#### KEEPING OUR CARS RUNNING

At the beginning of the year, it was widely forecast that sales of passenger cars would total 5,500,000 in 1955. Now there is reason for believing that this was too modest a figure, that sales may be as much as a million

There are 58,000,000 cars in the country now. In 1956 qualified experts think, there will be more than 80,000,000. That speaks well for the vigor and productive ability

of the motor industry. It speaks equally well for the vigor and productive ability of another industry without whose work not a single car could operate, much less 80,000. That industry is oil, the producer of the incredible quantities of fuels and lubricants that keep our cars running.

To find oil is a very risky proposition, most wells turn out dry and worthless. On top of that, oil wells depreciate every gallon removed from any well brings nearer the day when it will be exhausted and must be replaced. And that is why oil producers are given the much-discussed much-misunderstood depletion allowance. This allowance which applies to production only and to no other phase of the oil industry, is 271/2 percent of the gross income of the property, with the qualification that it must be limited to an amount equal to 50 percent of the net income. And it is allowed not to give producers any favors, but to help compensate for inevitable depreciation of existing properties, and to encourage the costly search for new ones.

#### EIGHT EVERY MINUTE

The period from April 30 to May 7 is to be celebrated as National Baby Week. We don't know just why this promotion and observation is necessary, since, without any Federal supports, at any percentage of parity, we are producing bumper crops of infants. Production for 1954, which figure has just been officially decided on, totalled 4,076,000 new citizens. This is an all-time high, exceeding last year's record-breaking births by 105,000.

But, while we don't suppose the National Baby Week festivities have much impact on parental intentions they do point out a fact of American business that is without parallel in this world, and without precedent in recorded history. That is the active concern of commerce, industry and agriculture over the patter of tiny footsteps. Great industries that provide his lordship with clothing and toiletries, food and furniture vie with one another for a toothless smile. Truck and fruit farmers study and toil to produce that improved garden-sass that will admit them to the nobility of baby growers.

"It only takes one baby to change the pattern of life for a whole household," says Dan Gerber, of Fremount, Mich., pioneer in providing special foods for these special people. "And when they arrive at the rate of 11,167 a day, as they did last year, and all of them hungry, a lot of people have a lot more to do today than they did yesterday It makes you wonder, when you think of how many of these baby-tending jobs business has taken over, how

Grandma ever raised a family. What ever happened anyway to the "race suicide" we were worrying about only a few years ago. As of National Baby Week, 1955, it looks as if babies were here to stay.
