## GRASS ROOTS OPINION

HATFIELD, Pa., Times: "A \$2,500 auto made by hand would cost \$17,500, and consequently there would be very little automobile production. Because greater productivity per man, we have so much more for so much less, that millions buy things which they could not otherwise afford. With the passing of time, tools and machinery have gradually replaced muscular effort. Today 90 percent of our total energy is mechanical, 10 percent muscular. Without efficient equipment and machinery our workers could produce little more than their grandfathers. Machines don't make a few things for a few rich families. Mass production means mass distribution, mass consumption. More machines mean more goods for more people."

BOOTBAY, Me., Register: "Suppose that each of us was assessed in one lump sum the same amount we now pay in hidden taxes. This lump sum would have a pretty sobering effect, and those of us who clamor for more and more government services and subsidies would be likely to reverse our thinking considerably. The inescapable fact is, that the people have to pay for what their government spends. The amount they pay is going to be the same, whether it is taken from them a cent at a time or in one fat, fearful sum."

PORT GIBSON, Miss., Reveille: "Postal Service News tells the story of the jaybird, looking for nesting material, swooped down on a dilapidated rural mailbox, grabbed a letter in its beak, and flew off. A member of the family startled the bird with its heavy cargo, and the letter was dropped, an envelope containing a pension check! ## GRAB-BAG TACTICS

A house committee has voted in favor of extensive and costly revisions of the social security law, on an immediate basis. It ignored recommendations by Secretary Hobby and others that the proposals should be given thorough study along with full public hearings.

No matter how one feels about broadening the base of social security and increasing benefits, it is difficult to see how hasty action can be justified. To vote major legislation on a hurry-up basis is to invite all kinds of problems and dangers. The only sound procedure is to keep whatever time is needed to study the proposals, let all points of view be heard and considered, weigh the pros and cons, and then vote.

It is reported that there is strong sentiment in the Senate for doing just that. May it prevail—in the interest of the taxpayers, and of the social security beneficiaries now and of the future.

Now that a compulsory social security system, upon which millions of citizens are utterly dependent, has become an established part of our lives, it would be nothing less than criminal to alter it except in a spirit of the highest statesmanship. The integrity of social security is synonymous with the integrity of our money.

## THIS MUCH IS SACRED

We understand from experts that the world's best-known symbol of democratic government, the dome of the US Capitol, rests as firmly on its base of steel girders as the Rock of Gibraltar—even though former President Harry Truman predicted periodically that it would fall on the heads of our law-makers.

Mr. Truman also used to say that it was too big—but nobody suggested making it any smaller. Now however if the House Appropriations committee has its way, Congress will authorize an enlargement to the rest of the building—which should have the same effect. The east front of the Capitol (where the steps are) is to be extended about 40 feet, at a cost of about ten millions, and based on plans submitted half a century ago.

## IT CAN BE DONE

Writing in the American Magazine, Senator Byrd had this to say about federal spending: "Sometimes you may get the discouraged feeling that forces are now loose in the growth of the federal octopus that are beyond the power of mere man to halt."

"I say they can be halted, and reversed—But I might as well warn that it will be done only if you, the taxpayers, make your sentiments known this month and next. Make them known to friends. And make them known to elected officials. You can be more powerful than you realize. Elected officials generally are eager to do what they feel the public wants. The trouble is that the only 'public' they hear from consist of the 'gimme' groups which camp in their anterooms."

If we can't balance the budget in a time of booming business and enormous tax collections, when can it be balanced?

