Free Chest X-Rays At Corner Drug Saturday

Demonstration for Preparing Foods
Freezing, Thursday and Friday
At the Local Texas Electric Offices



Best methods of preparing foods for freezing will be demonstrated in the Texas Electric Service Company office on Thursday and Friday, July 28-29, it was announced by the company manager.

Elizabeth Gunther, TESCO home service advisor, will conduct the demonstrations at 10 a. m. and 2 p. m. She will demonstrate the preparation of foods using the newest materials available for packaging, including cooking of frozen foods.

Gunther will display a food freezer with foods packed according to four classifications.

The picnic shelf will include sandwiches, meats, salad, fruit juice ice cubes, tarts and sherbet.

The meat shelf will include a variety of frozen meats, bread, baked-stuffed potatoes and doughnuts. The section will be an array of commercially frozen available in most food stores.

Gunther will demonstrate the preparation of a pie for freezing and the proper packaging of fruits, meats and meats. As she packages and prepares one pie, she will take the frozen meat previously prepared in the freezer and cook it. Electric table appliances including the deep fat fryer and the electric skillet will be used in the demonstration.

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

ANTONIO, Colo., Ledger-News: "Perhaps the automobile industry can deliver its new 'package' to its workers and the same package, at the same price, to its customers. But certainly there are many industries that can boost the payroll and not the price tag."

ARCATA, Calif., Union: "Certainly we shall not be worthy of those who founded our Nation unless we strive to emulate the spirit of independence which motivated them. This means standing on our own feet, saving for our future, and not looking primarily to government, relatives, or friends for our well being. It means facing up to our local, state and national problems."

GLENCOE, Minn., Enterprise: "The seven billion dollars' worth of surplus wheat, corn, rice, butter, cheese and dry milk stored away safe from the open market is poor business for the U. S. Government. You and I and every American taxpayer pays for these surplus foods — We go right on spending billions to keep the agricultural clock turning back instead of allowing free enterprise to prevail."

GEARED TO THE JOB

Sweeping changes have been taking place in our eating habits. Foods which require a minimum of handling and preparation in the home, and thus save the housewife time and labor, are becoming more and more popular.

The trend includes meat, along with other foods. According to the head of the American Meat Institute, about three-fourths of our bacon reaches the consumer in sliced form. Nearly an eighth of all our meat production is made more convenient for consumers by canning. Packaging is increasing and so is freezing. A recent and popular development consists of frozen dishes made with meat which require only brief heating prior to serving.

The Institute spokesman also touched on the meat supply situation. It's a good one, from the consumer point of view. In the foreseeable future, meat will be plentiful, barring occasional short-term fluctuations which are beyond anyone's control. This year's meat production is expected to be the largest on record.

The price situation is also favorable. As an example, the prices of most pork cuts are eight to 27 cents lower at wholesale than they were last summer. And supplies are 15 per cent greater.

We're a nation of confirmed meat eaters. With our population increasing at the giddy rate of 11,500 each day, demand will soar as the years wear on. It's fortunate that we have a vigorous, highly competitive meat industry geared to that big job.

Restore Free Competition

Until last year, natural gas production was a competitive free enterprise. Then, as a result of a split Supreme Court decision, the Federal Power Commission was given authority to regulate production at the wellhead.

Many believe that this was never the intent of Congress. A pending bill (H. R. 6645) would specifically exempt the producers from Federal control. Top officials, including the President and FPC Chairman Kuykendall, urge its passage.

The Chicago Sun-Times recently devoted an excellent editorial to the matter. The paper pointed out that between 1938 and 1953, when there was no federal regulation, natural gas prices nationally went up eight percent, far below the increase in the cost of living indexes. And this, it continued, was due to the fact that competition has worked to keep prices low at the wellhead, there are more than 8,000 independent gas producers.

Then the Sun-Times concluded: "Regulation of gas producers for conservation purposes long has been left up to the states. Federal regulation, besides being, a step toward socialism, would substantially interfere with sound regulatory measures covering production, prices, etc. We believe consumers will be better off if Congress passes H. R. 6645 to restore free enterprise in this field and to exempt independent producers from control."

Remember Those Hats?

It has been observed that the possibility of soaking the rich to pay the cost of government went out with prohibition and Empress Eugenie hats.

ming is fine, if you can keep your head above water. So, in fact, is life.

If the federal government took every nickel of individual taxable income above \$10,000 a year, the amount collected wouldn't pay its bills for one month. If it took all taxable income above \$4,000, it would get only a fifth of what it is spending each year.

