Wheat Outlook Very Doubtful

If Rains Delay

What appeared earlier to be a promising bumper wheat crop could fizzle out if needed rains do not come in the next few days. Rain last fall, plus two or three very wet snows brought the small grain crop up to the best prospects in years. But, only traces to no rain at all this spring has changed the picture considerably.

Many farmers believe that a good slow rain right now would not save some wheat. Others believe that with the proper mois-ture they would still make a dandy crop.

From the road, some wheat is very deceiving. It is almost knee high and appears to have heads two to three inches long. On examination, the heads found to have no grains. A few hot days and this wheat would wither and be completely lost.

MORE MOONS THAN VENUS

While we have our doubts that they're cheaper by the dozen, that's the number of earth satellites the US Government will launch into the wild blue yonder during the International Geophysical Year, which occurs from 1957 to 1958. These 20 inch metal balls, stuffed with suntry instruments, will weigh from 20 to 50 pounds. Each will be hoisted about 300 miles above the earth by an eleven ton, three-stage rocket, touched off from the Florida sands and inclined to drop its spent sections in the South

On reaching its ceiling, the satellite will be traveling about 18,000 mph enabling it to circle the earth every hour and a half and may stay in its orbit for weeks or months or even longer, sending back meanwhile various data on what it's like up there. They will also report from that vantage point, say the experts, what it's like down here, giving us better dope on our geography than the map-

The cost, as voted by the House Appropriations committee, will be \$19,262,000.

Actually, the scientists expect to make eighteen of these moonlets, hope to launch 12 and pray that at least eight of them will stay up there for a while. But if only one does, we shall have definite proof that the world is

WHAT'S HAPPENED IN EDUCATION

Sometime ago 1,500 high school students in a typical industrial community were polled as to their view on certain economic questions.

The results, according to Ralph T. Moore, writing in the Oregon Voter, was as follows: "A majority of those polled favored the totalitarian system of price controls over free enterprise wherein the consumer controls prices through exercise of his preference franchise. Most believed that owners of a business get too much compared with employees. A large majority subscribed to the Communist exiom that from each should be taken in accord with his ability and to each should be given in accord with his needs, the latter of course being only vaguely defined. And the majority also subscribed to the Communist manifesto that no worker should produce all he can. The replies more resembled those to be expected from a Russian youth organization than from American high school youngsters.

About the best single word that can be applied to this symposium is "shocking." It is evident that if such views are at all representative of youthful thinking, something has gone terribly wrong with our educational system. That means education in the schools, where the truth is supposed to be taught. It also means the education that children should absorb in the home. And it points to failure on the part of business and other groups which have the duty of speaking for free enterprise.

The young people of today will, tomorrow, determine what kind of country this is to be. That is a sobering thought, in the light of this poll.
