More Food From Fewer Acres

A spokesman for two national organizations of advertising agents has flatly contradicted the idea that we are in for a depression or any marked drop in business activity. To buttress his stand, he cited a number of changes which have taken place in the country and which in his view, mean that the economy will continue to grow.

One of these has to do with a quiet revolution that has occurred in agriculture. He said: "Our farms have become mechanized. And they have better methods and are far more efficient. Although our population has had a net shift of almost 6,000,000 away from the farms since 1940, there has been a 52 percent increase of farm output per man-hour, resulting in higher living standards for both farm and urban people."

This tribute to the mechanized farm and to its vast influence on the well-being of the whole country, is well deserved. Indeed, the machine, coupled with scientific soil utilization and conservation techniques, is the best weapon we have against the spectre of eventual famine. Some 11,000 new humans are born in this country each day. By 1960, we will have to feed about 180,000,000 hungry mouths. And we will have to do it from a farm acreage which, all expect, will change but little if at all. That means that each acre must not only produce more, but must be zealously guarded for the future. More mechanization is the answer.

SO FOR SO GOOD

On April 1, substantial reductions took place in the excise taxes. An officer of an association of retailers which represents some 7,000 stores, chains and independents among them, hailed this as an important forward step to "unloosen the shackles that have so long acted as a brake on the sale of the affected categories of merchandise." And in addition to the stimulating influence the reductions will have upon production and distribution, he added, "They also constitute a lessening of the inequities that have so long been part of our excise tax laws, and so represent the American tradition of equal treatment to all citizens and all segments of the economy. They also represent the first step towards the complete and desirable elimination of all war time imposed excises which have proved a heavy burden to the sale of many types of consumer goods."

The excise taxes have often been referred to as "luxury taxes". Actually, in a country with our accepted living standards, many of the goods involved are in universal use by people in all income brackets and are considered necessities — good example being cosmetics and leather goods. And this is true also of services subject to excise taxation, such as railroads and other transportation, and the telephone and telegraph.

More important, the key to good times in this country is consumption—the volume of goods which people go into stores and other retail outlets and buy. Anything which abnormally burdens and reduces consumption is bad for all. There can be no question but that the excise taxes have been such a burden.

The hope is that, in time, these war-imposed taxes can and will be eliminated entirely, not just reduced. But unless such tax cuts are accompanied by drastic cuts in the cost of government, they will be prelude to more debt and inflation rather than sound prosperity.

Government Needs Enterprise

After a large corporation pays for the materials and supplies it needs, and meets its payroll and all other operating costs, who gets the lion's share of whatever money is left?

Most people, probably, would say the owners—the individuals and institutions whose invested savings make the existence of the business possible.

That answer would be wrong. For in the great majority of cases, the biggest slice is taken by government.

Here are a few examples, based on corporation reports covering last year—and they are typical, not exceptional.

An oil company paid in taxes 5.12 cents out of each dollar it took in. The stockholders got 1.12 cents — not much more than a fifth as much as the tax collector.

The nation's largest railroad paid a tax bill which was almost twice as its entire net income after taxes.

A power utility was able to pay 8.0 cents of each dollar of revenue to its common stockholders. But its tax bill was close to three times that — 22.3 cents.

Government's stake in progressive, prosperous business, and in governmental laws and policies which encourage progress and prosperity, can't be exaggerated.

Men 18 to 40 Years Biggest Movers

Men 18 to 40 years of age move more than any other age group in the population. Since almost 70 percent of the over 20 million male living veterans are under 40, a large group of veterans will be on the move again this year.

For that reason, Mr. Scott E. Harrington, Manager of the V.A. Regional Office at Dallas urged veterans who receive benefit checks, to use claims pending, or hold GI insurance to keep the VA posted on their new addresses as soon as possible.

Under the law, checks for benefits may not be forwarded by the Post Office, he said. They must be delivered directly to the addressee.

In order to keep receiving benefit checks, these veterans must inform VA of any change as soon as it is made. Any VA office can furnish a form for this purpose.

For reporting change of address for insurance purposes, VA provides a convenient form on the flap of the premium notice envelope.

