Officers Need Public Support

Never has there been a time in Cochran County history when the law enforcement officers were more in need of support from the people

feel on their law enforcement agency. If they have little respect, the time and place to show it is at the polls during election time. Or, if necessary, thru a complaint filed with the proper authorities.

But when the public overwhelmingly endorses the Sheriff Department and its efforts, by electing the Sheriff by a large margin to another term of office, it should bear out that respect by upholding the officers in court.

This does not mean nor does it even hint that innocent men should be convicted. When evidence is not conclusive, the jury not only has a right, it has a duty to turn the defendant loose.

But when a decision depends upon the word of a defendant or of an ambitious lawyer, versus the word of a group of officers who made the arrest, it seems rather foolish to publicly slap the officer in the face by indicat-

Last week a local jury heard a man admit to having been drinking, admit to having suggested to a companion that he'd better throw beer and whiskey out of the car because law officers were following him. He asserted a local law officer stuck a gun in his stomach and that another swore at him. Not only is neither one substantiated but the man who reportedly swore at him is known not to use that kind of language, even in the most trying moments That can be substantiated by those who do business with

It was clearly an effort of mudslinging and it paid off. The man was freed.

This isn't the only experience of this kind. Local officers have had trouble in making the merest traffic violations stick. The officer writes a ticket for speeding and all the defendant has to do is say, "I'm Not Guilty." If the officer can't produce a dozen bona fide witnesses who say the man was speeding, they turn him loose.

The matter is relatively unimportant to most persons. They maintain it really makes no difference. But here's where the difference comes in.

The officer soon tires of being publicly insulted and he stops writing tickets or arresting drunk drivers. The law enforcement department soon becomes worthless to us, the taxpaying citizens. Nothing results until someone is killed or maimed thru a violation. Then, it is too late to start thinking about law enforcement or safety regulations.

It's time we made a decision. The people who sat on that jury last week were good citizens. They just evidently didn't believe in their officers enough, to bring a guilty

The next two steps are up to the people.

The first step should belong to the City Commission and the Mayor of Morton, who was foreman of that jury. If they have no confidence in the present marshal they'd better get another. We'd hate to see him go and so would the sheriff's office. The present marshal has posted an excellent record of cooperation with the sheriff's office. That sort of cooperation is badly needed. There is no point

Beparately. Together they can accomplish a lot more. Nevertheless, step one, if the Commission doesn't have confidence in the marshal, they'd better get another.

Step two is up to you. If you're not satisfied with the sheriff's office then get a new one when election time comes. But if you continue to vote for the present officers, it's about time you supported them.
