## New Bridge On Red River Due In Two Years

A million dollar bridge across the Red River north of Burkburnett, Texas, on U. S. 281, to be built within two years, was approved for construction by the Oklahoma and Texas Highway Commissioners in Oklahoma City this week.

The long sought bridge will be built north of Burkburnett and south of Lawton, the commissioners said.

Another bridge, on U. S. 75, was also approved.

The first project, the commissioners agreed, will be a \$400,000 span south of Durant, Okla., and north of Denison, Texas, on U. S. 75. A contract will be let next summer.

Cost of the two projects will be shared equally by both states.

The bridges, each 2 lanes, wide, will be used for one-way traffic with existing bridges serving opposite traffic.

The bridge north of Burkburnett will be in a line between the Y on East 3rd St. and the Y on top of the hill in Oklahoma. The new structure will be some 3/4 mile west of the present bridge.

## 1957 Plymouth To Be Shown Here Oct. 30th

The 1957 Plymouth will be displayed by dealers throughout the nation beginning Tuesday, Oct. 30th. Plymouth President J. P. Mansfield announced today.

Lower, wider and more powerful, the new model represents a complete change in styling, body structure and chassis.

Mansfield said the new car is the result of a telescoping of Plymouth's forward planning. "The car we are about to introduce has the style and features of the car we had thought, only a few years ago, as possible for about 1960," Mansfield said. "We have moved faster than we had hoped. The public has shown an eagerness to accept dramatic change."

1957 Plymouth models are as much as five inches lower than corresponding 1956 models. The wheelbase has been lengthened from 115 inches for all models in 1956 to 118 inches for standard models and 122 inches for Suburban station wagons in the 1957 line.

## Swept-Wing 1957 Dodge to Show October 30th at Burkburnett Motors

Lower, longer and wider with far-reaching advances for quieter smoother performance, the 1957 Swept-Wing Dodge passenger cars make their first appearance in dealers showrooms on Tuesday, Oct. 30th.

M. C. Patterson, Dodge President, said dynamic new principles of auto design and manufacture, with exciting new applications of materials, have been combined to produce an advanced design 1957 Dodge with "entirely new riding characteristics, virtually free of vibration noise and road shock."

The same autodynamic principles responsible for achieving this new driving sensation in the 1957 Dodge also made possible many of the car's Swept-wing styling advances.

An all new suspension system and newly designed frame give the 1957 Dodge a much lower center of gravity, providing road hugging qualities formerly found only in high priced sports cars.

Not only is this a major contribution to highway safety, but it also enabled Dodge to reduce car height by as much as five inches, so that the new Lancer hardtop stands less than 55 inches high.

The 1957 Dodge features swept-wing rear fenders comparable to the rudders of airplanes or racing boats. Keynote of the Dodge styling theme, they also have the definite functional purpose of stabilizing the car in cross-winds.

The old vertical coil front springs are gone from the 1957 Dodge, which resents a new type modern front suspension, Torsion-Aire.

Horizontal steel torsion bars have replaced the upright coil type springs, and the new springing is achieved by slightly twisting these sturdy, straight bars. The torsion bars give a smoother softer ride, last longer, require less maintenance and occupy less space, a major factor in lowering the car's overall height.

Rear leaf springs are mounted outside the frame rather than inside, substantially increasing the car's stability and reducing sway on turns.

Suspension and steering systems of the new Dodge, as well as the engine, are completely isolated from the frame with rubber insulation to eliminate metal to metal contact for smoother, quieter performance.

Dodge's new Torque-Flite push button transmission gives livelier response in both acceleration and engine braking, and the smoothest kind of getaway performance.

Five selector buttons for Torque-Flite are located conveniently on the left side of the instrument panel, with "first," "second" and "drive" forward ranges plus neutral and reverse. The "drive" range is used for 95 percent of all driving. "first" provides maximum power for sand or mud, or top engine braking for descending long, steep hills. "Second" may be used for acceleration or for engine braking on lesser grades.

Power-Flite, the original push-button automatic transmission with four selector buttons, is available for the 1957 Dodge Coronet models only.

Roof lines are thinner to accent the Swept-Wing look of the 1957 Dodge, but the roofs are stronger, yielding substantial improvement in driver visibility through use of 53 percent more windshield glass.

