaches) out of the federal woodwork.

The thousands of ideas submitted ranged all the way from putting a Secretary of Transportation into the President's Cabinet to requiring drivers to wear illuminated gloves for signaling turns in the dark. But most of the contestants agreed on these three points:

There is no quick and easy solution to the highway problem.
 We need continued and intensified research into highway matters.

Most important of all, we'll never get better roads without public As Harlow H. Curtice, president of General Motors, has said: "Highways are built by public authorities. But it's a great deal easier for the public authorities to act in response to informed public support."

The contest demonstrated that there are bound to be honest differences of opinion as to how to plan and pay for better roads. Some contestants thought the federal government should have more power over our highway network; others feared any encroachment on prerogatives of the states. Some favored higher taxes; others said the necessary money would be available if we would end diversion to non-highway purposes of taxes collected from highway ways of the contestant ways. purposes of taxes collected from highway users. One contestant suggested raising money for roads by putting the government into the toothpaste business.

Differences can be resolved. The competition showed how deep and widespread is the concern over our highways. And in the opinion of the contestants themselves, it's up to all of us to translate that concern