We just haven't got enough rich or middle income people to soak, and those we have are soaked to the hilt already. So the lower incomes must carry a great part of the burden.

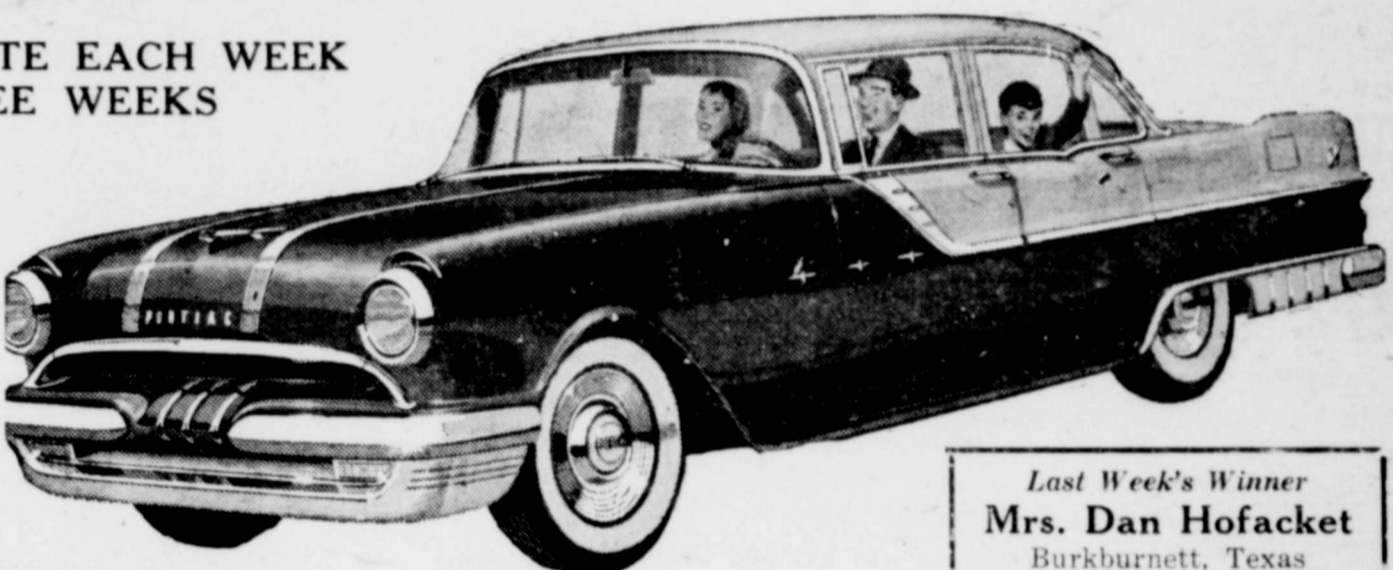

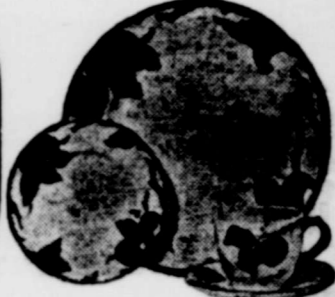

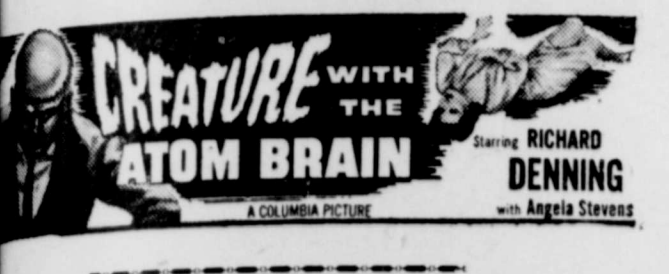

James T. Brady, Jr. Receives Certificate For Efficiency

A certificate of Efficiency has been awarded to James T. Brady, Jr., Manager of the Associated Credit Bureau of Texas.

The award certifies that Mr. Brady has completed a prescribed course of study and met other requirements established by the Associated Credit Bureaus of Texas. The award entitles the Retail Merchants Association of Burkburnett to all rights and privileges for one year.

Signing the certificate, which will be hung in the local association's office were William J. Strickler, President and Charles T. Lux, Executive vice-president of the Associated Credit Bureaus of Texas.

A review of bills passed at the present session of the 54th Texas Legislature, compiled by the Retail Merchants Association of Texas shows that more than a score of measures affecting retailers of the state have been signed into law.

