## THE GAS PRODUCERS POSITION

The sale of natural gas to consumers by distributing companies, and the interstate transmission of the gas by pipelines, are public utility functions. As such, they long have been are and will continue to be publicly regulated.

But the production of natural gas in the field is in no way a public ulitity function. Senator Fulbright made this abundantly clear when he said of the gas producer: "He must compete with thousands of other producers for lease before he can drill a single well. Should he be lucky and hit that one-to-nine shot, he must compete with many other producers for a market. No one guarantees him a return on his invested capital, thus eliminating the tremendous risks he must take. His is inescapably a business of economic imponderables. His costs are almost impossible to ascertain.

"The producer, in short, is no more a public utility than the man in West Virginia who sells coal to an electric company in New York, no more one than the oil producer who sells diesel oil to a railroad ,no more one than the Detroit manufacturer who sells buses to our local transit company, no more one than the California manufacturer who sells airplanes to the airlines of America.

Senator Fulbright is among the leaders of a bipartisan campaign to free gas producers of needless and dangerous federal controls (brought about as a result of a Supreme Court decision) which must inevitably discourage exploration and risk-taking, reduce production, increase costs, and in other ways work to the direct disadvantage of the consumer.

## KEEP YOUR FINGERS CROSSED

Labeling Alger Hiss and the late Harry Dexter White as architects of UNESCO (a mismash which stands for United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization) National Commander J. Addington Wagner of the American Legion has asked Congress for a full-scale investigation of its activities.

In testimony before the House Foreign Affairs subcommittee on internation organizations and movements, Commander Wagner declared that such a probe would reveal the need for repealing the law creating the U. S. National Commission for UNESCO, as called for by resolution of the 1955 Legion convention in Miami.

In addition to Hiss and White, Commander Wagner, wounded Navy veteran of World War II, named other associated with UNESCO who have been affiliated with as many as 17 organizations identified as subversive by the Attorney General or the House Un-American Activities committee. Such characters and UNESCO and the National Commission, he charged, are infecting the nation's chool system with world-government propaganda, and at the expense of American taxpayers. Wagner quoted from a UNESCO publication complaining that "education for world-mindness" is running into trouble outside the school principally in the form of "nationalism."



It is the time of year once again to make definite plans for planting winter legumes, accordng to B. T. Haws, county agent. However, there will have to be good rain before anything can

The two major winter legumes planted in Wichita County are hairy vetch and Austrian Winter peas. Hairy vetch is recommended in the sandy soil and Burkburnett. Austrian Winter Peas in the tight soils.

In the past several years the value of winter legumes has been demonstratd by participants in the Bridwell Soil Builders Awards program. In every case crops following legumes have increased yields. What following legumes gives an increase up to Morning Worship . 10:50 A. M. 5 to 20 bushels per acre. while to 600 pounds of seed cotton per acre. The Bridwell Soil Awards to you to come and worship with great increase in winter and summer legumes in Wichita, Clay and Archer counties.

Below are given the important facts about winter legumes.

Why Plant Legumes - (1.) Furnishes a cover on the ground during a time when most soils will blow. (2) adds organic matter which helps to hold water, plant food anr air. (3) Adds nitrogen to the soil which is essential to the growth of all crops. 4) Increases crop production. (5) Vetch can be used as a good cash crop by harvesting seed. Fertilizer Theatment - 200 lbs. or 0-20-0 per acre. Apply commercial fertilier according to recommendation from soil analy-

Planting Date- From September to November 15th.

Inoculation - Inoculation is advisable even if grown the year before. Use culture "C"

Method and Rate of Planting-Sow with a grain drill on prepared seedbed or in grain sorghum stubble or cotton stalks without any preparation. If plant ing on clean land, a crop such as rye wheat or oats should be seeded with the vetch to help hold it up during growth.

Rates for Vetch - Drilled alone-15-25 lbs per acre. With small grain - 10-15 lbs

Rates for Planting Austrian Winter Peas - 30 to 40 pounds per acre drilled alone. 20 to 25 pounds per acre drilled with small grain, 15 pounds per acre put in three foot rows.

Covering Depth-2 to 3 inches. Harvesting for Vetch - For green manure, mluch into soil when in full bloom. For seed. harvest with combine. For hay cut when small grain is ready for haying.

Time to Plow Up Austrian Winter Peas - Chisel or chop up in early spring at least three week's before planting a suc-ceeding crop.

Haws states that he would like to urge all farmers to contact Bob Crocker at the ASC office as there is a payment on vetch and Austrian Winter Seed.

## October 6th-21st

Spectacular illumination and scenic water effects will be incorporated into a dazzling "Esplanade of Light" for the 1956 State Fair of Texas, Oct. 6-21.

