WE MUST HAVE ROADS

Gov. Allan Shivers in his message to the legislature this year says that Texas must have more money for highways. He urges an increase in motor fuel taxes for this

A bill immediately was introduced in the legislature by Rep. Charles Murphy of Houston and W. W. Glass of Jacksonville calling for constitutional amendment which would dedicate all such revenue to highway work. Later Murphy on his own introduced a bill calling for a 2 cent increase in gasoline and a comparable increase on LPG and diesel fuel. If a motor fuel tax is imposed by the 54th legislature, it will be the first since 1929.

There have been other taxes on the automobile user, however, which have been both added and increased since that time. Unfortunately none of these taxes goes directly back to his own benefit as the fuel tax does.

The Murphy-Glass amendment is strongly supported by the Texas Good Roads Association because it would dedicate all future motor fuel revenues to highway building. Little disagreement can be found with this principle, especially in view of the tremendous demands now being made upon our highway system. We do not have to look far to see where our road money is going. For the most part it goes directly under rubber to provide safer and more economical operation of our motor vehicles.

We are today living in a motorized economy. We have within the last half dozen years gone from the family car to the two car family. The automobile no longer is a luxury. We must have it in every thing we do.

During the last two years the highway situation in our own country has become acute. We are using more automobiles and trucks in our daily living than we ever dreamed of even a half-dozen years ago. Our own businessmen have gone to Austin and were told by the highway department that there isn't enough money to get the job done. Meantime our automobile population and our human population is continuing to grow.

Accordingly there will be a lot of serious consideration given to the suggestion by the Texas Good Roads Association that future motor fuel revenues be spent for the modernization of our highway system. Texas now has the best highway system in the United States-it must keep it.

Good highways are money savers and as such, they must have the support of everyone because everyone benefits from them. Give this a lot of study and then tell your legislator what you think of it.

TOO CONVENIENT

Dorothy Thompson recently discussed the closed shop and the union shop. She wrote: "It is extremely convenient for union leaders if every worker is compelled to join a union to get or hold a job. It is convenient for many employers to have a 'closed shop,' and bargain collectively without possibility of minority dissent.

"The trouble is that it is too convenient. It reduces the workers' status, more than ever, to that of a commodity to be bought and sold en bloc. It reduces the possibility of creating a more genuinely free and democratic industrial system. It freezes and creates a monopoly of the status quo."

Seventeen states have adopted right-to-work laws, under which workers can join or not join a labor organization, as they choose, without fear or reprisal by either employers or unions. There is no more fundamental or important right.







INCOME TAX FACTS No. I-New Federal Tax Law May Save You Money

(This is one of a series of articles on income tax changes. The articles are based on information provided by the American Institute of Accountants and the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants.)

The "Ides of March" will no longer hold any terror for the average taxpayer, but the new tax deadline of April 15 can be just as alarming if you don't start early to prepare your federal income tax return.

of certified public accountants. Use form of reduced withholdings from these articles, together with the instructions that come with your federal income tax forms, to guide you in making out your return.

Most taxpayers report their income for the calendar year on a cash basis, and the new rules are explained here as they apply to these typical taxpayers. Anyone reports on an accrual basis should check the official instructions to see how he is affected.

Completely Revised Tax Rules

Last August the Internal Revenue Code was completely overhauled by Congress and thousands of changes were made affecting taxpayers. It is estimated that every year a million taxpayers overpay their income taxes by a total of more than \$100,000,000. More milions, of taxpayers pay less tax than is due. making them liable for assessments interest and possible penalties.

With the many changes of the new law there is even greater danger of mistakes this year unless you read the instructions and prepare your tax return with great care. This is a good reason for starting long before April 15. Here's another:

You May Get a Refund

If you find that more tax has been withheld from your wages than you actually owe, you will be entitled to a refund of the difference. The sooner you file your return, the sooner you are likely to get your What are the chances of a re

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Higher Profit From Certified Planting Seed

ability protection.

Guaranteed purity, higher germination and boosted crop yield await farmers who buy and plant certified seed this year. Germination and yields of course are dependent upon the available moisture, but farmers can not afford to gamble with seed of questionable quality, says B. T. Haws, county agent.

Certified seed usually are the best seed of a particular variety available. This seed with a 'blue tag" comes from fields that have been inspected during the growing season, properly handled at harvest, cleaned and tested for purity and germination. Only after the seed has passed certain rigid standards does the State Department of Agriculture issue a blue "certificate" tag for each

Certified seed may cost slightly more, but the added cost is good insurance, Haws says. He advises farmers to buy now, plan ing seed for this year's crops. Seed supplies generally are adequate but last minute shoppers may find local stocks depleted and forced to plant whatever seed is available.

If the planting seed has not been chemically treated for seedborne and seedling diseases, farmers find this practice profitable and added insurance against poor stands and plant losses during early growth.



are for convenience outlets in kitchen, laundry, and dining areas. At least two appliance circuits are needed in a small house. Large houses require three or more. No. 12 wire is the small-est that should be used.