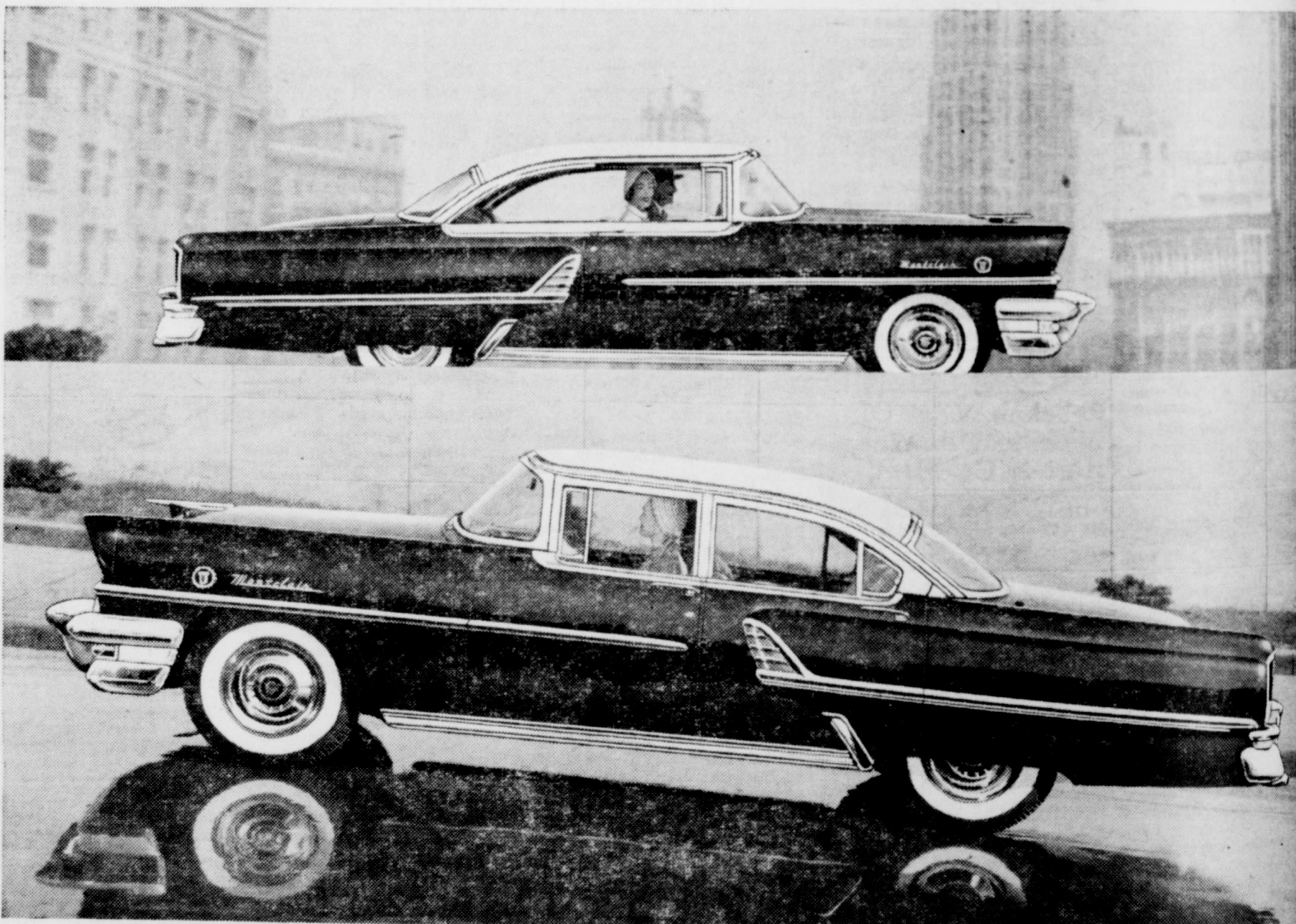

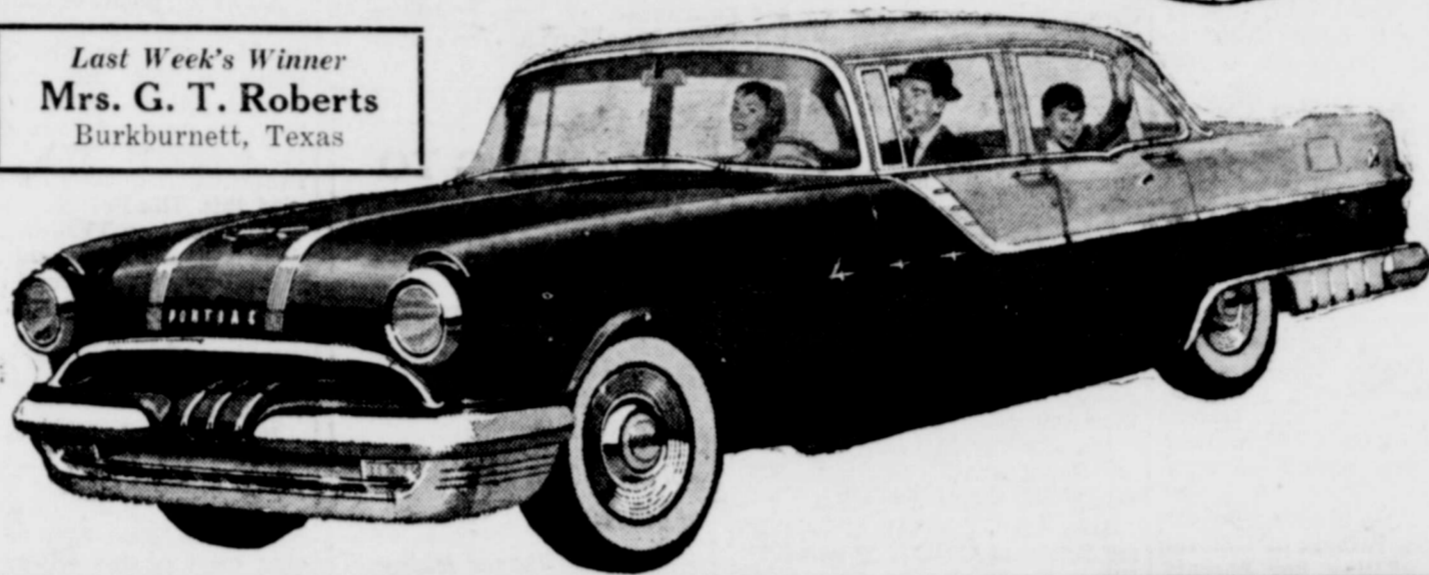

### Pure Politics

Now that opponents of the Dixon-Yates contract have succeeded in having it cancelled, the people should be given a clear conception of what actually underlies the argument about this contract which was intended to supply the Atomic Energy Commission, thru the Tennessee Authority, with electric power.

The whole debate, in and out of Congress, is drenched in the bitter partisan politics and the gates were opened for a flood of demagoguery not exceeded in many years. One doesn't have to have an engineer or a lawyer to understand the reasoning back of these views. For the opponents of the contract have done a potent job of obscuring its provisions and purposes and for the most part, administration officials have been much less effective in presenting their side.

All of the points of controversy were hopelessly befogged in complex and reconcilable sets of statistics. But the main ones are as follows. It was charged that the contract was designed to undermine TVA. Yet the President has categorically denied this. The President does not want to destroy TVA, but neither does he want to expand all over the country its principal tax support while exempt from tax contributions, particularly when private enterprise is equipped and willing to take over the expansion.

It is charged that the cost of Dixon-Yates power would be much greater than if TVA expanded sufficiently to supply it. Yet documented estimates show that most of this difference lies in the fact that TVA wouldn't pay taxes on the revenue, while the Dixon-Yates system would. It is assumed that TVA could charge less for power than can private companies which must pay taxes and interest on their capital, but what the Government would save on one side of the ledger it would lose on the other.

