GRASS ROOTS OPINION

EL DORADO, Kans., Times: "A dime out of every tax dollar goes to pay interest charges alone (low interest, too) on the national debt. Maybe some of the rank and file folks ought to worry a bit about that debt, and what it means to all of us as a burdened obligation and inflationary influence, as well as Treasury officials and a few others."

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Ye Towne Cryer: "There is nothing wrong with the abundant life which has become prevalent in this country in the past decade or so, but with it has come a feeling on the part of many — that the world owes them a living and that somehow they will be taken care of."

PAMPA, Texas, Daily News: "Government schools must of necessity work toward mediocrity, regimentation, and mendacity. It is only in the independent school where opportunity still remains for the individual to dare to be what he is, himself."

ODESSA, Texas, American: "Little Miss Muffett sat on a tuffet eating her curds and whey. Along came a spider who sat down beside her and frightened Miss Muffet away. We are looking for the spider. It seems the government, in the role of the hungry Miss Muffet has been in the process of squatting on its extended bureaucracy and endeavoring to consume all the extra curds and whey in the country."

WE MUST HAVE ROADS

Gov. Allan Shivers in his message to the legislature this year says that Texas must have more money for highways. He urges an increase in motor fuel taxes for this purpose.

A bill immediately was introduced in the legislature by Rep. Charles Murphy of Houston and W. W. Glass of Jacksonville calling for constitutional amendment which would dedicate all such revenue to highway work. Later Murphy on his own introduced a bill calling for a 2 cent increase in gasoline and a comparable increase on LPG and diesel fuel. If a motor fuel tax is imposed by the 54th legislature, it will be the first since 1929.

There have been other taxes on the automobile user, however, which have been both added and increased since that time. Unfortunately none of these taxes goes directly back to his own benefit as the fuel tax does.

The Murphy-Glass amendment is strongly supported by the Texas Good Roads Association because it would dedicate all future motor fuel revenues to highway building. Little disagreement can be found with this principle, especially in view of the tremendous demands now being made upon our highway system. We do not have to look far to see where our road money is going. For the most part it goes directly under rubber to provide safer and more economical operation of our motor vehicles.

We are today living in a motorized economy. We have within the last half dozen years gone from the family car to the two car family. The automobile no longer is a luxury. We must have it in every thing we do.

During the last two years the highway situation in our own country has become acute. We are using more automobiles and trucks in our daily living than we ever dreamed of even a half-dozen years ago. Our own businessmen have gone to Austin and were told by the highway department that there isn't enough money to get the job done. Meantime our automobile population and our human population is continuing to grow.

Accordingly there will be a lot of serious consideration given to the suggestion by the Texas Good Roads Association that future motor fuel revenues be spent for the modernization of our highway system. Texas now has the best highway system in the United States—it must keep it.

Good highways are money savers and as such, they must have the support of everyone because everyone benefits from them. Give this a lot of study and then tell your legislator what you think of it.

TOO CONVENIENT

Dorothy Thompson recently discussed the closed shop and the union shop. She wrote: "It is extremely convenient for union leaders if every worker is compelled to join a union to get or hold a job. It is convenient for many employers to have a 'closed shop,' and bargain collectively without possibility of minority dissent."

"The trouble is that it is too convenient. It reduces the workers' status, more than ever, to that of a commodity to be bought and sold en bloc. It reduces the possibility of creating a more genuinely free and democratic industrial system. It freezes and creates a monopoly of the status quo."

Seventeen states have adopted right-to-work laws, under which workers can join or not join a labor organization, as they choose, without fear or reprisal by either employers or unions. There is no more fundamental or important right.

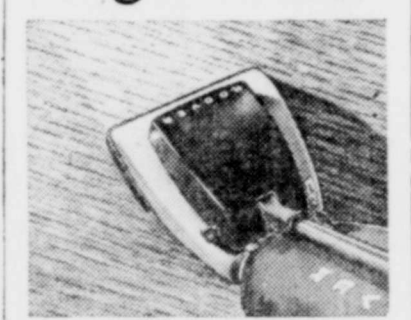
The Iowa is the first of its kind to visit the Mediterranean in several years.

INCOME TAX FACTS No. 1 New Federal Tax Law May Save You Money

The "Ides of March" will no longer hold any terror for the average taxpayer, but the new tax deadline of April 15 can be just as alarming if you don't start early to prepare your federal income tax return.

