## WHAT NEXT?

This second half of the present decade may well be recorded in the history books as the highway life-saving era. Most notable in the 1956 model cars, and in the manufacturers' claims for them, are their safety features. Within months, the radical idea of airplane safety-belts was accepted by motorists as a common sense addition to improved brakes and steering. The advantages of more easily operated controls and of flexible steering wheels with deeply offset hubs to protect the driver's thorax were immediately recognized. From windshields to tires, improvements have underscored survival.

These new "safety" models have spurred fresh interest in highway traffic signals and lighting, radar speed controls, uniformity and reflectorization of "stop," "turn," "slow" and other warning signs, have aroused new concern for the proper examination of prospective drivers and developed improved techniques and foolproof new testing equipment for vision and driver reaction.

Next comes the "disablement flare" that provides automatically flashing lights at all four corners of a vehicle stopped on or near the highway. Actually, this safety improvement involves nothing more than an additional switch installed in the turn signal system that causes all four of these lights to flash simultaneously.

Literally speaking, this safety feature of tomorrow is here now, since hundreds of thousands of installations have been made thusfar. The great majority are on trucks. This is because both ICC and state regulations require truckers to set out pot torches, electric lanterns or portable reflectors when stalled on or near the road — and there have been numerous crashes and drivers have been killed while in the act of getting the warning lights out or taking them in. As a result, the American Trucking Associations formally recommend that: "Turn signals shall be wired in such a manner that they will flash simultaneously to indicate vehicle disability."

Certainly such protection is no less desirable for the family car. Death is just as permanent, and injuries just as painful whether you crash in the dark into a 20 ton truck of a two ton passenger automobile, and to be marooned on a busy highway at night with a flat tire, without those flashing guardians — is a nightmare, even when nothing happens.

This "disablement" signalling system has been provided for in the Uniform Vehicle Code and is recognized by the states. And you may be sure it is in the minds of the auto manufacturers who are searching for something new (especially in safety features) for their 1957 models.

## THIS HAS GOT TO BE GOOD

There is every reason to believe that the Senate's bipartisan eight-man investigation into lobbying and corrupt political practices will do a thorough job. The probe is backed by a vote of 79 to 1. Senator Langer being the lone objector. It has wide authority, an appropriation of \$350,000 and will carry on through the elections until the end of the year. And a thorough job is necessary, not only to purge the Senate, but to restore the faith of Americans in their government.

