RECOVERING HUMAN ASSETS

Major advances in the re-training of the physicially handicapped came after World War II when special interest was taken in the rehabilitation of disabled war weterans. Thousands were re-trained for new jobs, jobs they were able to perform fully, despite their injuries in the Officer Procurement Offiwar, and for which they had had no previous training.

One of the most interesting examples is the Joseph under 12. Bulova School of Watchmaking in Jackson Heights, Long Island, New York, set up in 1945 to train veterans to be watchmakers. Paraplegics, amputees and other veterans were trained in the school without any fees whatever, so they could resume a normal place in the world and maintain themseives by their own skills.

In the ten years since the school began, 465 men have graduated. Each one of them fully trained and is now working. Until 1961, the graduates were 39 percent veterans, but now the school is admitting all disabled who will benefit from the ourses, veteran of civilian.

Under the regulations of the school, the applicant is given an aptitude test. If the test shows that he has an aptitude for watchmaking, he is then accepted at the school. There are no fees involved. All costs for training







Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District News

Applying irrigation water at the proper time and in proper amounts may greatly influence yields. Most crops take about 40 percent of their available moisture from the top foot of soil and time of irrigation should be determined by the available moisture content in the top 12 inches

A simple way of making field determination of available water in the soil is to dig in the top foot and squeeze a handful of the soil into a ball. If the ball crumbles, it has less than 50 percent of water in the soil it is capable of holding and water should be applied as soon as possible. Plants will not be wilting but should not be allowed to wilt for maximum growth. Soil temperatures taken at Iowa Park were 64 degrees at 7 a. m. March 14th, succeeding days at the same time of day were 68, 60, 56, 64, 60, and on
