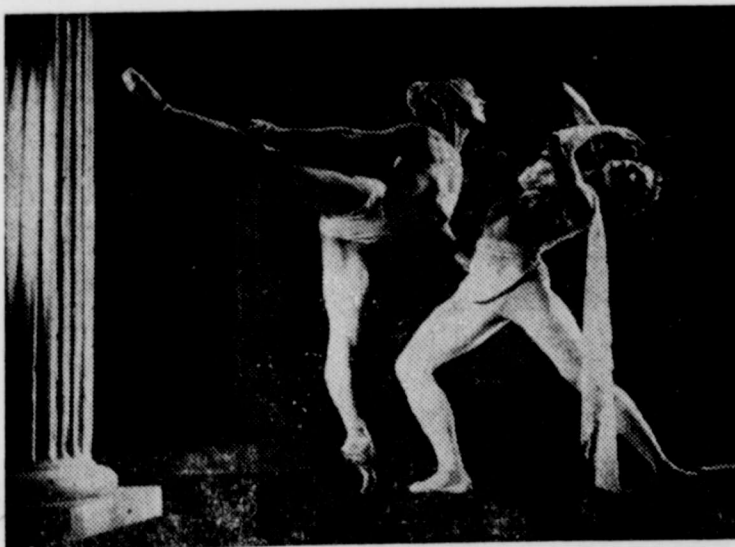

### Burkburnett and Seymour Battle To 13-13 Tie in District Contest

Seymour, Nov. 18—Seymour and Burkburnett battled to a 13 to 13 tie Friday night in a District 2A-3 showdown struggle that left them co-champions with identical 3-0-1 records but raised doubt on the playoff entry.

Officials and coaches of both schools were huddling over regulations late Friday night.

Seymour fought back to tie the favored Bulldogs in the closing moments of a thrilling, hotly-contested championship fracas.

Burkburnett ran 58 yards for its first touchdown at 5:43 in the opening quarter after an exchange of fumbles starting with the kickoff.

Billy Mize and Donald McKinnis alternated on hard slants through the Seymour line on the drive which racked up four first downs.

From the Panther 13 Mize tundered the right for nine and McKinnis rolled the remaining nine to score standing up. Lewis McDonald kicked the extra pt.

Long Drive  
Burkburnett started an 85 yd. drive for its second TD late in the first quarter. McKinnis ran beautifully for 27. Mize hit right tackle for 12 and Ralph Adkins skirted left end for 19 yards for the score on a perfectly executed reverse.

The Bulldogs were penalized five yards on the first extra point attempt. McDonald passed to McKinnis on the second try but McKinnis was nailed short of the goal. Burkburnett led 13-0.

Burkburnett won a coin toss Friday night and will represent District 2A-3 in the bi-district tilt against Stamford Thursday afternoon, November 24th, at Stamford. Kickoff time is 2:30.

Burk and Seymour will reign as co-champions of their district, however.

Seymour coach Marshall Gearhart flipped the coin, and a Burk player, Alden Smith, called the flip.

A few series later a Billy Ryan pass was intercepted by Burkburnett Bill Turnbow on the Bulldog 26 but after three plays, Mize's toss was nabbed by Seymour's Pat Stewart on the Bulldog 24.

The Panthers scored in four plays with Larry Ware slanting 17 yards off right tackle to score standing up with 1:18 left in the second quarter.

Ryan faked neatly to Baldwin on the play to fool the Bulldog line. Bill Moss booted the extra point and the score was 13-7, Burkburnett. The half ended shortly afterward.

## GRASS ROOTS OPINION

Gibbon, Neb., Reporter: "A government bureau is where the taxpayer's shirt is kept."

Great Falls, Mont., Leader: "Those who invented the absurd assertion — a few years ago that 'the national debt doesn't matter because we owe it to ourselves' should ponder these figures, says the Los Angeles Times. They mean that every man, woman and child in the United States paid out \$42.18 just to carry on the debt, which does not reduce the debt itself. And interest rates are rising so that per capita interest charges in the future will be more."

## SAFE DRIVING DAY - DEC. 1st

The President's Committee for Traffic Safety again is sponsoring a special day dedicated to safe driving — S-D Day. The date is December 1st, and the aim is to hold deaths and injuries to the lowest possible level for a 24 hour period.

While perfection probably is too much to expect — even for one day — from a combination of about 72 million drivers and 58 million motor vehicles, no sensible person would argue for a minute that the usual toll cannot be substantially cut by more sensible driving.

It's too bad that such a worthwhile effort must be limited to only one day. The sponsors apparently think so, too, because one slogan urges Make Every Day S-D Day

There lies the irony of our traffic accident problem — that it takes a Presidential blessing and a high powered educational effort to achieve reasonable conduct on the highways for only one day of the year.

Safe driving should be the year-round rule, not the one day exception. We could "Make Every Day S-D Day."

## WANTED - 31 MORE

A recent editorial in The Indianapolis Star recalls that when Indiana's Governor Craig imposed martial law on Henry County to smother the Perfect Circle strike hoodlumism and bloodshed, a CIO official raised the cry that the Governor was "putting property rights ahead of human rights."

