Open House Sunday for New Primary School Building, 2:00 to 5:00 o'clock

Open house for the new primary school on Ave. F will be held Sunday, January 15th, from 2:00 to 5:00 P. M., according to R. M. Davis, Supt. No planned program will be given. Just make your visit of convenience at your convenience during the hours designated. This new building was completed just before the first of the year, and students moved into it following the Christmas holidays.

This Primary building houses the first grade students. Mrs. I. Evans in room 5, Miss Wanda Best, room 4, Mrs. Perry, room 3, Mrs. Farley room 2 and Mrs. Austin in room 1. Present enrollment is 150 students in the first grade.

Other than the five classrooms here is a teachers' lounge, book room and boiler room. The building is constructed of blocks and brick facing. Each room is contained classroom with lavatory for boys and one for girls in each room.

Total cost of construction is \$2,322,566, and of this amount, the government is paying \$600,000. General contractor was A.B.C. Construction Co. of Wichita Falls. The contract was made July 20, 1955, and the building will be accepted on January 3, 1956.

Mr. Ray Arnold, Wichita Falls, was architect. Those interested and wishing to visit the new building, please do so on Sunday from 2:30 to 3:30 P. M.

Burkburnett Schools Show Rapid Growth Over the Past Ten Years

Growth of the local schools in the past ten years can be noted by a few comparisons. In 1945-46 there were 34 teacher employees including Supt. and principals. In 1950-51 the total was 40, and had risen to 51 for the 1955-56 term. Other personnel, bus drivers, cafeteria, custodians, secretaries and tax collector, brings the 1955-56 total to 72 employees on the payroll. The total for 1945-46 was 50, while in 1950-51 it was 67.

Budget Increases
As the student enrollment went up, and teachers were added, logically, the budget soared. The total budget for 1945-46 was \$38,544.85. Ten years later, 1955-56, the total budget was \$95,921.22! This budget is collected from a total tax valuation of \$6,948,628.00. The valuation in 1945-46 was \$8,091,585.00, or a loss in total valuation of over one million dollars.

The school district is faced with greater expenditures, while tax valuations are going down. The present tax rate is \$1.50 per \$100.00 valuation.

Outstanding bonded indebtedness Sept. 1, 1955 was \$264,000.

1955 Enrollment
Total enrollment Sept. 1, 1955 was 1253 students. Hardin grade had 651, Junior High 324 and the High School 278. A gain of 115 students was shown over the previous year.

These figures were taken from an address given by Supt. Ralph Davis before the Lions Club recently. Right now, some of the classrooms are crowded, with as many as 39 students in some. If the enrollment goes up over 60 new students next year, where can they be put? That question is bothering the school board now. Preliminary surveys show the enrollments will go up next year.

TOO HIGH A PRICE

The Herald, of Brownsville, Texas, has printed a thoughtful editorial on the farm problem and its political repercussions. It touches on the situation facing livestock producers and other farmers, and on the varied strategies with which the major political parties are seeking to gain the farm vote. Then it says: "Certainly we would like to see some system which will insulate agriculture against catastrophe in net income. Above that however, our farmers generally feel that our best bet lies in free and untrammelled production. We know that any government program which attempts to maintain prices through artificial juggling of the laws of supply and demand and interlocking price relationships inevitably brings with it some type of production or marketing controls.

"This in turn hampers the productive genius of our farmers and removes the privileges of adapting our production and distribution methods to the demands of the market place. This is too high a price to pay in order to assure the prosperity of some farmers."

It could be added that the kind of "prosperity" that government aid and controls produces is a frail reed indeed, subject as it is to the ever changing political winds. And it is certainly evident that the taxpayers of the country cannot forever subsidize farm production which goes into storage, not consumption. The bill for that now has run far into the billions and the whole surplus problem is extremely critical.

The ultimate solution to the farm problem will be found within, not without, the world of agriculture itself. Political "solutions" usually just make bad matters worse.

FAMILIES NEED EACH OTHER

"Do-it-together" gives a new dimension to "do-it-yourself."

This new concept of leisure time activity, constructive relaxation and enjoyment of the sense of achievement has been put into words by Lewis H. Glaser, who as president of Revell, Inc., heads up one of the most spectacularly successful firms in the nation's \$200 million-a-year hobby-kit industry.

"Leisure," says Mr. Glaser, "is a potential blessing, of which Americans have more and more. It can be a good thing, or an evil thing, depending on what is done with it. When father secretes himself in his workshop for a weekend at a time, or becomes so engrossed in a 'do-it-yourself' project no one dares speak to him, his leisure is more of a strain on family relations than a joy. Much as Johnny and Suzie would like to help Dad, to be with him, to absorb some of his great wisdom, this normal, wholesome urge is frustrated. And mischief is the likeliest refuge of hurt feelings and rebellious spirits."

We agree with Mr. Glaser that in these days of tension and uncertainty, when the strains of high pressure working and living are increasingly reflected in broken homes, mental ailments and juvenile delinquency; family unity, the all-for-one and one-for-all spirit is our best hope of national strength and personal happiness.