It has been charged that the contract "guarantees" the Dixon-Yates group a handsome profit. The Bureau of the Budget has said, "The only element of profit in this proposal is the return to the sponsors on their \$5,500,000 of equity capital. This would amount to \$495,000 annually. So far as the rest of the investment is concerned, more than \$100,000,000 there is no guarantee."

In listening to further argument on this question, the people should not lose sight of the fundamental principal involved; namely, that it is a question of public power or private power, that is the question of socialism or private enterprise. If they do this, the side issues will not be so confusing. The whole question should be fought out on this basis.

The politicians, of course, do not like to have this issue drawn so clearly. They do not want to be placed in the position of supporting socialism by name; they want to call it something else. They should not be allowed to do so. They should be labeled socialists, just as is the labor Party in Great Britain, because they believe in the same things, and this is true whether they call themselves Democrats or Republicans.

That the whole argument over the Dixon-Yates contract is purely political is quite clear to anyone who will think thru the matter clearly. If it were not, the politicians would simply attack provisions of the contract with which they do not agree on rather than the contract itself. If it were not purely political, they would want only to amend the contract, not cancel it.

There is no mystery about the origin of the Dixon-Yates contract agreement. AEC needed

more power. It would be necessary to build a new power plant since the TVA had no power to spare. If TVA built the plant, Congress would have to appropriate the money and budget would have to be increased. If private enterprise built the plant, Congress would not have to appropriate money and the budget would have to be increased. In the latter case, the taxpayers would carry the load; in the former case, private investors would carry the load.