The Star further reminds us that this "high sounding sentiment" has been voiced (or more accurately, screamed) by our "liberals" time and time again when cornered by their own depredations. And finally, this editorial points out that "the right to own property and be secure in its possession" is of itself a human right of the first order.

"It is the one basic right that most sharply differentiates freedom from communism, where nobody has any property right," says The Star. "This slogan, 'property rights versus human rights' is a palpable fraud, propagated to inflame passions against those who own property. It is a disguise for a power bid by those who want to decide by themselves who will have what right and when. 'Life, liberty and property,' says The Star, "are the three corner-stones of a free nation. They are all inseparable 'human rights.'" To deny one is to deny all human rights. If you take away a man's life, his property and his liberty are gone. If you take away a man's liberty, his right to a free life and his right to be secure in his home and his income is gone. And if you take away a man's property, he has neither liberty nor a life of his own left."

A very similar and co-equal right is the right to work. It was never questioned in this country until the unions recognized it for a valuable property that they might seize and rent out "to member only." Previously, the right to work was accepted as unthinkingly as the right to breathe, or to sit in the sunshine or walk in the rain. Today, the right to work is so restricted and controlled, by the same people who wall about "human rights" when their goon squads are restrained, that seventeen states have found it necessary to protect it by law.

Moreover, labor leaders have announced that repeal of these right to work laws is a major item on their agenda. Given their way, where then are those other rights to life, liberty and property?

From Your STATE CAPITOL

By VERN STANFORD Texas Press Association

After three exiled years, Texas again has an official, accredited Democratic national committee-

man. Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey's acceptance by the national committee gave Texas full representation for the first time since Sept. 1952. Wright Morrow was refused recognition because he supported Republican Dwight Eisenhower.

Official groups of both conservative and liberal Texas Democrats supported Ramsey. Only scattered protests were heard, one by the president of the liberal faction of the Texas Young Democratic Clubs.

Shivers Okays Demo Rules Gov. Allan Shivers says he is willing to play by the rules adopted for the 1956 Democratic national convention.

He said at a news conference that he expects to be challenged, nevertheless, by a "bunch of wild-eyed pinks."

Rules set for 1956 were view-

ed by Shivers as being the same as in 1952. Then they required heads of delegations to work for placing the party nominees' names on the state ballot under the proper column.

Shivers said he is not surprised to hear that some old political enemies, like Stephen Mitchell, Adlia Stevenson's aide, think he should not be allowed a 1956 seat.

He held firm that he would not take any pledge to support the party nominee. "I will give no pledge to support a nominee until I know who he is," Shivers said.

He said he considers himself a "bona fide democrat" and feels it is no crime for a Democrat to vote for a Republican friend.

"I consider President Eisenhower a friend of mine," the governor said. His statement was widely interpreted as indicating he might support Eisenhower again if he is a candidate.

UT Tests Slated

High school seniors with a University of Texas career in mind will find a good vocabulary, logical mind and number sense helpful in taking the scheduled aptitude tests.

Tests may be taken in 42

Texas cities on three dates, Feb. 4, May 12 and Aug. 10th.

Dr. H. T. Manuel, director of the University Testing and guidance bureau, said that, as a general rule, a student can be confident of his ability to succeed with university work if he is in high school class and makes a score of 75 or more on the aptitude test. Most of those applying for entrance would be admitted, he said.

The tests are designed to measure two very general abilities in academic work. First is the ability to work with words and to understand their meanings. Second is the ability to work with numbers and to solve problems. Scores on the required tests will not be the only basis for admission, Dr. Manuel added. All test scores will be kept confidential.

Giles Appeals Pending

Former Land Commr. Bascom Giles can count on at least 2 1-2 months more of freedom.

Both Giles' convictions in land scandal trials have been appealed to the court of Criminal appeals. Formal submission of the Austin conviction and three prison sentences is set for Jan. 18.

A six year sentence imposed in San Antonio was appealed and is expected to come before the court about Jan. 25 or Feb. 1. Legislative Council Posts Filled Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey announced committee assignments at the first meeting of the new Legislative council.

Serving on the executive committee with Ramsey and House Speaker Jim Lindsey will be Sen. Abraham Kazen of Laredo and Reps. Obie Bistow of Big Spring and W. G. Kirklind of Odessa.

Studying finances will be Sens. Neville Colson of Navasota and Gus Strauss of Hallettsville, Rep. E. F. Crim of Henderson, W. S. Heatley, Jr., of Paducah and Pearce Johnson of Austin.

On the subject matter committee are Sens. Rogers Kelley of Edinburg, George Moffett of Chillicothe, Reps. Tom King of Dallas, Gus Garrett of Raymondville, James W. Yancy, Jr., of Houston, Ben A. Glusing of

Kingsville and Joe Burkett of Kerrville.

As to the subject to be studied before the next regular session, committee members say the council is "loaded."

Historical Committees Organize Every county in Texas is being asked by the State Historical Survey Committee, to set up a county committee, announced HSC director George W. Hill of Austin.

The state committee was authorized by the 1953 Legislature to "study the subject of preservation and dissemination of the records of Texas and Texans."