Not many families, now-a-days, are called upon to hew out a home in the wilderness, to build a house with their own hands and to produce for themselves the necessities of life. But it does seem entirely possible that we can salvage something of the pioneer virtues by making our leisure a family institution, by working together at learning and having fun and getting to really know and understand each other. And certainly these realistic scale-model kits, of contemporary cars, or full scale historic guns, or the very latest in battleships and planes, provide an excellent start for the do-it-yourself adventure.

It now seems more true than ever that "a family at play can keep trouble away."

FUTURE OF AN INDUSTRY

This Congress will consider a measure which will vitally influence the future of one of our fastest growing industries — natural gas. The situation, in capsule form, is as follows.

The sale of gas to consumers is a public utility function, and is regulated in the same manner as the sale of electricity and other public utility services. The gas pipelines operate in interstate commerce and so are subject to federal regulation.

However, the production of gas at the wellhead is in no sense a public utility operation. The independent producers, of whom there are thousands, have no protected markets. They must compete vigorously, both for land leases on which to sink wells, and in selling their gas to the pipeline companies which carry it to the centers of consumption. On top of that, natural gas production — like oil production, is an exceedingly risky enterprise. Most wells turn out dry and worthless.

Natural gas production at the wellhead was not regulated until about two years ago. Then a Supreme Court decision made producers subject to Federal Power Com-

mission regulation, even though many feel that was never the intent of Congress. This was a discouraging blow to producers, the men who must take the long risks, and has brought about a sharp curtailment of plans for exploration and new development. Government might as well set the price of automobiles at the factory as the price of gas at the well head.

The consumers' interest can only be served if the gas he wants is made available. Federal regulation is a massive road block in the way of that. The solution lies in a proposed law, which has strong bipartisan support, to free competitive independent producers of destructive and pointless regulatory burdens.

Notes from County Ag. Agent and HD Agent

Wichita County Home Demonstration clubs are starting their monthly Economics program this month. The family economics program will teach the women to better business women in their homes. There is no business more important than the housewife's demonstration is being given by Miss Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent. stration council, is preparing a program for the District Texas Home Demonstration Ass'n training meeting to be held in Benjamin on Jan. 30th. In this program Mrs. Graham is planning to stress the duties of a THDA chairman for Wichita County.

For amateurs, wintertime, when plants are dormant, is the safest time for transplanting, according to Miss Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent. Plants that drop their leaves are dormant after leaves fall, others usually are dormant immediately after the first two freezes. After that plants may be moved anytime before spring growth starts.

Prepare for the job ahead of time so plants will be out of the soil for as short a period as possible. If the ground freezes, do not attempt moving plants until it is thawed. Make the holes large enough so that roots need not be crowded or twisted.

Good drainage is important. If water will stand in the hole for several hours, additional drainage is needed. Try breaking through the hard pan below, drain off to the side or make the

hole deeper and fill partially with loose rubble and stone. Never plant a shrub or tree deeper than it grew in the nursery or woods. Place carefully firm topsoil about the roots or ball. Avoid air spaces by pouring water into the partially filled hole.

Prune tops of deciduous plants at planting time to compensate for root loss. Apply heavy mulch around the plant to guard against freezing and keep soil moist during the winter.

Uncertain rainfall is about the greatest hazard to dairying in Wichita County, from a feeding standpoint. Silage as a feed reserve or irrigation are the possible solutions on most dairy farms. Until we can control the moisture supply, with irrigation or otherwise, pasture alone will not get the job done. Even with good pastures, many dairymen are finding that silage will pay off according to B. T. Haws, county agent.

If a dairyman is in the business to stay, raising herd replacements will pay. Herd replacement must be developed and not raised. This is something to think about.

News From The Congress

On Jan. 3rd the second session of the 84th Congress convened. It will probably be several weeks before any legislation comes to the floor due to the fact that it will be necessary for the Committees to first pass on the various bills. A great deal of legislation has been held over from the last session. This is true of the amendments to the Natural Gas Act, the agricultural program and others.

On Jan. 5th, the President sent his annual message to Congress in which he outlined the Administration's legislative program for this session. The message was in the very general terms and did not go into details as to many of the programs that the Administration will advocate. The program, as outlined in this message, briefly is as follows: it calls for the enactment of a semi-permanent foreign aid program which would exist over a number of years, the passage of a Federal aid to

education program and a Federal health insurance plan, the extension of the coverage of the Wage-Hour law, the creation of a Federal commission to see that desegregation is carried out throughout the country, expansion of the public housing program, providing for a National highway system, balancing the Budget, the enactment of the new agriculture program, as well as maintaining substantially the same spending for National Defense. There were, of course, many other items mentioned in the message, however, these were the most important ones.

