Seaborn P. Collins, six foot plus, Seaborn P. Collins, now of Las Cruces, N. M., national commander of The American Legion, comes to Texas for his official term as head of more than 3,000 Legionnaires and Auxiliary members, Sunday, March 6, and returns through the following Wednesday, March 9.

Burkburnett C-C Sponsors Poultry Tour and Clinic

The Burk Burnett Chamber of Commerce sponsored a poultry tour Tuesday, March 1st. Making the tour from Burk Burnett were B. A. Farris, High School Agriculture Teacher and Tommie Oglethorpe, manager of the C. of C. B. T. Haws, County Agent of Wichita Falls helped conduct the tour. Fourteen other interested persons joined in on the tour.

The first stop was Barron Bros. Poultry Processing Plant in Wichita Falls, where the group was shown one of the most modern plants of its kind in the Southwest.

After leaving the processing plant the group proceeded to Burk Burnett to the Ross Reagan chicken ranch and visited the laying flock where Mr. Wornelli gave a culling demonstration. Mr. Wornelli is from the poultry husbandry Dept. of Texas A. & M. College.

The next stop on the tour was at the J. J. Dwyer farm where the group observed the caged layer program that Mr. Dwyer has had in operation for about one year.

The final stop was at the Burk Gin and Feed Mill where the group observed their feed grinding process.

Tuesday night a poultry clinic was held at the American Legion Hall, with sixteen in attendance.

C-C Agriculture Committee at Work

The Agriculture committee of the Chamber of Commerce, with Virgil Brookshear, chairman, has a very comprehensive program of work outlined. Several sub-committees with appropriate chairmen and workers have been formed.

1. Stockyards Committee: Arrange and conduct trips to stockyards by business men and farmers for the purpose of observing livestock commission operation, feed lot operations, packer-buyer operations, slaughtering operations, grading and pricing of meat and price trends and price cycles of all types of animals.

2. Farm Home Improvement: To promote improvement in farm home living conditions by utilization of spare time labor applied to materials and equipment.

4. Dairy Committee: Feed for profit clinics, breed for profit clinics and a dairy tour.

5. Poultry Committee: Feeding and management, grading and marketing, and Poultry Show.

6. Farm Youth Committee: Promote effective participation of farm youth in 4-H Club and FFA studies; promote and conduct youth shows and demonstrations; study advisability, and procedure to gradually change from prize animal show to feed for profit show.

7. Publicity Committee: Publicize various committee activities and publicize individuals and families doing a good job on any family size farm.

8. Rural Community Committee: Secure use of abandoned one and two room school houses as community meeting places; promote interesting educational meetings by use of motion pictures, slides, and lectures; promote the "old Friday night" type of literary meeting and promote use of circulation library.

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

RED HOOK, N. Y., Advertiser: "A Rhinebeck woman has been arrested on a charge of refusing to yield a telephone line in a fire emergency. It is good to know that there is a law protecting the status of the telephone as an emergency weapon."

INTERNATIONAL FALLS, Minn., Daily Journal: "The pay-your-own-way spirit which still dominates a sizeable portion of our agricultural population was dramatically demonstrated—when Minnesota's dairy farmers repaid an 18 year old debt of \$20,000 to the state treasury—thereby demonstrating a respect for public funds that is all too rare in our times."

BROWNSVILLE, Pa., Telegraph: "Life is rapidly becoming more and more predictable. Economists are forever charting curves on the unemployment level for next August; insurance companies foretell life expectancy with astonishing accuracy; — widget manufacturers predict, with a small margin of error, how many widgets the public will buy in 1963. All this makes life more secure but less interesting, since the unexpected adds zest to the stew."

FAST AND LOOSE

Asked in his press conference for his opinion of the Democratic income tax reduction bill, cutting each taxpayer's obligation by \$20, and adding \$20 to the exemption for each dependent, President Eisenhower expressed vigorous objection to the reduction and resentment of the fact that it is presented as an amendment to the corporation and excise tax bill and not "on its own merits".

In his lengthy reply to the question, the President recognized that "any proposal to reduce taxes is, of course, popular," but declared with some heat that since the Government "is still spending somewhat more than it takes in, we are reaching some kinds of heights in fiscal irresponsibility."

We can only agree with the President that, under the present continuance of deficit spending, a reduction in taxes is illogical, unwise and carries with it a certain political aroma.

But, whether or not we get this token reduction [which would save the average taxpayer but little, at a loss of \$2,800,000,000 to the Treasury] this Democratic maneuver brings two points into sharp focus. First Eisenhower pledge to balance the budget is still, in spite of all the pruning thusfar, a pious hope. Second, the opposition, with the notable exception of Senator Harry Byrd, Representative Martin Dies and a handful of other patriots, was jumping the gun on the President's hint of a Republican tax cut in 1956 contained in his budget message of last January.

As it looks from here, the only protection against such "fiscal irresponsibility" by either party is legislation to prevent our law-givers from appropriating money the Treasury hasn't got—a type of legislation to which the Congress has thusfar given the back of its hand.

A HOLE IN THE GROUND

Under Federal law, oil producers are given what is called a "depletion allowance," which is a credit that is applied against their taxes. And the reason why Congress after Congress has renewed the allowance, and why President after President has approved it, is found in something that happened near Bakersfield, California in mid-January.

At that time and place, one of our leading oil companies abandoned the world's deepest well at 21,482 feet. Some \$2,250,000 had been spent on the venture since it was started in 1951. The well was abandoned because it had turned out dry. All the drillers got was some potentially valuable experience in using modern rotary equipment at great depths. They got no oil at all.