Dixon and Yates came into picture by express invitation of the Government. The Administration asked for bids on plant necessary to provide electricity needed by the Atomic Energy Commission. The successful bidders. But this was subsequent to Congress having "no" three times to the proposal to permit TVA to spend \$100 million to build another power plant which would be located at Fulton, 80 miles west of the border of the Tennessee River drainage area.

## Timely Hints From County Agent

Pruning plants is risky after July 15th — Light pruning of abelia, summer flowering jasmine, bush honeysuckle and other plants may be done continuously to shape them. Other plants that form a few long-vine like limbs may be "nipped" lightly and continuously.

Mulch — with almost any vegetable matter such as lawn clippings, hay, straw, whole or ground leaves, compost, peat moss or sawdust. Mulches help hold moisture and help keep the soil cool. It helps to hold the rain until it can soak into the soil. Can you put on too much mulch? Yes, do not heap the mulch around trees, shrubs and roses. Had you noticed that aluminum foil is now being advertised as a mulch? It does not improve the texture of the soil like vegetable mulches but does help to save moisture, soil and fertility. One or two inches of vegetable mulch is usually enough.

Insects — Spider mites continue to menace roses and are attacking plants on which they are seldom found. Look underneath pale green or drying leaves or

## Veterans Administration Questions & Answers

Q—Does time spent as a cadet at the U. S. Military Academy at West Point count, in computing my entitlement for Korean GI Bill Training?

A—No. Time spent attending any of the U. S. Service academies including West Point, may not be included, in figuring your GI training entitlement.

Q—About a year ago I was seriously injured while traveling, under orders, to report for induc-

tion into military service. Of course, I never was inducted. My disability is acting up, and I need hospital care. Would I be eligible to go to a VA hospital.

A—You may be eligible for VA hospital care, on the same basis as a veteran with a service connected disability, providing your disability was not the result of your own misconduct.

Q—I am planning to get a GI business loan to be insured, rather than guaranteed, by the VA, what is the maximum rate of interest on insured non-realty loans?

A—The interest may not exceed a three percent discount rate, or an equivalent simple interest rate of 5.7 a year.

Q—I have a Korean GI term insurance policy. At the end of the five year term period, what will I have to do to renew it for another five years?

A—You needn't do anything, except make certain your premiums are paid on time. So long as your policy is in force at end of the term period, it will be renewed automatically.

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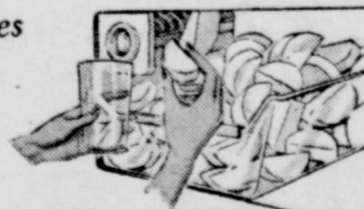

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### "The Caine Mutiny" Unique Realism of South Pacific

Hollywood's production ingenuity has always reached its peak whenever a great cataclysm has to be filmed. New processes, about which the studio is still tight-lipped, were developed. Footage shot at sea while the company was on location in Hawaii forms the backbone of the typhoon sequence. Camera crews deliberately set out to sea in search of storms, and recorded them in color by Technicolor at the risk of their lives.

In the midst of all this fury on the screen in "The Caine Mutiny," Van Johnson as Maryk, MacMurray as Keefer and newcomer Robert Francis as Willie Keith take command of the typhoon-endangered USS Caine away from Captain Queeg, in the person of Bogart, in one of the climactic episodes of a great film based on the Pulitzer prize-winning best-seller by Herman Wouk.

Jose Ferrer plays Lt. Greenwald, the court-appointed and reluctant defense counsel who cold-bloodedly "torpedoes" Bogart in the court martial which follows, in order to save Maryk from the consequences of his "mutiny."

"The Caine Mutiny" typhoon, both in its awesome self and in

consequence of the stormy emotions which it brings to passionate action, enters film history to be long remembered by a movie-going public which has always been fascinated by tremendous happenings against which men are helpless. "The Caine Mutiny" joins such dramas as "San Francisco," with its well-staged shocker of the 1906 San Francisco earthquake and fire; "Gone with the Wind," which depicted the burning of Atlanta; "In Old Chicago," and the Chicago fire; and a man-made and therefore even more spectacular cataclysm, the re-enactment of Pearl Harbor in Columbia's Academy Award-winning "From Here to Eternity."

### Fowl Ticks Are An Unnecessary Drain On Poultry

Poultry heavily infested with fowl ticks becomes unthrifty and may lose weight during the summer months if proper control measures are not followed.

