NEAT . . . NOT GAUDY

More than eighty million Americans, men, women and children, (that's half the nation), toiled devotedly and voluntarily in clean-up, paint-up, fix-up campaigns over the nation last year that culminated in the annual National Cleanest Town Contest!

After inspecting the necks and ears of the finalist towns, a panel of four distinguished Washington judges declared Hammond, Ind., top winner and San Antonio, Tex., runner-up. But there were other winners, since the contest, sponsored by the National Clean-up, Paint-up, Fix up Bureau under the direction of Dr. Frank Monaghan, divides the competing towns into eight population categories.

Among towns under 5,000, Richlonds and Chincoteague, both in Virginia, placed first and second; with Ashland, Neb. third. In the 5,000 to 10,000 group, Valley City, N. D. won first place; Oelwein, Ia., second; Negaunee, Mich., third. Among towns of 10,000 to 25,000 Bluefield, V. Va., took first prize, Morristown, Tenn. and Cairo, Ill. tied for second, and Monterey Park, Cal. came in third. Highland Park, Mich won first place in the 25 to 50 thousand class; with Hagerstown, Md. and Pine Bluff, Ark., tied for second and Watertown, N. Y. third. Hammond, Ind., winner of the Grand National Award, led the 50 to 100 thousand group with Lancaster, Pa. second and East Chicago, Ind. third.

San Antonio, Tex., runner-up for the Nation's cleanest town title, was first among cities of 100 to 500 thousand. Atlanta, Ga., and Little Rock, Ark., tied for second place with Louisville, Ky. third. In the 500 thousand to one million class, Houston, Texas, placed first, St. Louis, Mo. and Cincinnati, O., third. Among the Nation's biggest cities, one million and over, Philadelphia took top honors with Detroit and Chicago second and third respectively.

And now that hundreds, perhaps thousands of American towns have achieved, under the spur of the contest, a cleanliness that brings them closer to Godliness, we can hope the proud citizens will make a special effort to keep their tidy streets and highway approaches from being smeared up with blood of traffic victims.

Savings Bonds Best Farm Investment

The crop of 1840 is said to have been planted with the hoe, the plow and ax. The hand-turned grind-stone in the back yard of the farm home that kept the farm tools sharp was a valued labor-saving device of the day — probably the only mechanized piece of equipment on the farm.

How different is the farm mechanization picture today. In 1953 farmers spent over three and a third billion dollars for farm equipment. This one figure shows how much the American farmer depends upon farm equipment to continue the huge production job that has made him the greatest food producer in the world.

Farm machinery has paid off in a higher standard of living for the farmer and the consuming public at large. In 1840 it took 276 man hours of labor to produce 100 bushels of corn. Today, less than 83 man hours are required to produce the same amount.

The big problem, however, facing farmers in the mechanized world of today is not operation, production or maintenance. The one big obstacle is replacement. Farm machines, however good, do wear out. And when they wear out they must be replaced if the farming job goes on.

While in 1952 expenditures for new machinery amounted to 3 1/2 billion dollars for the depreciation on machinery on the farms during the year came to over 3 billion dollars. The depreciation plus operating costs reached the staggering sum of \$7.6 billion.

The best solution to the problem seems to be in paying the depreciation cost year by year. One way this can be done is to set up farm machinery replacement fund in the form of United States Savings Bonds. The amount of money equal to the yearly depreciation costs invested in U. S. Competition for the human being is in the ordinary ways of his life is so intense that it governs a great deal even in our industrial life. The control of competition by the control of jobs is very common. And competition not only for money but competition for position, for status, for prestige, for power — these things that insure safety to the individual in the group — cause him to struggle enormously and at very serious price to himself.

But there should be an optimistic outlook. It would seem that the fear that we now exhibit in this country and the near hysteria that we evidence are unnecessary, and are un-called for. We have the greatest, the richest, and the most powerful tradition of free institutions in the world. Our heritage is so rich that it is very difficult even to allude to it effectively in this article.

