Trinity Lutheran Church At Clara To Receive Offering For Servicemen's Program On Mother's Day, Sun., May 9th

Members of Trinity Lutheran Church at Clara, will join with the 5,000 congregations of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod next Sunday, Mother's Day, to receive an offering for the Church's Armed Services Commission.

The Commission, which has its offices in Washington, D. C. ministers to the spiritual welfare of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod's 32,000 young men and women in the military. It's program has been hailed by church and military leaders as the most comprehensive and effective service carried on by any church among the military.

The Commission's ministry begins with each individual member when he first enters the service. He is sent an initial packet containing a Lutheran Identification Tag, Service Prayer Book, Scripture Pocket Calendar and several tracts.

The serviceman's name and military address, sent to the Commission by his home pastor, is forwarded to the nearest chaplain or contact pastor of the Church. One hundred and eighty-two chaplains and 403 contact pastors are co-operating in this effort. In addition the Commission, with the assistance of 87 hospital pastors, serves Lutherans confined to Veterans Administration hospitals.

Each month an order of service with sermon and hymns, "Loyalty—Christ and Country", along with a folder, "Directory for Service People", listing the locations of Missouri Synod Lutheran chaplains, are mailed to the service people. "Double Time", a pocket news magazine containing pictures and items of Lutheran service interest, is mailed periodically.

Fifty-five Lutheran Service Centers, located in the United States and overseas, are being supported by the Commission for the purpose of spiritual counseling and informal hospitality to service people during their off duty hours.

This comprehensive service program is financed solely thru the Mother's Day collections held in Synod churches thruout the United States and Canada.

From Your County Agent

Clean up, fix up, and paint up is a popular springtime slogan and rightly so, says B. T. Haws, County Agent.

Take painting for example. Right now is the time to get a first class paint job. The weather is relatively dry and temperatures moderate. The best paint in the world can't stand up if applied in wet or damp weather. In addition sudden changes in temperatures may cause new paint to wrinkle.

Conditions during April and May are optimum, Haws says. Avoid painting when insects are numerous or when dust is blowing. Paint, at least as much as possible, in the shade. It's easier on the worker and the direct sunlight does not fall upon the newly applied coat.

Possibly the main consideration is the selection of outside paints suited to the climate. In humid, warm areas, hard type paints stand up better and softer paints are best suited in dry areas. Paint dealers can recommend the best type.

The next rules are simple, but important, he says. Get the surface clean, dry, and free from old, loose materials. Three or four light coats are much better than a single thick application.

Finally, each coat should be allowed to dry thoroughly before the next is applied.

Burkburnett Man Makes Test of Southern Peas

According to B. T. Haws, county agent, Henry Vaughan of the Burkburnett community will conduct a plot test on new varieties of southern peas that have been developed by the agriculture experiment station in six different locations in Texas.

The new varieties include California No. 5, black eye, purple hull commercial F, purple hull 49, cream 40, cream 12 and Dixie Lee Crowder.

One of the principle objectives of the plot demonstration is to determine the varieties best adapted to Wichita County and ones of higher yielding ability. The peas are generally considered to produce the fancy products and are in good demand.

Mr. Vaughan is planting his peas close to the road in front of his house this week. Farmers interested may stop by later and check these variety test of peas.

These eatable peas are also good soil builders. Peas may add as much as sixty pounds of nitrogen per acre and eight thousand two hundred thirty-five pounds green matter per acre.

Pfc. Elmer G. Tyler At Ft. Bliss, Texas

Pfc. Elmer G. Tyler, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Tyler, Box 404, Burkburnett, Texas, recently began eight weeks of basic training in the Antiaircraft Artillery Replacement Training Center at Ft. Bliss, Texas.

The first eight weeks of basic training are spent on fundamental infantry subjects like army drill, rifle, machine gun, and bazooka marksmanship and familiarization with army technical subjects. This first phase of training is climaxed with a one week maneuver in the field.

Upon completion of the first eight week cycle, he will either be assigned for further training at Ft. Bliss in the techniques of Antiaircraft artillery or he will be transferred to another training center for schooling in some other army skill.

Should he remain at Ft. Bliss, his second eight weeks will see him learn the uses of various electronic equipment employed by the AAA-RTC. He will also be expertly trained in the firing of light and medium anti-aircraft artillery at low flying and high altitude aerial targets on the one and one half million acre Ft. Bliss ranges.

