Pool Hall Blast Clues Being Sifted

Local police were still searching for clues Tuesday in the mysterious explosion which shook the Boom Town Recreation Club Monday night. A number of youthful suspects were questioned Tuesday but no arrests were made. Officials were in disagreement over the type of explosive used. Two policemen said they believed the explosion was caused by dynamite. However, Wichita County Deputy Sheriff Willis Bartley said he thought "some kind of chemical caused the explosion since no fuse was found and the blast area didn't look as if dynamite was used." The club, a combination pool hall and domino parlor, is located in the 100 block on Third Street. Only minor damage was done by the blast and no one was hurt although the explosion ripped a 10-inch hole in the sheet metal rear of the building. Wall board was shattered and furnishings damaged by the blast which was heard all over town. A table not more than six ft. from the blast was occupied and five others in the immediate vicinity also were in use.

PLENTY OF ROOM

Leaders in retailing point out that this enterprise offers great opportunities to young people choosing careers. There's every reason why that is true. A retailer operates on the certain premise that things just don't stand still. The business is in a constant state of evolution, due both to new products and to new ideas. Being intensely competitive, management must be ever on its toes trying to do a better job, for the consumer is always looking for a lower price, more attractive displays, better service, and other inducements, and he takes his trade where he can get them.

A retail store must have its rules and regulations and routines, like any other organized activity. But the big thing is found in the human factor — in people with ideas and imagination and vitality and the urge to outdo the other fellow.

Today's executives in the big chain and other leading retail outlets came up from the ranks. They started as salespeople, warehousemen, and so on: In retailing there is plenty of room at the top.

Solution To World's Food Problem

In a recent issue of Life, it was pointed out that the half of the world which is semi-starved is still using Biblical methods of agriculture. The magazine continued, "From 3,000 B. C. to the beginning of the 19th Century only a few significant advances were made in the science of agriculture — use of the horse collar, the scythe, and the 'cradle' for the scythe. The undeveloped parts of the world never got beyond these advances; most of it still plows with a bent stick. Most of its grain is still harvested with sickles.

In those countries the arduous work of most of the people must be devoted to producing enough food for a bare subsistence living. In the U. S., by contrast, there are about 2,000,000 fewer farmers now than there were as recently as 1940. Yet the population has grown greatly and we have more and better food than ever. That is because substitutes of one sort or another have been found for human toil. Electricity has been one. Another is modern chemical fertilizers which increase production even as they enrich the soil. Another is proper conservation. Another is farm equipment. It is estimated that tractors save 2,000,000,000 man hours a year, while a mechanical picker does the work of 40 men.

The solution to the world's food problem lies in an agricultural technology of the kind we take for granted.

Yuletide

While far into the winter the Indian Summer sun shoots burning arrows down upon this yuletide season of the year. It is little wonder that one can find warmth in the frozen meadows and fields through which he walks and dreams. Recalling those happy yuletide days when a boy, you brought down from the woods an evergreen Christmas tree for the enjoyment and the pleasure of your family at Christmas time, may have well made your plans to extend the season on through the weeks of snow and cold, through the days when the jeweled fingers of the ice-covered creeks and streams point with quiet certainty toward the valleys and the low lands.

Making your way across the hill and the windswept pasture toward home you likely as not, was thinking then of spreading goodness to both of your families, the one in your home, and your family of birds which has been a part of all the winters you have ever known. Going about the daily chores about the old farm house, one watches and he enjoys his outdoor neighbors, the movement of their wings, their small beaded eyes and their constant chatter, sounding like contentment in the sharp and frosted hours. Looking out of your window in the morning or at noon, or before darkness comes, you find a deep and lasting delight in a tree, a tree alive with birds and the warmth with the same kind of friendliness that has been found, deep in the woods, out of the long reach of the ice and winter wind.

When a boy, I well remember those happy yuletide days, the wind whistling a wierd glissano around the corners of our farm home piling snow in drifts that covered the fences and the small buildings and at times obscured the west windows and then,

when the snow ceased to fall, the thermometer hitting bottom as though on skids. In the evening after all chores were done and supper was over, the family gathered in the large comfortable room which was used as a living and dining room, while outside the wind blew and the snow fell steadily. I shall always remember those wonderful evenings, the warmth of love and companionship, the flashes of wit and humor, the hearty laughter.

During those yuletide seasons of the year, there were so many wonderful things to do. After a heavy snowfall when the drifts were hard enough to walk on or when a bit of rain on the snow had frozen and caused a hard crust to form, we could slide anywhere, down through the fields, over fences and bushes. Skating was a favorite sport, and not exclusively for youngsters. Our favorite rendezvous was the old mill pond. In the evening when the older and the young people came out, big bonfire fires burned on the ice, bright flames darting high into the night sky and flickering on the faces of the boys and girls sitting on the logs in front of the fire. The dark woods lining the pond on either side, where big pines and firs and hemlocks mingled with white birches, oaks and maples, echoed with songs and merry laughter.

After yuletide comes Christ-

mas. I do not suppose that one person can ever penetrate the event of Christmas deeply enough to understand its total significance. It is this significance of Christmas which pulls families together from all corners of the nation. Tinsel and pretty colored balls and electric lights alone do not have enough drawing power of themselves to reassemble families. People who lived at the time of the event of Christ's birth were no different than we are today. They too, were seeking a deeper understanding of life and man's relation to his fellow men.

Christmas cannot reach its climax as a festival simply on a secular basis. The Christian church, with its whole existence based on this event, is the logical focal point of the family's celebration. Here, in the worship of the church, the family assembles to give thanks for the inestimable gifts of God to man. It is only thus that the tinsel, gifts, lights, holly and greens become filled with the deep meaning of joy and love, friendship and peace.

When Christmas night finally arrives we should find ourselves spiritually deepened. May such a Christmas be yours this year!