One of the problems of the moment, it would appear is that people are becoming so afraid of communism, instead of realizing that the free mind in the free society has an answer to a philosophy of materialism. We can find, as we believe fundamental fallacies in the theory of social development that is at the heart of communism — its economics won't stand scrutiny, its whole abhorrent concept is something we repudiate. Why don't we face that thing in our own dynamic ideology instead of rushing away in fear? We've got nothing to fear in the market of ideas when we take our own theories seriously.

Our minds should dominate our lives, instead of our fears, and we should adopt a philosophy and an ideal with a broad deep tide of national fidelity that bears us forward. Our hopes should be good hopes, and in the public interest. Our fears should be good fears, and in the public interest. And the bigger the fears the bigger our prayers, and in the public interest. And finally, we should remember and adopt the slogan of one of our great Presidents, who warned us, "That we have nothing to fear but fear itself."



-YOUR FARM BUREAU-

BY MARYE ECKELKAMP

Pick up your newspaper and you will read something like this, "the flexible support program would definitely slide the farmers of the nation into bankruptcy, and the economic repercussions to lower support levels would be terrific." Yet no where have I seen any facts given to prove that the farmer is going to take a terrific beating should a flexible program be put into effect.

It has been tried and sentenced to die by political judges before the jury of American farmers have been given the facts to enable them to reach their own decision. There is nothing like serving as a judge and jury especially if it sounds good to the voters back home.

How do they know that such a program wont work? In fact how many of our congressmen can tell us the mechanics of the plan? Yet, they consider the program as fatal to the farm population.

The American Farm Bureau has been a strong advocate of flexible price supports, not sliding scale, since 1948 because the majority of the voting delegates voted for such a program. The AFBB plan returns to the farmer independence of decision as to the crops and production that he wants on his acres.

Under the Farm Bureau program, the price remains at 90 percent of parity as long as sup-

ply and demand remain at normal. When supply begins to rise above normal, the price support begins to flexuate at a ratio of 2-1. For every 2 percent rise of supply above normal, there is a 1 percent drop in support price. Thus when supply goes up to 102 percent, price would be 89 percent of parity, 110 percent, 85 percent, etc. But what happens when supply falls below normal? The price flexuate at 90 percent or above. That means that when supply is 96 percent or normal, the support price would be 92 percent of parity. Sure, it can go up or down.

Should supply reach the surplus danger point, as it is today, it would be mandatory for the Secretary of Agriculture to call a referendum of the producers of the commodity effected. At the referendum, the farmer could vote to continue and

er flexible supports and plant from fence to fence, or vote for acreage controls and marketing quotas with the support set at 90 percent of parity. The farmer by simple majority could choose his own program at the referendum.

Please notice the word mandatory. At the present time, a referendum on wheat is to be called when supply gets to 120 percent above normal. In 1952 an election year, the wheat supply was bordering that 120 percent. For obvious reasons, a referendum was not called. In 1953, the farmers had no choice but to face drastic cuts in acreage. To eliminate politics at the expense of the farm population, a referendum should be mandatory at a specific level. Somewhere in the back of your mind is a mental picture of wheat, butter, etc, piled high as surplus stocks and with a little mental arithmetic you see 75 percent of parity staring

you in the face. The Farm Bureau recommendations state that any surplus in existence at the time of flexible support program goes into effect should be written off and that a state of normal supply be declared. No program can be effective with the present surplus hanging on it's neck.

To further protect the farming interests, the support price for any commodity will be announced before planting season. This is another opportunity for the farmer to make his own decisions. What would you do if cotton was 92 percent, wheat, 88 percent, peanuts 90 percent, etc. If I were a wheat farmer I would stick with wheat and so would you.

This is a simplified version of the proposed flexibile price support program as supported by the Farm Bureau. It was

written after listening to its 6000,000 members by majority rule. Think about the plan, and remember that every suggested farm program should be given the right of trial by the jury of the American people. The economy of agriculture and a nation will continue to be used as a political football. We must decide for ourselves our own future farm program. Then we will tell the congressmen and senators, and not them telling us, what program we want to live under.