March retail sales in Texas were 11 percent more than in February but 8 percent below March, 1953, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports.

All but 12 U. S. Department of Agriculture crop-reporting districts in Texas bettered February sales by 3 to 19 percent.

Downward trends are in prospect for taxes, prices, earnings and installments obligations and farm incomes are stabilizing everywhere except drought areas. Bureau researchers declare. Possibilities for a slow and easy resumption of more favorable business appear promising, they say.

Cities reporting March retail sales increases from February totals include Goldwaite and Lampasas, each 16 percent. Goldwaite retail sales topped, March 1953, by 9 percent. Lampasas registered a 4 percent gain in the same comparison. Leading cities in retail sales for the first quarter of 1954 include Jasper, up 19 percent over last year.

Improperly Used Machines Can Cause Mastitis

Improperly used milking machines rank as one of the top causes of Mastitis.

One milking machine is as good as another and it's the use that counts, says B. T. Haws, county agent. Use the machine according to manufacturer's specifications, he advises. Each machine has its own method of use, and used any other way it can result in high incidence of mastitis.

No more than two units should be used by any one man doing the milking, at one time. Keep the rubber liners clean. Use one set for two weeks, then boil in a lye solution for 15 minutes, cool, remove from solution and let dry for two weeks while the alternate set is in use. Make certain all mechanical parts of the machine are functioning properly.

To prepare the udder for milking, use separate clean towels dipped in a disinfectant solution to clean each cow, and always use a strip cup. This stimulates a cow to let down her milk and removes the first milk which is high in bacteria.

Don't leave the machine too long, says the county agent. This results in irritation, which can lead to mastitis. Disinfect the test cups between each cow. Rinse first in clean, luke warm water, then in fresh warm disinfectant solution.

Finally, milk on schedule. Cows are creatures of habit and most dairy farmers are aware of the advantages of a rigid schedule. Keep hands, clothing and all equipment as clean as possible, Haws adds.

Present indications are there will be no change in laws governing the medical and hospital care for non-service connected veterans during the 2nd Session of the 83rd Congress.

This conclusion was reached, National Commander Arthur J. Connell said, when the House Veterans Affairs committee by a unanimous resolution on March 24 approved the continued hospitalization of non-service connected veterans where VA beds are available and the veteran does not have the ability to pay for private care. The House Committee took this action after extended hearings and investigations.

It marked a signal victory for The American Legion in defending this program against the attacks of The Medical Association, according to Robert M. McCurdy of Pasadena, Cal., National Rehabilitation Chairman. Commander Connell led the fight by his personal appearance before the House Committee, through public addresses and his direction of a VA bed to bed survey which disproved AMA charges of widespread abuses of hospital care. In its action the House Committee took cognizance of the new financial statement to VA Form P-10 by veterans seeking hospitalization.

Commander Connell approved a reasonable trial of the use of this statement on Nov. 10, 1953. The 1954 national rehabilitation conference held in Washington, D. C. March 2 to 5 with a record attendance gave strong impetus to American Legion championship of the rights of sick and disabled veterans. Out of it came a vigorous 25 point recommendation for strengthening of the entire program for the care of veterans. Chairman McCurdy said. It also demonstrated the excellent working relationship between The American Legion and the VA in the interest of all veterans developed under Commander Connell's leadership.

Q—How do I go about applying for institutional training under the Kame Bill?

A—Obtain an application blank at any VA office out completely. Send to nearest VA regional office along with the following documents: (1) Photostatic copy of your papers; (2) detailed description of your program as set up in school; (3) certification of school stating that the program meets all standards of training; and (4) evidence that control of the farm or the training will be full time.

Q—Would I be able to take institutional training under the Korean GI Bill in a dairy processing plant?

A—No. Under the farm training must be on a farm or other agricultural establishment owned or controlled by the veteran. A dairy plant does not fit this definition. You must ever, take on the job as an apprentice on a farm as opposed to on a farm in the plant under the GI Bill providing the State approval for the training.

Q—I'm entitled to 36 months of 36 months of GI Bill under the Korean GI Bill. I use all that time in institutional on farm training.

A—You could use a time for farm training you needed it to reach goal. Farm training programs are tailored to the veteran; so if you could your objective in a short period of time, as a result of experience, you would use the full 36 months to complete your course.