The larger windshield wraps around at the bottom as well as the top, and on 1957 Dodge convertibles they also curve into the roof itself.

Fourteen-inch tubeless tires are standard on the new Dodge. The larger tires, mounted on smaller but wider safety rim wheels, provide a double tread on the road surface for greater safety.

Dodge offers a new line of engines for 1957. Displacement of the Red Ram V-8 has been increased to 325 cubic inches and the compression ratio to 8.5 to 1. The Super Red Ram engine (power pack) for Custom Royal models is equipped with four barrel carburetor, dual exhausts and extensions, special distributor, special air cleaner and four barrel intake manifold. A special D-500 engine, featuring a redesigned intake manifold and a four barrel carburetor, also is available. Compression ratio of the Getaway 6 to 8.0 to 1 and the displacement is 230 cubic inches.

## 1,200 RED HERRINGS

The USSR's memorandum bragging about its reduction of armed forces by 1,200,000 and which has been sent to all the NATO nations, has drawn a stinging reply from Prime Minister Louis St. Laurent of Canada.

The joy of Canadians over this colossal news, he declared, is "somewhat tempered by reflection that these reductions would have been more timely ten years ago, when the Western powers demobilized the great armies they had brought together in the common interest of the United Nations." Mr. St. Laurent added, in his note to Premier Bulganin that when this reduction is effected the Soviets will still have more divisions in Europe than the free world.

Further, he might have asked just who, from the West, is to be permitted to count Red noses to see that the cut has, in fact, been made. And he might have also pointed out the general awareness of the NATO allies that the 1,200,000 soldiers who are doubtless being sent home to meet serious manpower deficiencies on farms and in factories can be brought back into uniform at the snap of Kremlin fingers.

In discussing further cuts in US military manpower presumably the reduction of 800,000 by 1960 as advocated by Chairman Radford of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Secretary of State Dulles told his press conference that this was a matter for the military experts, but pointed out reasons to expect such a trend. He also took occasion to refer to the USSR as a "Johnny Come lately" in the matter of troop reductions.

But if this Russian move should have the effect of reducing the military "force goals" of NATO, particularly the troop commitment of West Germany and hasten further drastic manpower cuts in US forces at home and abroad, the Russians will not mind name-calling, even by our Secretary of State.

## RIGHTS AND OBLIGATIONS

The right to nationalize property is an element of the Suez Canal situation—but it is not the central one. The fundamental question concerns just application of that right.

The right of a nation to nationalize property situated within its borders is generally acknowledged. The injury to the previous owners is recognized in the obligation of the nation to pay prompt and effective compensation.

But no man-made "right" is absolute and limitless. With respect to nationalization, there are conditions, of which the Suez Canal situation is one example, in which that right has been superseded by an obligation.

When a nation enters into a contract, as has been done in the case of the Suez Canal, that nation waives the right of nationalization for a stated period. If this were not so, the second party of the contract would not assume the obligations which he takes upon himself. Each party pledges itself to perform or not to perform certain acts.

In the case of Suez, nationalization of the property in 1956 was definitely provided for. What is wrong is for Egypt unilaterally to shorten the term of the contract it solemnly entered into.

If we take the position that it is right and proper for governments, simply by virtue of being government and not private parties, to alter or destroy contracts they have undertaken, then we grant that there is no higher standard of right in the world than the arbitrary whim of governments. We admit that the pledge of a government has no substance or validity, and we give this admission the sanction of morality.

To do this would be to take a long backward step in the whole concept of orderly human relations. It would leave the might of one nation to enforce its whim against the whim of another as the final measure of right.

## PEOPLE'S CAPITALISM

More and more Americans are putting a part of their savings in shares in our corporation—and the trend is particularly marked among people of modest means, and in the smaller communities of the country.

These are highlights from the New York Stock Exchange's new 1956 census of shareowners, based on a nationwide study of 4,600 corporations and a survey of the adult population.

In the past four years the number of people owning shares in those corporations has jumped 33 percent, to a total of 8,630,000. Two thirds of the shareowners have incomes of less than \$7,500 a year. Women outnumber men shareowners by a narrow margin. The greatest growth in shareownership has taken place in communities with populations of from 2,500 to 25,000.