Also commonly known as blue bugs and chicken ticks, these blood sucking insects pose a problem for turkey and chicken raisers during July, August and September, says B. T. Haws, county agent.

They hide in cracks and crevices of the poultry house during the day and appear at night to suck the blood of poultry. On the range ticks repose under the bark of fence posts and trees and in old lumber.

"It's easier to discover the ticks by looking for masses of them in cracks and under loose planks in the poultry house," Haws says. "Usually you don't know they are around until the flock shows marked symptoms of attack."

A spray containing 5 percent

lindane, toxaphene or dieldrin is recommended for fowl tick control. A smaller power or hand sprayer is effective in making application.

Apply the spray to the roofs and interior of poultry houses and coops. Pay particular attention, Haws adds, to cracks, crevices, fence post and trees where ticks may be hiding. Repeated treatments may be necessary.

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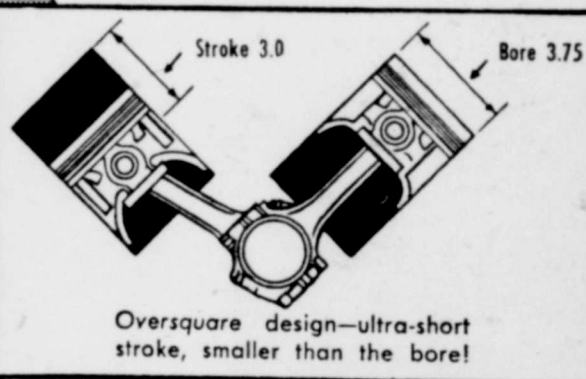

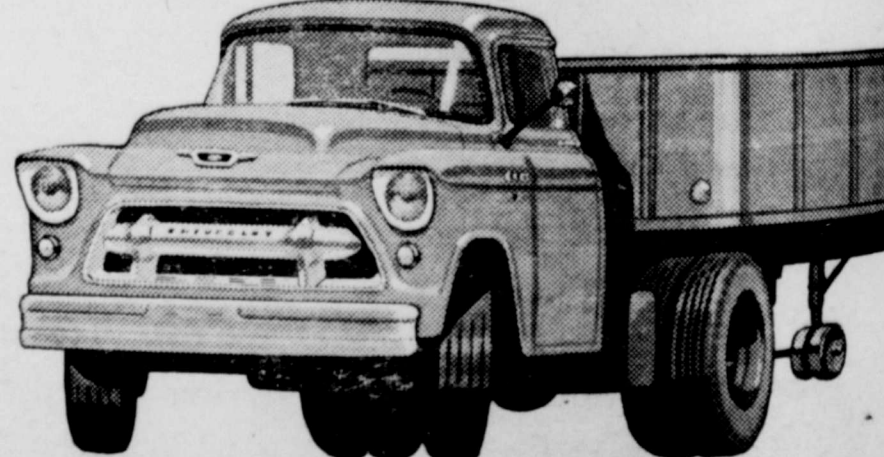
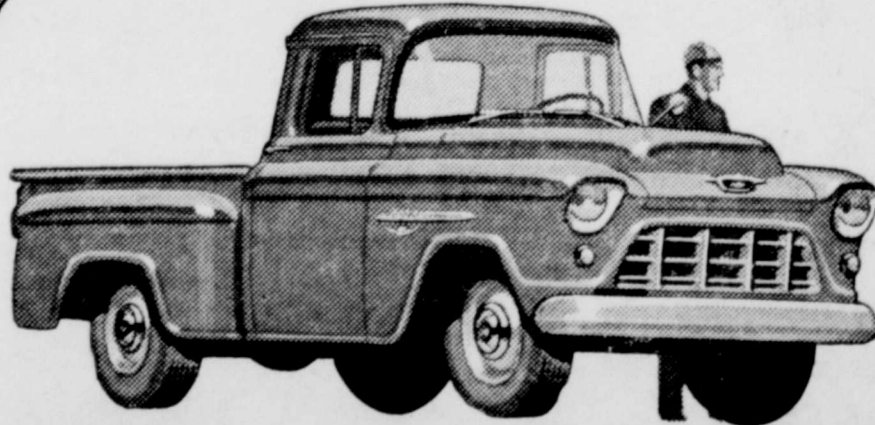