James T. Brady, Manager of the local Retail Merchants Association, said he had been advised by the State RMA office in Austin that bills relating to collection, wage assignments, sales prices (grocery items), and taxes were among the more important enacted.

A breakdown by subjects of the laws passed follows:

Unfair Sales — Effective Sept. 6, a new law prohibits grocers from limiting purchases on merchandise offered for sale below cost.

Collection — The small Claims Courts act has been amended to provide for a fee of \$1 to the citation serving officer and authorizes the usual court fees for levying executions to enforce judgments.

Holidays — November 11 has been officially designated Veterans Day. Banks and Trust companies are given permission to close on Saturdays.

State Taxes — A one cent a gallon additional tax on gasoline. A one cent a package additional tax on cigarettes. A \$2.30 per barrel increase in the tax on beer. A 25 cent additional levy per \$1,000 on corporate capitalization.

Collected of State Taxes—The method of collecting a 2.2 per cent tax on radio and TV sales has been amended in a measure that will become effective September 1. The tax remains on the seller making the final sale and requires wholesalers to pay the tax on sales to institutions, hotels and others. The retailer is required to file a quarterly report showing a starting and ending inventory on both TV's and radios. The bill further requires TV and radio dealers to be bonded to guarantee payment of the tax and requires retailers to secure a permit and authorizes the State Comptroller to collect audit fees from the dealers.

Effective October 1, the maximum weekly unemployment compensation benefits will be raised from \$20 to \$28.

Assignment of wages — Employees, under terms of a new law, are exempt from legal action in cases where an employee's wages are pledged to a creditor, if the employer can prove that he was not notified in writing of such an assignment and did not assent to such an assignment in writing.

Youth Of Today

By R. D. Laney

Recent actions taken by Shepard Air Force officials and that of officials of Wichita Falls, restricting the activities of youth, makes the subject an important and timely one. When we consider that this government has endured 179 years, and that its future depends upon youth, we will recognize that if we continue to have a progressive, dynamic society, we must have as its base a purposive body of young people with ideals and high moral standards.

Unfortunately, there is a strong evidence that today's youth are in great need of moral and spiritual guidance. Witness, for example, the news stories of yesterday which tell of another teen-age gang killing. Everything mankind has ever loved and cherished, including life itself, will depend on the moral fibre of the younger generation to today. The world our older generation has brought about is a dynamic world full of challenges and new frontiers. We produce more good and gadgets than past ages ever dreamed of.

But we also kill more people with automobiles and we pay comic television actors many times more than we pay our school teachers, and we haven't yet found a way to end war before a war ends the human race. Young people see today, as they have always seen, visions of a better world, but they need to find moral leadership to guide them there. Where shall youth seek that moral leadership? First of all, they should seek it in their homes because the family is the

foundation stone of all human society and unless that stone is strong and sound the whole structure will surely crumble.

Of those youths apprehended and found guilty of crimes, in some such cases these youths came from the juvenile delinquency class. The growth of juvenile delinquency in the United States during the past decade has assumed proportions which in the opinion of many are so alarming as to approach a national emergency. Rampant in every phase of our society and every corner of our nation, the spread of crime and waywardness among our teen-age children has engaged the most intensive efforts of churchmen, educators, social experts, and law enforcement officers at every level of our life, from Main Street to Capital Hill.

Youth is no longer subject to a time limit for its definition. A world that lives longer, here in America the average span of life has increased twenty years in a half century, find the earlier-maturing youth. No longer is it accurate to say that you are a "child" until you are thru with your teenage and that overnight you are in the capacity of the

category of an adult. The change is not that precipitate, nor is it to be fixed by the calendar. The definition of maturity is "A stage of full development." Maturity has little relation to chronological age. One of the most important aspects of intellectual maturity is the ability to intelligently consider advice, accept it if it is valuable and reject it if it is not.

The medical and scientific opinion tells us that the span of youth is shorter, that maturity now comes earlier for the average person than at the beginning of the century and that the young people of the world in reality are more capable of mature decisions and actions today than the calendars and the birthday rosters might indicate. But you are the youth of an age that keeps threatening you with the fact that man now controls weapons for world extinction, if he unleashes enough of them at one time. You are the youth of an age that finds military service in this free country a necessity for the males among you, as soon as you reach the age of 18 or 17 if you volunteer. There is no plan that young men of today can make the family, home, busi-

