BACK IN 1925

Remember the prices that obtained back in 1925? You could get a new small car for \$500. You could get a cigar for a nickel. And you could buy a reliable watch for one dollar.

Those days are gone, no doubt forever. But there are a few-a very few-commodities in general use which still sell at around the 1925 price.

Gasoline, the oil industry's principal product, is one of them. Exclusive of the taxes, over which the industry has no control, and which are up 250 percent, gasoline measured by the barometer of performance, it cost substantially less-for two gallons of today's motor fuel does the work that required three in that earlier era.

Various forces have helped to bring this about. For one, consumption is far greater, and the more we use of anything, generally speaking, the cheaper the price. For another, the oil industry has always been a leader in scientific research designed to produce new products, better products, and lower priced products. And for still another, intense competition is a hallmark of the oil industry, in refining, selling and every other phase of opera-

HAY - HAY!

While there are no records to prove the point, we would guess that it rained the day the first neolithic farmer harvested the first experimental hay crop to nourish his mastodon-or whatever it was he kept in his barn, through the winter.

At least the wet-weather precedent for the having seasons seems to have been established a long time ago, and continues to plague today's otherwise modernized farmers. But, at long last, there seems to be a practical and economic means of ending the annual weather-worry, and at the same time preventing loss of nutrition in hay-

This latest boon to the agriculturist is the brain-child of a Miami, Fla. businessmen, who has developed all steel hay drying wagons that may be towed into fields for mechanical loading, and which operate in a train of six wagons. These wagons have floors of expanded metal, a diamond pattern wheeling steel grid that is lightweight strong and freely admitts the flow of warm circulating air from the generators. Unlike the wooden floors of earlier hay-drying wagons, which had to be replaced every three years, the expanded metal is immune to rot and mildew. Thus, it is also an ideal material for the construction of ventilating trunks in hay lofts. Incidentally, with those six wagons you can remove about 60 percent of the moisture from 30 tons of hay in 12 hours.

And in case you live in town, and don't have any hay to dry, and are wondering what all this is to you, we need only suggest you consider whether the farmer's prosperity, will be mighty glad to see those new expanded metal hay-wagons at work.
