## \$40,000 Okayed For Burk School

The U. S. Office of Education has made available \$40,000 to the Burkburnett Independent School District to provide classroom facilities for children.

This will pave the way for the start of a proposed primary school building of five classrooms to cost \$62,000 with the site to be about 300 feet east of the east wing of Hardin Grade School. It will be on Avenue F.

Plans have already been drawn by Ray Arnold, Wichita Falls architect, and Ralph Davis, Burk superintendent, said Tuesday construction bids will be asked immediately.

Davis said the proposed building should be ready for occupancy by November. Burkburnett, with its proximity of Sheppard Air Force Base, schools some 275 students whose parents are directly connected with SAFB. Previously, Burkburnett had been classified as a "populus defense and federal installation community" and eligible for federal funds when schools became crowded.

Commissioner of Education S. M. Brownell said some \$16,846,000 has been set aside for school districts in the nation. A preliminary application for federal assistance was made last November by Truman Garland, president of the Burk Board of Education, and a formal application was made 60 days ago.

The school board had to submit plans and specifications to the Housing and Home Finance Agency, Fort Worth. The school board set aside its part of the fund when the budget was made last August.

Dow Estes, veteran dance caller and the man who called for the old quadrille, will again sing out the fancy turns and movements for the teams of horses and riders.

One of the most difficult and dangerous maneuvers of the show of horsemanship comes when the riders, galloping at full speed, cross one another's path in the center of a figure "8." At the center, just enough space is permitted for each rider to cross ahead of the horseman coming at a sharp 35-degree angle, first to the right on the outside trip, and again to the left after the turn toward the inside of the figure.

## NOT JUST "COAL"

This country, as all of us know, is blessed with abundant resources. And Nature was especially lavish in providing us with coal.

Our coal reserves are estimated at 2,000,000,000,000 (two trillion) tons. That is some 40 percent of the world total. Russia is next with about 22 percent, and China third with 18 percent.

But resources mean nothing unless a nation has a means of wisely and efficiently using them. Here our world leadership is enormous. Few industries have seen as much technological progress as has coal in a comparatively brief span of time. Complex machines have replaced the pick and shovel. The miner has become a skilled, highly paid craftsman. And coal isn't "just coal." It is processed and tailored nowadays, to best fit it to the varying needs of many kinds of consumers, home users, electric companies and steel mills, chemical concerns which process it into plastics and cosmetics and many other products, and so on down the list.

This is vastly important in an era in which the demand for energy seems limitless. We need a progressive and profitable coal industry capable of handling any and all requirements of the nations.

## NO COMPARISON

It has been observed that "today's homemaker buys not only food, she buys freedom."

If we keep that phrase in mind, we will be much better able to accurately evaluate the charge that there is too much spread between what the farmer gets for his products and what the housewife pays when she goes to the store.

There is virtually no comparison between the foods we have available today as against those of 20 or 30 years ago. They come frozen, pre-cooked and processed in a wide variety of ways—with, in other words, built-in-kitchen services. That involves a great deal of labor, and the consumer must pay for it—no one else can. In return, she has saved a vast amount of labor that she would otherwise have to perform herself. According to a government study, meal preparation for a family of four can be accomplished in 1.6 hours using ready-to-serve foods—as against 5.5 hours with unprepared foods.

How about the profits taken by food manufacturers and retailers? The facts will come as a great surprise to many consumers. A survey has been made of the 1954 experience of 89 grocery manufacturers and 18 big distributors. It shows that the net profit of processor and distributor combined amounted to only three cents out of each dollar spent for food by the consumer. The ever-at-work force of competition sees to it that we get the best possible value for our money.

## MORE MOUTHS TO FEED

Our 'bumper baby crops' continue. Some 4,000,000 new American citizens are coming into the world each year.

From a business point of view, this means that the potential market for all manner of goods and services is increasing at a tremendous rate. It is one of the reasons why most forecasters are convinced that the American economy far from being mature, will keep on expanding—and keep on bringing better living standards to the masses of people.

At the same time, certain inescapable problems are involved. In addition to the bumper baby crops, our senior citizens are living longer and the indications are that the U. S. population will touch 215,000,000 in 20 years—a jump of about 50,000,000 over the present figure. Producers in all fields have a real job ahead to compensate for that. Meat is a good example, inasmuch as it is a basic item in the eating habits of almost everyone. Our per capita consumption is now running around 154 pounds a year. If that rate is to be maintained, it is estimated that production will have to be increased by as much as 15 percent in the next 15 years and 30 percent in the next 20. The livestock and meat industry is thus faced with a task of the first magnitude.