To help you get started this newspaper is publishing a series of articles prepared with the help of the national and state organizations of certified public accountants. Use these articles, together with the instructions that come with your federal income tax forms, to guide you in making out your return.

Most taxpayers report their income for the calendar year on a cash basis, and the new rules are explained here as they apply to these typical taxpayers. Anyone who uses a different fiscal year or reports on an accrual basis should check the official instructions to see how he is affected.

Completely Revised Tax Rules

Last August the Internal Revenue Code was completely overhauled by Congress and thousands of changes were made affecting taxpayers. It is estimated that every year a million taxpayers overpay their income taxes by a total of more than \$100,000,000. More millions of taxpayers pay less tax than is due, making them liable for assessments, interest and possible penalties.

With the many changes of the new law there is even greater danger of mistakes this year unless you read the instructions and prepare your tax return with great care. This is a good reason for starting long before April 15. Here's another:

You May Get a Refund

If you find that more tax has been withheld from your wages than you actually owe, you will be entitled to a refund of the difference. The sooner you file your return, the sooner you are likely to get your refund.

What are the chances of a refund? Well, your tax will probably be less because of the reduction of approximately 10% in tax rates since last year, but you have been getting the advantage of this re-

duction all through the year in the form of reduced withholdings from your pay.

Many newly authorized deductions, however, may cut down your tax bill below the amount that has been withheld, thus entitling you to a refund.

New Savings This Year

Here are some of the changes, to be discussed in later articles, which may cut your tax this year:

1. More single persons are entitled to "head-of-household" status.
2. Medical expenses are deductible to a greater extent.
3. Certain health and accident benefits are not counted as income.
4. The \$600 exemption applies to various dependents not previously eligible.
5. A special deduction of as much as \$600 for child care is now available in some cases to working wives, widowed and divorced persons.
6. Tax may be reduced by new credits for dividends and retirement income.

7. Salesmen and other employees who travel may benefit from new rules on expense deductions.

8. New provisions may benefit anyone who bought or sold a home in 1954.

9. Farmers get new deductions for soil and water conservation expense.

10. Businesses are helped by liberalized depreciation rules and other changes.

Be sure to read the official instructions. You can also get help from the Internal Revenue Service, which urges you to consult only qualified advisors.

