



GRASS ROOTS OPINION

BUFFALO, S. D., Times-Herald: "The Lord giveth and the Lord taketh away' could be paraphrased to read "the government giveth and the government taketh away." The main point of difference, however, is that the Lord giveth out of the bounty of His goodness, while the government can only "giveth' back part of what it takes away.

KETCHIKAN, Alaska, Daily News: "The paternalistic attitude exercised by the Civil Aeronautics Board (CAB) over commercial airlines is more often a handicap than a benefit. The CAB arbitrarily decides what routes airlines must run and what companies may operate. To our way of thinking, airlines should have the same right as other concerns to operate where they pleased as long as they maintain safety standards set by the CAB."

SALEM, O., Farm and Dairy: "Farming is no longer a matter of getting up with the chickens and going to bed with the sun. It is paper-work, pencil work, using long words like blend-price and aureomycin correctly and effectively. You have to be a combination of Einstein, Shakes speare and Diamond Jim Brady to be a success as a farmer any more, and it doesn't hurt if you throw in a little P. T. Barnum either. That's an exageration. But it is far harder to be a good farmer nowadays than it used to be."

ANOTHER TO CONQUER

One by one, the infectious diseases that have plagued men for centuries are going down to defeat. But tuberculosis remains unconquered.

The attack on TB has been carried out on a broad front by the combined efforts of the medical profession, public agencies, and citizen's groups, such as our own Wichita County Tuberculosis Association. The weapons have been education of the public, chest x-rays to find cases of tuberculosis, legislation to make the best treatment available to all patients, programs in rehabilitation to help patients get back on their feet and stay there, and research for ever better methods of preventing and treating the disease.

Each of these weapons has an effective place in the campaign against tuberculosis. If each were used to the fullest possible extent, the disease could be brought under

It is easy to be lulled into a sense of false security by telling ourselves that TB no longer kills people as it used to. We are curing people of tuberculosis, but we are not doing so well at preventing spread of the disease. Today, 400,000 Americans have the disease, approximately 100,000 new cases are reported each year. Estimates of the number who are infected with TB germs range from one-fourth to one-third of the American people. Most of these people will not develope active disease, but any of them could do so.

Obviously constant vigilance against tuberculosis is necessary. But more than that - there must be increased efforts to make full use of the weapons that can defeat tuberculosis. When we buy and use the Christmas Seals of the Wichita County Tuberculosis Association we are sharing in these efforts. We can take pride in what has been done - but we can and must do more.

Readiness Is The Best Prevention

Statistically, the great American hunter can be proud of his record for shooting game, instead of his fellowhunters, innocent bystanders and domestic farm animals. Out of the total 90,000 fatal accidents last year, 1,050 were caused by firearms. And while only one third of these occurred while hunting, we should properly consider the alarming number of home tragedies due to hunting arms as hunting accidents. Further, since most hunters pride themselves on their guns and their understanding of how to use and care for them, as well as the lore of woods and fields, it should be possible to eliminate such accidents entirely.

But we know there will be mishaps and bloodshed and the best we can do is to improve a little on last year's record. Thus, it is fitting that again the season is ushered in by "Emergencies Don't Wait"—when our friends the druggists go all-out to remind us it's time to overhaul and restock both the first aid kit and the home medicine cabinet. We should need only a reminder that when an accident happens, in the field, the shop, the kitchen or the barn - there's no time to go shopping for emergency

We should remember too that hunting accidents most frequently involve novices at the sport. Thus, the youngsters who will get their first experience at game-shooting this year, as well as inexperienced oldsters, should be instructed, and drilled and grilled on the handling of arms. Here are the simplest and most comprehensive safety rules we know of which you may want to use as a teaching guide:

1. Make sure guns stored away at home are unloaded. 2. Guns should be locked away from children.

3. Keep firearms in good working condition. 4. A gun pulled carelessly out of a car may shoot

someone, the first morning of the hunting season, or the 5. Don't drag your gun through wire fences.

6. Following another hunter under trees, limbs and thru

underbrush is dangerous when carrying loaded guns. 7. Never use your gun to punch or club game out of he brush. 8. Don't carry a cocked gun.

9. Carry the gun with its muzzle pointed to the ground Never point it at anyone. Don't let the muzzle clog with

In an official memorandum dated November 14, the governor recognized the work of the Texas Tuberculosis Association and its local affiliates as helping to prevent the spread of tuberculosis.

He designated the period Nov. 16-December 24 as Christmas Seal Days in Texas and urged every citizen to buy and use Christmas Seals to help end the economic loss and personal tragedy caused by tuberculosis.

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