Q—How much classroom instruction is required of vets taking institutional training under the Kame Bill?

A—Under the law, a veteran must receive at least 200 hours per classroom instruction. It is not less than eight hours. Not less than eight hours must be given in a month.





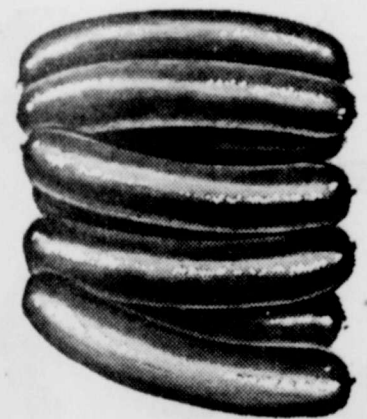

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tary Stevens seemed less sure of his ground, especially when he found it difficult to convince the committee why he felt that Mr. Carr should have been a party to the investigation.

He was under handicap of being required to confine his testimony to his own personal observations of Mr. Carr, which contained little which bore on his charge against Mr. Carr. He was not allowed to discuss evidence bearing on Mr. Carr which was to come from other witnesses later on. As a result, he was put in the position of seeming to condemn Mr. Carr on the basis of his own evidence which did not, of itself, sustain the charge.

The Secretary of the Army was told by Mr. Jenkins that it appeared to him and some members of the committee that Senator McCarthy and his committee had done the country great service in its investigation into alleged espionage at Ft. Mommouth, N. J. It was brought out in testimony of the Secretary that he had in mind at one time to discharge the commander of this installation who had closely cooperated with Senator McCarthy in his efforts to clean out the communists, but when Senator McCarthy indicated his disapproval, the matter was dropped and the commandant remains in his position.

From the start of this investigation it has been assumed by many close to the scene, the senators, and the unfolding story, that when all the thousands of words are in, and the haystack of memoranda, letters and transcripts of conversation is studied, and sifted to the bottom and in every detail, that

the committee will come up with divided views.

One reason for this forecast already can be traced. Questioning of Mr. Stevens and Maj. Gen. Miles Reber by Democrat members of the committee has been noticeably more gentle than questioning by Republicans. The vigorous and often rough interrogations by committee Mr. Jenkins, a man who has called himself a conservative Republican and who came to the committee thru the efforts of Senator Dirksen of Illinois, will have to be compared to his handling of the other side later on.

All members of the committee on the Republican side have appeared friendly to Senator McCarthy and frequently agreed with him on policy and political questions. Many who watched Senator Mundt conduct the hearings did not consider that he was particular strict with Senator McCarthy's repeated interruptions in the early hearings.

It was noticed that time and time again when the senator interrupted the interrogation with a "point or order" he was allowed to finish a statement or a long question — even after Senator Mundt cautioned Senator McCarthy that he was not actually making a point of order.

So the pattern of the outcome may be fairly clear already, meanwhile attending the hearings each day are noted such important military officials as the Chief of Staff of the Army and other high brass who take time off each day to sit in the audience as an "aid" to Secretary Stevens to watch the show. They must have little to do in that branch of the service to which they are attached. Maj. Gen. Miles Reber, a witness for Secretary Stevens was flown back from Germany for questioning in the investigation. Staff members of the McCarthy Subcommittee, as well as the Army personnel who accompany Secretary Stevens during the hearings, receive their regular government pay during the hearings, the cost of which is eating rapidly into the \$207,000 available this year for investigations by the subcommittee from which Senator McCarthy has stepped down temporarily as chairman.

But why all this foam and

fury if it is only a matter of whether or not Private Schine failed to get a commission, as Senator McCarthy wanted, and instead was drafted? No cabinet member can formally charge a senator with "perversion of power," even over the case of a single private and not expect an investigation to follow.

It does not follow, however, that an investigation will produce a clear answer, though it may follow that heads may roll and that one side or the other will emerge the stronger politically in his party. But why disturb the peace of a nation with a televised drama of the prima donna, G. David Schine, who went in as a private, and remains a private. Should an examination be made of how some others got their promotions would only lead to further arguments, investigations and hot rod journalism. So Private Schine will probably have to do his time as a private in the Army, notwithstanding his high education, wealth and social standing which most likely is the main reason for his misfortune in having to associate with those unfortunates who were born to be poor.

Need For Water Conservation

Water conservation is an acre by acre, farm by farm proposition.