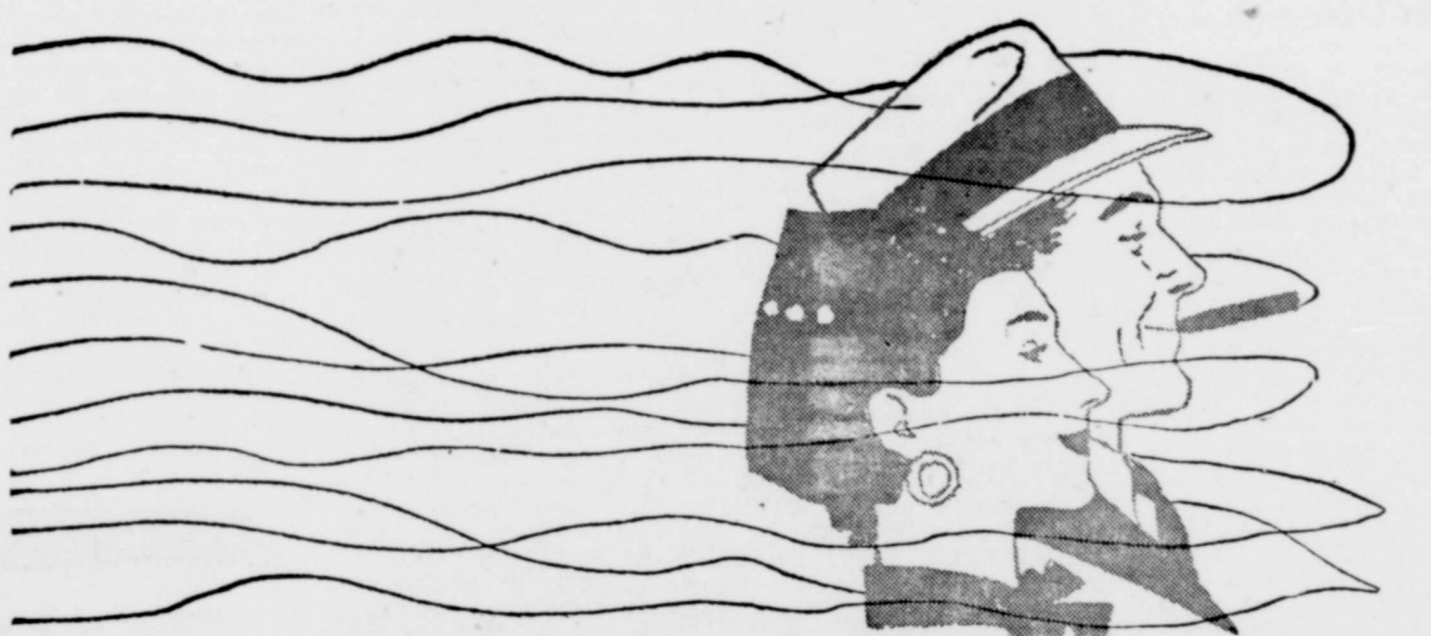

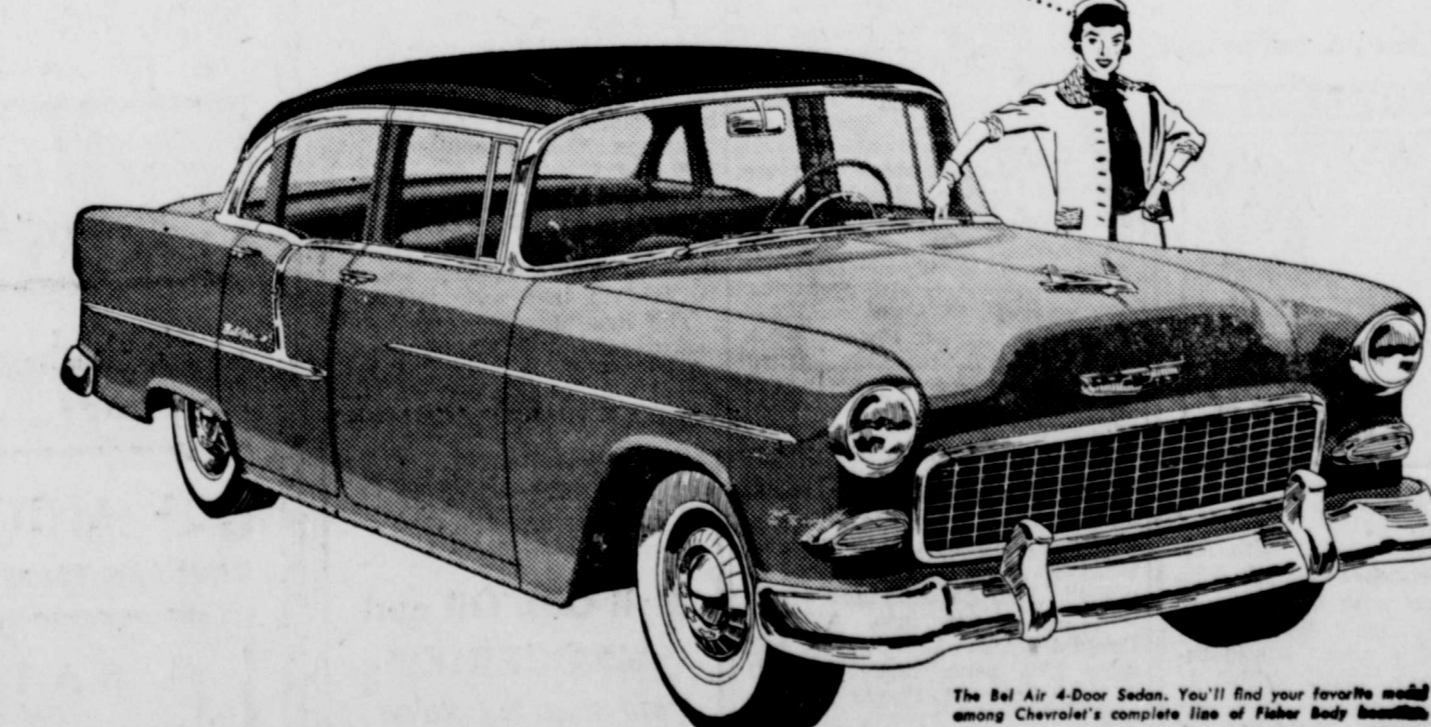