A particularly significant fact is that the median income of today's shareowner is \$6,200, as against \$7,100 in 1952. Families in modest circumstances clearly have a very different attitude toward stock than did their equivalents in past times.

Keith Fuston, president of the Exchange said: "The nation can take tremendous satisfaction in the great progress made in the last few years in broadening shareownership and creating a 'People Capitalism.' This provides excellent evidence to send abroad about the real meaning of the most successful economic system ever devised." If the news ever reaches the oppressed, poverty-stricken masses in the Iron Curtain countries, the dictators will have something to worry about.

and with the following absent: none, constituting a quorum; and among other proceedings had were the following:

Commissioner Kelley introduced a resolution and order and moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Lippard. The motion, carrying with it the adoption of the resolution and order, prevailed by the following vote:

AYES: Mayor Smith and Commissioners Reagan, Lippard, Brookman and Kelley.

NAYS: None.

The RESOLUTION and ORDER is as follows:  
WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the City of Burkburnett, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said City for the purpose hereinafter mentioned; and WHEREAS, the Board of

Commissioners considers that it is to the best interest of the City and its inhabitants that at the earliest possible date the City provide funds for such purpose, thereby creating an emergency measure for the immediate preservation of the public business, property, health and safety and for the usual daily operation of a municipal department; therefore

BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT:

SECTION 1: That an election be held on the 13th day of Nov., 1956, which date is not less than fifteen (15) days nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this resolution and order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified electors who own taxable property in said City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

"SHALL the Board of Commissioners of the City of Burkburnett Texas be authorized to issue THREE HUNDRED SEVENTY FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$375,000) of revenue bonds of said City for the purpose of constructing improvements and extensions to the City's waterworks system; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed forty (40) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed five per cent (5%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; said revenue bonds to be special obligations of the City, payable as to both principal and interest solely from and secured by a first lien on and pledge of the revenues of the City's combined Waterworks and Light and Power Systems, after deduction of reasonable operation and maintenance expenses, as said expenses are defined by Statute?"

SECTION 2: That said election shall be held at the CITY HALL in the City of Burkburnett, Texas, and the entire City shall constitute one election precinct.

SECTION 3: That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election to-wit:  
F. T. FELTY, Presiding Judge;  
JAMES E. FRYE, Judge;  
MRS. EVELYN FELTY, Clerk,  
and MRS. JOHNNY HAGEMAN, Clerk

SECTION 4: That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities, as provided in the General Laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified electors who own taxable property in the City, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote.

SECTION 5: That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V. A. T. S. Election Code adopted by the Fifty-second Legislature in 1951, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$375,000 WATERWORKS REVENUE BONDS AND PLEDGING THE REVENUES OF THE CITY'S COMBINED WATERWORKS AND LIGHT AND POWER SYSTEM TO THE PAYMENT THEREOF."  
"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF \$375,000 WATERWORKS REVENUE BONDS AND PLEDGING THE REVENUES OF THE CITY'S COMBINED WATERWORKS AND LIGHT AND POWER SYSTEM TO THE PAYMENT THEREOF."

AS TO THE foregoing proposition, each voter may mark out with black ink or pencil one of such expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition; or in the alternative each voter may vote on the proposition by placing an "X" in the square appearing on the ballot beside the expression of his choice.

SECTION 6: In the event the said revenue bonds are authorized to be issued by a majority of the qualified electors of said City, voting at said election, and the same are issued and sold, the holder or holders of such bonds shall never have the right to demand payment thereof out of any funds raised or to be raised by taxation; and each bond issued or executed in pursuance of such election shall contain this clause:

"The holder hereof shall never have the right to demand payment of this obligation out of any funds raised or to be raised by taxation."

SECTION 7: That a copy of

this resolution and order, signed by the Mayor of the City and attested by the City Secretary, shall serve as proper notice of said elections.

SECTION 8: That notice of said election shall be given by posting and publication of a copy of this resolution and order at the top of which shall appear the words:

"NOTICE OF CITY BOND ELECTION." Said notice shall be posted at three public places in said City, one of which shall be at the City Hall, not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation, published in the City of Burkburnett, Texas, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election.