No half way measures are going to solve the water problem which now plagues Texas. The recent scourge of dust has been a nuisance over the Eastern half of our state but it speaks of tragedy to our soil in West Texas.

These storms are just the beginning. Worse is yet to come unless we get water and soil saving projects underway on a state wide basis immediately. Dams will be useful in this program but they, alone, are not the final answer. Although we waste 85 percent of our annual water supply by downstream floods and field run-offs we need more than dams to hold back the tide.

The practice of every known water and soil conservation measure on the farm level is the first step. Then we need some practical laws which would help control underground and surface supplies in the critical areas of the state. This would help assure a fair distribution of what we have.

In building dams, three types may be necessary; small check dams in the upper tributaries larger storage dams to furnish municipal water and irrigation, and large dual-purpose storage and power dams on the major rivers.

All these steps should be considered in seeking a solution. But it would be futile to consider the steps separately. If only the large dams were built, they would soon be clogged with upstream silt due to the lack of

other conservation methods. Our future water supply will determine whether we continue our industrial development in Texas or succumb to economic stagnation.

At least one major industry locates in the Dallas-Ft. Worth or Houston areas every day — and a minor industry every hour. But for every one industry we gain, two others turn down Texas as a possible site because of the lack of water.

We must take action on our water problem.

Texas Municipal Police School

New Courts Dispense Speedy, Low Cost Justice

In 1953 the Texas Legislature created a system of "small Claims Courts" which appear to be making progress in that type of cases.

Lawsuits formerly requiring a minimum expenditure in excess of \$10.00 for court costs may now be tried for a total cost of only \$2.00 and without the formal pleadings required in other courts. This latter feature results in lower attorney fees when counsel is employed, and cases can be processed without assistance from attorneys if the parties so desire.

Applying to all claims for money debts not exceeding \$50, and for wages not exceeding \$100.00, the new law provides that the justice of the peace shall sit as judges of the Small Claims Courts in their own precincts and counties. Hearings must be informal, with the sole objective of dispensing speedy justice between the parties.

In these new courts legal actions are commenced by the filing of a simple statement made under oath, describing the claim concisely and without technicality. Blank claim forms are supplied by the justice of the peace following filing of the sworn claim citations are used in the same manner as in any other case in Justice Court, and defendants are directed to appear and answer.

If a defendant fails to appear at the proper time and place on the date specified for the hearing on the claim, the judge will enter judgement for the plaintiff for the amount proved to be due him. If the plaintiff does not appear the judge may enter an order dismissing the case.

During the hearing the judge listens to testimony from the plaintiff, the defendant, and from any witnesses produced by either side. He is also empowered to question any witness or party and to summon additional witnesses to the extent necessary "to effect a correct judgment and speedy dispose of such case."

Either party to a suit in Small Claims Court may arrange for trial of the case by a jury by filing a request with the judge at least one calendar day prior to the date set for the hearing. In such event the requesting party must pay a jury fee of \$3.00.

Upon concluding the hearing the judge is directed to "render such judgement as the justice of the case shall require." If the judgement is against the defendant and he fails to pay the same forthwith, execution may be levied against his property as in other justice court cases.

Parties dissatisfied with the judgement may appear to the County Court or County Court at Law in some counties, where the amount in controversy exceeds \$20.00. In such event no further pleadings are required, and the appellate court is required to dispose of the appeal "with all convenient speed."

The Small Claims Courts have been in operation only a short time, as the creating statute became effective on August 26, 1953. Reports indicate however, that these so-called "Poor man's courts" are already proving their worth. They have helped many Texans settle pay disputes and collect wages and salaries due them, and have placed speedy justice within the reach of even the lowest of income groups.

Veterans Administration

Q—I'm a World War II veteran who went back on active duty after Korea. When I did so, I put my National Service Life insurance premiums under waiver. I've just been separated and I understand that the waiver will last for 120 days after my separation. However, I plan to go back into service again before the 120 days are up. Will I have to apply for another waiver of premiums?

A—No, there will be no need for you to apply for another waiver. So long as you re-enter service within the 120 days period, VA will continue to waive your premiums while you are on active duty—just as though you never had left the service.

Q—I am the widow of a World War I veteran, and I have applied for a VA pension. At the present time, I am in a nursing home. My nephew is paying the expenses. In figuring my annual income, for pension purposes, must I include the cost of keeping me at the nursing home?
