The man who wrote, "Let me live in my house by the side of the road. And be a friend to man." probably resided miles from the nearest highway. At least, it's reasonable to believe he never had to rake up the lunch papers and bottles and cans and candy wrappers and partly eaten mandwiches from his front yard, and pick the used match books, punctured balloons, empty cigarette packages and assorted cellophane out of his hedge.

And if he had owned vacant property "by the side of the road," especially if it had a few trees on it, the accumulation of picnic trash, newspapers, old tires, even a junked car or two would definitely have deprived us of his souching poem.

But Keep America Beautiful, Inc., a non-profit corporation organized about two years ago to restore this poetic faith in our fellow man, and to clean up our highways and by ways, our beaches, picnic grounds and sylvan dells, and keep them clean, is swinging into action on a mide front.

Associated with KAE in a nationwide drive against litterbugs are 36 influential, energetic national organizations, including the 4-H clubs, National Grange, Boys Club America, The American Legion, the Boy Scouts, the Campfire girls, and the National Clean-up, Paint-Up, Fix Up Bureau, National Council of State Garden clubs, the US Chamber of Commerce, the Jaycees, National Recreation Association as well as appropriate US Government cepartments.

And cooperating with KAB in newly inspired drives against litterbugs are the enforcement agencies of the various states where anti-litter laws, calling for stiff fines even jail terms, have long been on the books but BSPC. until recently have received scant or inadequate attention he of now, state, county and city police, justices and judges are pretty well agreed that motorists will keep America Beautiful, or else. It is the popular supposition that nice people (like you) are not litterbugs, and that people who strew trash in their wake are definitely not nice. But the sad fact is that all of us are litterbugs, to a greater or lesser extent. And let him who never threw a matchbook or a chewing gum wrapper out of a car window speak up in protest. In fact, he can write to Keep America Beautiful, Inc. at 39 Park Avenue, New York 17, New York, and they will probably strike off a medal for him. As for how not to be a litterbug, here are KAB's rules Dispose of your trash in a proper receptacle, wherever you are. (If there isn't any, keep the trash till you find one.) Urge your community to provide plently of such receptacles conveniently located. Carry a litterbag in your car. Encourage local anti-litter programs. 


THE RIGHT TO WORK STATES

Eighteen states have passed right-to-work laws. While they differ in detail, in broad principle they are all the same. They guarantee that a man has a right to join or not to join a labor union of any other legitimate private organization, and still get and keep a job. In short, they protect him against coercion by either the employer or the union.

One argument against these laws is that they hurt the economy generally. But a survey made of the 12 states which have had the laws since 1947, and so have had a chance to see just what results have been, belies that absojutely. These states have matched or outstripped national average gains in such important barometers of economic health as non farm employment, business in operation, population growth, per capita earnings,, retail sales, new construction and bank savings accounts. In some cases the differences are spectacular, business and personal savings, for example, increased 34 per cent more in the rightto-work states than in the others.

No one claims that the laws alone are the reason for such improvement. But the facts certainly prove that the laws in no way hurt workers or others.

Going beyond the statistics, the truth is that the right to work is as fundamental as religious freedom and the right of free speech, free assembly, and free press. Where the right to work does not exist, there is no real freedom.





Brucellosis Costs **Texas Ranchers** \$10 Million A Year

The eradication of one disease, Brucellosis, would save the livestock industry of Texas an estimated ten million dollars annually. In addition to the direct loss from the disease, B. T. Haws county agent, reports other costs are piling up which are difficult to estimate.

In a year end report, he said, out of state buyers of feeder and breeder cattle are showing some hestitancy in making purchases because of the high incidence of this disease in Texas livestock. Too, the marketing of dairy products within another two years will hinge on the control of the disease.

Haws also pointed out that the human health hazard cannot be overlooked. The disease each

can wreck the physical well-being of its human victim for a period of years.