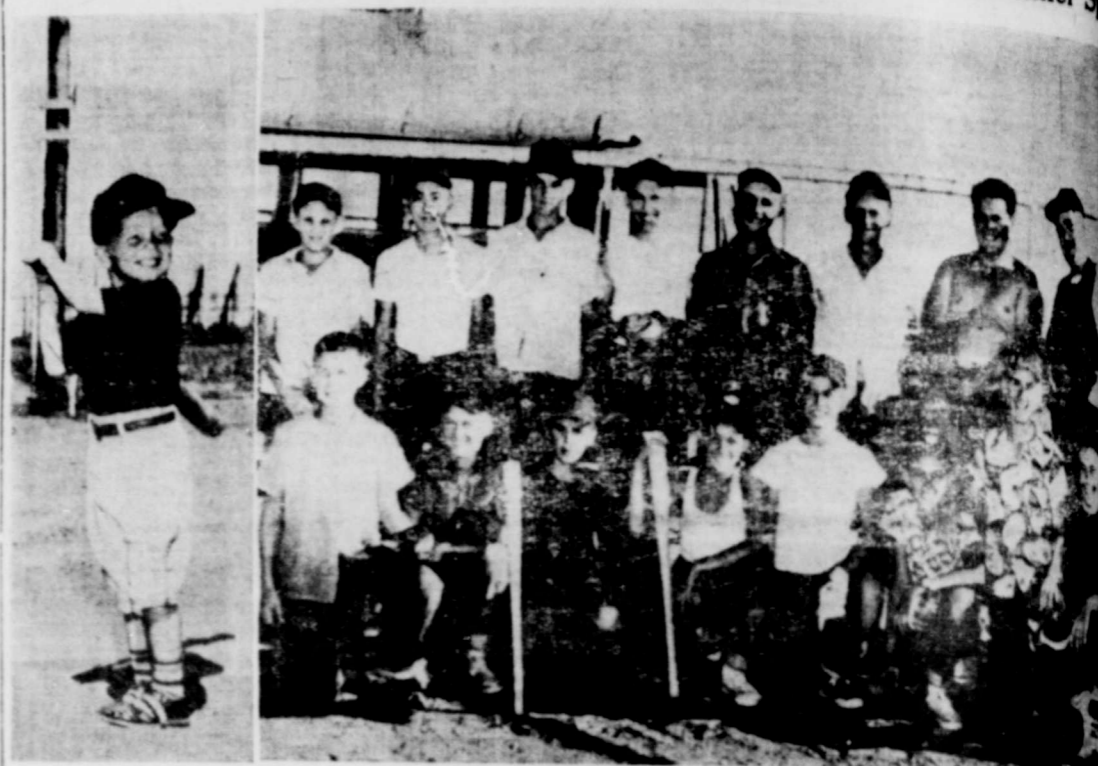
ness and future that does not involve the possibility of interruption of a 24-month minimum of military service.

You are the youth of an age that find God-loving, God-fearing people in dangerous grip with godless governments. You are the youth on whom tremendous shares of responsibilities in the atomic age world have demanded, and therefore you are maturing earlier than might have been the case in a more normal and happier state. In consequence of such conditions, you are stronger, more assertive, more capable, and you seek more aggressively the proper answers to your questions and problems.

But finally, young people must look within themselves for a moral leadership which can be found there, even if they can't find it anywhere else. For within each of us is a knowledge of right and wrong. Within each of us there is a voice that speaks when we are huddle and willing to learn and listen to it a voice that speaks today in this atomic age of the very same laws of life the voice of conscience.