This well was unusual because of its size and cost. But the experience is a common one in the wildcatting and producing end of the oil industry. The great majority of wells prove to be dry and worthless. Others may produce oil but in too small a quantity to be commercially feasible. The chances of making a really big strike are long indeed. And even the best of wells become worn out and empty in time.

In other words, looking for oil is an exceedingly risky business. But that search must go on if our insatiable appetite for oil products is to be met and our known reserves are to be held at high levels. And it can only go on if the men and companies involved see a chance of making a profit if they succeed.

There is the reason for the depletion allowance. It is necessary to the existence of the kind of oil industry this country must have.

DEVILED TUNA AND SPAGHETTI

- 2 (7 oz.) cans tuna fish
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 (8 oz.) package spaghetti
- 6 stuffed olives
- 5 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon paprika
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1 teaspoon prepared mustard
- 2 1/2 cups milk
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1/2 cup dry bread crumbs

Drain tuna. Flake into large pieces. Cover eggs with cold water. Bring to boil. Reduce heat and cook gently for 10 minutes. Cool immediately under cold running water. Peel and slice. Cook spaghetti in lots of boiling salted water until tender. Drain. Cut olives in slices. Start oven 350°F. Melt 3 tablespoons butter or margarine. Stir in flour, salt, paprika, pepper, Worcestershire sauce, mustard. Gradually add milk, and cook, stirring constantly until sauce is smooth and has thickened. Stir in lemon juice. Add tuna, spaghetti and olives. Spoon into medium casserole. Melt remaining butter. Stir in bread crumbs. Edge casserole with bread crumbs and arrange egg slices in circle next to crumbs. Bake 25 minutes. Makes 4 servings.

Soil Conservation

Farm ponds for livestock use have been completed at Dan Hofack farm near Berry and the J. D. Van farm near Friberg. Otis is constructing a farm pond on his farm near Thrift this year.

The Hofack and Van ponds are enlargement and opening of old structures that not have sufficient depth storage to cope with last years prolonged drought.

Farm ponds that are constructed and in balance the watershed that produce runoff will furnish a dependable source of livestock water. recreational features of a farm pond should not be overlooked. 150 to 300 lbs of fish can be taken annually from a pond of one to two acres surface area and at least a 10 foot depth. The majority of the ponds constructed in this area in past few years range from 20 feet in depth.

Farmers interested in stocking ponds should contact the soil conservation service which is located in the National Bank building in Burkburnett.

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INCOME TAX FACTS No. 3

Not All Your Income Goes In Your Tax Form

(This is one of a series of articles on income tax changes. The articles are based on information provided by the American Institute of Accountants and the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants.)

Taxpayers make more mistakes in listing their income than any other type of error, according to a survey made by the Internal Revenue Service. It is important to know what to include and what NOT to include. Look at this list and see if you can tell which should be listed as income on your federal income tax return:

Dividends from an insurance policy.

Pay of armed forces enlisted men while in combat or while hospitalized from combat service. Social Security benefits.

Gifts.

Payments received under Workmen's Compensation laws.

The answer is that none of the above should be listed as taxable income! There are other forms of exempt income, too, which you will find listed in the official tax instructions. Some of them are:

Other Exempt Income
Inheritances and bequests (the estate may be taxed but not the recipient).

First \$200 of monthly pay of armed forces officers while serving or hospitalized from active service in a combat zone.

Railroad Retirement Act benefits. Certain health and accident benefits.

Damages awarded by a court or paid out of court for personal injuries.

Government payments and benefits to veterans and their families, except nondisability retirement pay and interest on

terminal leave bonds. Interest on state and municipal bonds.

Parsons and Prizes

The rental value of a parsonage furnished to a minister of the gospel is not taxable income; the law now adds that a rental allowance paid to him for this purpose is also exempt.

If you won a prize, watch this fine distinction: the prize is taxable if you were required to exert even the slightest effort to earn it; on the other hand, if it was made in recognition of scientific, literary or other achievement and you were selected without any action on your part the prize is considered a gift and you are not taxed on it.

Most scholarships and fellowships are exempt, unless they are paid as compensation for services, such as teaching and research.

Be sure to read the official instructions. You can also get help from the Internal Revenue Service, which urges you to consult only qualified advisers.

The Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow in our school is Noladene Arndt.

She received the highest score in a written examination which tested the homemaking knowledge and attitudes of the senior girls in the graduating class. She will be entered in competition to name this state's candidate for the title of all American Homemaker of Tomorrow. She will also receive a golden ward pin, cook books for herself and the school.

The national winner in this search conducted among 187,000 young women in 8,000 of the nation's public, private and parochial high schools will be named April 21 at an American table fete in Philadelphia.

General Mills is the sponsor of this program designed to assist schools in building in young women a deeper appreciation and understanding of the American home and the personal qualities necessary to successful homemaking.

A scholarship of \$1,500 will be awarded each state winner, and she will receive a trip with her school advisor to Washington, D. C., colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Philadelphia. The school will receive a set of Encyclopedia Britannica.

The scholarship of the young woman named All American Homemaker of Tomorrow will be increased to \$5,000.

Each girl who took the test received a 24-page homemaking guide which will assist her in pursuing the career of homemaking.

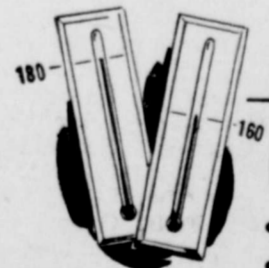