Luckily, past experience indicates that this industry will find ways and means of doing whatever is needed to meet the demands of the public. It is a significant fact that we've never had a meat shortage in this country—except when government controls discouraged producers on one hand and boomed black markets on the other.

**Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District News**

The third annual Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District Stubble Mulching field day will be held at 10:00 a. m. Friday, June 24 at Punkin Center. Farm Machinery and equipment dealers will demonstrate the equipment with which they can best do stubble mulching.

A 4-H and FFA tractor driving contest has been added to this year's program. Each club and Chapter is being given the opportunity to enter one boy to compete in hitching, efficiency of operation, safety, and parking of tractor and pulling a four wheel trailer. First and second place banners will be awarded.

The Amarillo Station has found that sweep type implements do the best job and plows designed for stubble mulching should meet these requirements.

First, be capable of operation at fixed depths.

Second, have adequate weight and strength for penetration and operation under difficult soil conditions.

Third, be equipped with rolling coulters to cut residues and weeds ahead of the sweeps to prevent clogging.

Fourth, effectively cultivate the soil to kill weeds and volunteer crops.

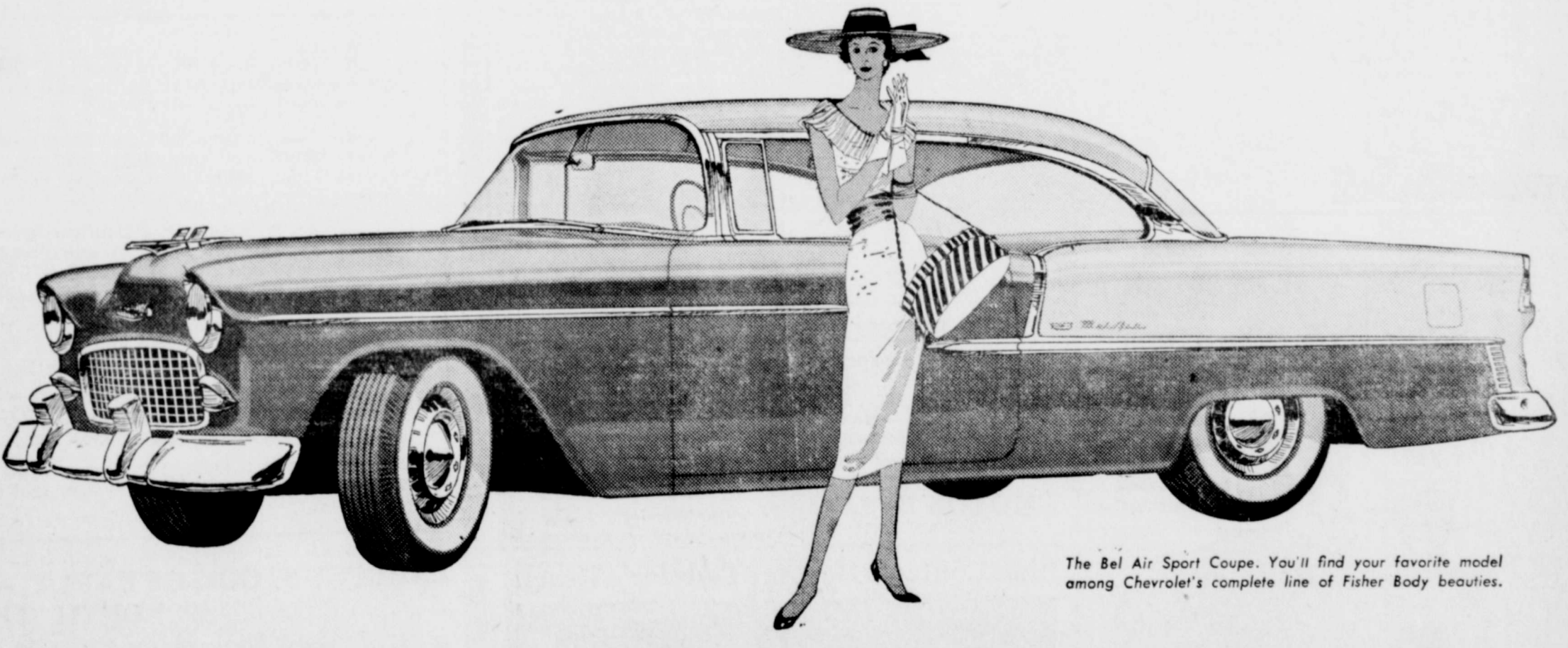