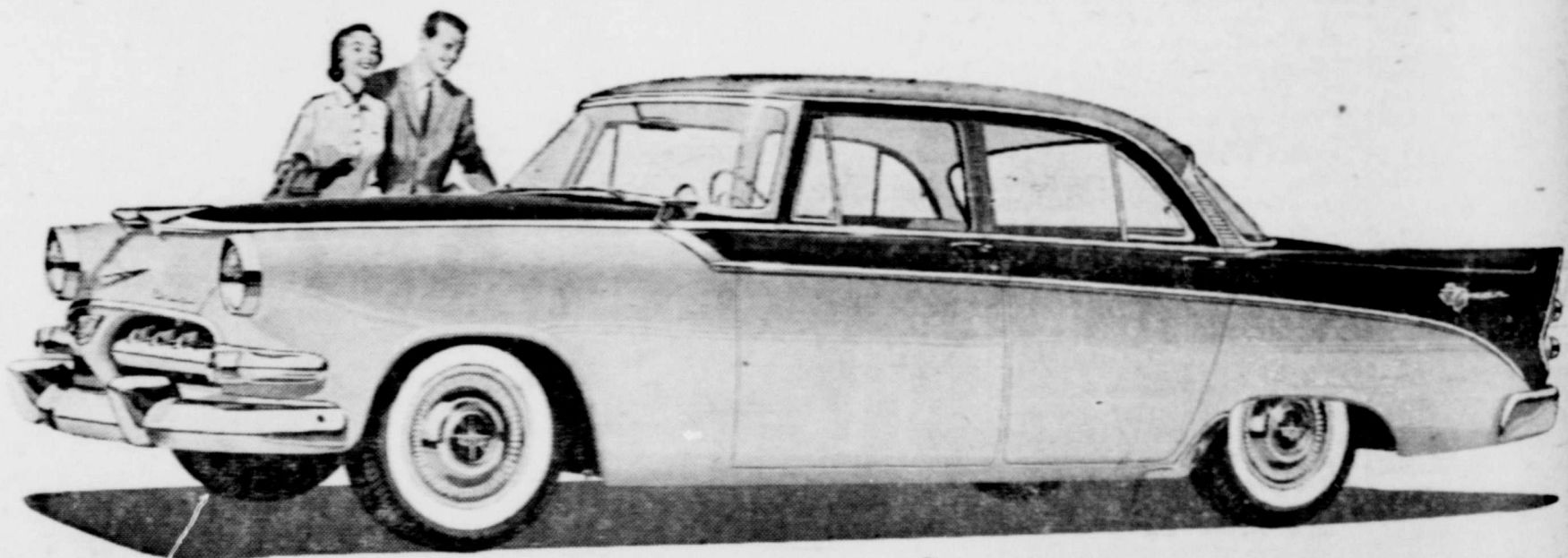

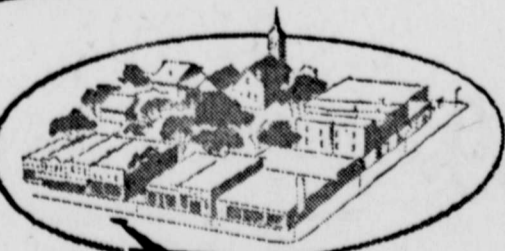

### Spring in the Air Says James Brady

James T. Brady, Jr., manager of the Retail Merchants Association, made his weather observation today after a swing around the local mercantile establishments.

Everywhere, Brady reports, spring is really in the air. Counters and show cases at every place he visited exemplify that the merchants are well prepared for what is expected to be the biggest spring buying season in Burkburnett history.

Since spring is the time for people to set out their garden, plan their vacation, repaint their motor boat, test their fishing lines, clean their golf clubs and plan weekend outdoor outings, Brady jotted down various spring specials and the types of stores that will carry such items by classification of spring projects. Here they are:

For Sportsmen -- Spring is the most pleasant time of the year to pursue your favorite sport. Hardware Stores and Service Stations have available the latest equipment in all sports lines, whether it be baseball, golf, tennis, swimming, boating, fishing. Most sporting goods stores and all department stores and wearing apparel specialty stores carry all types of sports wear, whether it be fishing boats or golfer sweaters. Most hardware stores also carry sports lines, especially in the field of fishing.

For those planning spring parties -- now is the time to get ready for various entertainments with your friends, whether it be an outdoor barbecue with your neighbors or a spring formal. Check your barbecue pit to see if any of your cooking utensils have become misplaced during the winter. All hardware and department stores and most grocery stores carry many items for outdoor cooking. Many new lines in outdoor furniture have been added this year by your favorite furniture store. You may want to buy this year the

outdoor set of furniture you have been putting off buying for so long. The latest fashions for spring parties, both formal and informal, have been stocked by women's wear stores and department stores. If the party you are attending requires a gift, jewelry stores can furnish you with suggestions, binoculars for the men, earring set for the ladies and cigarette lighters for both sexes.

For the vacationer -- it will only be a short time until vacations begin. Get ready now. Check the tires on your car. Any automobile supply store or service station will be glad to help you pick out replacements. ## Cull Caged Layers On 28-Day Basis

Poultrymen are beginning to wonder if their old severe culling methods have been too quick to give the ax to some hens, and if less severe culling might not be more profitable.

Hens in cages can't feed the poultryman about production, he cause individual daily records are kept. Many cage operators have been culling birds that drop below 50 percent production for a period of 14 days. Under this system, if a hen lays less than 7 eggs in any two week-period, she is culled and a replacement pullet goes into her cage.

Research information now indicates that a good hen may have a bad month yet still come back to high production at less cost than it would take to fill her cage with a replacement. A culling experiment was conducted in the cage layer unit at the Balmori Poultry Research Farm near Gray Summit, Mo., involving 2,000 birds. The cages were all filled at the same time with pullets grown in the same flock. The birds were of a heavy producing strain. After they had been in production two months, 1,000 were culled under the 14 day system, while no culling was done in the other 1,000.

The group culled under the old 14 day system showed no production advantage over the non-culled group for the first several months of production. In other words, it appeared that good layers might drop below 50 percent production for 14 days, but come back to good production inside of 28 days.