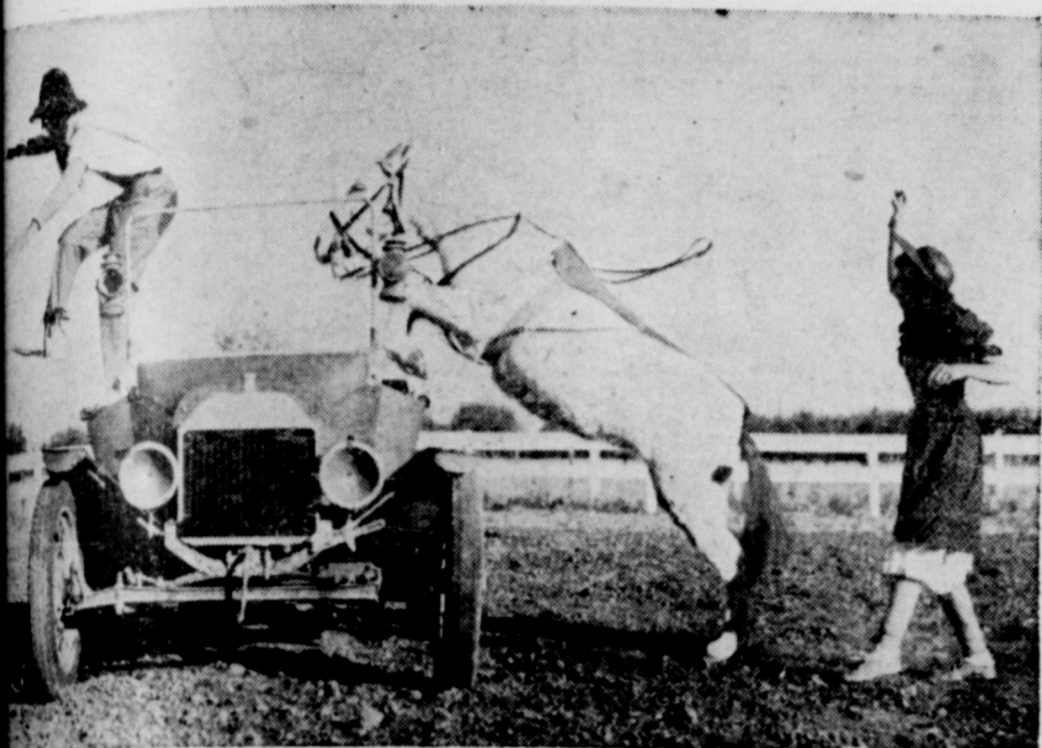

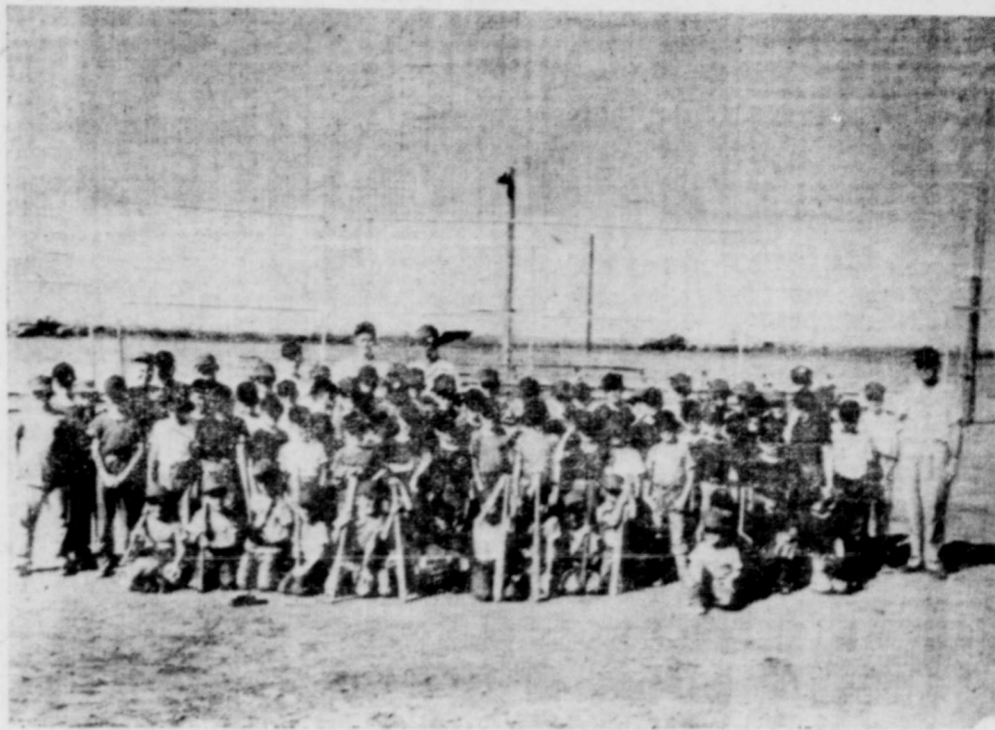

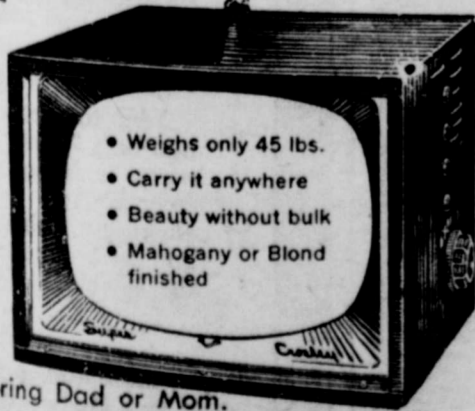