Recently a Congressional subcommittee has been holding hearings on the post war trend in automation. The most disturbing thing among their findings was that this country is faced with a threatening shortage of scientists and technicians which could cost us a technological superiority in the world. The committee found that professional engineers are being graduated in Russia at twice the rate they are in this country and that the Russians are turning out technicians at thirty to forty times the rate we are. The findings of this committee have been con-

firmed by the Chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission, Admiral Strauss, as well as the National Science Foundation. If we are to maintain our leadership in atomic development, it will be necessary that we encourage more and more of our young people to go into the scientific field and also provide more facilities where they can receive training.

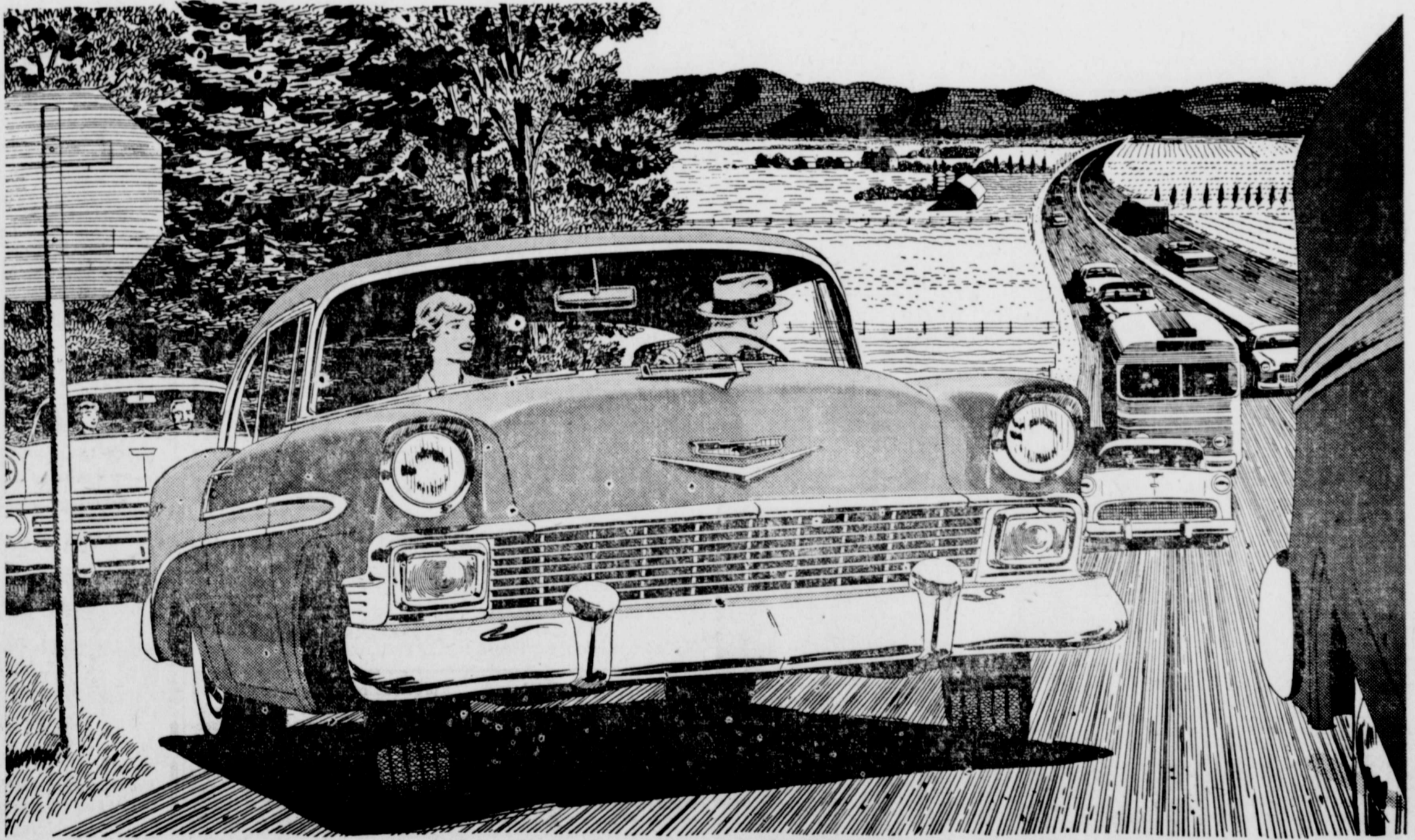

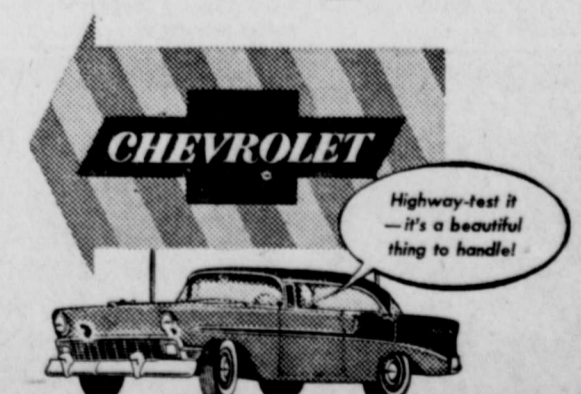