This culling work, which is still continuing, emphasizes that good culling is still vital to egg profits. It has also resulted in Purina's recommendation to cull birds that drop below 50 percent production for at least 28 days, rather than 14. Even then a previous record of high production may justify a few extra days grace for the hen.

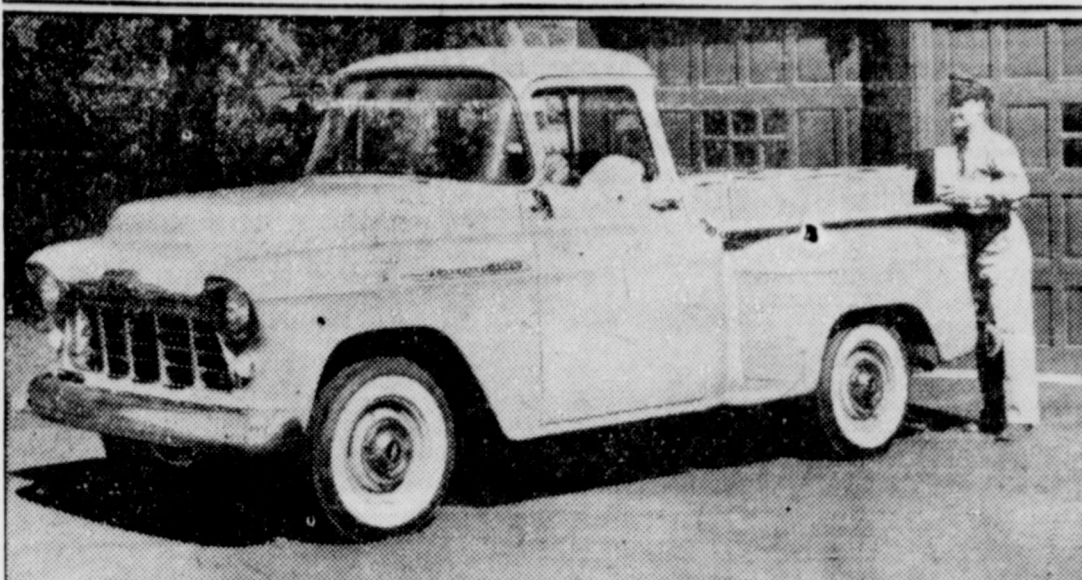

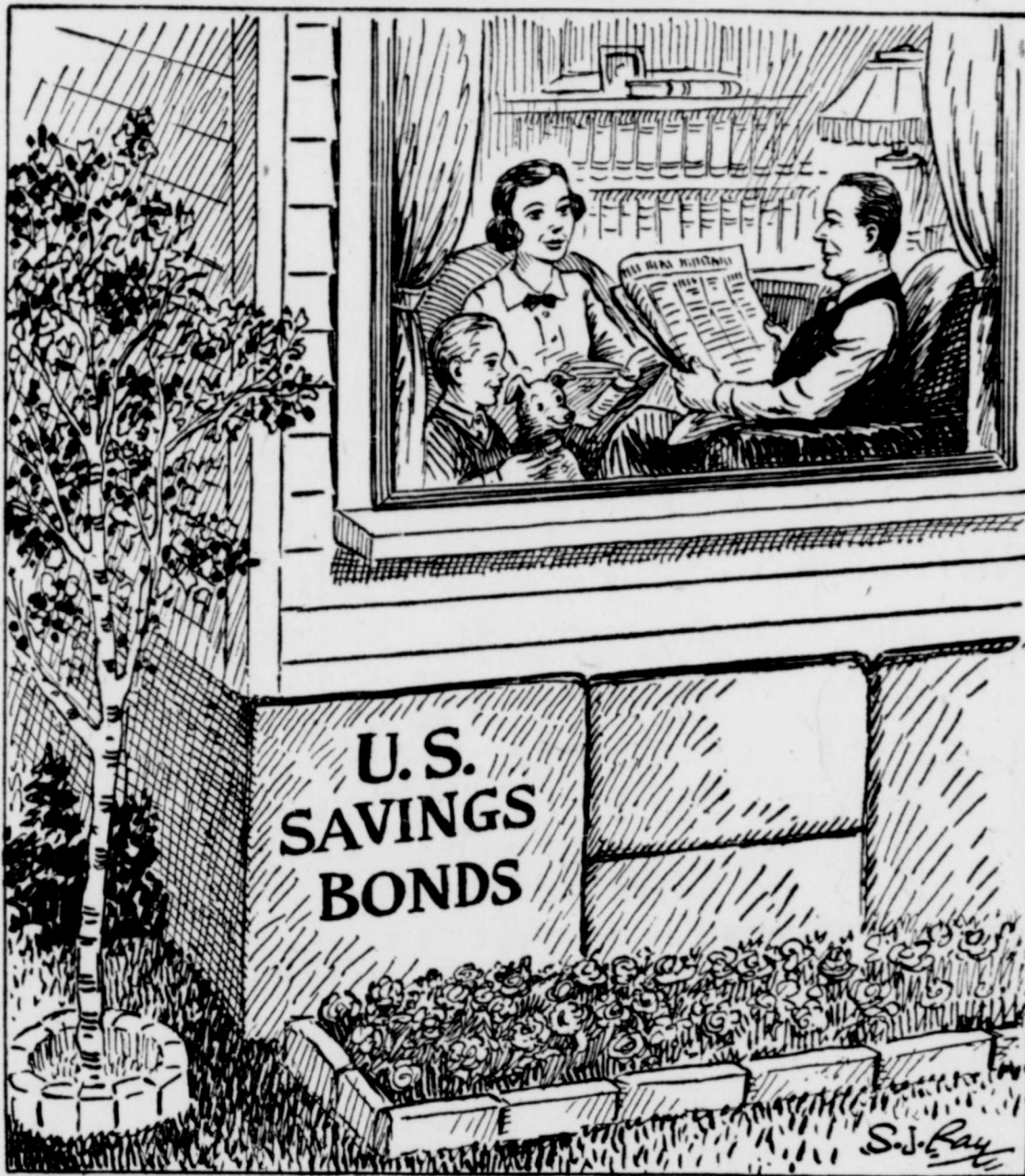

## IN THE NAME OF THE LAW

The guns of death to which I refer are the useless and unused guns. Quite often they are the unloaded guns. Do you have a useless death weapon in a dresser drawer at home, an almost forgotten gun which has lain there unused and unnoticed for months or years? If so, we pray that this unnoticed potential instrument of death will continue unused and unnoticed, unless, of course, you would notice it enough to rid your self of it.

I am not one of those who cry, "Do away with guns! prohibit the possession of a pistol by law. But this must eventually be done if a better way cannot be found.

Common sense tells me that they should be removed from the reach of the drunkard, the idiot, the careless and the children of the home, and years of experience have shown me that they are unsafe when the safety rules are not only not used but unknown. A rattlesnake is not dangerous in a cage. A pistol is dangerous even where constant vigilance is exercised and all safety rules known and practiced. You just have to relax your vigilance a second and a death may result.

Our boys and girls play cops and robbers now. They emulate sheriffs and bad men, outlaws and Indians. They have their own belts and pistols and they practice the fast draw. They are definitely gun conscious. They are interested in guns. They are not afraid of guns.

What is more natural than for a boy of nine or ten or even fourteen or fifteen to want to handle that old forgotten gun in the trunk or clothes closet or dresser drawer? What is more natural than for him to show it to the neighborhood gang? Death to most of them is something that happens on a TV screen, and it usually happens to the bad man, not the good man and is passed over so lightly and seen so often that it seems almost unimportant.

They do not realize the potentialities of grandpa's old thumb buster or Daddy's automatic, a war souvenir.

But they learn. They learn too late! You read the papers. The tragedy touches you lightly unless you know the boys. But you read about the boy, eager, lively good looking American boy who is suddenly terrified and sick when the gun goes off and his neighborhood playmate lies bleeding and gasping and dying.

This is not a TV story. It is not imaginary. They do not run fairly

The verse is translated thus: "But you shall receive power after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you; and you shall be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and Judea and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost parts of the earth."

Then, the word "dunamis," translated "power," is the same word that we got our english

word "dynamite." Do you see the implication? Bretheran, we who have accepted Christ as our savior and received the Holy Spirit literally have "dynamite" in our pockets. We have the power to cleanse our sins, to save us from condemnation, and the power to face every situation the world has to offer by way of temptation.
