HUBERT GRAGG, 1425 NW 35, owner of the C. H. GRAGG Pipeline Co., 223 Britton Road, recently made a big gas strike in Greenwood, Ark., but that is just one of his international enterprises and ventures he operates from here to Canada in his Britton Office.

The gas and construction magnate is also owner of Gragg (Canada) Limited, Toronto, Ontario; Gragg, Inc., Exeter, N. H.; G & H Constructors, New Jersey; Gragg, Inc., Oklahoma City; and T & G Constructors, Inc.

Besides this, he is pasturing some 650 cattle south of San Antonio, Texas. and owns a 200acre farm north of Edmond.

His Greenwood strike, brought in by the Gragg Oil Co., came in while he was attending a dinner party in Fort Smith. There, he was presented an Arkansas Traveler certificate by Lt. Gov. Nathan Gordon.

The certificate authorized and commissioned him to serve as an 'ambassador of good will' from Arkansas with the people other states. He plans to drill three more wells there.

Probably his biggest enterprise is Gragg Limited in Toronto. There, he laid the first natural gas pipeline into the city. Before, Toronto used manufactured gas and coal.

His company is still working on the Toronto project and has expanded into surrounding towns. He has a crew of 120 men there, 20 of whom are from the United States. "Most of them," he adds, '-are from Oklahoma."

The natural gas is piped from l'exas and Louisiana fields to Buffalo, N. Y. Gragg put in the pipeline from there to Toronto. He organized the Canadian company two years ago and "plans to be there three more yearsand maybe longer".

Doing most of his contracting for oil and gas pipeline construction in this country is the G & H Constructors. This company has laid pipeline in several states, including Kansas, Arkansas, Texas and Oklahoma. It supplied most of the equipment for Gragg's enterprises in Can-

Just awarded a contract for laying gas pipeline in New Hampshire is Gragg Inc., which has offices in Exeter, N. H. The company will lay lines from the main trunklines in Massachusetts to Exeter, Dover, Portsmouth, Rochester and the Ports-

mouth airforce base. This corporation was incor porated in January, 1953, in New Jersey. At the same time, he formed Gragg. Inc., of Okla-

His newest company is T & G Construction, Inc., organized here. It is presently engaged in a \$100,000 centract with the U. S. Army engineers on a project in Pryor.



The advantages of more easily operated controls and of flexible steering wheels with deeply offset hubs to protect the driver's thorax were immediately recognized. From windshields to tires, improvements have underscored survival.

These new "safety" models have spurred fresh interest in highway traffic signals and lighting, radar speed controls, uniformity and reflectorization of "stop", "slow" and other warning signs, have arounsed new concern for the proper examination of prospective drivers and developed improved techniques and foolproof new testing

equipment for vision and driver reaction Next comes the "disablement flare" that provides automatically flashing lights at all four corners of a vehicle stopped on or near the highway. Actually, this safety improvement involves nothing more than an additional switch installed in the turn signal system that causes all


four of these lights to flash simultaneously. Literally speaking, this safety feature of tomorrow is here now, since hundreds of thousands of installations have been made thusfar. The great majority are on trucks. This is because both ICC and state regulations require truckers to set out pot torches, electric lanterns or portable reflectors when stalled on or near the road - and there have been numerous crashes and drivers have been killed while in the act of getting the warning lights out or taking them in. As a result, the American Trucking Associations formally recommend that: "Turn signals shall be wired in such a manner that they will flash simultaneously to indicate vehicle disability.

Certainly such protection is no less desirable for the family car. Death is just as permanent, and injuries just as painful whether you crash in the dark into a 20 ton truck of a two ton passenger automobile, and to be marooned on a busy highway at night with a flat tire, without those flashing guardians- is a nightmare, even when nothing happens.

This "disablement" signalling system has been provided for in the Uniform Vehicle Code and is recognized by the states. And you may be sure it is in the minds of the auto manufacturers who are searching for something new (especially in safety features) for their 1957 models.

THIS HAS GOT TO BE GOOD

There is every reason to believe that the Senate's bipartisan eight-man investigation into lobbying and corrupt political practices will do a thorough job. The probe is backed by a vote of 79 to 1, Senator Langer being the lone objector. It has wide authority, an appropriation of \$350,-000 and will carry on through the elections until the end of the year. And a thorough job is necessary, not only to purge the Senate, but to restore the faith of Americans in their government.



Cull Caged Layers On 28-Day Basis

Poultrymen are beginning to wonder if their old severe culling methods have been too quick to give the ax to some bets, and if less severe culling might not be more profitable.

Hens in cages can't fool the poultryman about production, be cause individual daily records are kept. Many cage operators have been culling birds that drop below 50 percent production for a period of 14 days. Under this system, if a hen lays less than 7 eggs in any two week-period, she is culled and a replacement pullet goes into ber cage.

Research information now indicates that a good ben may have a bad month yet still come back to high production at less cost than it would take to fill her cage with a replacement. A culling experiment was conducted in the cage layer unit at the Balston Purina Besearch Farm near Gray Summit, Mo., involving 2,000 birds. The cages were all filled at the same time with pullets grown in the same flock The birds were of a beavy producing strain. After they had been in production two months. 1.000 were culled under the 14 day system, while no culling

The group culled under the old 14 day gystem showed no pro duction advantage over the nonculled group for the first several months of production. In other wicds, it appeared that good layers might drop below 50 percent production for 14 days, but come back to good production inside

1. Calves are gradually weaned from whole milk or milk replace-

ments. A safe age at which whole milk or milk substitute may be replaced by a suitable startergrain mixture and roughage-depends on their vigor. Usually six. weeks can be considered a safe age for this change.

2. Calves are turned out to pasture as soon as practicable after four months of age. Continue to provide the usual feed and allow access to salt, water and shade, (While grass is an excellent feed for mature animals, it does not contain enough essential growthpermitting nutrients for calves. As a result, they easily fill their