County judges, with other officials, have been asked to appoint committees for their county.

Should Be Simple - But

On Sept. 6th the fee for driver's license renewal was increased to \$2. All summer, however, Texans kept jumping the gun and sending in the larger fee. Patiently, the Department of Public Safety sent back the over-payment.

Now, however, the new law is in force, and guess what. The DPS is busy writing Texas drivers, asking for more money. Many of them are sending in the old \$1 fee.

SHORT SHORTS - Heart disease is Texas' No. 1 killer, accounting for 20,191 deaths last year, said Commr. of Health Henry A. Holle. An early winner in the first week of deer hunting season was Rep. Charles L. Sandahl, Jr. of Austin who shot an eight point buck from the wheelchair to which polio has confined him. W. Newton Barnes, Terrell city attorney has been named assistant secretary of state, replacing Miss Marie McCutchen of Dallas, who did not accept the office offered her two weeks ago.

News From The County Agent

Nothing can be more irritating and disagreeable to poultry or to the poultryman than a flock infested with lice. And, too, says B. T. Haws, county agent, lousy poultry grow at a slower rate, are unthrifty and produce fewer eggs. In laying flocks kept for producing hatching eggs, heavy infestations of lice can cause egg fertility to drop to the vanishing point.

The louse spends its entire life on the host bird and spreads through a flock most rapidly during cooler weather. The eggs attached to the feathers by a gluey substance, hatch in two weeks or less and in another two weeks the lice are full grown. One pair may produce 120,000 offspring with their life span of a few months; hence, the need for immediate control.

Fortunately, says Haws, the several species commonly found in Texas can be controlled by the same treatment, the most common is fumigation by using a roost paint. An effective paint is one percent lindane in an oil solution. It should be applied at

the rate of about one each 200 feet of roost before the birds go to second application made within a 10-day weeks period, says the agent. He adds that dips and dusts can also be used for the handling of each

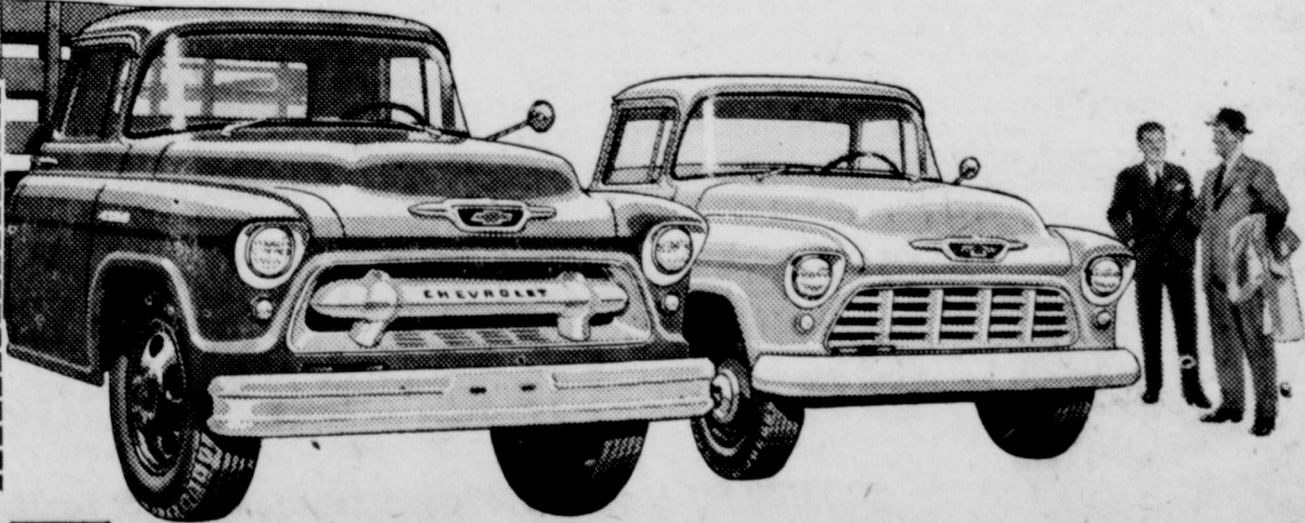

## Pan American Road Race Film To Be Shown Here

The first public showing locally of the 1-2 hour color sound movie of the 1954 Pan-American Road race is scheduled for the Town Hall, Monday, November 28, 7:45 P. M.

The movie, covering the entire 5-day race, was made by K & W Products, Inc., automotive chemical manufacturer. K & W sent a 9-man crew to Mexico to cover the race from start to finish. Included in the film are starts, finishes, skids and accidents. Cameras mounted in several of the race cars afford the audience the opportunity of "riding" in a race car at speeds up to 150 miles per hour.

The 1954 race was run over a distance of 1,908 miles, starting at Tuxtla Gutierrez, near the Guatemala border, and finishing at Ciudad Juarez, across the Rio Grande River from El Paso, Texas. In its fifth running, the race has truly become an international classic, with 154 entries representing 14 countries.

Admission will be FREE, but due to the limited seating capacity, it will be necessary to have an invitation. These are obtainable from one of the local automobile dealers, garages and service stations who are making this local showing possible.
