GRASS ROOTS OPINION

EMPORIA, Kans., Gazette: "In this great land of the free and home of the suckers there always is the desire to get something 'at wholesale.' Recently many Kansas towns have been flooded with so-called 'wholesale' catalogs. These 'wholesale' houses are trying to bamboozle the public into thinking they are offering something for nothing. You get just what you pay for. Moreover the merchandise is likely to be cheap 'seconds.,

NASHVILLE, ARK., News: "The Chattanooga Times, showed that Tennessee since TVA has skidded in population, farm production, retail sales, payrolls, manufacturing output, where her neighbors without the burden of such fraud, have pushed ahead in economics. In effect, socialism damns the giver and the taker.

DILLON, S. C., Herald: "Karl Marx has been dead nearly seventy-five years, but his warped mind and irregular life are responsible for many of the ills that have afflicted the world for the past half century. His false teachings have cost milions of lives.'

MANHEIM, Pa., Sentinel: "It would be a great blessing to humanity and to civilization if governments were under the same compulsion to cut costs as is private enterprise. No matter how large a private business becomes, it is faced with oblivion the moment management becomes lax and inefficient.

FRESH OUTLOOK

It is refreshing to hear of an agricultural group that wants no Government price supports—at any level of parity—and that expects no crop surpluses since it intends selling to the consumer everything it can produce.

These are the thousands of members of the United Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Association, growers, shippers and wholesalers, mostly small business men, who are determined to keep the pulse of their seven billion dollar trade beating lustily without the aid of Uncle Sam's fiscal

But the produce people are no more immune to prob-lems than the rest of us. In recent years, they have seen an unhealthy chunk of their business slipping away to the food freezers and canners. Industry leaders have reacted to the danger signals, and a drive is on to give new meaning to the word "fresh." In fact, it is to become a noun as well as an adjective.

Under the guidance of the newly organized Fresh for Health Foundation, home-makers all over America are continually reminded of the merits of fresh. From the Foundation's test kitchen comes hundreds of new recipes for fresh. Produce men demonstrate on local TV shows across the nation how to buy and prepare fresh. This strictly positive campaign concerns itself with nutritionnot competition.

Last fall, the produce people joined another advocate of self-help, the meat industry, in a highly successful effort to do their own price-supporting by the time-tested, free-enterprise method of making the public want their products. When vegetables and meat get together, the inevitable result is an old fashioned stew. With everyone cooperating, from President Eisenhower on down (he contributed his favorite recipe and served his own stew to prominent guests), the stew idea caught on and the nutritional curve took an upswing. You can expect something similar again this fall.

As taxpayers and as consumers of food, we can all applaud a group that believes in producing food to be eaten—not to be sold to the Government at fictitious prices and stored at further public expense until it's not fit for man or beast. We salute the United Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Association. Theirs is the healthy spirit!.

HOW BIG IS TOO BIG?

The Federal Trade Commission and the Department of Justice are reported working together under the close direction of the White House to give anti-trust legislation some new dentures to protect us against the current wave of mergers and general concentrations of business power. One example is the purchase of the Statler Hotel chain by the Hilton group, which Government lawyers contend enables the combine to dominate convention business over the nation. Another is the wave of bank mergers on which the Justice Department is turning a cold eye.

Federal Trade wants a law to require firms that are that way about each other to tell uncle before they do anything about it, in effect, get a marriage license first. Justice wants Congress to say how big the mergees must be before they have to reveal their intentions.

But we don't seem to be hearing anything about merger of our labor trusts being slightly immoral, threatening to our economy or contrary to the public interest. Even a monopoly of the convention business, badges and soft drinks included, would seem less threatening than control of 15 million workers. And borrowing all our money from one bank could hardly restrain trade more severely than hiring all our workers from one super-union.

Wonder when our eager-beaver regulatory agencies will think of that?