The lighting effects will be the most magnificent and thrilling since those which illuminated the Texas Centennial Exposition on the Dallas fairgrounds in 1936. In addition to the modern

theatrical illuminative techniques an array of 1,772 jets and fountains of water will leap and cascade in and around the 730 foot long reflecting pool which forms the centerpice of the Esplanade, C. A. West, Recording Secretary just inside the main gates to the fairgrounds.

Lights playing on and under the water will provide everchanging kaleidoscopic effects of magnificent color.

Dallas Power and Light Company is co-sponsor with the State Fair of Texas of the lighting and fountain project.

The Esplanade of Light will utilize enough electrical voltage to light up a small city. There will be a total of 981 spots and floods. Special mercury vapor lamps will give a silver green glow to the 40 great live oak trees along the Esplanade.

The overall lighting effects for the Esplanade of Light were designed by C. M. Cutler of General Electric Company. Mr. Cutler is one of the world's top experts on illumination. He served as Director of Lighting for the Texas Centennial and was also a consultant on lighting for the Chicago Century of Progress Exposition. From 1937 to 1939 he represented General Electric Grady Hancock, of Wichita Falls, on lighting matters at the New Oscar Klinkerman, Lorande, World's Fair.

Everett Folsom, illumination engineer for the Dallas Power George Lutz of Vernon, Butch and Light Company, is working Klinkerman of Iowa Park, J. R. with Mr. Cutler on the project, Klinkerman of Electra, and Tom serving as the Dallas coordinator. State Fair At Dallas will have 1,000 separate water. Two 6 foot rings will have 226 jets each, shooting 25 feet into the air, and lighted by colorscopes. Five 18 foot stars will shoot water 20 feet into the air along the length of the reflecting pool and at the lower end the two 25 foot pylons will have a colorful flow of water cascading down its length.

Yellow "buttercup" lights, 82 on each side of the pool, will line the bordering walks.



## Notes From The County Agent

No detectable amount of the hormone-like chemical, stillbestrol, is present in meat steers "fed this substance in fattening rations. Extensive tissue tests made by the Food and Drug Administration and reported by the USDA confirmed findings of state experiment stations in their research with stillbettrol.

Cotton producers of Texas and the nation are being asked to take every possible step to keep tar spots out of their cotton. The problem has become serious enough says B. T. Haws. county agent to warrant a belt-wide campaign of elimination.

Surplus agricultural commodities valued at about \$1 1-2 biltion have been sold to foreign countries in exchange for their own currency since Sept., 1954. Of this total, \$759 million worth was arranged for in the first six months of 1956, reports B. T. Haws. Sales of cotton ranked second to wheat flour.

The USDA reports that a \$3 million investment in research has given more than \$1 billion in added returns to oat growers. That's a return of \$1,000 for each

The bollworm is doing a lots of damage to cotton in the counby. Farmers are cautioned to check their cotton and spray if necessary. The cotton, as a whole is good in the county and farmers have already started harvesting early planted cotton. The cotton harvest will get in full swing the latter part of August.

Now is a good time to make plans to plant winter legumes on your farm. Federal cost-staring will be according to Bob Crocker, ASC County Office Manager: Austrian Winter Peas, 3.6c per pound Hairy Vetch, 9c and Madrid Clover 8c.

American artists are sharing the concert platform with the Hamburg Symphony Orchestra, which is featuring the best known works of Mozart in commemoration of the 200th anniversary of the great musician. Guest conductor for two of the orchestra's performances is Leon Barzin, from the United States. ## Arab Patriarch Holds Fond Memories of U.S.



Boulos Maoushi, the patriarch of nearly a million Maronite Christians around the world, is a native Lebanese who spent more than a decade of his life as a parish priest in the United States. The tall, grey-bearded prelate was appointed last year as spiritual head of the ancient Oriental Catholic community by Pope Pius XII. Although many Americans may not be aware of the size of the Maronite sect in this country, the patriarch estimates that there are 100,000 members now living in the United

Patriarch Maoushi became well acquainted with these American Maronites during his service as parish priest in New Bedford, Mass., and Los Angeles. A man with a keen sense of humor and strong moral courage, he came to this country in 1923 to study conditions of the Maronite communities in the United States and

"At the time I expected to stay on two years," he recollects, but his tour of duty was extended to 1934. During this period, almost all the Lebanese emigrants in America knew young Maoushi who devoted himself to community service, As a parish priest in Los Angeles, he launched a fund-collecting campaign to repay debts incurred by the local Maronite House and also managed to build the city's "Madonna of Lebanon" church.

"We had just completed our new church and I thought at last I could relax when I was called back to Lebanon in 1934 to become Bishop of Tyre," the 61-year-old prelate recalls. He succeeded Bishop Shukrallah Khouri, who died in the same year.

A man with a broad international background, the patriarch was educated in Lebanon, Rome and Paris, and is the master of seven languages. During his eleven years in United States, he absorbed the values of freedom and democracy, plus the intrinsic dignity of the individual, and today stands as a staunch supporter of all these values.






