## **A VACCINE FOR TB?**

#### A brief statement by JAMES E. PERKINS, M.D.

naging Director, National Tuberculosis Association

At the present time there is not a satisfactory vaccine against TB.

After years of study, a vaccine, called BCG, was developed that does increase resistance . . . but gives neither strong nor predictable protection.

Tuberculosis poses peculiar problems to researchers seeking an immunizing agent. Vaccines have been most successful against diseases where a single attack of the disease itself rings about immunity against future attacks. This, unforttely, is not true of TB. One attack is no guarantee against future attacks of tuberculosis. In fact, TB is notoriously a ing" disease.

However, in the uncharted future of science and medicine, it is certainly possible that a vaccine could be developed that would confer strong and lasting immunity. Or the secret of preventing tuberculosis may lie elsewhere . . . in enhancing nutrition for example, or perhaps a superior drug can be used to prevent actually and the prevent actually to prevent as well as treat TB.

The important thing is that all likely avenues are being carefully investigated. ## WANTED - 31 MORE

A recent editorial in The Indianapolis Star recalls that when Indiana's Governor Craig imposed martial law on Henry County to smother the Perfect Circle strike hoodlumism and bloodshed, a CIO official raised the cry that the Governor was "putting property rights ahead of human rights.

The Star further reminds us that this "high sounding sentiment" has been voiced (or more accurately, screamed) by our "liberals" time and time again when cornered by their own depredations. And finally, this editorial points out that "the right to own property and be secure in its possession" is of itself a human right of the first order.

"It is the one basic right that most sharply differeniiates freedom from communism, where nobody has any property right," says The Star. "This slogan, 'property rights versus human rights' is a palpable fraud, propagated to inflame passions against those who own property. It is a disguise for a power bid by those who want to decide by themselves who will have what right and when.

"Life, liberty and property," says The Star, "are the three corner-stones of a free nation. They are all insepar-able 'human rights." To deny one is to deny all human rights. If you take away a man's life, his property and his liberty are gone. If you take away a man's liberty, his right to a free life and his right to be secure in his home and his income is gone. And if you take away a man's property, he has neither liberty nor a life of his own left.'


A very similar and co-equal right is the right to work. It was never questioned in this country until the unions **reco**gnized it for a valuable property that they might seize and rent out "to member only." Previously, the right to work was accepted as unthinkingly as the right to breathe, or to sit in the sunshine or walk in the rain. Today, the right to work is so restricted and controlled, by the same people who wail about "human rights" when their goon squads are restrained, that seventeen states have found it necessary to protect it by law.

Moreover, labor leaders have announced that repeal of these right to work laws is a major item on their agenda Given their way, where then are those other rights to life, liberty and property?