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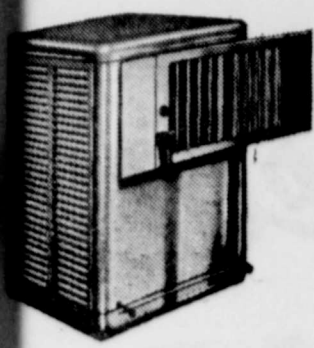

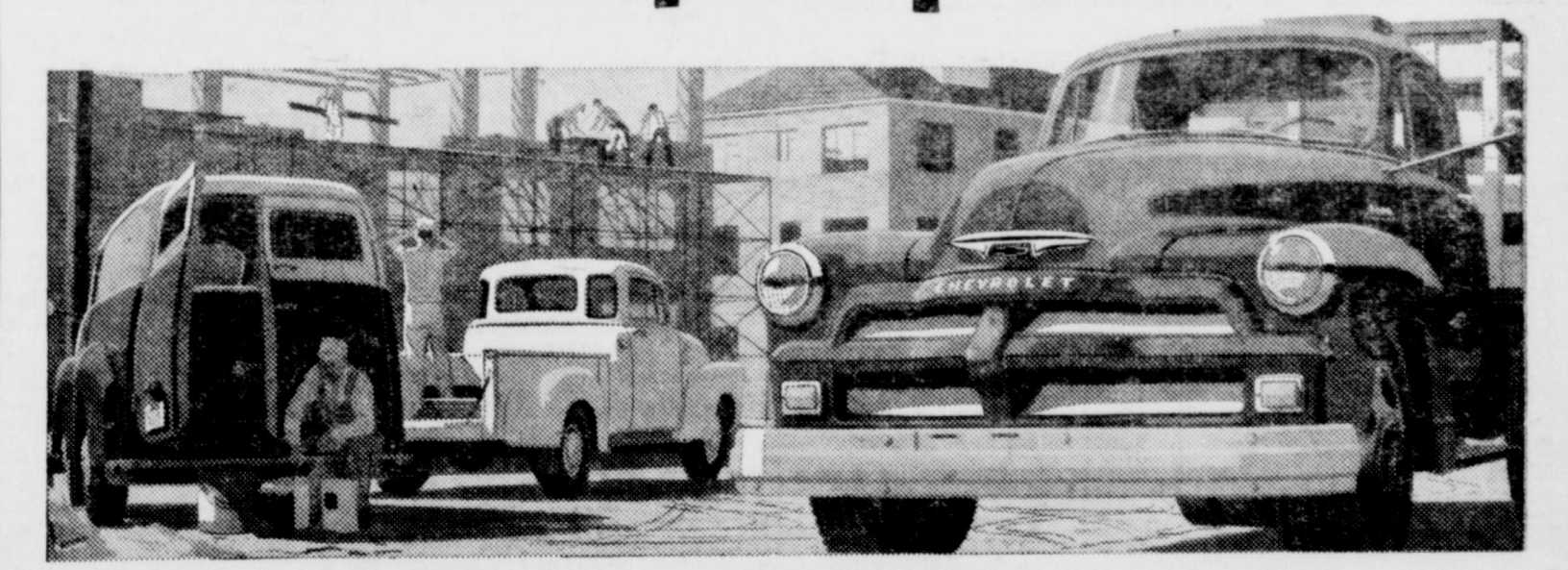

It is the child's job to pre-
vent childhood accidents," de-
clares Gen. W. Col. state
Health officer.
An accident is not always
preventable, but the greatest safety
factor is to be made to under-
stand the accident problem of
children and to be concerned
about it as they are about
childhood diseases.
A notable decrease in infant
mortality has been brought
about by physicians and public
health work during the past
quarter century. Despite the ef-
forts of medical profession to
protect the country's future citi-
zens, childhood mortality con-
tinues high because of accidents
that for the most part are pre-
ventable.
The accident death rate among
children is being reduced only
about one third as fast as the
rate for death by disease. Pre-
ventable accidents are the lead-
ing causes of death in the age
group one to fourteen. Only by
the understanding and co-opera-
tion of adults can the toll of
child accident deaths be reduced.
Besides causing deaths, acci-
dents are responsible for thou-
sands of school children being
injured sufficiently to require
the attention of a physician or
cause absence from school. In-
juries occurring in school build-
ings account for 26 per cent of
such cases, on school grounds
23 percent, going to and from
school 5 percent, at home 17 and
other places 23 percent.
Children deserve the right to
grow up and it is up to every
adult to give them that chance,"
said Dr. Cox.

Q—Are there any circum-
stances under which a Korean
veteran would not be entitled
to make his one and only chance
of course under the Korean GI
Bill training program?
A—Yes. If the veteran drops
out of training because of his
own misconduct, neglect or
failure to apply himself to his
studies, he would not be per-
mitted to change to another
course. In fact, he could be de-
barred any further training.

Q—I'm taking on the job
training under the Korean GI
Bill. In addition, I would like
to take a correspondence course
in the same field. Could I re-
ceive a GI allowance for the
correspondence course, as well
as my monthly allowance as an
in the job training?
A—No. The GI allowance for
a correspondence course
could not be paid so long as
you're receiving an allowance
for on the job training.