SECTION 9: That the revenue bonds presented for vote under the proposition hereinabove set out are to be ratably secured in such manner that no one bond shall have priority of lien over any other bond or bonds so provided; and so that no one bond authorized at the election herein ordered shall have priority of lien over any of the outstanding Waterworks and Light and Power System Improvement and Extension Revenue Bonds, Series 1952, dated April 1, 1952, authorized at an election held on the 26th day of February, 1952, originally issued in the principal sum of \$350,000. It is the intent and purpose of the Board of Commissioners that if authorized at the election herein ordered, the revenue bonds herein proposed shall constitute an indebtedness against the City's combined Waterworks and Light and Power System for the purpose hereinabove stated, payable from the net revenues of the City's combined Waterworks and Light and Power System, on a parity with the Waterworks and Light and Power System Improvement and Extension Revenue Bond, Series 1952, dated April 1, 1952, originally issued in the principal sum of \$350,000, as aforesaid.

SECTION 10: The public importance of this measure and the fact that it is to the best interest of the City and its inhabitants that at the earliest possible date the City provide funds for the improvements herein authorized, constitute and create an emergency and an urgent public necessity for the immediate preservation of the public business, property, health and safety, and for the usual daily operation of a municipal department, requiring that any rule providing for resolutions and orders to be read or voted upon at more than one meeting of the Board of Commissioners be suspended, and requiring that this resolution and order be passed and take effect as an emergency measure, and such rule is accordingly suspended and this resolution and order is passed as an emergency measure and shall take effect and be in full force immediately from and after its passage.

George W. Busby, CDPS Motor Vehicle Division, stated that more than 4,200 licensed stations in the State would be equipped to handle the starting of the inspection program.

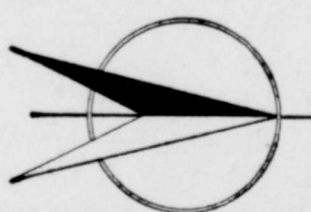

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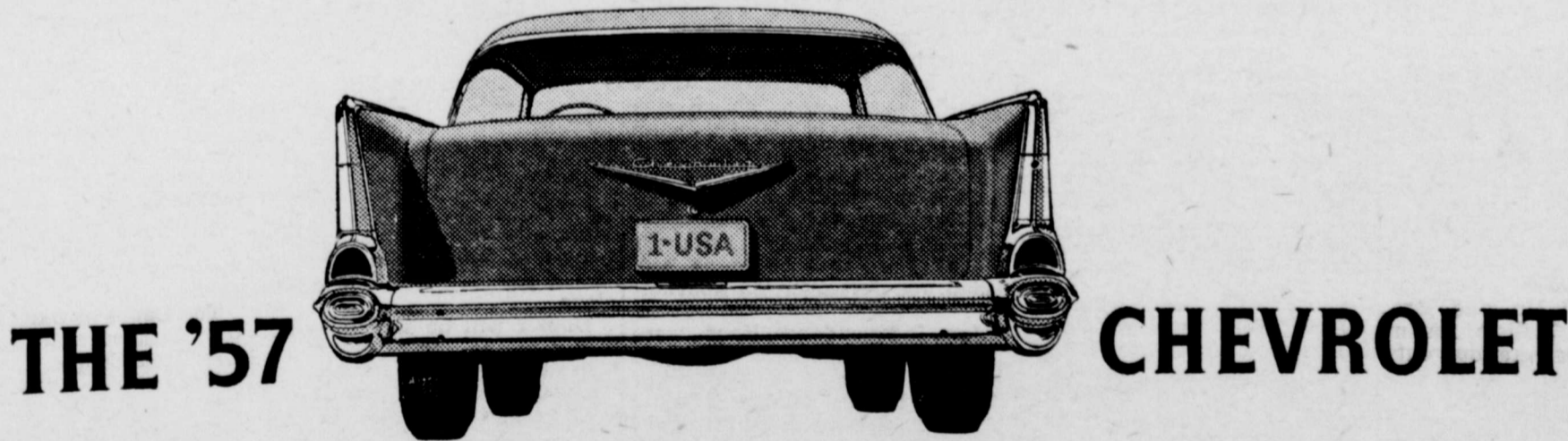
